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Eleventh Meeting of the 27th Senate
Monday, August 13, 1990

1. Call to order by the Presiding Officer:

The meeting was called to order by the Speaker of the Senate Mark Burge at 6:05 PM.

2. Opening call of the roll by the Secretary:

Senate Secretary Nandita Venkateswaran called the opening roll and the following senators were present: John A. Berggren, Michael C. Berry, P. Jan Burns, Preeti Gandhi, Charlie Hasselbrink, Tuan Vu Nguyen, Michael Rosenberger, Tiffany Russell, Farrel Sharp.

The following senators were absent at the opening roll call: Joel Richards, D. Lee Grooms, Shannon Wilkie.

The following senators were excused: None.

3. Reading and approval of the Senate Journal from the Previous Meeting:

The Senate Journal was approved as corrected by the members.

4. Special Reports:

Dr. Michael Bisesi, Associate Dean of the College of Business Administration and Dr. David Small, Associate President for Student Services spoke on the Future of Career Planning and Placement at UH. Speaker Burge asked that the senators pay close attention to the speakers as bills favoring both sides of the issue were going to be proposed during the meeting.

Speaking first, Dr. Bisesi said the College of Business Administration has two constituencies- the University and the business community. He said the business community is a major stakeholder as they are also the final consumers. He said 25% of UH students are business majors. It would therefore be in the best interest of the University to have a separate business career planning and placement center as it would provide more personalized services. He said it is in the best interest of the University to have better-served recruiters. A centralized center will save company recruiter time and will provide better facilities to the recruiters. He mentioned the names of some major corporations like Coca Cola and Tenneco and said they supported the idea of a separate career planning and placement center for the Business College. He said such a center will expand the outreach to the business community with active programs and that such a system will be open to students from other colleges, too.

During the cross examination session Dr. Small asked Dr. Bisesi if he stood by the accuracy of the Business Career Center proposal. Upon receiving an affirmative answer, Dr. Small read out portions of the report. He said that contrary to the suggestion in the document, 71% of all large universities have centralized placement as well as 84% of all universities. Dr. Bisesi said that at the GMAT meeting in Chicago in June there were 30 schools in the process of setting up separate placement centers in their business schools. Dr. Small asked if the business school would be willing to replicate a survey of

recruiters and students in regards to the quality of present services and their preferences and follow up accordingly the results of such a gathering of data. Dr. Bisesi said a survey would take several months and there is the question of determining the validity of such a survey. He said, however, that there are recruiters already knocking on the door of the proposed business CPP center. Dr. Small said 22 services including published placement reports, salary reports, resume critiques, advance delivery of interview schedules etc. are listed in the document as not being available in the present career planning and placement center. Dr. Small said 25 of these services are already available to students contrary to what the report states. Dr. Bisesi said those assertions are open to debate.

Speaking in favor of centralized career planning and placement, Dr. Small said that as student development professionals they had to give opportunities and choices for students instead of only specialization. He said students need to be exposed to the entire career spectrum as early as possible. This can be done with testing services, counselors etc. Such services will not be available to students in a smaller career planning and placement center. The second issue to be decided is whether the College of Business will aggressively market opportunities to non-business majors too. Dr. Small said it should not be required for students to go to two different locations and contend with two different systems of recruiting and interview scheduling. He said the 'spectre of favoritism' looms for liberal arts majors. He said it will also be more convenient for recruiters to go to only one office and have the same dates. He said the next issue to be decided is what to do for jobs requiring any major. He said not only do the operations of recruiters create opportunities for students but the operation side by side of student created internships and alumni placement create a synergy. 'One service spins off another.' Dr. Small said it would not be fiscally prudent to duplicate all these services. He said many of the smaller corporations cannot afford to send more than one team of recruiters in Texas and therefore are forced to decide which major they can recruit if there are a lot of placement centers. Dr. Small said an important question for the Senate to resolve is whether student development ought to be placed below the corporate development point of view.

During the cross examination session, Dr. Bisesi asked if Dr. Small was suggesting that the College of Business will not be allowed to use the central CPP center's data banks and such services. Dr. Small said that would not be the case. Dr. Bisesi said that there is nothing in their proposal to suggest that liberal arts students will be excluded from using their services. Dr. Bisesi also said students at the University of Houston are competent enough to handle two different placement centers. Regarding convenience of the employers Dr. Bisesi asked how recruiters in other universities contend with different placement centers. Dr. Small said they can be counted on one hand. Dr. Bisesi asked if Dr. Small was suggesting that student relations and corporation needs are mutually exclusive. Dr. Small said they were not.

The floor was then opened for questions from the senators:

Directing his question to Dr. Bisesi, Vice President Flemming asked what it is that the present Career Planning and Placement Center is not offering to the business school, and if the present system could be so upgraded. Dr. Bisesi said a whole host of opportunities could be provide with a linkage with the the business community which the business school would be in the best position to foster. Dr. Bisesi said there would be a close connection between the Career Planning and Placement Center and the Business Career Planning and Placement center. Senator Burns asked Dr. Small if 25% of the placement services go to business students as 25% of UH graduates are from the business school. Dr. Small said that more than that percentage goes to helping business students. He said 6% of all SSFPAC funds go to the Career Planning and Placement Center. Directing a question to Dr. Bisesi, Senator Burns asked if the business school will be paying for this program themselves. Dr. Bisesi said that was correct. Senator Burns then said that it would be fair to assume that the funds not being used in the Career Planning and Placement Center would be used for other colleges. Senator Rosenberger passed out figures to show that career opportunities for students will increase as had been the case with the law center. He said the

School of Hotel and Restaurant Management has seen a dramatic increase in the number of recruiters after it opened its own career planning and placement center. Dr. Small challenged the validity of this statement. Senator Rosenberger asked Dr. Small how he could be against better services. Dr. Small said some services like housing etc. are better centralized. Dr. Small proceeded to give a 10 point proposal to the senators detailing possible collaboration with the business center. Senator Berry asked Dr. Bisesi if he could guarantee that non-business majors will get equal services in the business school. Dr. Bisesi gave an unequivocal yes as his answer. Directing his statement to Dr. Bisesi, Senator Hasselbrink said the only really specialized major in the business school is accounting and that jobs like marketing etc. can be filled with non-business majors, too. He asked him what would prevent other schools from demanding their own placement centers. Dr. Bisesi said that, keeping in mind that the employers make the market, if two different majors can fill the same position then the businesses will request those majors. Senator Berggren referred to a national data bank called ethernet and asked if it would be available to a decentralized placement center. Dr. Bisesi said it could be. Regarding funding, Senator Russell asked if it is in writing that no student service monies will go to the business placement center. Dr. Bisesi said that funds for the first four years will definitely be from internal funds and corporations. He said he cannot speak for later years. Dr. Small said a consultant was brought in to review the business proposal and he observed that they showed serious underspending. Dr. Bisesi said this was on the initial budget. Speaker Burge asked if any of the budget will come from University funds. Dr. Bisesi replied in the negative. Speaker Burge asked if private funds might be funneled to the College of Business development office that might otherwise go to the university in general. Dr. Bisesi said it will not happen and that corporations are committing additional funds for this purpose. Dr. Small said Speaker Burge had raised a good point and that there was also no widespread student consultation before the business school submitted its proposal. Vice President Flemming asked Dr. Small if any companies had expressed displeasure with the existing system. Dr. Small said other than a few isolated complaints there were not any and in fact 80% of them seemed to prefer a centralized office. Senator Burns, referring to a duplication of service,s asked Dr. Bisesi how they planned to work with the services already in place. Dr. Bisesi said they had no definite plans yet. He said we will see a wider range in organization and size of recruiters. Senator Richards asked how decentralization will affect the existing career planning and placement center. Dr. Small said there are other non-degree jobs that students now benefit from which will not be available to them. He said we shouldn't ask students to contend with more bureaucracy.

5. Two minute Speeches by the Members:

Senator Hasselbrink said he is working on implementing a carpooling program.

6. Report of the President:

President Paul Hoglund said he was really pleased with the activities of SA during his absence. He said it was good to see such dedication on the part of the senators to make the university 'user friendly.' President Hoglund said he was going to nominate Michael Little as a new Co-Director of Public Relations since Mark Brokowski had turned in his resignation.

7. Report of the Vice President:

Vice President Lee Flemming said that in accordance with the Senate's approval of the use of office space for AAUS, they will soon be allowed to use the area previously used by the Election Commission. He said UH has offered the use of its resources to TSSA also since TSU has declined to host it. He said there is a committee meeting currently to go over the stand of the University on arrest policies. He suggested that SA take a formal stance on this issue. Vice President Flemming said the Athletic Advisory Board is looking into the possibility of increasing attendance and increasing the number of ticket redemption centers. He said he is impressed by the amount of research put into the Career

Planning and Placement issue.

8. Report of the Speaker:

Speaker of the Senate Mark Burge said he had received letters back from Dr. Magner saying he had received both UB 27010: ADDING AN AUTOMATED TELLER MACHINE IN THE SATELLITE and UB 27009 CONCERNING BOARD CONTACTS. The Speaker informed the Senate that the first meeting of the fall will be on August 27 in the UC Regents Room at 7:00 PM. He said the Fall meetings schedule has been posted on the bulletin board. The Speaker gave out two legislative assignments. The first one was to have SA print up 'Spirit Tickets' to place on cars with other universities' bumper stickers. Senator Rosenberger said he would undertake it. Senator Richards offered to help as well. The Speaker said that SSFPAC had surplus funds from previous years which were placed in a surplus account but then subsequently frozen by the administration. He suggested that SA try to unfreeze the account and/or write a bill to prohibit freezing of future accounts. The UAF committee agreed to take that assignment as a whole. The Speaker gave the names of the senators who were removed or resigned from the Summer Senate and said he hopes to see everyone back in the fall.

9. Report of the Standing Committees:

a) Academic Affairs:

Senator Burns, Chair of Academic Affairs said her committee approved the appointments of Doanh Nguyen to the Undergraduate Council, Donald Easterling to the Library Committee and Kevin Carreth to the Graduate and Professional Students Council. She said they were reporting out favorably on all three bills in their committee: UB 27013: CALLING FOR THE IMPLIMENTAION OF GRADUATION COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES FOLLOWING THE FALL SEMESTER IN ADDITION TO THE CURRENT SPRING COMMENCEMENT; UB 27011: REQUIRING FACULTY TO RETAIN EVALUATED MATERIAL FOR SIX MONTHS; and SAB 27009: CREATING AN AD HOC COMMITTEE TO STUDY UNIVERSITY COURSE EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND TO PROVIDE FOR STANDARDIZATION OF SAME.

b) Internal Affairs:

Senator Russell, Chair of Internal Affairs said her committee was reporting out favorably on SAB 27007: TO ADOPT TITLE 2 OF THE STUDENTS ASSOCIATION CODE, TO BE KNOWN AS THE COMPOSITION AND STRUCTURE OF THE SENATE; REPEALING BYLAWS REPLACED BY THE CODE.

c) Student Life:

Senator Hasselbrink, Chair of Student Life said his committee was reporting out favorably on the nominations of John Berggren to the Presidents' Art Acquisition Committee and Geoffrey Maduzia to the A. D. Bruce Religion Center Policy Board. He said they had not yet met with Jetty John. He said they approved of UB 27012: REQUIRING THAT THE TIMING OF THE TRAFFIC LIGHT AT THE INTERSECTION OF CULLEN AND ELGIN BE EXTENDED. They committee continued to hold SAR 27006: RECOGNIZING THE DIVERSE ETHNIC GROUPS ON CAMPUS BY NAMING A DAY IN THEIR HONOR.

d) University Administration and Finance:

Senator Berggren, Vice Chair of University Administration and Finance said his committee had nothing to report.

The bills pertaining to Career Planning and Placement were discussed first. The Speaker asked if there was any objection to discharging both the relevant pieces of legislation while the issue was fresh on the Senators' minds. None was raised and debate proceeded accordingly with a joint consideration of the two resolutions (SAR 27009 and SAR 27011).

Senator Berggren spoke in favor of SAR 27009: ADVOCATING THE CONTINUATION OF CENTRALIZED PLACEMENT SERVICES. He said he was not convinced that a decentralized career planning and placement center CAN do any better than the existing one.

Senator Rosenberger spoke in favor of SAR 27011: ADVOCATING THE CREATION OF A BUSINESS CAREER CENTER FOR UH STUDENTS SEEKING A CAREER IN BUSINESS. He said it is a win/win situation as it does not hurt the University in any way but helps business students.

During general debate, Senator Burns said her major concern that non-business majors will be excluded had been satisfied and that she is in favor of decentralization. Senator Hasselbrink said a decentralized Career Planning and Placement Center will only lead to more bureaucracy and that he is not convinced that business students are sufficiently specialized to need a decentralized center. He said

it would be more beneficial if the money donated by corporations were to go to academics. Vice President Flemming said he couldn't visualize the business school dedicating their college's resources if their students would have no advantage. Senator Rosenberger said every college on campus acts in its own interests. Senator Berry said that most companies are small and that while major companies can afford to send more than one batch of recruiters, smaller companies cannot do so. He said business students would certainly be given preference and the fact that Senator Rosenberger could not get past the front desk at his dean's office is indicative of the bureaucracy present in the business school. Senator Berggren said valuable services like 'ethernet' etc. will be lost in a decentralized placement center. President Hogle said he would like to echo Senator Berggren's comments and said a centralized placement center will have more power to provide such services. Senator Rosenberger said the number of recruiters in the law center increased after it was decentralized. He said the College of Hotel and Restaurant Management places nearly 98% of its students. Senator Hasselbrink moved the previous question. The motion failed for a lack of a second. Senator Richards asked that Dr. Small be allowed to explain the loss of services. Dr. Small mentioned a resume service which is a national service accessible to multiple majors. This and other similar services will be lost. Senator Gandhi asked if these services can be made available to all. Dr. Small said they could not, since they require that they deal with one office only. Senator Berggren moved the previous question. There were six votes on favor and three votes against closing debate. The Speaker cast his vote against and the debate remained open. Senator Richards said if a decentralized placement center is not effective then we can always revert to a centralized system. Vice President Flemming asked why the corporations did not work with the centralized career planning and placement center. Senator Rosenberger said that multiple corporations have already voted with their pocketbooks. He said there were multiple examples on campus that proved decentralization works. Senator Berry asked why there are only 15% of all universities using it and that in serving one-fourth of the students we are sacrificing three-fourths. Senator Hasselbrink moved the previous question. The bills were put to a direct vote. There were five votes in favor of SAR 27009 and four votes in favor of SAR 27011. SAR 27009 thus passed and SAR 27011 was defeated.

Senator Burns spoke in favor of UB 27013: CALLING FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF GRADUATION COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES FOLLOWING THE FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS. The bill passed unanimously.

Senator Burns spoke in favor of UB 27011: REQUIRING FACULTY TO RETAIN EVALUATED MATERIAL FOR SIX MONTHS. The bill passed unanimously.

Senator Burns also spoke in favor of SAB 27009: CREATING AN ADHOC COMMITTEE TO STUDY UNIVERSITY COURSE EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND TO PROVIDE FOR STANDARDIZATION OF SAME. Senator Berggren asked if he could be a sponsor of the bill. President Hogle spoke against the bill and said an informal group instead of a committee can be established to deal with it. Senator Berggren said he felt a formal committee will make the bill more powerful. The bill passed unanimously.

Senator Russell spoke in favor of SAB 27007: TO ADOPT TITLE 2 OF THE STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION CODE, TO BE KNOWN AS THE COMPOSITION AND STRUCTURE OF THE SENATE REPEALING BYLAWS REPLACED BY THE CODE. She said Sections 2.3.2, 2.3.3 and 2.3.4 were amended in committee. Senator Berggren asked what non-feasance meant. Speaker Burge said that it means neglect of duty. Senator Richards said he is unclear about Section 2.3.4. Speaker Burge said it means a senator who misses five Senate and committee meetings or two consecutive Senate meetings can be removed from the Senate. Senator Richards said it seemed to conflict with 2.3.3. Speaker Burge said either of the sections could be used to remove negligent senators. The bill was put to a direct vote and passed unanimously.

Senator Richards spoke in favor of UB 27012: REQUIRING THAT THE TIMING OF THE TRAFFIC LIGHT AT THE INTERSECTION OF CULLEN AND ELGIN BE EXTENDED. Senator Burns said the only changes made were to specify the direction of the traffic light. The bill passed with eight votes in favor.

b) Motions on Committee bypass:

Senator Berggren moved to bypass and consider SR 27002: THANKING DR. GEORGE MAGNER FOR HIS SERVICE TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON AS INTERIM PRESIDENT and SAR 27003: WELCOMING DR. MARGUERITE ROSS BARNETT TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON. Senator Richards spoke in favor of the motion saying it will be too late at the next Senate meetings. Senator Berggren spoke in favor of SR 27002. Senator Sharp spoke in favor of SR 27003. The resolutions passed unanimously.

Senator Berggren moved to bypass committee on SAB 27010: ESTABLISHING A TEMPORARY STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1991. Senator Russell spoke against the motion and said a bill dealing with such a large amount of money should go to committee. President Hogle said it is a temporary budget only and a delay may not be prudent. In a point of information Speaker Burge said the fiscal year starts on Sept. 1st. President Hogle yielded the floor to Ryan Chadwick, Treasurer of SA. Ryan Chadwick said this budget is a working budget extrapolating from the previous two budgets. Speaker Burge reminded the Senate that its requirement is to pass a temporary budget prior to September 1st. A final budget is to be passed no later than Sept 30 and no earlier than Sept. 7th. Senator Richards moved to previous question. The motion to bypass failed for lack of a two-thirds majority. The bill was referred to Internal Affairs.

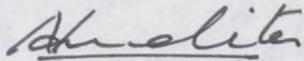
President Hoglund asked that a senator take a legislative assignment to allow business majors to minor in other fields. Senator Richards indicated an interest in it.

Speaker Burge noted that the next Senate meeting is two weeks from today.

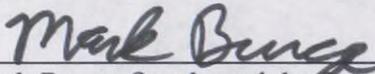
17. Adjournment:
