CAPLINE BEGINS DELIVERY OF CRUDE OIL TO MIDWEST

The largest diameter crude oil pipeline in the U.S. began delivering Louisiana and Mississippi crude to the Midwest recently. The Capline system, which will cost more than \$100 million, marks the beginning of a wider market for domestic crude oil.

Construction of the line's supporting facilities is continuing. Shell's Wood River Refinery, currently in the midst of an expansion-modernization program, will eventually hook up to Capline at its distribution terminal in Patoka, Illinois.



REFINERY PENSIONER J. M. DEVERAUX RETIRED IN 1964 FROM ENGINEERING FIELD

Refinery pensioner J. M. Deveraux died of a heart attack on November 3, 1968, at the age of 63, at Conroe, Texas. He retired from the Refinery's Engineering Field Department in 1964 after 20 years of Company service.

He was born in Dobbin, Texas, on July 20, 1905, attended the Dobbin public schools, and joined Shell at Houston Refinery in 1943.

Funeral arrangements are under the direction of the Collins and Johnson Funeral Home, 2055 4th Street in Conroe, and funeral services are scheduled at the St. Beulah Baptist Church at Dobbin, Texas, on November 10, at 2:00 p.m., and burial is to be at the Beulah Baptist Church Cemetery. He is survived by a son, Jimmy Lee Deveraux of Conroe.

Roy Swann, outdoor editor of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times, reports an ammunition saving way to sight in a deer rifle. "Put your target on the 35-yard range, sandbag the gun and fire one shot at the center of the bulls-eye. Then, sandbag the rifle once more with the crosshairs on the center of the target. Holding it steady, turn the adjustment knobs until the crosshairs exactly match the hole made by the first bullet.

"Now aim at the bulls-eye again, and, if it's off again, make the same corrections." Swann says it takes no more than three to five shots to bring it right "in."

struction, estimates that the line will be on automatic control by March, 1969.

Receivers of Capline's crude are Midwest refineries caught in the pinch between increasing demand and limited crude oil supplies from traditional sources in Illinois, Kansas, Oklahoma, and the Rocky Mountain region. Capline's crude oil supply is expected to supplement, not displace, crude now moving to refineries from these courses.

Initially, deliveries through the new 40-inch diameter pipeline will be 350,000 barrels a day and are ultimately expected to reach about one million barrels a day. Capline's optimistic growth picture is keyed primarily to the growing crude oil supply from offshore Louisiana coupled with growing markets in the industrialized Midwest.

Completion of the 630-mile long Capline adds a much needed link to the nation's crude oil pipeline system. It adds flexibility which will provide more economical transportation for crude oil now moving by barge and high cost marginal pipeline capacity to the Midwest from the U.S. Gulf coast.

Joint venture owners of Capline include Shell and seven other Companies.

SHELL PLANS SECOND EXPANSION AT SLOCUM OF 39 ACRE STEAM INJECTION PROJECT

Shell is expanding its Slocum Field steamflood project in Anderson County, Texas, for the second time in six months.

Shell began its pilot steam injection program about a year and a half ago in an effort to recover the otherwise unobtainable viscous crude from the shallow Wilcox Carrizo sand. Initially, seven injection and fifty-nine producing wells were drilled into the target zone - topped at 500 feet and only about 40 feet thick.

The first expansion of the project came in May of this year. It called for an additional thirty-seven wells located in the southeast quarter of the 39-acre project area. Present expansion plans call for fifty-seven additional wells.

NOVEMBER 9TH MARKS OPENING DATE FOR DEER, TURKEY, AND QUAIL HUNTING

The best hunting prospects in years face hunters this year when the season on deer, turkey, and quail opens Saturday (Nov. 9), in many counties of Texas.

Hunters are urged to check their 1968-69 Texas Hunting Guide (usually available where hunting licenses are sold) to find out what seasons start, when and where.

Texas has more than three million deer and approximately half the entire wild turkey population in the United States.

Reports from all over the State indicate an excellent quail crop.

Other seasons have ended or will be ending soon. The season on rails and gallinules closes November 9, and the mourning dove season in the North Zone and the white-winged dove season are closed. The mourning dove season in the South Zone ends November 19, except in the counties which had a white-winged dove season where it ends November 15.

But the major part of the hunting season is still ahead. The goose and sandhill crane season is in full swing, and the magic date of December 14, is finally looming into sight for duck hunters.


