Florida Voters Start Trend Back **Toward Constitutional Government**

During the Thirties when Franklin D. Roosevelt was throwing his weight around all over the place like the straw boss of a section gang and ordering members of both Houses of Congress to vote for his "must" legislation, one of his most servile and spineless flunkeys was the goose-stepping Claude Pepper of Florida.

Elected by the voters of that great State to represent them in the United States Senate and, in such capacity, to perform in accordance with the Constitution which set up three separate and distinct branches of government, each to act as a check on the other, Pepper was one of the first to renounce his sworn duty to his constituents and become one of the administration's Mortimer Snerds.

Last week the people of Florida by an overwhelming vote retired the Senator to private life and named George Smathers, World War II Marine veteran, to succeed him.

In no uncertain terms they told the New Deal puppet to take a long walk on a short pier or, in other words, to "get lost."

A large slice of the CIO million dollar slush fund was alleged to have been spent in the Florida campaign principally in rounding up Negroes in various sections of the State whom a Supreme Court "social decision" some time ago gave the right to participate in white Democratic primaries. This vote is generally supposed to have gone to Pepper.

Friends of the Southern Conservative in a certain section of Florida where large numbers of the March and April editions of the paper were circulated were kind enough to tell us that we helped in the campaign but, much as we would like to claim some credit for the great victory for political morality in that State, we can't honestly feel that we are entitled to do so.

The people of the several States, and especially those in the South, don't take kindly to outside suggestions, or at least are not influenced by them and have demonstrated this by giving the CIO a nice big slap in the face every time it has interfered in a State election.

So, while it would give us great joy to think that we influenced even one vote in the right direction, we do not feel that we did. We were glad to send any number of papers to parties requesting them, but it was the citizens of Florida, themselves, who finally realized what the score was and

Our remarks about the Florida ex-Senator were all directed against his official acts, of course, and were not intended as personal. As an individual, he may be a gentleman and a scholar, but as a statesman discharging the Constitutional responsibilities of an elected official, he was a good adagio

The State of Florida is well rid of him and we hope that the people of other States do as good a job of mowing down "New Deal" and "Fair Deal" lawmakers as fast as they stick their neck out for re-election as the people in the Everglades State have just done.

Any Disloyal Employee Probably Feels Assurance of Protection

Regardless of whether or not Senator McCarthy's charges that Communists are on the payroll of the State Department can be proved, it is clear that it would have been much wiser if the current investigation had never been called.

The strong defense made of such characters and the vigorous protest put up by the president, the secretary of State and other high officials against disturbing them even if they are operating within the government service, has no doubt given these subversives a feeling of security and freedom to continue their activities unmolested, which they could not have had before the investigation was initiated.

Where they might have been doubtful and apprehensive before of being able to hold their positions while betraying their country by giving government secrets to its enemies, they now probably feel that they can proceed without hindrance, in view of official defense and even denial of their existence.

Any way, what would it profit us to remove a few pink punks from the State Department so long as the government itself continues to be administered by a man who publicly demonstrates his esteem for the Commies by openly denouncing any attempt to expose them as a "red herring"?

Also, who is going to draw the fine, thin line between 'Fair Dealism' and 'Communism' or definitely point out where the one theory of government leaves off and the other begins?

A close examination of the objectives of Stalin and those of Truman will reveal to any intelligent and observant student of government that there is very little difference between the political ideologies of the two and that the distinction is only in methods of procedure and not in prin-

Regardless of what name it goes by, the only way that radicalism can be eliminated from the State Department, as well as all other branches of the Federal government, is for the Truman administration to be voted out of office lock, stock and barrel, the ship of state thoroughly fumigated, and good sound-thinking Americans placed on deck.

A good way to start this disinfecting job is at the ballot box in the Fall elections when several Senators and Congressmen whose lack of allegiance to American principles and our form of government is responsible for the congregation of Reds in Washington, come up for reelection.

As for the Senate Investigating Committee, it was rigged from the start and the few unbiased and sincere members on it never had a factory girl's chance of developing the truth about whether or not we were paying government employes taxpayers' money to sell us out to Communist spies.

Evidence of this may be found in the fact that it took eleven years to dislodge Alger Hiss from the government payroll and even then he quit of his own accord and was indicted only because of the persistence of a courageous congressman from California who refused to be intimidated by opposition from high sources.

The appointment of the Chairman of the Senate Investigating Committee was a forceful demonstration of the vicious circle within the government which operates to prevent unbiased consideration of any unwholesome conditions prevailing in any department.

Of all available men in the Senate who might have been expected to conduct a thorough and vigorous investigation and make an honest attempt to either prove or disprove Senator McCarthy's charges to the satisfaction of the taxpayers, the appointment went to a son-in-law of "Mission to Moscow" Davies whose book indicated where he stood on Communism, and a partner of the chairman of the so-called Loyalty Board whose duty was to pass on those suspected of being disloyal.

While this, in itself, does not reflect necessarily on the integrity of the chairman of the Senate Investigating Committee, it certainly prevents it from being regarded as an impartial body and the half-hearted performance of the chairman in going about the job does not add to his stature as an unbiased and open-minded investigator.

All of which proves what a foolish and utterly futile gesture it is to try to remove a Communist here and there from the set-up of an administration whose policies, together with those of the preceding administration, are responsible for the extraordinary growth of the cancer of Communism in this country and its spread into the very bloodstream of our national life.

"To begin with, it might be well to observe that today is an anniversary—the fifth anniversary of the opening in San Francisco of the world conference at which was organized the United Nations Organization, to safeguard and forever preserve the world peace and comity which, at the time, we were just in the final stages of achieving. achieving.

"It all looked very glamorous and promising, then. The Russians still wanted things of us, and were going through the motions of being polite though tough. Mr. Alger Hiss of the State Department—having returned just a few months before from Yalta, where he was chief advicer to the ill. where he was chief adviser to the ill President Roosevelt—was running the San Francisco show. At Yalta, all previous promises of faith to the Chinese Nationalist Government had been thrown overboard and a secret agree-ment had been reached, selling out China to the Communists. We were ry palsy-walsy with the Russians, der the friendly aegis of Mr. Alger iss' direction and management—we called them one of the great democracies of the world. Mr. Truman and Mr. Stalin had gotten along beautifully in their meeting in Potsdam and it was all very cute, because both Mr. Truman and Mr. Stalin so greatly enjoyed the musical programs, presented for their entertainment while they were there. "There were a few who were skep-tical, but to express that skepticism was to prove oneself a vulgarian and a

And so it was formed, the United Nations Organization, and has operated for five years, safeguarding the peace, the security, the freedom of the liberated nations of the world, and insuring their perpetual right to and tenure of the freedom to be democracies-nations where free men and

racies—nations where free men and women govern themselves.
"Somehow, as of now, there is tragic irony in these retrospects. Under that safeguarding, one nation after another has been gobbled up by the villainous." gangsters of Moscow. Half of Europe, most of Asia, is shackled with the chains of a dictatorship as ruthless, as bigotted, as cruel, as Godless and depraved, and far more bloody than the dictatorships of Hitler and Mussilini had ever been, in their worst days. Religious intolerance and persecution is now directed at all faiths—Catholic, Protestant and Jewish alike. A mad, power crazed, totally unprincipled and anti-God stalks the world and over every nation that is not already cap-tive, hangs the ominous shadow of the hammer and sickle.

American Communist Party officials an nounced recently that their membership in the United States is declining and that their party organization is badly shaken.

They asserted that registered party mem bers in 1950 do not exceed 47,000 which, they estimate, is about fifteen per cent of eir strength of 1949.

Former Congressman Dies May Run Again

Former Congressman Martin Dies Lufkin who was the original Chairman of the House Committee on un-American Activities and whose attempts to expose Communists in the various departments of government met the active opposition of Franklin D. Roosevelt addressed a large gathering of East Texans at Beaumont

In his usual vigorous style, the former congressman poured it on selfish business men, labor leaders, as well as the apathetic public, for allowing Communism to acquire

ombed with Communists.

If Mr. Dies should decide to make the race for Congress again and should be elected, maybe he would be able to extend some assistance to Truman in identifying Communists since the president seems com-pletely unable to tell the difference between a Red sympathizer and a red herring, difference.

We Ask the Blind To Lead the Blind

At the head of the Government of the United States is a man who failed in the only business enterprise he conducted, This is no reflection on the personal integrity of Harry Truman, as many another man has taken bankruptcy in business failure. But the fact remains that, with one failure and no business success, he has yet to prove his ability to conduct any enterprise. His conduct of the important business of the United States has been on exactly the principle which brought him mercantile failure—over extension of credit, more expense than income. In private business this takes you speedily into the bankruptcy court. In national business, it takes you eventually

Were Congress itself composed of men who knew how to operate business suc-cessfully, presidential ineptitude would be of less concern. Congress itself would stop prejudicial policies cold. But Congress numbers few men who have not made politics their career. Of those who do not fall in that category, most have been successful in the professions rather than in enterprise.

It would be interesting to know how many top men in the executive department and agencies where understanding of business should be a prime requisite have ever conducted a business successfully. This would include the Departments of Commerce, Labor and the Treasury, the RFC, the Interstate Commerce Com-mission, the National Labor Relations mission, the Board, the Cor to name a few. Communications Commission,

The welfare of the nation, its ability to remain solvent, maximum employment of the American workers, all depend on the successful working of American business. Dependent on it in addition to the government are the professions whose contributions, however useful, is not itself the production and exchange of goods but of

That in the public interest business enterprise should be regulated against human rapacity and injustice has been demonstrated in experience. But experience has shown, too, that the pendulum can swing too far the other way and that unjust regulation can become expropriation. Aesop put it as killing the goose that lays the golden egg. Still worse, we tend to kill the goose that lays any egg.

Doubtless there is in present regula-tion of business by taxation and restrictive direction a minimum of willful effort to destroy. But to the business facing destruction, it matters little whether government bears ill-will or is simply ignorant.

You would not ask a jury of the insane to pass on sanity. But we think nothing of trusting regulation that may make or break industry to men and women who have never understood the basic principles of conducting enterprise successfully.

Englishman Tells of Rights for Robots

Sir Ernest Benn who, in pre-Socialisim days in England, was a successful business man and who was invited to address a national meeting of electrical engineers in this country recently sent the following copy of his speech to be read to the con vention:

I regret that I am unable to come in person from Britain to talk directly to you, but I am not prepared to accept the only terms on which my government will allow me to travel.

In the past I have always been able to meet you on more or less equal terms. I could, for instance, at my own expense offer a handful of roses or a box of candies to a charming hostess. Now I can come to you only as a government-created pauper absolutely barred from securing, of my own right, the dollars or dimes to spend as I myself would like to do. I am not prepared to put myself into this curious and un-comfortable position. Thus my address must be read for me by another.

I understand that in the United States there are still those who think that the machinery of government can be used as a substitute for personal responsibility on the part of the governed. This idea, as we know only too well in Britain, is the open road to disaster. It changes persons wir responsibilities into robots with rights.

And while you fortunate Americans will last a little longer than the rest of us, your doom is also assured if you, like us, rely upon politics and collective action to relieve you of the normal and natural responsibilities of healthy men. For socialism is not a system; it is a disease. The "something for nothing" mentality is, in fact, an

In England we have suffered nearly five years of effective socialist govern-ment. But that is only the end of the story; we are merely completing 50 years of a sloppy sentimentalism in public affairs of which the present socialism is merely the logical outcome. In the process we have murdered old virtues with new deals. Wellmeaning, shallow-thinking, kindly people, aware of the scriptural injunction that "the greatest of these is charity," have failed to notice the distinction between the real article and the giving away of other people's money. So, having lost our faith, we come to the end of the story; we have accepted false hopes and practiced a charity which is nothing of the kind.

You will remember that 50 years ago at the end of Victoria's reign, we had achieved in Britain, notwithstanding many shortcomings and blemishes, a high general standard of living. From that proud posi-tion we have now descended to the point where American tourists coming to Europe go to the countries conquered by Hitler to escape the drab austerity of utopian Brit-

We have had enough experience to know exactly what "security" means: It is a prior government claim upon salaries and wages; it is austerity rations bought with Marshall Aid; it is more and more paper money, and less and less of anything to

This government-guaranteed "security" is steadily reducing output per man in our industries. There are, of course, glorious minority exceptions. But in general, our people have believed the promises of 1945 and have concentrated on their supposed rights and forgotten their responsi-bilities. Most thinking people among us now realize that while it is easy to make the rich poor, it is quite another matter to make the poor rich.

There is little purpose to be served in wearying you with the details of our

life, especially business life, in Britain today. To argue about taxes, pensions, houses, or even ground-nuts is merely to scratch the surface. You will be more interested in the longer view and the lessons to be learned from it.

In the short period of 50 years we have traveled the whole road, starting when government had almost nothing to do with trade, and ending where all trade is under the dead hand of the state. America, as I understand, is about half-way along this

Among the disasters resulting from governmental planning in the economic field. I put at the top of the list the loss of the market. We have no such thing that counts for much in England today. Exchange by willing buyers and willing sellers has, for practical purposes, disappared Coursemental buying fixed prices peared. Governmental buying, fixed prices, peared. Governmental buying, fixed prices, subsidies, and purchase taxes have substituted force for willingness. Goodwill is a thing of the past. Price, properly the result of a compromise between the willing buyer and the willing seller, is now replaced by an official chefrotic property. placed by an official abstraction arrived at for political rather than economic rea-sons. The word "willing" is not to be found in any official vocabulary.

The sanctity of contract is also a thing of the past, and that again shows how far we have departed from the principles up-on which civilization was constructed. Governments, here and elsewhere, fail to set much value on their pledged word.

Perhaps the biggest of all the changes in this connection is the destruction of the price mechanism. Before the politicians usurped the right of the citizen to provide for himself, the price mechanism indi-cated with speed and certainty the degree cated with speed and certainty the degree of plenty or of scarcity. It did not require committees of experts and official enquirers to discover changes in production and consumption, and the need for adjusting action accordingly. The price mechanism has been put so completely out of action that we now pay a series of varying prices for the same article at the same time.

The natural process, named by economists "the law of supply and demand," insures the freedom of choice that is essential to the worthwhile life of free citi Socialism tries to put the matter the other way around. Some authority, claiming to know what the people want, issues orders for supply without being able to know the requirements of the buyers or demanders. This theory ignores completely the forces which govern the dinary actions of the ordinary man. natural order of things requires that the maker shall produce his goods and display them for the inspection of the buyer who is, at all times, free not to buy. The right to buy or not to buy is vital to economic well-being and, of course, to personal liberty.

It is only now that we are beginning to reap the inevitable fruits of wrong thinking. Millions of our people now thinking. Millions of our people now look to the government much in the same fashion that their fathers of Victorian times looked to God. Political authority has taken the place of heavenly guidance.

Herbert Spencer in that wonderful prophecy, "The Man Versus The State," explained in detail what would happen. He foretold with exactitude the present rush of the weaklings for jobs as planners and permitters, telling other people what not to

You will have noticed that while we are all under the thumb of authority, authority becomes composed of those who, lacking the courage to stand on their own feet and accept their share of personal responsibility, seek the safety of official positions where they escape the consequences of error and failure. Active, energical and programme the consequences of error and failure. getic, and progressive persons, instead of leading the rest, are allowed to move only by the grace and favor of that section of the population which from its very nature lacks all the qualities needed to produce the desired results. Authority s the power to say no, which requires lit-

tle ability.

self must try to avoid the loss that results from mistakes. But if he is the planner or the planned, the loss comes planner or the planned, the loss comes out of the public purse, and he is relieved of personal responsibility. He can then waste and lose just as much as his un-herent laziness may dictate.

The individual responsible for himself must strive to do better—better than his previous performance and better than others. But in a planned society, the only upward route available to a person is into the ranks of the planners where he can presume to arrange the affairs of others.

The socialist advances the supposi-tion that the individual can be so trained and managed as to cause his every act to be performed in the interests of society as a whole. The idea of the socialist is to substitute for the enormously constructive natural power of the self-interest of each of us, a manufactured force composed of the theoretical interests of the state. To the individualist this socialist idea is utter nonsense—a view much strengthened by the losses and disasters of the last five years in England alone.

Perhaps, above all, I am an individualist because it makes for honesty. In a society of free men, each acting on his own The individualist thinks of millions responsibility, honesty is the best policy.

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"CIVIL RIGHTS" ONCE AGAIN SWAY HIGH COURT DECISION

The Supreme Court, whose members have time and again demonstrated their strong prejudice against the white race, has made another "social decision" and one which clearly indicates that we are fast approaching the place where an American citizen, in order to get justice from our highest court, will have to first paint his face with a piece of burnt cork.

In Dallas where a Negro burglar bashed the brains out of a sleeping night watchman in order to commit robbery without interference, a jury indicted him for first degree murder.

There was never any question as to the Negro's guilt and the ruling was not made on this point, the murder, itself, seeming to have been regarded as "immaterial and irrelevant" by the majority of the Supreme Court judges.

Civil Rights on which the Court has gone hog-wild and which appears to include murder as one of the privileges of the minority race, was the point on which the decision was made.

Because there was no Negro on the jury, the defendant was set free to pursue his career of burglary unmolested which should serve as a warning hereafter to night watchmen who are so careless as to get in the way of a burgler intent on the serious business at hand.

No cognizance was taken of the fact that in the South we have gotten along for more than eighty years without Negroes on the jury and would still be doing it if Joe Stalin had not issued his decree concerning "Civil Rights" through the medium of the Communist Party platform.

At any rate, the eminent jurists on the highest court in the land have once again pointed up "Civil Rights" as the dominating factor in influencing decisions and the fact that an innocent man lost his life in the transaction, is just one on him.

It may be that something constructive will come out of these continuous rulings in favor of one race as against another. Perhaps it will ultimately force the organization of a group called something like "The National Association for the Preservation of the White Race", which can be shortened into the initials NAPWR, and which will shoot its lawyers into the picture every time it feels the white race is being discriminated against.

In the meantime, if a blonde is convicted of murder and it is discovered by the Supreme Court sages through the medium of an astute lawyer from a national organization of blondes that the jury contained no member with platinum hair, we assume that the case will be reversed and the blonde set free to kill somebody else.

Presumably this would also apply to Indians, Mexicans, Chinese, Half-breeds and Swiss Bell Ringers who commit a crime and then discover that they can wiggle out of it by pointing out that the jury failed to include their prototype in its panel.

Houston Woman Talks Good Government To Publishers

American newspaper publishers in convention in New York recently were told by Oveta Culp Hobby of Houston that the "whole complexity of government has led to an overplanned economy, an overgoverned nation and an overspent budget."

The means must be found for eliminating waste, cutting taxes and simplifying government, she pointed out "if venture capital is to be free to provide an expanding economy in the United States."

She insisted that it was not her intention to castigate government officials and congress because these weaknesses "are the result of the combined weakness of the public."

While she was obviously doing a little graceful and diplomatic verbal sidestepping in order to avoid offending some of her friends in the Fair Deal set-up, we think it very hopeful and encouraging that Mrs. Hobby has publicly aligned herself on the side of those who oppose waste and inefficiency in government.

If she has decided to permanently throw in with the forces who are trying to preserve the free enterprise system in this country and to bring about a return of constitutional government, she will be quite a valuable asset to such forces.

Mrs. Hobby is an exceptionally brilliant, able and intelligent woman who comes from a long line of straight-thinking Texans who would have been the last to accept the New Deal or Fair Deal ideologies or to hold with the alien "isms" which have overrun this country in the past seventeen years.

We hope she continues to adhere to the policy of defending the cause of good government because it is within the power of influential women like her to offset, in a degree, the evil influence of some of the fulsome females in public life who are constantly spouting off about "social injustice" and who are more concerned in movements for supplying bubble baths to the Bengalese than they are in helping to preserve our form of government.

So far as we have observed, this is the first time Mrs. Hobby has taken a definite stand in favor of sound American principles in government, but we hope it is not the last.

The great Houston newspaper of which she is the executive vice president turns out some grand editorials along this line but, for some unexplained reason, employs persons on its reportorial staff who are regarded as extreme radicals and who slant local articles to conform to the large colony of Red sympathizers in Houston.

In the days when Texas sent its best brains to the United States Senate to represent the Lone Star State, Joseph Weldon Bailey made this assertion from the Senate floor: "If I have to choose between a crook and a fool, I will take the crook because there is a possibility of reforming the crook, but no hope of changing the viewpoint of a fool." The eminent statesman never got around to contemplating what could be done by a people who find themselves saddled with leaders who are both fools and crooks.

HOW TO AID THE CAUSE OF COMMUNISM IN THE U. S.

One of the reasons Communist infiltration of our institutions has been able to make such effective and rapid progress in the past few years is because of the highly organized "smear" campaigns directed against those who oppose this subversive force.

It is astounding to observe such naivete on the part of those at the head of vast enterprises and one can't help but wonder, in view of such stupidity, how they ever managed to attain a commanding position in the field of business.

Certainly the smear artist is going to brand as a "racket" any effective effort to thwart the plans of his masters to Communize our government, schools, churches and other social and civic institutions.

What should we expect of those who are paid to wield the tar brush? Do we expect them to praise and extol those who are fighting their nefarious proposals and blocking their subversive plans?

Do we expect them to put the stamp of approval on those who are doing most to prevent them from carrying out their dastardly schemes?

To the extent that business men are fooled by these smear tactics and accept the propaganda at face value, in that measure they are aiding and abetting the enemies of this country to firmly established Communism here.

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Robber Barons in Washington Who Steal By Statute

Miss Vivien Kellems the Connecti-Miss Vivien Kellems the Connecticut manufacturer who won our unbounded admiration and respect when she stood alone and fought the political robber barons in Washington who steal by statute, is getting recruits to her cause in increasing numbers.

The first person in the United States to defy the Treasury Depart-ment to make a tax collecting agency of private business concerns, Miss Kellems' nerve has helped put steel in the spines of many citizens who, without her fearless leadership and example, would have accepted this indignity along with all others which the New Deal and Fair Deal gang has rammed down the citizens' throats.

Latest to condemn the despicable Latest to condemn the despicable practice of the Treasury Department in seizing a citizen's salary before it ever finds its way into his pocket is the powerful Charlotte, North Carolina, Observer.

Coming from a state where the wild and reckless expenditure of government money has resulted in contaminating the political morals of the people to such an extent that they send long-haired radicals to the Senate and allow a leading University in their midst to offer a course in Com-munism, this editorial is significant:

The Fair Dealers have found the with-holding tax such an easy way to get money out of the taxpayers without raising a storm of protest that they are now planning to use it on corporations and stockholders.

If the Fair Deal Group, whose chief If the Fair Deal Group, whose chief occupation is thinking up new ways to get the people's money and spend it, have their way, corporations would be required to withhold 10 per cent of all the dividends they declare and pay it over to the govern-ment before any payment is made to the stockholders.

The stockholder, therefore, would find part of his money seized by the government before he ever sees it, just as the wage earner or the salaried man gets only what is left after the government takes its cut out of his earnings by a highhanded and very questionable method of seizure.

It is questionable because it is an un-warranted confiscation of private property to which the government has no moral right and only a very shady legal right.

Under our American system of juris-prudence, and according to the plain words of our Bill of Rights, the seizure of private property is justifiable only to satisfy a just and legal debt. The existence of the debt must be proved, and it must also be proved that all reasonable means have been used to collect the debt and that the debtor will not pay, before any court will permit the seizure of the property.

But under the withholding tax, the gov ernment seizes private property where no debt exists. Taxes are not calculated on the basis of a man's weekly or monthly pay, but on the basis of his annual income. Therefore, no debt exists until the annual income is complete. This raises a serious question as to whether this seizure is according to due process of law or not.

Moreover, the withholding tax is de-moralizing to the citizen. He no longer thinks of his salary as the whole amount, but only as the part left after the government takes its forced cut. The tax has been made invisible and painless, and he does not protest. When the taxpayer does not complain about his taxes, the govern ment is encouraged to collect more and more and spend more and more.

No wage earner has contested this seizure of his property in the courts because it takes about \$50,000 to take a case through the Supreme Court, and very few wage earners have \$50,000 for that purpose. Moreover, with the Supreme Court packed as it is, he would not have much chance of winning the case if he did contest it.

If the withholding tax is applied to cor porations and to their dividends, maybe we ably lose, but it ought to be tested anyway.

EDGAR B. CHURCHILL AND MORTIMER S. ROOSEVELT

(From the New York Sunday News)
The New York Times and Life magazine between them are performing a public serv ice by printing big portions of Winston Churchill's World War II recollections al-most as fast as they steam off the point of Mr. Churchill's power-packed pen.

We've been greatly interested in the latest installments, to be printed in Vol. 3 of the Churchill World War II memoirs. Much of this material has to do with how the British Prime Minister acted as the Edgar Bergen, champion puppet manipu-lator, to U. S. President F. D. Roosevelt's Mortimer Snerd.

Snerd is the dumber of the two dolls operated by the original Edgar Bergen Charlie McCarthy being the other.

From the war's outbreak in September, 1939, Mr. Churchill did his best to get the United States into the fight—which, as a loyal Britain Firster shopping for any and every possible ally, he had a right to do. But in Roosevelt he found a most willing helper, or errand boy—which Roosevelt had no right to be. Some specific instances:

1. Atlantic Charter Conference, Aug. 9-12, 1941, four months before Pearl Harbor. At the meetings in Placentia Bay, Newfound land, on the British battleship Prince of Wales and the U. S. cruiser Augusta, Churchill drew up the bulk of the famed and phony Atlantic Charter.

Then the conferees turned their attention to Japan. Roosevelt's plan was to hand the Japanese a series of demands which they could not accept. Object: to delay U. S.-Japanese negotiations a month or so, while the U. S. got ready as best it might for the Jap attack the demands were expected to provoke.

Churchill says he wrote the last paragraph of the planned note to Japan: "Any further encroachment by Japan in the Southwest Pacific would produce a situa tion in which the United States Govern ment would be compelled to take counter measures, even though these might lead to war between the United States and Japan.

The note went to Tokyo a few days later and was taken there as an ultimatum. Churchill's evidence shows that his mouthpiece Roosevelt intended it as such.

2. A letter to Gen. Jan C. Smuts, South

African Prime Minister, Mr. Churchill wrote this letter Nov. 9, 1941, to explain how his friend Roosevelt was hobbled by the Constitution's provision giving Congress, not the President, the power to declare war.

Churchill reported that Roosevelt had told him: "I may never declare war; I may make war. If I were to ask Congress to declare war they might argue about it for three months.'

Roosevelt was already making war. His "shooting order" to the Navy, regarding German and Italian warships found in the North Atlantic, had gone out long before the Smuts letter was written. On Churchill's evidence, Roosevelt was willing to make unofficial was indefinitely in the second of the se unofficial war indefinitely, in complete con

3. Pearl Harbor Day in Britain Dec 1941. Mr. Churchill was at Chequers that Sunday, and with him were two Americans

—W. Averell Harriman and U. S. Ambassador John G. Winant.

The latest comedy in connection with ice boxes was played at Fort Worth at a Government housing project known as "Libera tor Village"

It seems they have some kind of rule to the effect that all those who occupy the houses in this Federally controlled area are compelled to get their ice boxes from the government for which their rent is raised three dollars per month, after the installa-

Sometime ago the government was unable to supply these refrigerators and several housewives went ahead and bought their own and had them installed.

When the government finally got a supply of the boxes, their agents insisted on putting them in the houses where the women had their own refrigerators. refused to let the government equipment be put in their kitchens for the very logical reason that they already had one ice box and didn't want two

This confused and frustrated the representatives of the government housing pro ject whose rule book did not tell them what to do in such a contingency. There w rule that the boxes must be put in and, as their single-track minds viewed the mat-ter, they had to put them in even if they had to stack them on top of those owned by the women occupying the houses.

Not being government employes them selves, the women took a common sense view of the matter, stood in the door, place ed their arms akimbo and dared the gov ernment men to move in with the second

Finally, in desperation, the local government representatives appealed to Washing-ton for a special ruling and, after weeks of cutting of red tape, it was decreed that the government would not compel the occupants of the houses to accept the govern-ment refrigerators if they already owned

The ruling was nothing new to the irate ousewives. They had made this decision when the matter first came up.

'Robinhood View Of Life'

In a speech made in Portland, Ore., Rep. Ralph W. In a recent letter to its members, the National Association of Credit Men made a clear and logical analysis of British election results in which it said:

"The meaning and consequence of the recent British election can now be more accurately evaluated. The election confirmed the definite trend from socialistic programs, a trend which began in Europe with the Conservative victories in Belgium Austria, Western Germany, Italy and a slight Conservative shift in France. Then New Zealand and Australia confirmed the free world swing toward more conservative government. These election results mean that, as far as the people of Europe are concerned, it will be much more difficult

"Those with leftist leanings in this country, who believe in a shift of power and responsibility from local to centralized government, are hard pressed to explain the results of the British election. However, they ingeniously try to emphasize that the Conservative party in England did not challenge much of the socialistic program. Others express the view that the British election proved that a "me too" or "we will do it better and cheaper" campaign could pay off. Since the Conservative party won a moral victory in England they argue that such a campaign need not be a failure They seek to defend the type of campaigns we have experienced in our own country in recent years and feel the English electihelped their argument. There is, of course, no way to know what would have occurred had the British Conservatives challenged most of the socialistic program. It is just as reasonable to presume that since the Eng-lish people were fed up on the present program the shift to the Conservative party might have been greater had the party challenged the socialistic program from top to

In our discussions of State and National issues, we shall show no more partiality to the Tycoons of Industry than we shall to the Czars of Labor.

In fact, we seem to remember that some of the biggest business men in the nation teamed up with labor union racketeers in playing ball with the New Deal when that economic atrocity was riding the crest and have continued to string along with its more vicious counterpart currently administering the government in Washington. ent in Washington

The courage, integrity and patriotism which must be commanded if the Republic is to survive will not be found exclusively among representatives of big business or leaders of labor unions.

It must be drawn from that vast group of average Americans who ask nothing of government except that it secure them in their inalienable right to work, to save and to keep a reasonable share of the fruits of their toil.

We are against the domination of government either by big business or big labor and we maintain that favoritism to either group on the part of a State or National administration is un-American, immoral and a flagrant abuse of power.

As to political affiliations, we acknowledge allegiance to neither of the two major parties.

As presently constituted, both are so shot through with radicalism as to render them incapable of resolving the serious problems confronting the Re-

We acknowledge our indebtedness to the courageous and patriotic Coalition Block of sound-thinking Democrats and Republicans in both Houses of Congress which has prevented Communistic influences from complete domination of our Federal government.

We are opposed to the reckless squandering of the taxpayers' money by incompetent, irresponsible and improvident public officials and we contend that taxes should be levied for purposes of revenue only and not to punish the rich, reward the poor or redistribute the wealth.

We are firmly committed to the principle of States Rights and we hold that the people of an ypart of the United States are entitled to maintain their own social customs and traditions without interference from politicians seeking oves to perpetuate themselves in power.

We are unequivocally in favor of Free Enterprise as opposed to government ownership of business and insist on the responsibility of every American to seek to improve his social and economic condition through initiative, energy and thrift rather than leaning on the arm of government for support.

We concede to every man the right to work and the opportunity of profit-

We concede to every man the right to work and the opportunity of profit-able employment regardless of whether he does, or does not, belong to a labor

On the other hand, we claim for the employer the irrevocable right to hire and fire his employees without instructions from any government agency or intimidation by Federal Police.

We feel that at this crucial time in history, it is imperative that newspapers and other groups seeking to influence public opinion should exert every effort within their power to help preserve our republican form of government, our Free Enterprise system and American way of life. We shall exert all our energies to that end.

These are the sentiments of the SOUTHERN CONSERVATIVE and although ours may be only one small voice crying in the wilderness, we will fight for fundamental American principles, as we understand them, without apology to any man or set of men.
