






35 EMPLOYEES TO DATE HAVE COMPLETED REQUIREMENTS OF CRAFT PROGRAM

MTM R and D LAB TRANSFERS LELLIS TO TECHNICAL COMPUTING CENTER

J. C. Lellis, Research Engineer, MTM R&D Laboratory, transferred to the Technical Computing Center.

The move, which was effective November 1, was announced by J. G. Pratt, Refinery Manager.

Lellis began working at the Refinery in 1967 after graduating from Villanova with a B. S. degree in chemical engineering.



Two and a half years since the beginning of the Craft Development Program, 35 employees have completed all phases of the training course and become Number 1 Craftsmen. Included in this total are a number of welders, electricians, pipefitters, machinists, instrumentmen, linemen and insulators who have completed the Manual of Job Requirements and have shown proficiency in their fields.

On November 28, 12 machinist trainees will complete 288 hours of classroom work which they did one day a week at Lee College under James Dreymla, instructor. These trainees, who are in the Machinist C classification, attended classes at Lee from October 19, 1971 to March 21, 1972 and again from September 5 to the present while getting additional on-the-job training at the Refinery. Subjects covered in the machinist program include mathematics, machine shop operations, and selected shop skills.

This class is the second group of machinists to participate in the program.

A second pipefitters class will begin at the Refinery on Monday, January 8.

Most recent graduates of the program, who have qualified as Number 1 craftsmen include W. F. Greene, F. Springer, and E. E. Holub, Jr., pipefitters; and J. P. Krolczyk, and R. P. Chauvin, Jr., insulators.

Sixty-five employees are presently in the training program.

**SHELL SON, ROY HEATON, TO MARCH
IN TWO WORLD-FAMOUS PARADES**



Roy Heaton, son of R. C. Heaton, MTM R&D Lab, has been named to the 1972 McDonald's Restaurants All-American High School Band. The Band, which includes the nation's top 101 high school band musicians, will participate in the nationally televised Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York and in the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California.

Young Heaton was among 20,000 high school youths from throughout the country who were nominated by their high school band directors.

Jim Doody, manager of the McDonald's in Pasadena, Tex., said this is the fifth consecutive year the band has been asked to appear in both parades, "where repeat performances are rare. That's a real tribute to the musical talents of winners like Roy Heaton, and we're proud that he will be a part of this growing recognition of the great performances put on by each year's band."

Two winners were selected from each state and one from the District of Columbia by the Director and a panel of band directors from across the nation. The other Texas winner is a student from Port Arthur, McCall Bundy.

Roy was nominated for the honor by his band director at Sam Rayburn High School in Pasadena, Fred Baetger. As first chair baritone horn player for four years and drum major for two years at Rayburn, Roy has been polishing his talents. He has also been in the All-District and All-Region bands for three years and last year was named first chair baritone player for the All-Area and All-State symphonic bands. The Interscholastic League has also awarded a first division rating in the solo competitions to Roy for the last three years.

PROVIDENT FUND NEWS

The following is the Equities Fund valuation:

Shell and 11 other interested companies have joined a combined federal, Colorado state and industry study to determine the possible environmental effects of oil shale development.

The study will cost about \$750,000. The 12 participating companies will initially contribute from \$5,000 to \$20,000 each.

"This cooperatively funded study is well-conceived and will help us achieve President Nixon's clean energy policy," said U. S. Department of the Interior Secretary Rogers Morton, who joined Colorado Governor John Love in announcing the combined study.

In a concurrent statement, a group of Colorado legislators congratulated participants for achieving a notable first in environmental history. Never before, the legislators said, have state and federal governments joined industry in conducting advance studies on land use planning, reclamation, water resources and an ecological and wildlife inventory for a total environmental analysis.

The study is to be completed by the spring of 1974, when the Department of the Interior, the state of Colorado and industry will consider the results before field oil shale development can begin on a commercial basis.

The advantages of a radial over the conventional bias ply tire include improved highway ride, excellent steering response for better car control, open tread grooves to increase traction, extended tread life and less rolling resistance.

The Super Shell Steel Radial is the same height-to-width ratio as original equipment tires and was introduced nationwide following a three-year development program.
