Explanation of the Six Championships and Awards

TEAM MEDAL PLAY

Each member of the four man teams scores will be added up and the teams will be rated 1 through 16 as to which teams have the least number of strokes.

Award: The Houston Post's Marion Hiskey Trophy will go to the winning team.

TEAM MATCH PLAY

Each member of the four man teams scores will be point each and the number one team (composed of number one and two men) play the other team's number one team for 1 point and the number 2 team (3 and 4 men) play each other for another point . . . making a total of 6 points possible for each team to win. The team that wins all four team matches is the Team Match Play Champion. Teams are rated 1 through 16. Teams that

win play other teams that win and teams that lose play other teams that lose.

Award: The Houston Chronicle's Fred Cobb Trophy is awarded to the winning team.

TEAM LOW FOUR BALL

This team championship is determined by the best ball of the four team members for 72 holes. The lowest score each member of the team has on a hole is the score that is counted for the team on that particular hole. Teams are rated 1 through 16.

Award: A beautiful trophy is awarded to the school that the team represents.

TEAM LOW TWO BALL

Each team has a number one team (1 and 2 men) and a number 2 team (3 and 4 men). Their low ball as a team over 72 holes determines the championship. Teams are rated 1 through 32.

Award: A beautiful trophy is awarded to the school that the winning team represents.

INDIVIDUAL

Each contestant plays 72 holes and the lowest score in medal play competition is the champion.

Award: The Austin-American Statesman's Morris Williams, Jr. Trophy is awarded to the school that the individual represents.

The Willie Maguire Trophy is awarded to the individual to keep for himself.

The top four finishers will receive a trophy.

OVERALL

Points are given for the first 10 places in each of the championships listed above. The team that has the highest total points is the Championship Team of the Tournament and is called the Overall Champion. The teams are rated 1 through 16.

The following scoring system will be used for the Overall Championship. The points for the 1st ten places are as follows.

Team Medal Play — 95, 18, 12, 8, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1.

Team Match Play — 25, 18, 12, 8, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1.

Team Low Four Ball — 20, 15, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 3, 2, 1.

Team Low Two Ball and Individual Medal Play — 18, 15, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 3, 2, 1.

MARION HISKEY AWARD

The Marion Hiskey Trophy is presented annually to the Team Medal Champion by the HOUSTON POST in honor of the late Marion Hiskey. Marion was one of America's outstanding collegiate golfers while at North Texas State from 1952 through 1954. He was killed in an Air Force plane crash in 1956.

FRED COBB AWARD

The Fred Cobb Trophy is presented annually to the Team Match Play Champion by the HOUSTON CHRONICLE in honor of the late Fred Cobb. He was golf coach of four national championship teams at North Texas State College.

MORRIS WILLIAMS, JR. TROPHY


The Morris Williams, Jr., Trophy is given annually to the school that the individual champion represents by the AUSTIN AMERICAN STATESMAN. It is given in honor of the late Morris Williams, Jr., who was an outstanding player at the University of Texas.

BILL LAUFMAN AWARD

















Some of his accomplishments are as follows: Selected by NCAA Golf Coaches as Number 1 player in the nation; Shot 21 under par in 26 rounds of competition his sophomore year; Played on 2 National Championship Teams and one National Runner-Up team; Ranked Number One Amateur in United States by Golf Digest for 1967; Won 8 Collegiate tournaments and was co-champion of another; Runner-up in NCAA Championships in 1968; Selected on NCAA Golf Coaches First Team of the All America team in 1967 and 1968.

MORRIS FRANK of The Houston Chronicle will emcee the All America Pre-Tournament Banquet for the 11th straight year in 1969. He also emceed the NCAA pre-tournament banquet last year.

The All America has grossed over \$175,000 throughout the years and most of it has gone for scholarships to help many young men receive an education and provide a program for them to play golf while in school.

All of the 14 All America Golf Championships have been played on the beautiful Pine Forest Country Club Golf Course in Houston, Texas.

The Universities playing in the 1969 All America have won 18 of the past 20 NCAA Championships. Houston has won 10, North Texas State 4, LSU 1, SMU 1, Oklahoma State 1 and Florida U. 1.

SOAPY JOHNSON will be the official Scorekeeper for the 13th straight year. He was also the official scorekeeper of the NCAA tournament last year. He takes his vacation during the dates of the All America tournament.

* * * * *

8 of the top 10 teams in the NCAA last year will be playing in the 1969 All America . . . including the Champion team, the University of Florida. Houston finished 2nd, Texas U. and Oklahoma State tied for 4th, Arizona State was 6th, New Mexico U. was 7th, Colorado U. finished 8th and Florida State finished 10th.

Texas University waited until the 14th year of playing in the All America to win a Championship but last year they won the Overall Championship. They won the Low Four Ball, Team Match Play and the Low Two Ball. Houston won the Team Medal Play and Individual Championships.

EXCITING GOLF . . . The All America has to have the most exciting finishes of any tournament in the history of golf. You have six Championships being decided on every shot. Last year Houston and Texas came to the last hole with all six riding on every shot of Hal Underwood and Bob Barbarossa of Houston and Rik Masengale and Chip Stewart of Texas.

The 1968 Eastern Amateur Champion and the 1968 Western Amateur Champion could wind up playing each other in the All America this year. Rik Masengale of Texas U. won the Western Amateur and Bob Barbarossa of UH won the Eastern Amateur and was also Medalist (72 holes) in the Western Amateur. Rik finished 3rd in the All America last year and Bob finished 4th in the 1968 All America. Bob was also runner-up in Porter Cup and South-eastern Amateur Championships last year.

Grier Jones of Oklahoma State won the 1968 NCAA Championship setting new records. He tied for 12th in the 1967 All America and tied for 16th in the 1968 All America.

Hal Underwood of UH became the only outright two time winner of the All America last year. He won in 1967 and 1968. Hal was rated the top Amateur in the country by a National Magazine. He was runner-up in the NCAA, Eastern and Medal Play of the Western Amateur Championships. The Red Baron also won the Texas Amateur Championship for the second time this past summer.

Drue Johnson of Arizona University who finished in a tie for 2nd in the 1967 NCAA Championship will be playing in the All America for the first time this year.

Bob Barbarossa of UH and Rik Masengale of Texas U. will be playing in the Masters tournament this spring. They both finished in a tie for 5th place in the National Amateur last year.

Ben Kern of New Mexico State was voted top Amateur of Canada last year. He finished in a tie for 16th place in the 1968 All America.
