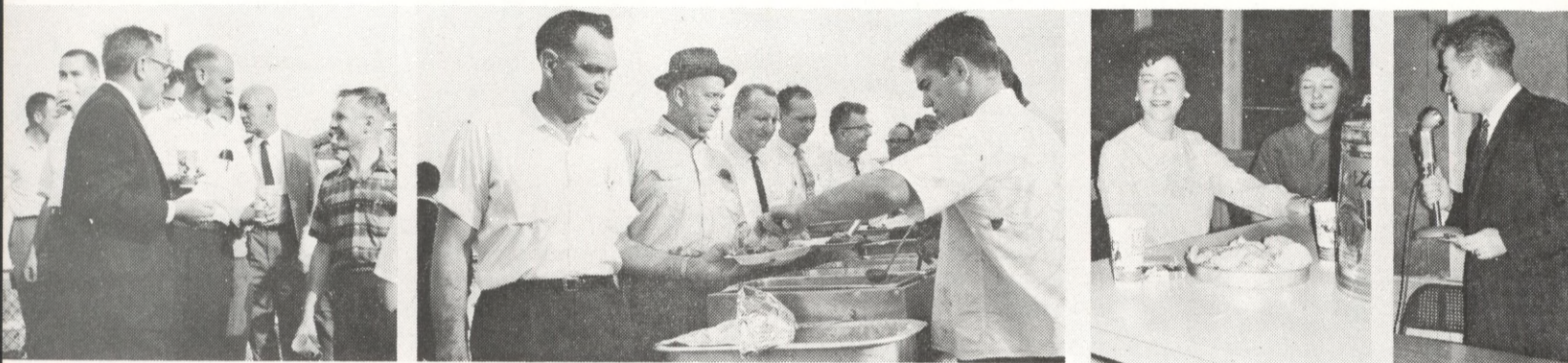

A. E. WILLIAMS DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

It is with regret we report the death this week of Alton E. Williams, Pipefitter No. 1 in the Refinery's Engineering Field Dept. Mr. Williams, 59, died Tuesday, May 12, in a Galveston hospital. He had been in ill health for several months.

SHELL STARTS CONSTRUCTION ON BIG FOOT WATERFLOOD

Construction is now underway on Shell Oil Company's Big Foot waterflood project to recover some 8 million additional barrels of crude oil over the next 15 to 20 years. Operation of the waterflood is scheduled to begin in November.

Discovered by Shell in 1949, the Big Foot Field has produced approximately 16 million barrels of oil over 15 years. Of this total production, 10 million barrels was produced from the area to be waterflooded. The field is located in Frio County southwest of San Antonio.

Without the waterflood measure, Big Foot had practically reached its limit of economic primary recovery. In 1958 Shell installed a pilot flood to determine the

A veteran of more than 20 years service with the company, Mr. Williams served throughout his career in the Houston Refinery's Engineering Field Department. Hired as general helper in October 1942, he became a pipefitter helper in April 1943. He began filling temporary vacancies as a Pipefitter No. 1 as early as October 1944, and advanced permanently to the classification in September 1952.

Mr. Williams was born in Livingston, Texas. His body will be returned there Saturday, May 16, for burial in the Me-nard Chapel Cemetery. Services are scheduled for 2 PM tomorrow, at the Pace Funeral Home in Livingston.

economic feasibility of a waterflood program. Based on resulting data, the Company obtained concurrence of the other operators and all the royalty owners to form a 4,850-acre unit. Shell owns about 88 percent of the unit.

Approximately one-half of the producing wells in the Big Foot Field are in the unit. For the waterflood, some 160 new producers are being drilled, with 207 existing producers being converted to injectors. A conventional five-spot pattern will be used in the program, that is, a producer will be surrounded by four injection wells.
