

CONSTRUCTION PLANS TAKE ANOTHER STEP ON NEW HOUSTON SHIP CHANNEL BRIDGE

Construction of another stage of the Houston Ship Channel Bridge on Interstate Highway Loop 610 was authorized by the Texas Highway Commission.

The Commission approved the construction of the south approach structure and connections, extending from Lawndale Drive northward to south of the ship channel, a distance of 0.7 of a mile. Estimated cost of the project is \$6.1 million.

Already under contract is work on the connection from the north end of the bridge to Interstate Highway 10.


TOURIST TALK







BUY SAVINGS BONDS FOR THE FUTURE
VIA THE PAYROLL DEDUCTION PLAN

A college education for your children, extra money for retirement and dividend checks twice a year are possible through U. S. Savings Bonds and the Shell Payroll Savings Plan.

As in previous years, Shell supports the 1968 U. S. Savings Bond campaign sponsored by the U. S. Treasury Department. "I urge all employees to consider participation in the program," said Shell President R. C. McCurdy.

By completing an authorization card, you can have a set amount deducted from your paycheck each pay period to purchase U. S. Savings Bonds.

And now, when you sign up for payroll savings, you can take advantage of a savings opportunity introduced last year: Freedom Shares.

Only regular Bond buyers can buy these higher-paying U. S. Savings Notes. Freedom Shares earn 4.74 percent interest when held to maturity (4½ years), and are redeemable after one year. They are offered in four denominations from \$25 to \$100.

Two series of savings bonds--the Series E bond and the Series H bond--are offered to savers.

Series E bonds are sold at a discount of 25 percent from their face amount and increase in value as they are held. Series H bonds are sold at face value and interest checks are sent out twice a year.

The Series E bonds originally reached full face value in 10 years, but as the interest rate was raised progressively from the original 2.9 percent to the present 4.15 percent, the holding time has been reduced. They now reach full value in seven years.

Actually, the 4.15 percent rate that savings bonds now pay is better than it appears on the surface. Federal tax law allows holders of Series E bonds to defer payments of Federal income tax on their savings bond earnings until the bonds are cashed in.

This means that the owner can choose to cash his bonds and report the interest in years of retirement when income is lower. Moreover, savings bonds are exempt from state and local income and property taxes.

There is a similar tax-savings, too, in savings for a child's education. Bonds can be bought in a child's name, and the tax liability for the earnings on the bonds shifted over to the child. Filing a single Federal income tax return for the child in the year that bonds are first purchased establishes the intent to treat the interest as yearly income.

When the child starts in college, and the bonds are cashed, then the earnings on the bonds are, in essence, tax-free, provided in any single year his income does not exceed \$900.

If you are not already enrolled in Shell's Payroll Savings Plan, you may ask your supervisor for a Payroll Allotment Authorization Form.




