




**NOT LISTENING COULD KILL YOU ---
PREVENT INJURIES BY COMMUNICATING**

In copies of this week's HOUSTON POST and HOUSTON CHRONICLE appeared an article about a worker being crushed to death because, according to witnesses, his new co-worker pressed the wrong switch on a machine. The cause of this industrial accident will probably be attributed to Communications. The most obvious meaning of this is that the deceased failed to tell his co-worker which button to punch; however, there is a possibility the co-worker failed to Hear the correct instructions.

Splitting communications into its two natural divisions of Speaking and Listening, an investigation revealed that the average person spent about thirty per cent of his time talking and forty-five per cent listening. There are lots of hus-

bands who will never agree with these findings; however, for the moment let's accept them and realize we only retain about fifty per cent of what we hear.

There are many ways a speaker can achieve his goal of clear communications and

perhaps the easiest are repetition, comparisons, and speaking clearly. In turn, the listener should face the speaker, ask questions, and discuss the subject.

If each of us were to improve our role in communicating, our plant injury experience would be lower and our homes an accident-free place of enjoyment.



GUINEA PIG COOKERY PROGRAM
OFFERS FREE SHRIMP COOKBOOK

Joining the guinea pig club of an experimental cookery program can cause butterflies in anyone's stomach. However, these fears prove unfounded at the Seafood Marketing Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department when Miss Henrietta Gossett, Departmental Home Economist, does the cooking.

Miss Gossett's job is to test and develop recipes involving seafood and marine products. Once tested and proven, she then demonstrates the dish to food preparation groups such as restaurant associations, dietitians, school lunch programs, high school economics classes, and others interested in getting the most out of the food dollar.

The program, jointly sponsored by the Department and the Bureau of the Commercial Fisheries of the U. S. Department of the Interior, points up the value of seafood in nutrition, taste, and cost.

Miss Gossett's first experiment left all guinea pigs calling for more. She called the dish, "Peppered Shrimp and Eggs", which now has the seal of approval of all guinea pigs concerned.

- 1/2 pound packaged (pre-cooked, frozen) fully peeled, de-veined shrimp
- 3 slices bacon
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 6 eggs, beaten
- 1/4 cup coffee cream
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Thaw shrimp. Fry bacon until crisp; drain on absorbent paper. Crumble bacon. Cook onion and green pepper in bacon fat until tender. Add seasonings and shrimp; heat. Combine eggs, cream, Worcestershire sauce and bacon. Add to shrimp mixture and cook until eggs are firm, stirring occasionally. Serves 6.

The recipe is part of a shrimp cookbook published by the Department. The booklet, entitled "Shrimp Tips from New Orleans", is printed in full color and would be a welcome addition to any household bookshelf. Shrimp recipes include: amandine, remoulade, gumbo, Newburg, de Jonghe, Rockefeller, stuffed eggplant, creole, curry, jambalaya, paradise, and cocktail.
