Blow 'em away

Reagan vows to destroy Commies

President Ronald Reagan, in a speech to University Park students Thursday, said he will "blow the hell out of communist hangouts all over Central and South America in an effort to purge the Western Hemisphere of dark, communist forces."

Reagan, speaking before an overflow crowd at Robertson Stadium of about 100,000 fair-minded supporters, said America needs to re-establish itself as "a nation that won't be subjected to the whims of these communist thugs who reek of Russian vodka."

The intelligent, clean-cut, Republican crowd welcomed the president with a loud, 20-minute standing ovation and later shouts of "Reagan in '84 and forever" punctuated the brilliant speech.

The president said the recent invasion of Grenada would be

"just the beginning of a long battle against the irritating dictatorships in our backyard."

"If need be, we'll blow these failures of communism right off the face of the beautiful earth. Cuba is walking on thin ice and Castro better realize that I won't hesitate to decimate him and his Russian slime island," the great leader said."

A fair-minded conservative man in the crowd burped an effigy of Soviet Premier Yuri Andropov and Reagan shouted, "Way to go son, I bet you and your family are God-fearing, bread-winning Republicans. People like you keep the world round and free."

Stand-off

SWAT removes Van Horn during siege

University Park Chancellor Richard Van Horn, suffering from severe dehydration and malnutrition, was arrested Thursday after SWAT police officers charged his office. Van Horn ignored an evacuation order in the wake of Houston's worst multiple disaster in history, police said.

A nuclear reactor disaster, city gang wars, a raging city-wide fire and an earthquake failed to convince the eager Van Horn

that enough was enough.

Van Horn, asleep with a copy of "Computer Digest" covering his face, had barricaded himself in the Ezekial Cullen Building vowing "to wait this thing out."

SWAT commander Chuck Tower said he thought Van Horn was crazy for staying because Houston citizens began fleeing the city last week.

Van Horn said, "I don't care if not one student shows up, I will run the whole damn campus if need be in order to keep UH open."

Tower said he thought Van Horn was suffering from exhaustion as well. The chancellor had been awake for four days waiting for 30,000 Texas Instrument delivery trucks containing 112 billion computer work stations.

"I told him that the trucks would be arriving as soon as the disaster ended," Tower said.

Van Horn was treated for dehydration at Hermann Hospital and then taken into police custody for questioning.

UH hires Watt to fill vacant VC position

Former Secretary of the Interior James Watt is joining the staff at University Park as the new vice chancellor for student affairs, and he couldn't be happier.

Watt recently resigned from his government post and is "delighted" with his new position at the university. He will replace Gerald Osborne, who was last seen boarding an airplane for Atlantic City, taking a swig from a bottle of Southern Comfort.

"I'm glad they found a replacement for me," Osborne said. "I need a vacation. I'm going to find me a showgirl!"

Osborne was considered for the vice chancellor spot, after serving an interim post, but objection to his paternal attitude toward students swayed the final decision.

During his time here Osborne was known to refer to University Park students, whose average age is about 24, as "kids." The cutesy term did not go over well with students, and apparently was the deciding factor against his appointment.

Watt admitted that life has been a little tough since his resignation.

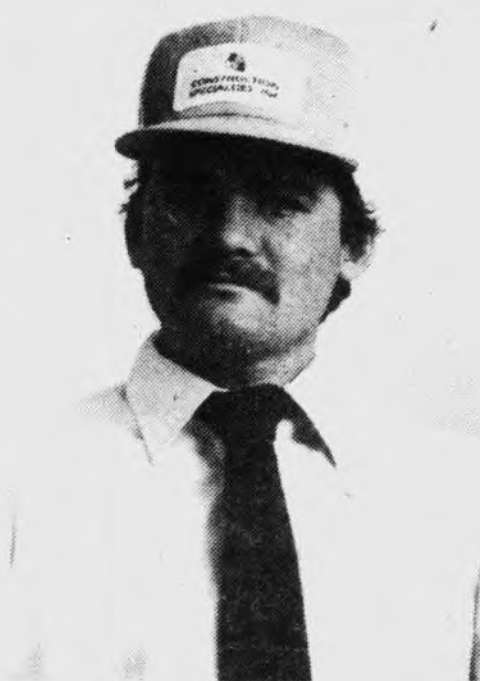
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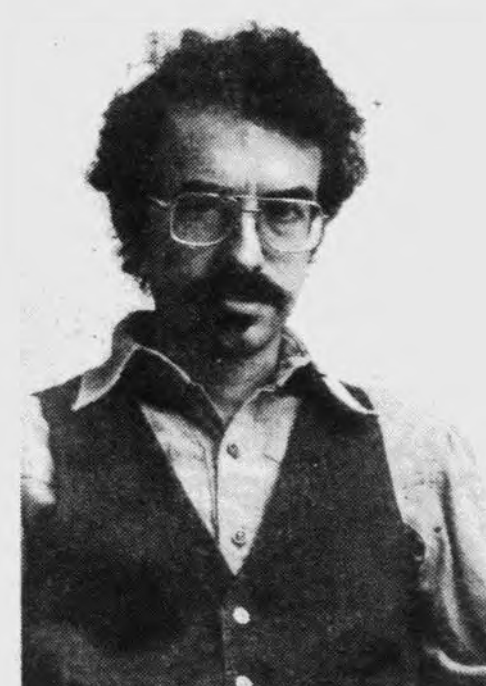

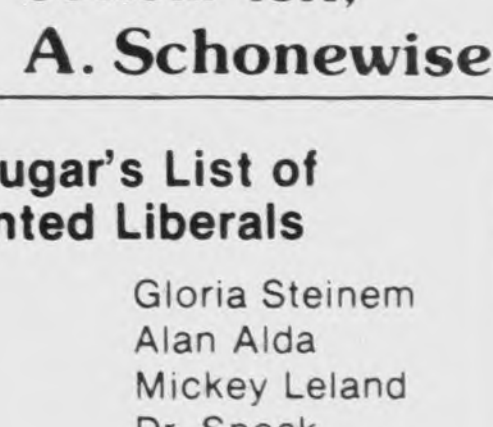

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Administrators spend \$500 mil to complete UP construction

University administrators today announced that the University Park campus is finally complete. After capital expenditures of \$500 million, including construction of the 86-floor Di Portanova Memorial dormitory complex, the flagship campus of UH has reached architectural maturity.

"We are now ready to provide quality education for quality students," Billy Jim Boomershine, chancellor, said after the Board of Regents meeting yesterday. "We're flat going to show Harvard and Yale our heels," he said, adding UH had shed its "Cougar High" image and is now ready to "take on the top contenders in the education derby."

Sam Bob Butts, renowned philanthropist and Chairperson of the Board of Regents, said UP is ready to take its rightful place among the elite in institutions of higher learning. "Hell, we're sick and tired of eatin' dirt. Let the Aggies and them Teasippers suck the hind tit a while."

Butts, the prime mover among UH Regents, is well known as the dental floss magnate and Brownwood division land developer.

University President Elwood Q. Smythe-Higgenbotham, recently induced to head the UH System from its new headquarters at Cullen and the Gulf Freeway, was absent from the meeting and unavailable for comment. A reliable source within the administration said the president is in Berne dickering for a grant from the Rothchild interests. The same source stipulated Smythe-Higgenbotham had been notified by telephone. He was reached briefly by Chairperson Butts in the chalet of Prince Rainier near Lake Como.

"The president was real pleased," Butts said. "He said he'd bring us all some of that good wine. He told me what 'year,' but it don't make no never mind. He's our boy and can really talk in places where it matters. Hell, that's what he was hired for," Butts said.

In the four years since 1989, the North Cullen corridor has been expanded and now encompasses the area bordered by Holman (west), Telephone Road (east), Gulf Freeway (north), and North MacGregor (south). The site of the former Texas Southern University is an asphalt parking lot and 12 intramural fields. Since TSU affiliated with Harvard in 1987, this expansion was a logical one, Jake "Jackboot" Samples, chief of the UH Police, said. This area is now under control of UH police. "Nothing moves without we know it," Samples said. "We got the five copters and the dogs, and the S.W.A.T. team has helped keep things quiet, too," he said.

Wingate Jerome, SA president and voting member of the Board of Regents, said UH must attract more active students and fight apathy. "We polled 63 votes at the last general election," Jerome said. "We must ask for supplemental funding from student fee allocations (SSFPAC), since this election cost \$97,000. It's true that's only \$1,539.68 per vote, but if we're to be a quality institution with good citizens, we must try to do even better."

Utilities at UP hit \$186 million in 1993, Uriah H. Peet, head of campus utilities planning, said. "Most of that can be charged to the dorms, but it is still a heavy burden for the academic community to bear." Dorm rooms (single) now cost \$1,800 per month, unfurnished. Penthouses

and townhomes can cost up to \$5,000 per month.

"It's a definite relief to cater to a quality class of people who can afford the excellent education UH has to offer," Butts said. "Jesus, we were giving students a free ride for so long we'd plumb forgot how to stand up and ask right out for the money."

The more than 30,000 personal computers now on campus, provided as a gift-in-kind from major manufacturers and interfaced by Butts' company, SyncLinc, Inc., have changed the atmosphere of the campus. Other than twice yearly, when Dance-a-Thon and Interracial Step-Dancing exhibitions are held around the canoes-only lake at mid-campus, noise levels have fallen to 12 decibels.

"We believe it can be attributed to the computers and their one-on-one nature," Carl G. Young, clinical psychologist and head of the psychology department, said.

The UH police are ordered to shoot on sight anyone causing an auditory disturbance, Samples said. "We got a guy in mid-stride last Thursday. He was humming 'Heart Like a Wheel' and fell like a rock."

For the estimated 300,000 ex-students of UH who may not have been allowed back onto campus, the new UP offers a fresh look in higher education, Smythe-Higgenbotham said. "It is, indeed, an academic's dream. The silence, the peace, the lack of boisterous students. This is a wonderful and challenging place to confront the 21st Century," he said. His message was sent by line printer direct to all media. Reporters indicate they have not yet been permitted on campus for interviews with the administration.

UH dorms get nifty new menu

In a surprise move by the University Park administration, ARA, the food service which serves the residence dining halls, has been released from its contract and will be replaced by the Neiman-Marcus Catering Co. on Nov. 31.

Gerald Osborne, interim vice chancellor dean of students, said the termination of ARA's contract was made in accord with the university's goal to become one of the leading learning establishments in the country.

"If we can't lead the nation academically, you can be sure we're going to be at the top of the lists gastronomically," Osborne said.

Tom Penett, associate director of residence halls, cited ARA's poor food quality a primary reason for the termination of the contract.

"About half the time the students didn't know what they were eating. There were also times when the line service staff didn't know what they were serving. The food wasn't extremely healthy. I'm sure the dorm residents would like to eat something other than carbohydrates and starch," Penett said.

Neiman-Marcus, known nationwide for its outrageous and expensive gifts, now takes on the responsibility of preparing the food for finicky dorm residents. Indie Jestion, spicy spokesperson for Neiman-Marcus, said the company is accepting the challenge with gusto and fervor.

"Our first day's menu will rival the menu of the finest restaurant in New York City," Jestion said.

The breakfast and lunch menus will be kept a secret, but the dinner menu has been disclosed. Residents will have a choice of entree: filet mignon, Maine lobster or rack of lamb.

"For hors d'oeuvres, we will be serving shrimp cocktail and caviar, of course," Jestion said.

Residents will have a choice of desserts. French pastry imported from Paris will be served, along with chocolate mousse and chocolate Monopoly boards, complete with game pieces, Jestion said.

Rather than an increase in board plan payments for residents, there will be a decrease in fees, Penett said.

FBI agents nab UH police chief after gun battle

Giovanini Hesta, who was employed at University Park as Chief of Police under the alias George Hess for 50 years, was dragged from his former office Thursday screaming "You'll never take me alive."

Hesta was finally taken from his office after a four-hour gun battle with 25 Texas Rangers and 50 members of the Houston Police SWAT team.

The only injury occurred when Sgt. T.M. Elliot was shot in the buttocks as he fled the scene. "It could have been a lot worse," said Captain Frank Cempa. "The chief is such a bad shot, though, nobody was really worried about being hit," he said.

Hesta was fired by the university last week after his trial and conviction for several crimes. Hesta was tried and convicted on six counts of lewd and lascivious behavior, running a prostitution ring and driving without a front license plate.

FBI spokesperson Laura Griffith, who worked undercover as Hesta's secretary, said, "We really wanted to nail this turkey." Sources close to Hesta say that Hesta was amazed that Griffith was an F.B.I. agent. "I thought she was my friend," Hesta said.

Hesta's crimes read like the script of "The Godfather." "Hesta ran the largest prostitution ring in the Southwest, maybe even the entire country," Griffith said. Hesta was reported to have 100 girls working for him and there was a waiting list for over 200 more, sources close to the investigation said.

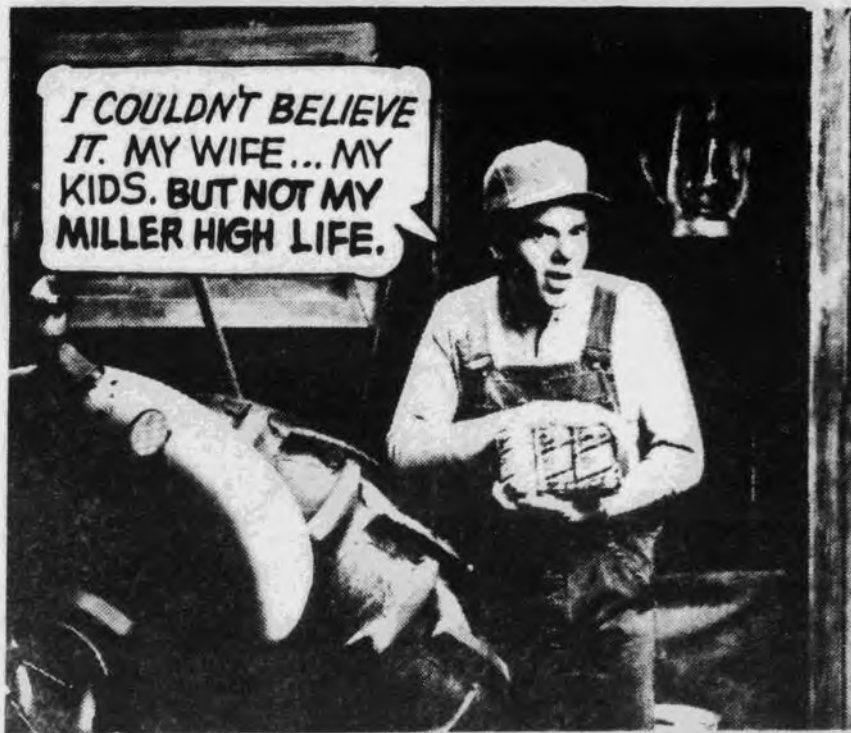
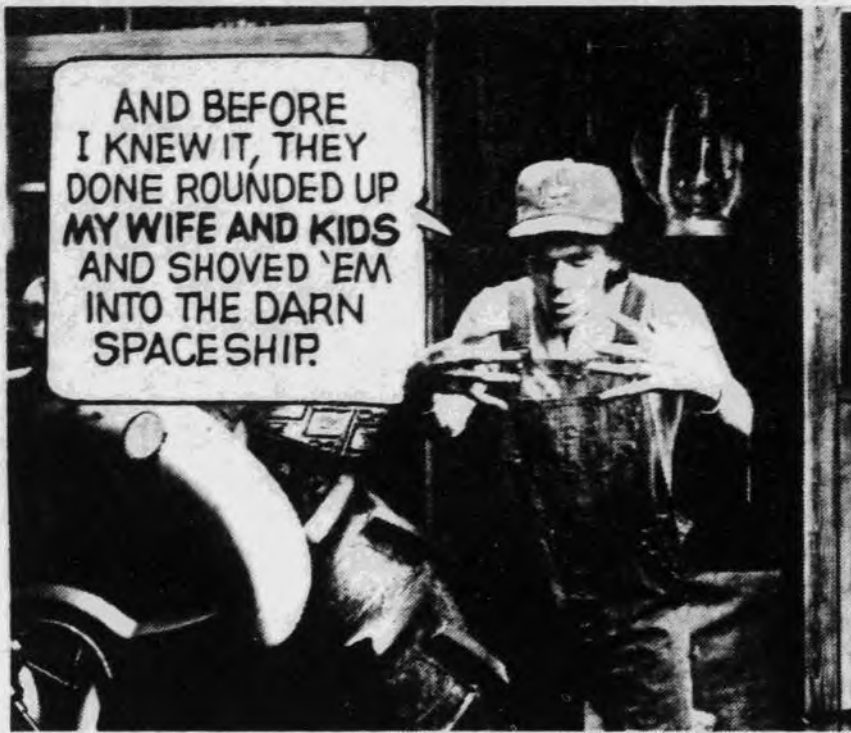
"We are still investigating the possibility of murder," Griffith said, referring to the charge that Hesta is linked to the Jimmy Hoffa case.

In an interview conducted in the Harris County Jail, Hesta said this was only a minor setback in his crime career. He said, "With the way the courts are these days, I'll probably get out in a couple of years."

"After I get out of the joint I'll probably go up to A&M," he said. "They'll hire anyone."

Hesta is already making plans for his Aggie brothel. He said his arrest was probably "a blessing in disguise. Everyone knows Aggies can't get girlfriends. Business should be great."

Hesta plans to write a book while he is in prison. A tentative title for the book is "How to be a Corrupt Police Chief Without Really Trying."

Coogs to play in Cotton Bowl

Five teams fall out under rare circumstances

The Southwest Conference Athletic Information Office announced early today that in a surprise outcome from the maze that has engulfed SWC football teams recently, the University of Houston Cougars have been named league champions four games before the end of the regular season.

The University of Texas team, ranked second in the nation and undefeated in conference play, admitted to having sexual intercourse with Bevo prior to the Arkansas game, and UT President Dr. James Longhorn said that after considerable deliberation he would be forced to withdraw UT's bid for a national championship. "We have given it careful planning," Longhorn said at a press conference held in the Beef Tongue Room at Memorial Stadium, "and it is in our best interests to withdraw. 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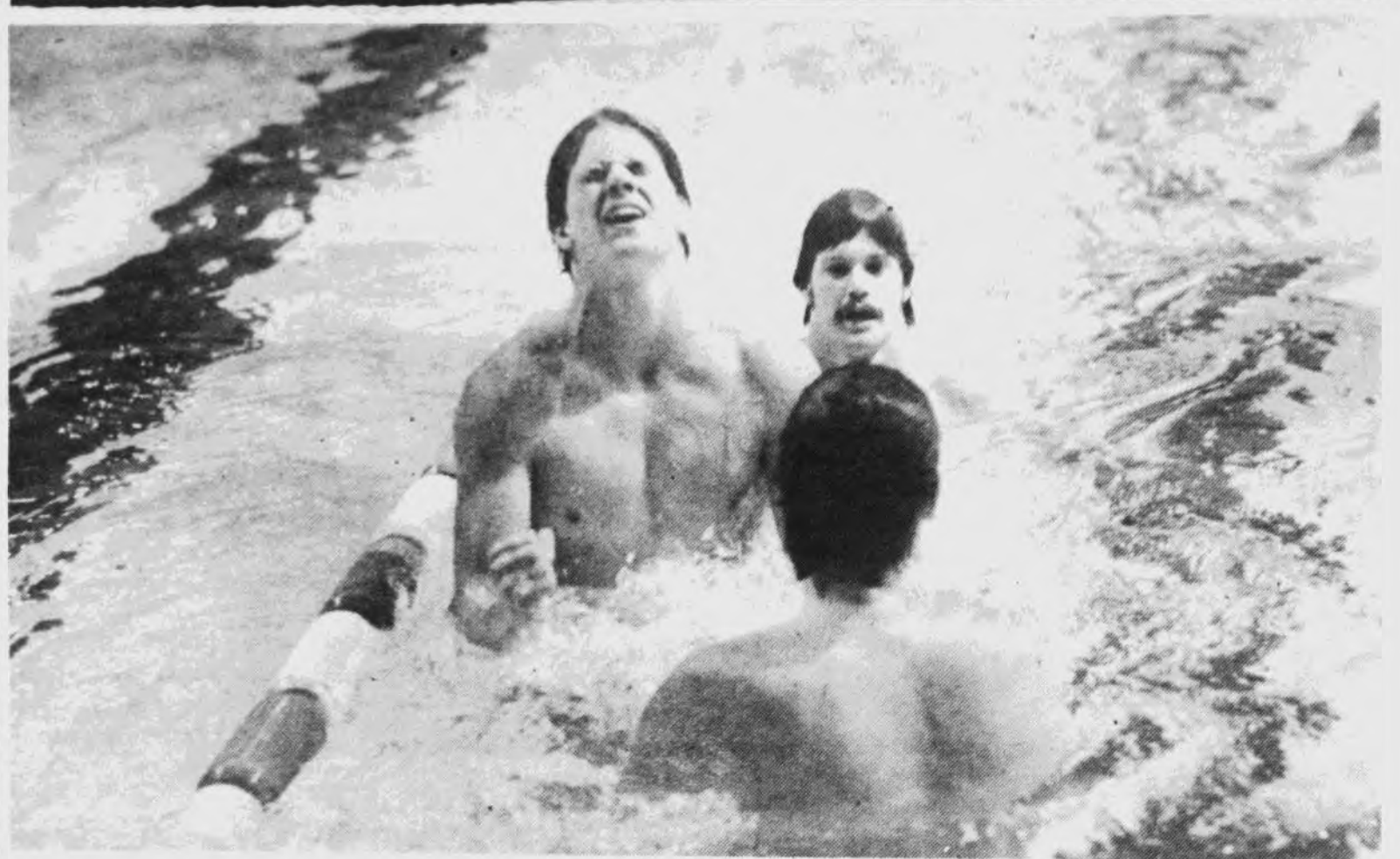

NCAA says that athletes must maintain 4.0 G.P.A. to play

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) announced yesterday a new policy will be implemented mandating that all college athletes must maintain a 4.0 grade point average to continue in a sports program.

At a press conference yesterday, Executive Director Walter Byers announced the new guidelines will take effect on January 1st, 1984. According to the rule, students participating in college-based athletics must keep and maintain a straight A average for every semester they are involved. Also, athletes must carry at least 12 units of classes.

Under the old rule, students

need only carry 12 hours and not fail any of those courses. Now, anyone failing to keep their A average is subject to probation. Once put on probation, a student is allowed one semester to bring his or her GPA back up to perfection before being permanently released from the team.

Also established was a commission to investigate any possible violation of this rule. SMU Athletic Director Bob Hitch has been appointed to head up the

Southwest Conference President Edwin P. Horner, commenting on the rule, said "I guess the rule has come because our system of education in America is under fire for too much emphasis on sports and not enough on education." Horner does believe that "the rule will bring nothing but good. It will make sure that athletes will get the education they need in life, make sure they have something to fall back on if sports ever fails them."

"We're actually building for the future. The runners gain valuable experience at the world-class level, and by sacrificing their freshman or sophomore year they'll be stronger for the college season in an off-Olympic year."

How do the runners feel about the new trend? Freshman sensation Anthony Smith was all for it. "It will benefit the school and give us a spot in the limelight. I really wanted to skip college for one year anyway to train for the Olympics. This way I can both study and train. SOLID!!"

Sophomore Rick Aukstikalnis was a little less enthusiastic about the new system. "It's harder for me to study my engineering, and they (coaches) won't let us party as much."

For the final touch, be sure and say something profound, whether it makes sense or not. Everyone will think you're another Marlon Brando.

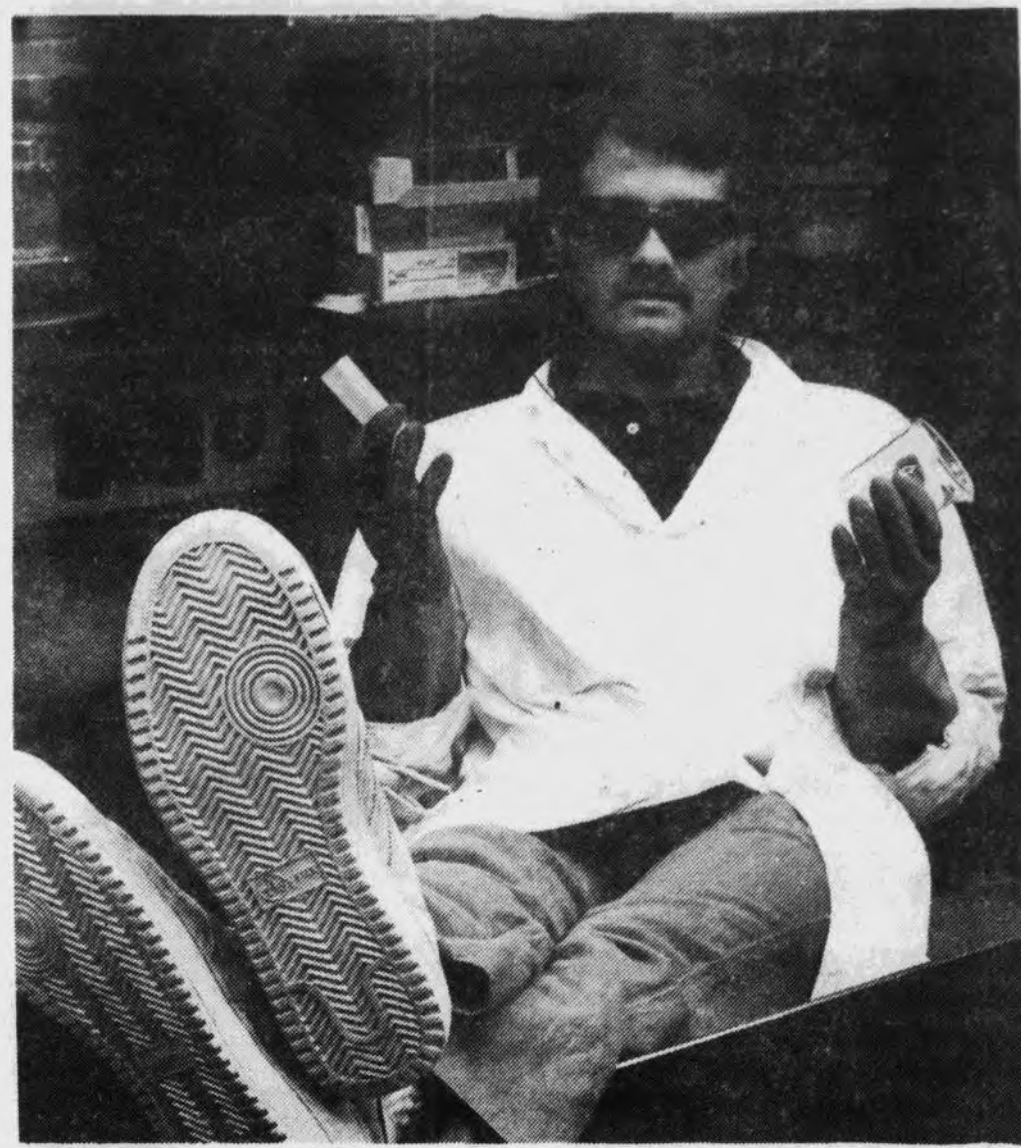

Despite advertising that says "You don't have to go to the 'Texas Chainsaw Massacre'" and "Absolutely no one under 17 admitted to this performance," "PIECES" is easily the most touching and sensitive film of the year.

The new film by Ingmar Bergman, which opens today in Houston at several theaters, has all the ingredients to be a classic, along the lines of an "Evil Dead" or "Bedtime for Barfbags." Its romantic scenes are touching, its terrifying scenes grab you in that particular heartstring.

A simple 12-inch review cannot describe the feelings an audience will have after seeing "PIECES." But let's try, OK?

Bergman's "Cries and Whispers," except that it done in a more discreet vein. Bergman does not remind the audience of the murder, he just goes onto the next one.

First to die is Biff, the "Joe Cool" of Camp Karankawa. If anyone deserves to be hacksawed and dismembered, it is Biff, for he always is making a play for Joanie, who represents the sixth murder in the film.

But let's not get out of order here, OK? Death number two is Buffy, who considered suicide over Biff's death until...

Number three, DeDe. Sorry about that, but...

Number four, Jock Jackson, represents that long-forgotten trait that almost all Bergman films have — sorrow for those in pain. His death is a shameful occurrence.

Before number five, enter subplot. Skip, who is after

Buffy's, then DeDe's, then Bunny's mind, decides that the true love of his life is Joanie, until...

After Bunny's death, the fifth within the last 45 minutes, Skip forges on, and goes after Joanie. Well...

After Joanie's death, Skip goes after Missy. Missy, our true heroine, decides that she doesn't want Skip after all.

Let me tell you, the lines of dialogue are among Bergman's best in that scene. Missy discovers... well, I won't tell you because of my earlier commitment to not tell you the end.

Oh, what the heck. Skip is the true murderer after all. Well, wouldn't you be if you were at a camp with six luscious females?

Sorry to give it away, but I just couldn't stand the thought of those few who might miss "PIECES" not hearing the end.

It's been discovered that the escalators have a "taste" for business majors and female preppies. Students who fit these

categories are advised to avoid using the escalators at all costs.

"Running up six flights of regular steps and getting sweaty is better than being sucked down into the depths of that old, 'mildew-ey' monster," said Don Hadley, director of campus safety.

Robot chancellor goes on rampage

Richard Van Horn, chancellor robot of the Computiversity of Houston, blew a fuse yesterday and went on a half-hour rampage through the Ezekial Cullen Building before he was deactivated.

Police said the malfunction was caused by a gang of renegade hackers who sabotaged the chancellor's program system leaving obscene messages and instructions for the robot to seek and destroy.

The former chancellor, a Van Horn human, recently was voted out of office and replaced with a flashier robot version to coincide with the Computiversity's new image of state-of-the-art computer technology.

Police said two unauthorized learning-units were spotted leaving the chancellor's storage shed late last night. They are the primary suspects in the sabotage, police said.

Sue Warren, secretary and maintenance engineer for the chancellor robot, said Van Horn burst out of his office about 2 p.m. Thursday waving his arms stiffly in the air and shouting "Danger! Danger!"

Warren immediately alerted the

main computing site for repair, but was told there were no available personnel to handle the emergency.

"Have you tried a little oil?" they asked. "Why of course," Warren replied, "I make it my personal business to keep the chancellor well oiled several times a day."

Warren said she then called a software counselor at the Programming and Compiling Center and asked him what to do.

"He's blown his fuse before," she said, "but never like this." Warren said the counselor told her to send the chancellor right over for evaluation.

Meanwhile, still shouting "Danger," the chancellor wandered out of the office and took an elevator down to the first floor.

Provost George Wagner failed to stop the robot or even notice that anything was wrong when he came across the chancellor repeatedly running into a wall along the first-floor corridor.

"I just turned him around and set him on his way," Wagner said. "It wasn't as if he was acting abnormally or anything."

The provost said he was not surprised by the apparent sabotage, and noted that there had been a lot of resentment on

campus lately due to the lack of a "human element" in university policy-making.

"For some reason they seem to resent being called 'learning units,'" Wagner said.

Wagner also said he received unconfirmed reports of guerrilla-faction-units springing up around campus in opposition to the computerization process.

"I believe these are the people responsible for the sabotage," said Wagner.

Until the Van Horn robot can be repaired, a VAX 11-780 computer will be hooked up via a speakerphone to the chancellor's desk.

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Knock 'em down Van Horn fixes parking problem

Richard Van Horn, chancellor at University Park, has been seen driving frantically through the parking lots and running over several innocent students since Wednesday night's Problem Awareness Seminar.

He was heard screaming at the students from his car window, "I'll teach you to complain about parking."

After the men in white jackets from Methodist Hospital got Van Horn to calm down, he explained what he was doing. "I just can't take it anymore," he said. "All I hear about is students' dissatisfaction with the parking situation. It's time to do something about it and it looks like I'm going to have to be the one to do it."

In a top secret inter-departmental memo sent out by Van Horn on Thursday, university officials have been told to run over anyone who gets in their way.

Interim Vice Chancellor of

Dean of Students, Gerald Osborne said, "I think it's a great idea. I've gotten rid of 35 students since Thursday morning. That's 35 more parking spaces," Osbourn said with enthusiasm.

The exact count of the students killed and injured by university administrators has been difficult to obtain because some of these students have been dragged from the area and hidden at various locations on campus.

Two were found in the library lobby three days after they had been hit because it was thought they had fallen asleep while studying.

Steve Parker, student association president, said, "I feel like the administration is finally accomplishing something around here."

In regard to the Senate resolution which passed Monday night to ensure the safety of pedestrians on campus, Parker said, "Now we won't have to worry about enforcing it."

Ruben Martinez, student life committee chair, said, "It's OK with me, I really didn't want to

see the resolution enforced anyway."

Two university departments are very pleased with the new procedure. The UP police department has been very busy towing the victims' cars away. George Hess, UP director of police, said, "We get \$40 every time a victim's family comes to pick up a car."

The Health Center also loves the new solution to the parking problem. "Business has really picked around here," a health center official said. "Van Horn calls us when there has been a 'hit' and we go and pick them up." "The new doctors are getting a lot of practice," said Health Center Director James R. Whitehurst.

"If we can get rid of some of the students by running them down then we won't have to hear so many complaints," Osborne said.
