

Support groups are a follow-up to CR groups, or an alternative to CR groups, offering women a chance to meet regularly and exchange their experiences and concern for one another. Like CR groups, these are small (8-10 members) and it is important for members to attend each time. There are no leaders; the emphasis is on personal closeness, not political awareness. ## TASK FORCE REPORT: CHILD CARE

We are very happy that Child Care was chosen to be one of the four priorities for this next year. We feel, when it comes to needing volunteers for "shit work," we do not want to take any away from the other priorities going on at the same time. If we have to go and lobby for the E.R.A. in Austin, we need to put that struggle as our main priority at that time. Also, we feel we can easily work for Child Care along with some of the other priorities. If we are working on an employment suit, then our task force can be working also, informing the employer that they can help provide equal opportunity by subsidizing a child care center for their employees, whose need will mostly be met by the women employed there. We want to work with the Women's Center's goals by providing a good children's playroom for our center, and providing a day care referral service. And, we also have an idea for fund-raising. The National N.O.W.'s Child Care Task Force has a "Lollypop People" slide show available, and we can purchase children's books with 30% off the retail price.

We are now busy on the day care referral service. In the last two months, since we have been coordinators of this task force, we have received several calls at the Women's Center for this service. With our lack of knowledge at this time, we have been very sorry we haven't been able to help these people very much. We plan to change this right now! Questionnaires were already sent out last summer, before we were even coordinators. Now, we desperately need volunteers to help us call these day care centers to see if they got the questionnaires, and to remind them to reply soon. Then, the volunteers need to visit these centers and fill out our checklist. If you do not know what to look for in a day care center, this check list will tell you.

We are in the process of making up lists of day care centers in the different zip code areas of Houston. So, I hope to have people take a list of centers that are close to their home and/or work, and to do what they can on their 1/2 or full days off, before or after working hours, and maybe during lunch hour. Some centers are open on Saturdays or in the evening. Since there are almost 400 day care centers in our area--profit and non-profit--we will need a lot more than 4 people working on this project. Please call Dianna Vejtasa or Elena Moore, and give us your name and phone number if you can help us. You can also sign up at the Women's Center. We will then call you, arrange a time for everyone to come to the Women's Center to get their lists of centers and checklists needed.

We plan to ask for \$225 at the next business meeting to purchase the "Lollypop People" slide show and the children's books. The children's books and records will make good Christmas presents for relatives and friends, and spread the word about non-sexist books for children. So we do want to get them before December.

We had our first task force meeting in September. Peggy Felix told us about her interview with Janis Armstrong of the Child Care Council of Greater Houston, Inc. The members of our task force want to know more about child care facilities in Houston. We plan to meet once a month.

We hope everyone is enjoying the newly-decorated children's playroom at the Women's Center. Elena Moore and her rap group painted the walls and doors one evening last September, and Dianna Vejtasa added the letters and tree! More toys were donated by Elena, Dianna, and Linda England. The broken, dangerous toys were thrown away.

At the August business meeting, the Houston NOW chapter voted unanimously to be a part of the Ad Hoc Task Force for Children, chaired by Marie Oser; and to support the proposal to the Mayor for an Office for Children. This proposal has not been submitted to the city yet. A program meeting by the Ad Hoc Task Force for Children is being planned for October. We hope to get more organizations and agencies to support the proposal at this time. Our next step will be to submit the proposal to our Mayor.

#### TASK FORCE REPORT: WOMEN IN SPORTS

In an effort to dazzle the rest of the state with the competence of Houston NOW, the WIS task force has invented a new method of communicating news to other chapters in Texas: it's called the non-workshop. We expect to have our comments ready for mailing next week.

A note of interest concerning Title IX is that I recently received a letter from D.C. NOW informing me that HEW is considering holding additional hearings on the athletics section alone. I'm not sure what this means but the people in Washington didn't seem to view it as a favorable turn of events.

(Would the person who is phoning me at 3:00 a.m. every morning and breathing "Title IX" into the phone please stop doing so. I'd almost prefer an obscene phone call.)

TASK FORCE REPORT: REPRODUCTION AND ITS CONTROL

Following is the text of the letter sent by Houston N.O.W. to President Ford:

Mr. President:

We wish to express our appreciation of your support of the Equal Rights Amendment. Hopefully, the weight of your opinion will hasten the passage of this landmark legislation.

At the same time, we wish to express our dismay at the position you have taken regarding a woman's right to secure a legal and medically safe abortion if she so chooses.

The Supreme Court decision on this matter is one which we fully support. Women now have the legal right to decide whether or not to bear a child--and children now have the right to be wanted.

Surely you must realize that enforced pregnancy is as dehumanizing as enforced sterilization. All people should have the right to individual reproduction control.

To give control of women's bodies to any state is to deny women not only equality but full humanity as well. States' rights were correctly found inadequate on the issue of racial discrimination; we believe the same inadequacy would be inherent in states' rights on the issue of sex discrimination.

We hope that you will study this issue further and decide to support full, not partial, equality for women.

Women in poverty have again been declared entitled to less rights than their more affluent sisters. On Sept. 18th the Senate passed a \$33 million HEW appropriation bill with a provision that such funds cannot be used to pay for abortions unless necessary to save the mother's life.

From Washington Blue Sheet in August 1974 Do It NOW:

The Mathias Rape Bill has attached, as an amendment to Kennedy's 1974 Health Services Act, S. 3280. The National Center for Control and Prevention of Rape that the bill would created within the National Institute of Mental Health would conduct a continuing study and investigation of amongst other things, the effectiveness of existing Federal, State and local laws dealing with rape, the treatment of rape victims, the causes of rape, and the effectiveness of existing public and private counseling programs designed to prevent and control rape. Non-profit organizations would be eligible for funding under Part C., Sec. 281 "for the purpose of conducting research and demonstration projects concerning the control and prevention of rape."

The Kennedy Act has passed both the Senate and the House. But the two versions are somewhat different, so it has gone to a joint conference committee. **THE RAPE BILL CAN STILL BE DELETED!** It is essential that feminists write their Senators and Representatives to urge the committee to retain the Rape Bill. Houston reps are listed below; write them immediately. In addition, it may help to write the conferees themselves. TASK FORCE REPORT: MENTAL HEALTH

Our counselor referral list now contains about 20 non-sexist psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers, etc. These people have all been totally cooperative about giving phone or personal interviews. After the Houston Post article appeared there were calls and letters from professional therapists requesting that we interview them so they could appear on our list! Another unexpected result: several of the women psychologists and social workers have asked to join NOW.

The article also resulted in up to 20 calls a day from women seeking counseling. If you have been to a therapist please fill out an evaluation form regardless of whether your experience was negative or positive. This is extremely important if we are to have a comprehensive list. Forms are available at the Women's Center.

We also need more help for the interviewing. If you have some free time during the day or access to a phone at work, come to the next Task Force meeting. (These will be held the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month at 8 p.m.)

Several teachers and school counselors have asked us to hold "rap" sessions with their students. We will need people who are free during school hours to help with this.

Starting this month we will list workshops and therapy groups which are led by women who are feminists and/or NOW members. If you are interested in joining one of the following groups please call them as soon as possible, as all have a limited size.

- 1) Dale Hill (clinical psychologist) is starting a women's therapy group which will focus on problems women experience which are unique to women in a sexist culture. Experiences will be provided in self-awareness, power issues, and getting rid of self-defeating behaviors. Meetings will be 7 - 9 p.m. Wed. Fee is \$15 per week for 8 weeks. Call 664-2313.
- 2) Miriam Rothaus and Gene Webb (social workers) are leading a 2 day Constructive Aggression workshop. It is designed to enable you to assert yourself and handle your anger more effectively. This is open to men and women; couples and singles. Sat., Oct. 19, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. and Sun., Oct. 20, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. Call 528-5228. Registration closes Oct. 11. Limit: 22 persons. Fee: \$35.
- 3) Kenwyn Hopper (psychiatric social worker) has several openings in a women's therapy group which was formed to help women deal with personal problems and relationships. This also includes women who are in the process of divorce or its aftermath and are working on identity problems and expressing anger. The group meets Wed. 6 - 7:30 p.m. Fee is \$10 per session. Call 784-2925.
- 4) Gene Webb is leading a 2 1/2 day workshop For Men Only-- exploring the role of male, husband, father. Discussion, interaction, and self-exploration of pressures and expectations of being a male. Co-leader is Wayne Mc Cleskey. Fee \$40. Oct. 4 (evening), 5, and 6. Call 528-5228.
- 5) Denise Weinberg (psychiatric social worker) and Miriam Rothaus will lead a one day workshop on Nov. 2 for people who are remarried or are planning to remarry. Couples or individuals. For more info on Second Time Around call 528-5228.
- 6) Denise Weinberg has openings in a therapy group for single, divorced or married women. They work on relationships, improving self-esteem, and actualizing their potentials. Mon. 7 - 9 p.m. Fee \$10 per session. Call 784-2925.
