Categories will include Best in Show, Directors' Choice (awarded by Art Show Staff). Colour, Monochrome, Humour, 3-D Craftmanship, 3-D Creativity, etcetera. Suzgestions are welcomed.

ART SHOW



RESTAURANT REVIEW

For those who wish to stay within the environs of the hotel for the whole weekend, the Westin provides a more than adequate food service. However, for those of you who wish to eat out, the surrounding area offers a wide range of eating and drinking establishments to satisfy any gourned's or gournond's taskes. What follow is an list of those places, indicating what cravings they can satisfy, how adequately they can ob it, and for what price. Unfortunately, it cannot be a complete list due to space limitations and the sheer volume of places available. The list therefore consists of places that are easily accessible (within a 10 minut e whilking radius of the hotel), those that are very good and those that are seriously worth avoiding. A map follows the list to "telly uv where to go". Good luck and Bon Appetit!

WESTIN HOTEL PROPER:

DALY'S: Restaurant Level (3rd Floor)

This is the hotel's main dining room and provides breakfast and lunch as well as a dinner menu. They serve a wide variety of foods at fairly reasonable prices. Liquor prices are comparable.

HARTWELL'S: Lobby Level

They call this place a "Seafood Bar". Both the food and the liquor are fairly expensive. It is also a High Class Meat Market. Warning: dress code enforced. No jeans, running shoes and/or sweatshirts.

LES SAISONS: Restaurant Level (3rd Floor)

Serves "Nouvelle Cuisine". In other words, speciality items. The food is very good, the service is good but the prices are exorbitant. If you're on a budget, forget it. Warning: dress code enforced. No jeans, running shoes and/or sweatshirts. Jacket required.

THE RIDEAU CENTRE:

The most accessible as it is part of the hotel complex. Wide range of fast food emporiums on the lower level. Those worth visiting are:

BLOOM'S: Serve wide range of foods from pizza to salad. All fairly good. Reasonable prices.

BAGUETTE: Serve fantastic danishes and croissants.

ORANGE JULIUS: A julius (a fruit drink) is worth experiencing.

BAGEL, BAGEL: 92 Clarence Avenue, Open 24 hours. 236-8998. Yes, they specialize in bagels and anything that goes with them. Good food, good prices. Highly recommended.

THE CREPERIE: 47 York Street. 232-8805 A fairly nice restaurant specializing in crepes. The food is fair to good. A bit pricey, though.

DAPHNE & VICTOR'S CAFÉ: 47 William Street. 235-4254 Limited light menu mostly sandwiches and desserts. Food is fair to good but the carrot cake is great! Moderately expensive.

THE EARL OF SUSSEX: 427 Sussex Avenue (at Murray). 233-5544 An English-style pub featuring both bottled and draft imported beers and ales. Food is also served but phone ahead because kitchen closes early (9:00 p.m.) some nights. The food is good and the liquor prices are comparable.

THE ELEPHANT & CASTLE: Rideau Centre, Lower Level. 234-5544

(no, it is not the same # as Earl of Sussex)

Another English-style pub. Liquor and food both expensive. Place to avoid unless you don't want to go outside.

GUADALAHARRY'S: 18 York Street. 234-8229

Serves Texas-style mexican food which is cheap but indifferent at best. Has a nice atmosphere though and the Sangria is cheap. Warning: this place is frequented by the "trendy". Will be extremely crowded Friday and Saturday nights. Attempt to enter at own discretion.

THE KEG: 75 York Street. 238-8514

A roast beef, steak, surf and turf emporium. Food is fair but expensive. Warning: Anyone who has any allergies or adverse reactions to MSG or similar chemicals, please check this out with the management first. Most of their marinades are MSG based.

THE KHYBER PASS: 271 Dalhousie Street. 235-0881

Specializes in Afghani food. The food is good but the service is slow. If you have time on your hands, this is a good place. Prices reasonable. Reservations recommended.

LA CRÊPE DE FRANCE: 76 Murray Street (at Parent). 235-2858

Specializes in Provincial-style crepes, soups and salads. Food is good and prices are fair. Liquor prices range from fair to expensive. Kitchen opens at 6:00 p.m.

LAS PALMAS: 111 Parent Street. 238-3738

Specializes in Mexican food. The food is excellent, the prices are reasonable but atmosphere is non-existent. Worth visiting for the food alone, though.

MOTHER TUCKER'S FOOD EXPERIENCE: 61 York Street. 238-6525

This place specializes in Prime Rib. The beef is good and so is the rest of their menu. The salad bar is very good with lots of variety. The service is fantastic. Worth visiting, Reservations are recommended.

THE OLD FISH MARKET: 54 York Street. 563-4954

Specializes in fish and seafood. The food is good and the prices are reasonable. If you like fish, this is a place worth experiencing.

OREGANO'S: 74 George Street. 232-3751

Serves mainly Italian food and pizza. The food is indifferent to fair and is expensive. Avoid this one.

PETE & MARTY'S: 2nd Level, Rideau Centre (close to the Bay). Serves a wide variety of food at reasonable prices. Said food is good, Has a nice


THE OLD SPAGHETTI FACTORY: 126 York Street. 238-6441



A loud drinking place. Bargain Basement Meat Market. Enter at your own risk and if you do go and catch anything, don't blame us, we tried to warn you.


