Roger Jeffery has been elected president of the Ex-Students Association for the second consecutive year. Mr. Jeffery won the top position without opposition.

Elected vice-president was David Halphen, Secretary Mary Lee Cook and Treasurer Larry Schroeder.

Ex Clips Red Korean Sniper

WITH THE X CORPS IN KOREA—An artillery forward observation team, with an assist from the setting sun, recently eliminated a Communist sniper that had been firing on their section of the front for days.

The team consisted of 1st Lt. Robert B. Rutledge, a graduate of the University, and Cpl. John Dorotky, Brooklyn, N. Y.

The sniper used a hollowed out boulder, which completely concealed him from the American positions and made him safe from artillery and mortar fire. Infantrymen in the area deemed it impossible to route him without suffering heavy casualties.

Rutledge and Korotky, however, developed a plan that worked.

Borrowing two M-1 (Garand) Rifles, they crawled out to the east of the rock, exposing themselves to enemy small arms and mortar fire. There they waited.

When the sun began to set, it silhouetted the enemy sniper's nest and Korotky opened fire at the small opening in the boulder. When the sniper returned the fire, he was visible, sharply outlined by the setting sun, for a brief moment.

Rutledge killed him with one shot, although the range was 500 yards.

Three new three year directors were chosen. They were Jack Valenti, Pat Foley and Police Chief L. D. Morrison. Bill Sherrill was chosen to a one year directorship.

The newly elected officers and directors will be officially installed at the Homecoming Luncheon preceding the Cougar-Tulsa football game on October 11.

Optometry College To Open; Only One in the Southwest

The only college of its kind in the Southwest, the University College of Optometry, will open its doors this fall for the first time.

Dr. Charles R. Stewart, dean of the newly-established college, is now holding interviews with prospective students. Applications and information for the fall semester will be accepted and reviewed through September 1.

The new college will begin operation this fall in the Science Building.

Before his appointment as dean of the college, Dr. Stewart was director of the Optometry Clinic at the Ohio State University. While there, he supervises a school children's visual survey program, publishing several scientific papers as a result of related studies. His research activities also included the development and use of special apparatus for photographically recording and analyzing movements of the eyes.

Aggies Plan Tour Of Texas Farms

A 20 day tour of Texas dairy and stock farm will be included in two courses, agriculture 463 and 464, which will be offered by the agriculture department beginning July 22 according to John T. Carter, chairman of the agriculture department.

These courses are for men only and will be limited to 18 students. The courses deal primarily with animal husbandry and dairy farming. The tour will include stops at the King ranch, the Rio Grande valley, farms in the San Antonio, Waco, Big Bend, Marfa, Ft. Worth and Odessa areas. The group will make major stops at nine dairies, eight beef ranches, and five experiment stations. Beef herds to be observed are Angus, Hereford, Brahman, Shorthorn, Beef Master, Santa Gertrudis and Charolaise, according to Mr. Carter.

Traveling in two pickup trucks equipped with "Tally-ho Carvens" the men will sleep in various Y.M.C.A.s in route. Several ranchers have already invited the group to eat dinner at their ranches. The cost, including tuition, will be about 150 dollars, according to Mr. Carter.

There will be two special recreational events. The first one will be a two-day stop in the Big Bend National Park, and second stop will be at Possum Kingdom Dam near Mineral Wells. The group will return to Houston Wednesday 13.

The rest of the course will include classroom work and short field trips. A report on the trip will be required for each student.

"Some vacancies remain for non-agriculture majors who are interested in the subject," Mr. Carter said.

Gerald L. Hamm, assistant professor of animal husbandry and John T. Carter, chairman of the agriculture department, will conduct the tour.

Kingsville, — University of Houston is still regarded by some as a hometown college, showed how it is spreading out Sunday May 12, as some 160 ex-students in this area met here for a barbecue and tour of fabulous King Ranch.

Alumni of the university now living in Corpus Christi, Kingville, Alice, Aransas Pass and Robstown were on hand for the first big gathering of the school's southernmost outpost since the ex-students chapter was formed last February.

University President Dr. W. W. Kemmerer, Roger Jeffery, president of the exes, and Johnny Goyen, executive secretary traveled from Houston to help the former students-some from the days when University of Houston was located at San Jacinto High School-celebrate.

Exes In Politics

This is the year for politics and the season finds the University well represented in all races as our Exes vie for public office.

In the race for position number two in the state legislature Bill Elliott, a law graduate from the class of '51, is no new comer to politics. He ran in 1950 and polled over 30,000 votes. Bill previously had received a BS degree from the University in 1949. He is

26 years old, married and has one son Bill Jr. nine months old. He resides at 204 W. Mavrick in Pasadena.

Ex Elliott is running on a platform of economy in government, assistance to the aged people of our state, a well planned public teachers program "to make the profession attractive to the point of getting the most qualified teachers for our children," a revamp of the Texas Veterans Land program into a

"workable, practical plan," and a revision of the Texas Election Code so that "it can be understood and obeyed by the citizens of this state."

He is against the sales tax and any form of state income tax. **BILL ELLIOTT**, position two, state legislature.

David G. Beerbower, a University graduate of the College of Business Administration is a candidate for state legislature position four.

While attending the University, David was active in Frontier Fiesta, was the sophomore class president, an officer in the Pre-Law Society, a member of the Student Council, and active in other student politics.

The 23 year old Ex says he is opposed to any unnecessary new state expenditures and is pledged "to curb the trend toward free-ride government in Texas and to apply the brakes to waste and unnecessary spending."

He favors adequate assistance for the aged, adequate teachers' salaries and more and better highways; that he will support stiffer narcotics laws and will insist on their rigid enforcement; favors a presidential primary in Texas and a constitutional amendment to let absentee servicemen vote. He is against state income or general sales tax.

L. P. (Lee) Ward Jr. 32, a June graduate of the University College of Law is a candidate for State representative position number seven.

Lee is an airforce veteran of six years during World War II. As a bomber pilot he was shot down over Austria and after evading capture for over 30 days, was taken prisoner by the Gestapo during which time he "learned what it means to be hungry and to be at the mercy of a dictator."

After his discharge in 1947 he took over a real estate business left by his father. These past four years he has been going to school full time, maintaining his own business from his home, participating in the Air Reserves and "trying to cope with three children."

Ex Ward is running on a platform of, adoption of the Presidential primary, improved educational system, better pay for teachers, revision of the motor inspection law, more punitive narcotics laws, revision of the present pollution and sanitation laws, and general economy in government. He wants to check over-centralization of federal power in Washington and socialization of professions and industry.

D. F. (Dave) Thompson Lld Class of '50 is a candidate for election to the position of Justice of the Peace Precinct two, an office which he now holds. Justice Thompson was appointed to office in 1951 by unanimous vote of the Commissioners Court.

He is 31 years of age, married and has two daughters, Sandra Sue and Linda Ray. He lives at 709 Medina Street.

Mr. Thompson has stated that his platform would be a promise to

"continue the policy of fairness and justice to all, regardless of rank, creed or color."

He is a member fo the State and Local Bar Association, various Masonic bodies, the American Legion, Eagles, Lions, Kiwanis, and the Broadway Baptist Church, D. F. (Dave) Thompson, justice of the peace, precinct two.

Miss Laura Patterson, MBA, class of '51, is a candidate for the state legislature position three.

Miss Patterson is the only woman legislative candidate from Harris County and she says, "I know that if elected, I can represent Harris County more actively than it has been."

She has taught personnel management on the main campus and at Ellington field, has served two years as full time librarian in Missouri City schools, attends the First Christian church and is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma, an honorary organization for women teachers who have taught more than five years and who are considered to be in the outstanding 10 percent. She is secretary for the coming year of the Fort Bend County unit of the Texas State Teachers Assn.

Miss Patterson emphasizes her opinion that "terms of elective office should be limited—I myself would like to serve no more than four years."

Miss Laura Patterson, state legislature, position three.

The brief thumbnail sketch of the above Exes in politics were sent to the Extra by the individuals.
