**NEW STOP SIGNS INSTALLED ON EAST-WEST MAIN ROAD AT REFINERY**







SAFETY TIP OF THE WEEK

Read and follow the instructions and cautions printed on pressurized containers such as "Shell Parts Loosner" and "Shelltox". These instructions mean exactly what they say. In brief, do not store or transport them in heated areas or behind glass. Glass tends to intensify the sun's rays and heat the containers to a point to where they could explode, for instance, either the front or rear deck of a car or truck, or windows of a building. Remember, high temperatures can cause the containers to rupture with a fragmenting effect.

HOT WEATHER TIP

People tolerate heat best when they are in good physical condition, eat a normal diet, replace their water loss hour by hour and maintain their salt reserves day by day. Salt is best taken with meals or soon after, when food is in the stomach. Salt tablets are not to be chewed or dissolved and no more than two should be taken at one time. People who develop cramps are usually salt depleted over a period of days and not necessarily during 1 day. That is the reason that salt should be replaced daily because of daily loss from excessive perspiration.


EMPLOYEE DAUGHTER NAMED TO POST

**ROUTE OF CAPLINE - NATION'S LARGEST CRUDE OIL PIPELINE:** Construction of Capline will begin this fall, following a 630 mile course from St. James, Louisiana, to Patoka, Illinois. Costing over \$100 million, Capline will deliver 417,000 barrels of crude oil daily from the Louisiana-Gulf coast producing region to the Midwest and will be capable of upping the daily movement to more than a million barrels. Besides terminals at St. James and Patoka, pipeline stations will be constructed at Liberty, Jackson, and Sardis, Mississippi, and Clinton, Kentucky. The line will cross the Mississippi River at St. James and the Ohio River near Paducah, Kentucky. Eight companies will own Capline: Ashland Oil & Refining Company, Marathon Pipe Line Company, Mid-Valley Pipeline Company, Pure Oil Company (a division of Union Oil Company of California), Clark Oil & Refining Corporation, Service Pipe Line Company, Shell Pipe Line Corporation, and The Texas Pipe Line Company.
