Commander James E. Fleming of the Coast Guard and Captain of the Port of Houston paid a get-acquainted visit to the Refinery last week. He assumed command of the Coast Guard Station in Houston on June 30.

Host for the newly-appointed Port Captain's visit was Refinery Manager, L. T. Wilson. Also among the welcoming party were A. S. Lehmann, Refinery Superintendent; L. J. Snyder, Process Superintendent; J. B. Harkness, Manager Dispatching; K. S. Messenger, Dockmaster; and L. J. Grossheim, Manager Fire and Safety. Marking his first visit to a refinery, the Port Captain's tour included process unit areas as well as dockside and channel facilities.

Except for the few years he worked for a pharmaceutical concern, Commander Fleming has been on active duty with the Coast Guard since 1942.

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RETIREE HOYE G. CREED DIES

Hoye Creed died following a brief illness on Saturday, September 5, 1964, in Wadley Hospital in Texarkana, Texas.

Hoye was born in Redwater, Texas, which is near Texarkana on May 12, 1906, and had returned to make his home there following his retirement. He began his Shell career at the Houston Refinery as a General Helper on November 3, 1941, and was promoted to Valve Repairman No. 1 on May 16, 1947 - the position he held at



the time of his retirement on September 1, 1963. He was a veteran of World War II, having served with the United States Navy from March 11, 1943 to October 20, 1945.

An expression of sympathy is extended to his wife, Mrs. Mabel Jeannette Creed, by their many Shell friends.

Funeral services were held Monday, September 7, 1964, at the Redwater Methodist Church in Redwater, Texas, with burial in the Hillcrest Cemetery in Texarkana, Texas.

You don't have to shut'er down, the hot work can go on safely....thanks to the new air conditioned vests recently put into Refinery service. Operating on plant air service, and using the basic principles of air conditioning, these insulated vests not only permit craftsmen to perform jobs which were formerly impossible, but offer added safety too. A small vented tubular harness sends cool air to all upper parts of the body when the vest is worn under a jacket or coat. The temperature of the air can be controlled manually within limits. Not only does the suit provide positive ventilation, but it also has its own hood which contains fresh breathing air for jobs in areas where fumes or dust are a problem.

To date, however, only three of the "cool" jackets are in service, so the drinking fountain is expected to remain the prime hot weather refresher for the less fortunate.

Directing this year's Houston-Harris County Drive toward its \$7 million goal as General Chairman is J. A. Horner, President of Shell Pipe Line Corporation.

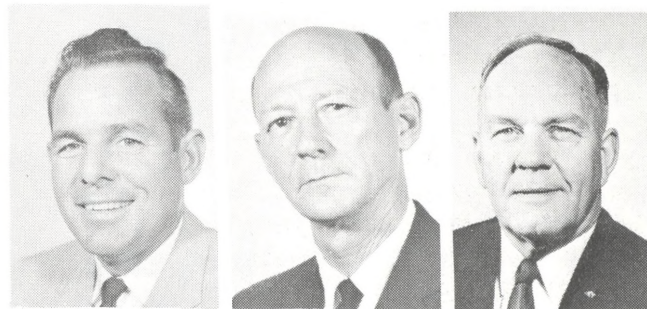
