DPMC SERVE Volunteers Are A Giving Bunch

SERVE (Shell Employee and Retiree Volunteerism Effort) is seeking volunteers for a number of organizations. Several DPMC employees are already giving of themselves as SERVE volunteers.

Among them are secretaries **Maxine Wallace** and **Jerri Dromgoole**, Administration, and **Terry Rodriguez**, Employee Relations. All three have volunteered their services to the Telephone Reassurance program. Every morning during the week they call an elderly Houston woman to check on her well-being. Maxine finds this "a really satisfying thing to do."

If the SERVE volunteer doesn't receive an answer to their telephone call, a preplanned course of action occurs, which involves calling a neighbor, friend or relative to check on the elderly person's well-being. If this action fails, the SERVE volunteer calls the elderly person's doctor for assistance.

Then there's **Murlean Arrazate**, office assistant, Services, who, along with 35 other women, recently completed a 20-25 hour training program designed to enable them to provide support and information to rape victims and their families. They will work through Crisis Hotline by manning their home telephones during a specific time period. They deal with rape victims over the telephone; and, if necessary, accompany the victim to the hospital.

Right now **Pat Cordes**, office secretary, Accounting, is between things. Her offer to assist with the elderly in the Sheltering Arms program fell through because SERVE wasn't able to locate someone in her area. She now hopes to work with boys from troubled homes who are housed at the Youth Village in Clear Lake City. Pat did, however, participate in the 20-mile March of Dimes Walkathon which took place recently in Memorial Park.

Ralph feels it's important to remember that the purpose of the Court Volunteer Services volunteer is to reach out to a youth between 10-17 years who has been involved with the law. He should know since he's been to court with the youth twice so far. Then there's the fun things of attending a ballgame, a movie or just going fishing or doing odd jobs together. All of these activities help provide a better self-image for a youth who really needs this support. And Ralph is trying his best to provide it.


