DATE OF FLAG SHIFT UNKNOWN

The date when Vice Admiral Tar-
rant will shift his flag back to his
regularly assigned flagship, the IN-
DIANAPOLIS, is not known. The de-
cision will rest with the Admiral when
he returns from Washington where
he is now serving in connection with
the Selection Board.

However, your correspondent is of
the opinion that the shift will not be
made until the later part of February.
During the Third Quarter, the IN-
DIANAPOLIS is going to have to fire
the greater part of her gunnery
practices which the other cruisers
have already completed. Furthermore,
she is scheduled for an overhaul period
alongside the tender during this per-
iod. Therefore considering the fact
that the Admiral will undoubtedly
want to be in close contact with the
Fleet landing Exercise No. 3, I believe
that we can be safe in assuming that
the Flag will remain on the HOU-
STON the greater part of the next
two months.

CHIEF GUNNER CONDIT TO BE TRANSFERRED

HOUSTON

When congress authorized con-
struction of eight treaty cruisers of
large tonnage and great speed, after
two had been named Pensacola and
Salt Lake City, some 80 cities applied
to have one of the remaining six
named in their honor.

William A. Bernrider, secretary
to Mayor Holcombe, was an active
member of the Navy League of the
United States, and while the mayor

was in Europe attending the World's Ad Club convention, Mr. Bernrider took up with Mayor Pro-Tem H. A. Halverton the matter of having a cruiser named for Houston. Together with Col. Ike Ashborn, vice president and general manager of the Chamber of Commerce, they made out a list of citizens whom they invited to meet in the Chamber of Commerce quarters. I was not invited to attend the meeting, but received a phone call to come over. Upon my arrival I found a large crowd assembled and was told by Mr. Halverton that they had decided to draft me for service as chairman of a committee to conduct a campaign to get one of the cruisers named for Houston. Complimentary references were made as to my fitness for the job because of acquaintance with officials in Washington and members of congress. From past experience I knew they were calculating upon my known weakness to accept public service carrying no perquisites except honor. I told them that due to press demands upon my time, I would not take the place unless all present and others interested would do the greater part of the necessary work; and unless the mayor gave me the services of Mr. Bernrieder to do contract work and carry on correspondence under my direction; also that I would not head the committee if it was expected to solicit funds for the purpose, or if anyone was to be paid for services.
