TINNERS, PIPEFITTERS TACKLE MANY TASKS AS PART OF ROUTINE

During their everyday working hours, Tanners have a variety of jobs, from making drip pans for the micro reactor to putting screens on giant fans used around the Refinery.

Five Tanners and three Pipefitters under L. F. Grove, Tin Shop Foremen, East District, are likely to be working on many different types of jobs from day to day.

At present some of the Eng. Field men are involved in making equipment for the Experimental Plant Center. J. P. Wolf has been making drip pans for the micro reactor housed in the building. While some West District Pipefitters, W. E. Bayless and W. H. McGuire, are installing stainless steel tubing for another facility in the EPC building.

Some of the other Tanners are making shelves and cabinets for special equipment at the EPC building as well.

The Tanners include F. M. McClain, J. P. Wolf, J. W. Henderson, S. D. Gault and J. D. Berridge. Pipefitters which Grove oversees are J. L. Matson, W. O. Wicker and E. L. Williams.

Tanners is the traditional name for these craftsmen. But it doesn't completely describe their job. They also work with stainless steel, copper, monel (a corrosion resistant alloy, chiefly copper), nickel, aluminum, brass and sheet metal.

Where one craft's area of metal work stops and the Tinner's begins, depends generally to some degree on the thickness of the metal. Tanners usually work with thinner materials and generally other crafts take over work involving the heavier metals.

Funeral services were held at Park Place Lutheran Church and burial was Wednesday, July 8.



