'I Feel Very Strongly We Are on the Brink of World War III'

Congressman Mickey Leland held a dialogue with residents of Montrose last Monday evening, January

14. At an informal 'townhall' session in the activity room of Bering Memorial Church, Leland spelled out trouble for local residents on a local, national and international level.

"I feel very strongly we are on the brink of World War III," Leland told the crowd of about 150

"It's possible any one incident can bring it on," particularly because the Middle East situation, "is very delicate."

One interpretation Leland gave explaining the Russian invasion of Afghanistan is because the Russians possibly assume the American hostages in Iran will be killed. He said if this were to occur, the United States would go to war with Iran, "and beat Iran badly."

Russia would then need Afghanistan as a buffer

Asked if he felt the Middle East crisis could be localized, Leland replied, "I don't think so." Because of the close proximity of Russia and Afghanistan, "the situation is very different than from Viet Nam."

Leland told the crowd, which included Houston City Councilpersons Lance Lalor, Eleanor Tinsley and former mayoral candidate Louis Macey, "Nobody has a magic solution for the situation in Iran. I'm classified as a (military)

dove, but at the same time I believe in strong national defense."

He said many government officials were disillusioned in trying to negotiate with the Iranians and that military actions such as a naval blockade, destroying Iran's oil fields or military were examples of a few options left.

"The President has done an escellent job in trying to negotiate with the Iranians," Leland remarked.

The congressman cited, "several crisis involving

On the agenda for the meeting are selection of a permanent planning committee, the formation of a formal statement of purpose for the march, and the selection of an actual date at which the march will occur. A letter will be sent out shortly to invite statewide gay organizations to ensure their attendance at this conference.

Dallas residents have been asked to contact the temporary planning comm-

ittee if they can provide housing to delegates.

A spokesperson for the committee told the Star that the March on Austin is not intended as a function of any local group but as a cooperative action of statewide organizations to make a gay voice heard in the legislature and to, "bring together representatives throughout the state to form a communication network and political vote for all gay Texans."

Individual Didn't Like



Steve Coates, a leading supervisor and moderator for the Patrol, says the cars vandalized probably sustained damage simply because they were parked in the Montrose Area.

"In recent weeks the feeling has been that there has been a lessening of incidents around here (Montrose) and maybe the Montrose Patrol wasn't needed anymore."

He goes on to say the attendence at Montrose Patrol "Musters" has dropped substantially in the past few weeks.

"As you can see evidenced by this," he comments, "that just isn't so." Coates goes on to relate, "The strange thing about this is that this happened in peak traffic hours around Montrose and with all the breaking glass and so on, nobody has come forth with any information about this or have we even found anyone who saw or heard anything."

Reports from the Patrol on the following night, Sunday, indicate Patrol units may have averted a repeat performance of the night before.

Patrol spokespeople say they received reports of a black man, five feet eight inches, medium build, running from the parking area where a large concentration of car windows had been broken the night before. He was apparently attempting to vandalize the cars when he was scared away.

An emergency mobilization of off duty patrol members failed to turn up any signs of the suspect.

Patrol headquarters announced it is planning on increasing the number of Patrol supervisors in preparation for planned full seven-day-a-week operation.

Coates remarked, "We are anticipating delivery of our new FM repeater communication gear any day now and we are preparing to expand our patrol perimeters and hopefully begin to recruit new members to beef up our strength.

"Hopefully we can do an even better job of averting vandalism and crime in this area."

Slusser Found Guilty

Phil Slusser was arrested November 23 during a Montrose community Christmas tree lighting at the corner of Bagby and Westheimer.

Municipal Court Judge Robert Jungman found Slusser guilty of operating a public address system without a permit. He was fined \$100 at the Monday, January 14 hearing.

"There were six officers at the trial, three that testified against me," Slusser told *The Star.* According to Slusser he did not operate the sound equipment even though the two arresting officers and Central Patrol Division Captain E.E. Milam said they saw

and heard him speak through the equipment.

He has 14 days to arrange payment or file a motion for a new trial. Slusser said he wants a new trial.

At the hearing last Monday, "Ray Hill was the only witness that testified in my defense," commented Slusser.

Hill was arrested with Slusser and charged with the same offense. He was found innocent on December 31.

"We though because Ray had been found innocent this trial wasn't going to be any big thing," said Slusser.

GPC Cans Coors Boycott

In a hotly contested battle the Gay Political Caucus laid to rest an explosive issue that has been brewing since 1976.

Bearing in hand a well documented position paper brought forth by five members of a GPC ad hoc committee, a packed roomful of GPC members listened to three hours of debate on the Coors Boycott.

Beginning with an apparent union grievance campaign that spread to the gay community throughout the nation, with much influence by gay minister/publisher Rev. Broshears

and others, the Joseph Coors Brewing Company, of Golden, Colorado, suffered economic reprisals.

This lead to a capitulation by Coors to gay demands regarding gay discriminatory hiring practices. Coors offered a barage of financial contributions through local distributorships to gay causes.

The debate, involved an impassioned appeal by local activist/publisher Gary van Oothegheim, replete with visual aid (a Coors beer can in hand) to table the issue. Others added their voice to a well orchestrated effort to block the boycott resolution.

Mary's bar manager Andy Mills, Ray Hill, local activist/radio personality, and numerous others joined the fracas with arguments against the boycott resolution appearing to be in the majority.

John Barksdale, president of the Houston/Galveston region Coors Distributorships, having only received notice of the possible boycott against his company at 8 AM Wednesday, pleaded his company's position with articulate fevor, speaking from very hastily assembled notes.

The issue was settled with a 35 - 15 vote against the boycott.

NGTF Protests ABC Documentary

On December 18 ABC News presented "Homosexuals" a documentary. The National Gay Task Force has decided to protest the film for the following reasons:

1. The documentary claims to represent a summary portrait of lesbian and gay life in America, but it does not.

2. Lesbians are underrepresented throughout the film, once again promoting the notion that women are insignificant in comparison to men in the gay community.

3. The personal suffering shown is intensified by a maudlin and sentimental musical score.

4. The film excludes gay experiences of pride

and power, thus reducing the diversity of gay experience.

5. The producer and ABC News refused to honor their agreement to let NGTF preview the program.

The Co-Executive Directors of NGTF said that "we do not in any way want to condemn the courageous contribution made by those lesbians and gay men who are willing to share their stories..."

But they also feel that the experiences "teaches all of us a hard lesson." "Until we can win assurances that agreements will be kept by ABC, the lesbian and gay community should exercise extreme caution in all contracts with ABC News."

Gay Sessions at Modern Lanaguage Association Meeting

The 1979 convention of the Modern Language Association met in San Francisco in late December. Some highlights of the sessions on gay topics were the following;

"The Rhetoric of Gay Liberation" featured papers by moderator Roger Masse as well as by Sally Gearhart and Jane Gurko. Gearhart is best known for her appearance in the film Word is Out.

Gearhart and Gurko read a joint paper about imaginative gay male and lesbian books of the last fifteen years Their paper sparked an energetic, if polite, discussion of the insights and limitations of a lesbian-feminist political perspective in literary matters.

"Academic Freedom and Legislative Control" featured lawyer Donald Knutson of Gay Rights Advocates, who spoke of the effect of the Immigration Service's decision to exclude known homosexuals from the U.S. It is possible that foreign scholars might be prevented from

attending conferences like the MLA's if the Service continues its current policy.

"The Business Meeting of the Gay Caucus" decided to try for Divisions status within the MLA next year--an upgrading of its position. Members also planned to have more sessions in 1980, in particular joint gay male and lesbian ones, as well as Gay papers mixed in with non-gay papers in sessions devoted to subjects relevant to gay authors.

Robert K. Martin chaired a seminar on Wait Whitman that featured several scholars, notably James E. Miller. Some of the panelists (though not Miller) spoke of Whitman's homosexuality. Robert K. Martin has just published a book through the U of Texas Press called Homosexual Tradition in American Poetry, in which he writes of the long tradition of denying, disguising, and distorting the homosexuality of major poets such as Walt Whitman and Hart Crane.

Gays Mistreated in China

CHINA--Little is known about the treatment of gays in the People's Republic of China, but what is known is truly horrible.

The legal position of the homosexual in Chinese law is not known, but it has been learned from many testimonies that the usual practice is as follows:

A homosexual caught in the act is deported to a concentrarion camp where he is kept under strict guard. If he persists in his criminal behavior, he is condemned to death.

Jean Pasqualini and Rudolf Chelminski in a book written in 1975 Prisoner of Mao: Seven Years in a Chinese Work Camp told of the execution of a homosexual:

One day all the prisoners were brought together in front of the local authority of the camp, while the guards led out a prisoner in chains. The commander then hurled himself furiously at the prisoner, threw abuse and insults at him accused him of being the disgrace of

Chinese society, and announced to all that this "horrible individual" had been condemned for homosexuality, but had continued his vice and been found in the arms of another prisoner.

Therupon a guard shot the prisoner in the back of the neck, and the brain spurted out on Pasqualini's clothes.

The death of Mao has not changed the situation much.

Travellers returning to the West have told of posters in the city of Wuhan announcing the condemnation of nine people for political crimes and civic offenses.

Eight of the sentences had not been carried out yet, but the ninth man had already been hastily put to death in case a pardon should arrive, because he had been discovered in his cell making love with another prisoner.

Moreover, Claudie and Jacques Broyelle pointed out in the French weekly L Express (October 22, 1978) that in China homosexuality is still considered a crime.

Emma Bonino, a rad-

ical member of the Italian parliament, visited China recently and asked about the situation of homosexuals there. She was told that they had all disappeared after the Liberation. Ms Bonino repeated her question, but this time no one dared translate it and the official translator turned as "red as a raddish." Ms Bonino changed her tactics and asked if homosexuality was a psychological of physical illness. She was told it was, but one that attacked only young men.

About the age of 25 one's feelings become "clear and certain." For those for whom it does not become clear and certain, the following occurs: They undergo a session in the medical room of their factory, then a session in the medical center in their neighborhood.

If they persist, they are sent to a mental hospital, where they are given ideological re-education together with hormones and tranquilizers.

NOTE: All this occurs in a country with a horrific overpopulation problem.

Committee Formed to Stop the Movie 'Cruising'

SAN FRANCISCO, IGNA--A committee called Stop the Movie *Cruising* has been organized in San Francisco.

Headed by Konstantin Berlandt and Kirk Essler, the committee so far has held a reading of the June script (the shooting script) of *Cruising* and is planning a panel discussion of the whole issue, including possible plans of action.

At the moment the committee is hoping for a

mass response, preferably a boycott.

Berlandt, who concedes that the issue is "emotional," argues that the movie suggests extreme acts of violence are commonplace in the homosexual community; that cruising, as the title suggests, is like asking to be bludgeoned.

"The movie is a genocidal attack on gay people,"
Berlandt says. When asked about the danger of cen-

sorship, he said, "Free speech only goes so far. You can't incite to riot, or incite to murder."

A spokesman for Lorimar Productions, when contacted in Oakland by a reporter for the Oakland Tribune, said he was startled to hear of the rumblings of protest.

Fred Skidmore said, "The picture is still in the rough stages of editing. Nobody's seen it yet."

Romney Says Lesbians, Gays, 'Moral Perverts'

In a copyrighted story by Harry Cook in the Houston Post George Romney, 72, a national official of the Mormon Church spoke out against the Equal Rights Amendment.

Talking about the danger of 'perverts' we reproduce that dialogue here:

Cook: You recently said that 'moral perverts' are the ones advocating the ERA.

Romney: What I mean is that at the Woman's Year meeting in Houston last year, there were many homosexuals and lesbians there to support ERA.

CooK: What's the problem with their supporting the ERA?

Romney: Well, the reason they do support it is that they hope its adoption would legitimatize their immoral relationships and behavior.

Cook: Do you think they think their relationships are immoral? And don't you think they have a right to them, so long as nobody is getting hurt? Romney: No, they are

morally perverted. I said that and I meant it. The Bible makes perfectly clear that adultery, fornication, homosexuality and lesbianism are immoral.

Cook: Well, you are speaking for the Mormon Church, are you not? What if John Doe is a Buddhist or Hindu or an atheist — in any event, someone who does not believe what you believe? Is he immoral?

Romney: Yes. Throughout history the family has been the most important social unit. The proper moral conduct of family members is crucial to civilization. The breakdown of family life has been the downfall of other civilizations.

Cook: But why should Mormons attempt to impose their moral values on others not of their faith?

Romney: Well, we don't undertake to force our views on others. We believe that people have the

right to choose, but they have to pay the consequences of their choices. We don't believe that people can be happy in immoral relationships and behavior God has not approved of.

Cook: And how do we know what God approves of?

Romney: We believe that the moral principles revealed by God through his prophets in all ages as contained in the Bible say what God approves of.

Cook: But the few texts that deal with homosexuality in the Bible come from other times and cultures. Are you convinced they are equally applicable now as they might once have been?

Romney: No question about it.

Cook: Just to make sure -- you're not saying that all who support the ERA are moral perverts?

Romney: No, no. But it should not go without notice that many who do

Cook: Mormons support equal rights for women, don't they? That's what all your literature says.

Romney: Certainly we do. We believe that the woman's role is even superior to that of a man. What greater or higher calling can there be than to bear life inside you and give it nurturing and training?

Cook: Help me understand why you and the Mormon Church are so opposed to the ERA.

Romney: The amendment is a simplistic approach to a very large problem. We Mormons are for equal rights for women. What we don't want is to have some of those rights taken away.

The ERA is too broad and vague as it stands. It is certainly possible that laws now protecting women from heavy labor in jobs, those involved in divorce and so on could be repeal-

Private Faces Murder Trial

A 21 Year-old man discharged by the U.S. Army for being homosexual has been charged with first-degree murder in the shooting death of the man he lived wih.

Roger Cutsinger was charged with the December 14 murder of Larry D. Duerksen, 29, an employee of the University of Washington library.

Cutsinger is in custody and bail has been set at \$250,000.

The Army gave Cutsinger an undesirable discharge in November, because it contends that homosexuality is "incompatible" with militaryservice.

The upcoming trial should be of interest to the gay movement since a discussion of the pressures on Cutsinger arising from his discharge should be a part of the testimony, just as such pressures were used in the Dan White case, where a lenient sentence resulted.

health: Angel Dust: 'He Banged His Head Against

the Walk, Drooling and Urinating Without Control.'

Sweeping across the country from the west and midwest comes another counter-culture hallucinogen called phencyclidine (fen-sigh' -cli-dean) also known as 'angel dust,' 'hog,' 'PCP,' 'crystal' or 'sheets,' and many others.

Known since the 1950's when first introduced as a veterinary anesthetic, it has gained popularity for human drug abuse particularly since

1975

It is gaining 'popularity' first because it produces intense highs, even higher than herion according to some users, and highs are, "what it's all about."

Next it is easly made and readily available. Further it can be taken either in pill form, drinks or by inhalation. Angel dust spiked marijuana is particularly treacherous for the unsuspecting "just pot smoker." Those who feel they can safely smoke pot beware, they may be in for

a frightening and dangerous psychotic trip. Angel dust causes many bizarre symptoms, ranging widely from quiet peaceful stupor to violent, combative, confused behavior and death.

Hallucinating means seeing or hearing things not there. Psychosis means confusion, disorientation. or in plain common terms, insanity.

The following is a description of a report on a 19 year old hospitalized angel dust patient.

On admission to the

hospital he was found to be assaultive, hostile, frightened, and anxious. He banged his head against the wall, drooling and urinating without control.

On the second hospital day, he escaped from the ward and threw himself out a third floor window, miraculously landing uninjured.

Mental examination indicated schizophrenia. However, nine weeks after angel dust, this phychosis cleared and the patient was discharged.


This is a very discouraging and alarming drug abuse development. Presently there seems to be no remedy.

Perhaps, like LSD these sad scenes themselves, will make the trips not worth the highs. At least this should be a red flag for those who "only smoke pot." They may pay a far greater penalty from hidden angel dust than that provided by the law.

The reason for the

organization's existence, Bruce told Up Front (now Up Front America) is to, "establish and maintain a society for deaf gay citizens that will promote and encourage the educational, economical and spiritual welfare of gay deaf people, and to foster fellowship, defend the gay deaf person's rights, advance their particular interest and open a forum for discussion of practical problems and solutions relative to their welfare and prosperity."

With this goal in mind word of the organization spread. December 3 saw a pot luck supper held at Bruce's, with forty people participating.

• ' In the middle of December elections for the organization were held. Bruce Herman was elected president; Roy Colling, vice president; Merle Canady, secretary; and Wayne Clearman, treasurer.

Sixty-five people showed up for a 'ARAD Christmas party held at MAC.

In a meeting January 11 the organization established by-laws, committees, ect. According to Bruce, ARAD is fixing up an office in MAC.

The after hours party coming up January 26 will be a fundraiser for MAC and ARAD. A high priority for the organization is building a gay pride float for the deaf gay convention, coming up in Toronto, Canada this June.

The group is also in the process of establishing activites, including sporting events, encompassing other organizations.

The national chapter of ARAD conducts talks about gay rights and the gay handicapped, social events featuring guest speakers, coffee houses and a 'Mr. National Rainbow Society of the Deaf' contest.

The national organization is concerned not only with the rights of deaf gays. Rights for handicapped people as a whole are also an important priority.

EPAH Holds Meeting

The Executive and Professional Association of Houston held its monthly meeting on Tuesday, January 15 in the Embassy room of the Shamrock Hilton Hotel.

A progress report was given on the present administration's results and pending work. Since September, when the new officers were elected, EPAH has published a membership directory, sent officers to New York City to help found the National Association of Business Councils, made charitable donations to various gay community organizations and is laying groundwork for the upcoming national convention for the NABC in May. The program speaker

was Mort Schwab, of the Texas Human Rights Foundation, who presented the work of that organization.

The members attended a cocktail party prior to the meeting. During the meeting they were asked to approve the new annual dues of \$85. The forcast annual budget for most in house operations was \$7,500. The money will be used to fund the operations of the various individual committees.

Other funding projects will take place in the near future for funding charities and civic projects, and for financing the hosting of the National Association of Business Council, in May.



Join us and be a part of something special.



Arkansas Shrimp is Wonderful!

It was during my Christmas holiday visit in Magnolia, Arkansas I discovered this delicious shrimp receipe.

To be an inland state, I was surprised that Arkansas had such a simple and delicious and original dish. It is not a Christmas dish, but I heard about it and it sounded so tantilizing as soon as I returned to my home I headed for the kitchen, to get it all together and test it.

Although you probably are full of holiday food for now, I suggest you make this one as soon as you eat again. It is so unique and delicious.

Shrimp

• Four bananas, quart-

• Melted butter

• Four cups curry sauce (see below)

• One to two pounds fresh shrimp, cooked and cleaned

• Three cups cooked rice (I like Uncle Ben's converted)

Saute bananas in butter, Heat shrimp in curry sauce and serve over hot rice. (Wild rice is good, too.)

The Curry Sauce

One third cup butterThree fourths cup

Three teaspoons curry powder (less if desired)

• One half teaspoon salt, dash pepper

• Three and one half to four cups chicken stock

Melt butter in sauce pan. Combine flour, salt, pepper and curry.

Gradually add half of the dry ingredients to the melted butter, stirring constantly until smooth thick paste is made.

Slowly add one cup liquid and stir 'til smooth.

Continue in this procedure until everything is combined. Cook over a medium heat, stirring constantly 'til sauce thickens, about 10 minutes.

Makes four cups.

Store sauce not needed in freezer and use at random.

Several bars were raided. All seems to be back to normal currently.

Chicago is a truly great city containing three of the

five tallest buildings in the world, Soldier's Field, University of Chicago, Alder Planetarium, Shedd Aquarium, Merchandise Mart and with parks, zoo's theatres, art galleries, concert halls and museums too numerous to mention. However, for a first time visitor I would suggest a trip around the Loop on the 'L' (elevated railway) and a drive north on Lake Shore Drive's 'Gold Coast.'

There are many good

hotels, but few are gay.

Of these, the Abbot at
721 Belmont is your best
bet. The Barracks is very
transient, and some baths
offer overnight accomodations. I usually stay at the
Travelodge Heart of Chicago, which has modest rooms
but is convenient to the
Clark Street and near North

Carol), the beautifully refurnished Dugan's Bistro at 420 North Broadway and Broadway Limited at 3130 North Broadway.

Others include Cry-stal's Blinkers (opposite the Broadway Limited), Sundays, The Factory. . and the new bi-sexual dance palace called Coconuts, which is neither fish nor fowl.

Chicago's legendary Gold Coast, known locally as the G C at 501 North Clark Street is one of the most famous leather and levi bars in America. Lots of action. . . especially weekends when the dungeon-like basement is open. Also downstairs is the Leather Cell, a boutique offering practically everything you wouldn't be able to buy at Marshall Fields. Their other shop, Male Hide Leather, Inc, is located just around the corner at 66 West Illinois Street and is open

Two other popular levi and leather cruise bars are Touche at 2825 North Clark and Redoubt on Illinois opposite the Male Hide.

The Locker on Clark is new and worth triying.

Some of the better gay/mixed restaurants are My Brother's Place, Dion & Co Pizzaria, Arnie's, Ely's Place for steaks and The Waterfront.

For great but expensive straight gourmet dining try the Abacus (Chinese), Bakery, Cape Cod Room, Jacque's, Jovan Le Perroquet, Maxim's De Paris, Ninety Fifth and the Pump Room.

Hot, mostly macho cruise bars include Alfies,

Bushes, Cheeks (late), Little Jim's and the Loading Zone.

Marilyn's is an all gal disco, open weekends only at 472 North Clark. Other women prefer the Lady Bug, Petunia's or CK & Augie's.

Chicago's two oldest bars are Kitty Shean's and the Haig, Vintage 1930, as are most of their customers.

Some terrific baths are Man.s Country, 5015 North Clark, CBC.s Club Chicago, 609 North La Salle and Steamworks, 3131 North Lincoln. Man's Country has a cabaret, disco, snack bar and overnight accomodations, as well as the usual scene.

Man's World North and the Ohio & State Health Club are also rans. The Body Shop is a new nautilus equipped gym at 2451 North Lincoln.

whose occupational or recreational needs require dependable travel under the most adverse conditions. It's also for people living in rural areas or in the snow belt where driving often is difficult or impossible during stormy periods.

While it shares many body components with AMC's compact Concord, the Eagle sits three inches higher off the ground for better clearance and uses 15 inch wheels and tires instead of 14's.

It is built in three versions, a two-door sedan, four-door sedan and four-door station wagon. I tested the wagon, which probably is the most versatile of the three models.

All have the same two front bucket seats and instrument panel and a roomy rear seat for two or three, but the back of the rear seat in the wagon can be folded forward, opening up 57 cubic feet of cargo space.

The sedans have 11 cubic feet of luggage space.

All three models are 186.2 inches long on a 108.3 inch wheelbase. They are 71.9 inches wide and stand approximately 55 inches high. A 258 cubic inch V - 6 with floor-mounted

three-speed automatic transmission is the only power train available this year.

Four wheel drive engages automatically only when needed. There are no levers to move or knobs to twist.

I originally tested the Eagle at American Motors' off-road course at the company's proving grounds near Bürlington, Wisconsin. A week of rain had left the fields, dirt roads and trails in a terribly bad condition. But neither soggy fields nor steep muddy hills could stop the car.

None of the conventional front-wheel or rearwheel drive cars at the grounds could follow the rugged Eagle on the tests.

Later, testing the car during a week of normal driving, I was impressed with its quiet, smooth ride and the comfort of its interior, fully equal to superior passenger car standards.

An independent front suspension, rare on 4WD cars, contributes to its good ride and fine handling. The ride is so much more comfortable than in AMC's other 4WD car, the Jeep, that they can't be compar-

ed. Still, with a trailer towing package, the Eagle can haul up to 3,500 pounds.

I averaged 14.6 Miles per gallon in a week of city and urban freeway driving and 17.2 MPG on a 105 mile highway test at 55 MPH. The Eagle has a 22 gallon fuel tank.

The car can accelerate from zero to 50 MPH in 11.1 seconds and from 30 to 50 in 6.8 seconds.

The Eagle wagon's base price of \$7,549 includes power steering and power brakes (discs in front), reclining bucket seats, an electronic quartz digital clock and radial tires.

A full range of optional equipment and luxury packages are are available at extra cost, including air conditioning, tilt steering wheel, cruis control, power windows and door locks, automatic load leveling, heavy duty suspension and numerous audio options.

The Eagle is covered by a full warranty for one year or 12,000 miles and a five-year rust warranty.

An extended parts and service warranty for up to 36 months or 36,000 miles can be purchased for \$295.

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
