

HURRICANE MAPS NOW AVAILABLE

A limited supply of hurricane maps are now available to employees through the SHELLEGRAM office.

The hurricane tracking chart also lists safety rules one should follow whenever there is a possibility of a hurricane striking your immediate area.

Before a hurricane strikes you should:

- Fill all gasoline tanks, check battery and tires, be sure your automobile is in good operating condition.
- Leave beaches or sea level locations, that might be flooded by tides or waves, early enough to avoid the risk of being marooned by washed-out roads.
- Stay in your house if it is well built and out of danger from high tides, flooding streams or falling trees.
- Put storm shutters on windows, or tape or board them, to protect them from flying debris.
- Be sure a window or door can be opened on the side of the house opposite to that facing the wind.
- Tie down or store loose articles which might be blown away or torn loose.
- Store drinking water, by filling containers and bathtub, as water services may be interrupted.
- Keep extra provisions on hand. Include foods which do not require cooking, a good first-aid kit and flashlights or other emergency lights along with a portable radio for keeping abreast of weather forecasts.

During the storm you should remain in your shelter and exercise caution during a lull.

SHELL FILM WINS AWARD

The Early Americans, Shell's newest film, has been recognized as the best in its field for feature length documentaries of social significance. The film recently won the Robert Flaherty Award at the British Academy of Film and Television annual awards presentation in London.

The program is the British counterpart of the American "Oscar" awards.

The Robert Flaherty Award is presented annually by the academy in honor of the American documentary pioneer, Robert Flaherty, who died in 1951.

The Early Americans, traces the history of man from his arrival in the New World during the Ice Age, to the 14th Century. The film is a sequel to Shell's international award-winning This Land. The company's educational film program is now in its 30th year.
