## **ROBERT ERVIN HOWARD**

### AND

## THE FOURTH WORLD FANTASY CONVENTION

In late 1974 I first conceived the idea of having a convention honoring Robert E. Howard somewhere in Texas. As with most of my good ideas I considered it a while, talked about it some, and then pigeonholed it away.

Then in the summer of 1975 I heard about a convention honoring H.P. Lovecraft that was calling itself the First World Fantasy Convention. This bit of information spurred me into action concerning my idea for a Howard convention. I checked on convention facilities in Brownwood, Texas, formed a tentative committee, and then flew up to Providence to present my idea to whoever had established this World Fantasy Convention. If Lovecraft was being honored by a convention of this magnitude I certainly was not going to let Howard be slighted by anything of a lesser stature.

When I arrived in Providence I found a convention that was certainly not international in attendance (although a few members were from such exotic places as Liverpool and Los Angeles) but was universal in it's spirit.

I then proceeded to talk up my idea for a World Fantasy Convention in Texas. When I was told that the next one was to be held in New York City I said that was too bad but I would take the third one. The problem was that a bid from Los Angeles was submitted and when a vote by the original committee was taken Texas was the loser by one vote and we got number four after moving the site to Fort Worth.


In the meantime the fantasy field has expanded many times over since the early 1970's. The field has changed and so has the Fourth World Fantasy Convention. This convention is not a Robert E. Howard Convention solely. It is a World Fantasy Convention honoring Robert E. Howard. A subtle yet distinct difference. Important as he is Howard is only a small portion of the fantasy field.

I hope that each person attending this convention enjoys himself but at sometime during the festivities remembers that everything that occurs here is dedicated to a man who did not even have a book published in his lifetime, who ended his existence in an act of despair, and yet whose work has survived to our benefit and inspiration.

# FRITZ LEIBER

## **Guest of Honor**

Fritz Leiber was born in Chicago on December 24, 1910, son of Shakespearean players Fritz Leiber and Virginia Bronson. He acted in his father's repertory company during 1929 and 1934. Leiber received the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy from the University of Chicago in 1932, majoring in psychology and physiology. He later spent a year at the Episcopal General Theological Seminary and was minister of two mission churches in New Jersey.



Leiber's list of accomplishments is staggering. He has won the World Science Fiction Convention's Hugo Award six times, the Science Fiction Writers of America's Nebula Award three times, the World Fantasy Award twice, the British Fantasy Society's August Derleth Award once, and was pres-

ented the Grand Master of Fantasy Award at the World Science

His first novel <u>Conjure</u> <u>Wife</u> has been twice made into a film and once into an hour long television program. His horror stories "The Girl With the Hungry Eyes" and "The Dead Man" were dramatized by Rod Serling for his "Night Gallery" television series. He has had two issues of magazines devoted completely to his stories (November 1959 <u>Fantastic</u> and July 1969 issue of <u>The Magazine of Fantasy</u> and Science Fiction).

Leiber currently resides in San Francisco, where he has set his latest novel, <u>Our Lady of Darkness</u>, which has been nominated for the World Fantasy Award's best novel category. His newest sword and sorcery novel <u>Rime Isle</u>, has been published by Whispers Press in a limited hard cover edition illustrated by Tim Kirk.

Leiber's interests include science, metaphysics, history, chess, field astronomy, cats, acting, poetry reading, and the cinema. The Fourth World Fantasy Convention is pleased to welcome this unique and wonderful man as Guest of Honor.



## ALICIA AUSTIN Artist Guest of Honor

Alicia Austin was born in Providence, Kentucky on November 24, 1942. Due to her father being in the Army she did a lot of traveling in her youth.

Alicia studied art at the University of Houston for four years on a scholarship, then studied cyto technology and accepted a job in Ottawa, Canada in 1964. This is where she was introduced to science fiction fandom.

She has had work published by Ace Books and has illustrated three books for Don Grant: <u>Echoes From an Iron Harp and A Witch Shall</u> <u>Be Born by Robert E. Howard and Black God's Kiss by C.L. Moore.</u> In 1971 Ms. Austin received a Hugo for Best Fan Artist. We are pleased to have this talented woman as our Artist Guest of Honor.

CHARLES L. GRANT --- Many thanks for... WEIRDBOOK 13. I don't know where that magazine has been all my life, but you can rest assured that I'm not about to let it slip by again. It was, frankly, a delight (especially the fage and Bishop pieces), and the artwork was... no words here. WEIRDBOOK back issues. WEIRDBOOK ELEVEN and WEIRDBOOK TWELVE are still in print. These are regular size (64 pages, 8½ x 11 inches in size). As this is being written, TWO, THREE and FIVE are OUT OF PRINT, and it is almost certain that ONE will also be out of print by the time this advertisement appears. FOUR and SIX are nearing O.P. status, but will probably still be available. SEVEN, EIGHT, NINE, and TEM should be in print yet for some time. They include tales by Howard, Munn, Wells, Home, Schweitzer, James Wade, Wade Wellman, and many many others, with artwork by A. B. Cox, Judy Fulkerson, Jim Garrison, Denis Tiani, and so forth. HOLLOW FACES, MERCILESS MOONS is a "special issue" of 96 pages plus covers. Contents are all new stories by William Scott Home and all new art by Stephen E. Fabian. SCIENCE FICTION RE-VIEW acid: William Scott Home writes weind, often biscarre, violent (yet ouriously static) fiction. Vivid, often boring, often electrifying material. And Steve Fabian has done over a dozen drawings --- evocative, in his most graphic style --- some of them full-page. The book is 8% all, offset, on white paper, heavy white cover stock, about 98 pages. Worth the money as entertainment and keeping value.



THE GOTHIC HORROR AND OTHER WEIRD TALES is another special issue, this time of 64 pages plus covers, devoted to stories by George T. Metzel, most reprinted from little magazines, with one entirely new novelette, THE PIRATE OF SHELL CASTLE, which has received commendations from several readers. Of this, SCIENCE FICTION REVIEW says: (Theee)... books are printed in the same format as the magazines, by at 11, which makes the artwork look very wice indeed. Wetzel is best known as one of the real pioneers of Loveenaft scholarship, but he has written a small amount of fiction over the years. He has a pollahed style and definite talent for imageny, but I find most of his shorter work fragmentary and underdeveloped. One novelet in this book of ocurse isn't, but the others are pleasant, if minor stuff. Very readable. The eight full-page drawings (including the covers) are by Tim Kirk and are worth the price of the book all by themelves!

STILL AVAILABLE from WEIRDBOOK is the collection TOADSTOOL WINE, which features samples from six magazines --- FANTASY & TERROR, MOONBROTH, SPACE & TIME, WHISPERS, WEIRDBOOK, and WYRD. FOUR of these are still publishing, and a fifth has changed tille and format, since publication of TOADSTOOL WINE in 1975. Has Risen Again

MIDNIGHT SUN, along with WHISPERS, has virtually shaped the semi-pro magazine field. And because of MIDNIGHT SUN's past efforts, it was nominated for The World Fantasy Award at The Third World Fantasy Convention in Los Angeles. In the previous four issues, MIDNIGHT SUN has:
