The promotion of E. W. Page to Engineering Foreman has been announced by B. C. Bell, Manager Engineering Field.





1966 NATIONAL DRIVERS' TEST FILM AND "MEKONG - A RIVER OF ASIA" ADDED TO SHELL FILM LISTS

The ever-growing list of Shell films available to schools, civic, and fraternal groups has two new additions. They are "Mekong - A River of Asia", a 25 minute progress report on the development of the Mekong River, and the 55-minute "National Drivers' Test" film. for 1966, familiar to millions of Americans who watched the Shell-sponsored program on TV.

"Mekong" tells the story of the studies involved in mapping a construction program for the river from the Burma border, through Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, and Vietnam, to the South China Sea. A number of multi-purpose dams, hydroelectric generating stations, irrigation canals, and pumping stations are scheduled to be built. The program is sponsored by the U.N. Commission for Asia and the Far East (ECAFE),

and may cost \$1 billion over a period of 20 years.

These and all other Shell films are loaned free (except for return postage) to any group with a 16mm projector, and may be obtained for 10-day periods by writing to the Shell Film Library at 450 N. 


A SWEETHEART - and it's easy to see why. LINDA WHITE, daughter of the Gas Department's BRYAN L., has just been selected



BUCCANEER GAS PLANT GASOLINE UNIT NOW COMPLETE AND ON STREAM AT SURFSIDE NEAR FREEPORT

The second and final phase of Houston E&P Area's Buccaneer Plant - the gasoline plant - is now on stream near Freeport. SHELLEGRAPH readers may recall the completion of the first phase, the condensate stabilization facility, earlier this year.


The Buccaneer Plant has a designed inlet capacity of 190 million cubic feet of gas per day - gas which originates at the Buccaneer field. It is transported to the plant via the Blue Dolphin Pipe Line Company's 20-inch pipeline facilities about 30 miles offshore



Galveston County. The Buccaneer field was the first of three offshore Texas fields Shell placed in commercial production during 1966. The others are the Den Area, offshore Jefferson County, and the Brazos Area State Leases, offshore Matagorda County.

WHAT CAN BE UNSAFE ABOUT AN ARTIFICIAL CHRISTMAS TREE?

Last week's SHELLEGRAPH cautioned you against the hazards of natural Christmas trees, and at least one reader said he "took the safe way out" and bought an artificial one this year. If that's what you did, don't relax, according to Houston Fire Chief W. O. Hunter. He says artificial trees need care in selection and handling, too. Plastic and metallized plastic trees can burn; use the type clearly marked as made of slow-burning materials. Those with built-in electrical systems should carry the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) label. Metal trees are not a fire hazard but may be a shock hazard. Use only indirect lighting with them. If lighting strings are placed on a metal tree, it may become "charged" and dangerous.
