

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Report from the President



4,000 Graduate at Spring, Summer Commencement

Over 4,000 degrees were awarded to graduating University of Houston students in Spring and Summer Commencement exercises for 1970. More than 2,500 degrees including 215 doctoral degrees were conferred by Dr. Phillip G. Hoffman at Spring commencement exercises on Saturday, May 30 in Hofheinz Pavilion. Dr. W. D. McElroy, Director of the National Science Foundation in Washington,

D. C., spoke to the audience of over 7,000 on environmental quality and control. Some 1,500 graduating students heard Dr. George G. Garver, new superintendent of schools of the Houston Independent School District at the Summer Commencement exercises at Hofheinz Pavilion on Saturday, August 15. College convocations and receptions followed.

T. Roger Nudd, 40-year old associate dean of students at California State College at Fullerton, has been named Vice-President, Dean of Students, to replace the retired Dr. William A. Yardley. Appointment of Dr. Nudd was announced on July 3rd by Dr. Phillip G. Hoffman and confirmed

by the Board of Regents on August 4th. "I am gratified that Dean Nudd has accepted the key post of vice-president, dean of students at the University of Houston," President Hoffman said. "Dr. Nudd," he continued, "is a highly competent student personnel administrator who is well known in the field. He is one of 45 persons suggested to the Search Committee for this position."

Dr. Nudd's activities include membership on the executive committee of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, and the American Personnel and Guidance Association, membership on the Executive Council of the California Personnel and Guidance Association (treasurer elect), and membership on the National Advisory Committee, U. S. Food and Drug Administration program to educate college administrators on the drug abuse problem.

Athletes Honored at All-Sports Dinner

Nearly 800 alumni, students and guests attended the Annual All Sports Dinner sponsored by the Alumni Federation in the Astroworld Hotel's Grand Ballroom on Saturday, May 2. The coaches and athletes from every sport of the university were guests of honor at the banquet which afforded the university community and its friends an opportunity to show their appreciation to the records and accomplishments established by the various

teams. Emcee Dick Proctor, Executive Director of the Alumni Federation, introduced each coach with a poem as opposed to a formal introduction, and the outstanding player in each sport was presented with a large oil portrait of himself.

Each recipient was introduced by showing a film clip of the player in action. Most Valuable Players honored were: Rusty Clark (baseball), Ollie Taylor (basketball), Bruce Ash-

worth (golf), Leonard Hilton (track and cross-country), Chris Bovett (tennis), and Jim Strong (football). Ken Bailey was presented the coveted Saunders Award which goes to the top scholar athlete. The dinner is conducted annually by the Alumni Federation. Arthur W. Barrett, Jr., is chairman of the UH Alumni Federation Athletic Committee.

Football

When returning starting quarterback Gary Mullins was required to have corrective knee surgery at the conclusion of the spring football practice, the 1970 outlook suddenly became a bit cloudy.

With 15 starters back, including Mullins, from the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl championship team that beat Auburn 36-7, the Cougars were once again looking forward to a team worthy of top ten consideration. Mullins had taken over the quarterback duties in the third game of the 1969 season and led UH to nine straight wins for a 9-2-0 record, including the bowl game.

If Mullins' recovery is not rapid enough to allow him to start, Coach Bill Yeoman will be forced to go with one of four rookie signal callers. They are: Terry Peel, Greg Frazier, Don Howard, and Joel DeSpain, all good prospects, but without experience. However, Mullins was in the same category when he took charge as a sophomore.

Counting Mullins, Houston will have 11 of 20 offensive lettermen back, 12 of 17 defenders returning and a kicking specialist to give a UH total of 24 of 38 letter winners back.

Offensively, Mullins, All-America split end Elmo Wright, tackle Craig Robinson and full-back Ted Heiskell are the top returning players from the country's second ranked offensive unit. Defensively, tackle Glen Lewis, linebacker Charlie Hall and the entire secondary of cornerbacks, Charles Ford, Ronny Peacock and safeties L. D. Rowden and Richard Harrington give Houston some outstanding returnees.

Problems for the 1970-71 basketball team center around the center. The lack of a proven pivot man will be the biggest problem for the coming season. Dwight Davis, Poo Welch and Jeff Hickman are all outstanding players at other positions who could develop

into the player to rely on as Taylor was last season. Starting his 15th season as UH head coach, Guy Lewis has watched seven of his last ten teams advance to post-season tournaments. With the 1971 NCAA tourney scheduled for the Astrodome, the veteran coach would like nothing better than to receive an NCAA bid this year. Robert Hall, junior letterman, and Mars Evans, a senior letter winner, could become the center the Cougars need to find. Hall, 6-9, and Evans, 6-10, both broke into scoring marks set by Elvin Hayes as a freshman, but neither Hall nor Evans has been able to maintain consistency as a varsity performer. If Hall and Evans do not come around, sophomores Gene Bodden, 6-9, and Steve Newsome, 6-7, will be ready to give it a try. Fourteen road games and rugged home games with Jacksonville, Dayton, Creighton and Seattle, among others make for a tough schedule. The schedule up through December: Thurs., Dec. 3, Northwestern Louisiana; Sat., Dec. 5, at Tennessee; Mon., Dec. 7, at Florida; Fri.-Sat., Dec. 11-12, Bluebonnet Tournament (Texas A & M, Tulane, Oregon, and Houston); Fri.-Sat., Dec. 18-19, Jayhawk Classic—Lawrence, Kas. (Villanova, St. Joseph, Kansas, Houston); Mon., Dec. 21, Auburn; Tue.-Wed., Dec. 29-30, Los Angeles Classic (USC, Tennessee, Michigan State, Houston). All home games are played in Hofheinz Pavilion.

PRESIDENT'S FUND SETS RECORD

University of Houston alumni are setting records these days with their gifts to the 1970 President's Fund Campaign. Total contributions are running well ahead of last year. Co-Chairmen Larry Fultz and Bill Morse indicated that a highly successful personal contact campaign during April and May, along with improved direct mail procedures have been responsible for the increase. "Mrs. Sabra Hall Richardson alone raised \$2,110 in cash and pledges," Fultz reported.

Fultz also indicated future plans for the campaign would include a campaign end telefund in October and November. General Eugene J. Mincks, member-at-large of the Alumni Federation Board of Directors, will direct the ten telefund evenings and anticipates calling at least 5,000 alumni. "A successful telefund will enable us to reach or even exceed our goal of \$60,000 by December 31," Fultz stated. 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
