Dear Sir:

This owns receipt of yours of April 12th.

While I regret to be forced to admit the fact that the experience since dedication last June can lead to no other conclusion than that outlined in your No. 6.

I further concur in your idea that a report should be submitted on behalf of the Advisory Committee to the Mayor and City Council, showing the position, the experience, and present status of the institution. However, before proceeding with the latter, it would seem to be desirable that an engagement be made with Dr. J. W. Slaughter, at such time and place as will afford opportunity to discuss the situation reflected by the experience up to this time; after doing so and getting the benefit of his ideas and advice about the best method of approach to secure the official consideration and attention essential to insure development of a workable plan applied to future organization and operation that will be helpful to the negro, call a meeting of your Advisory Committee, and at this meeting come to an understanding of what should be done, aiming if possible to secure unanimous advisory agreement on the new plan before assuming to turn the responsibilities over to the City, as originally contemplated in case the negroes failed.
