SOLICITORS TO CANVASS DEPARTMENTS DURING UF CAMPAIGN, SEPT. 11-13

In a joint project of Shell Oil Company and OCAW Local 4-367 AFL-CIO, Refinery employees will hold a United Fund campaign September 11-13 to raise \$41,000.





ROLLER SKATING JUST NATURALLY LED TO SQUARE DANCING FOR MILLER

What do square dancing and square dance calling have to do with roller skates? For most people the two are about as far apart as Hong Kong and Tierra del Fuego. But for Carl Miller, Operator No. 1, Cat. Cracking, roller skating just naturally led to square dancing when he was a teenager in Galveston.

"I actually started square dancing on Stewart Beach back in '46. There were two squares there, one for roller skating and one for dancing. The caller for the square dances saw us roller skating and thought it would be a good idea if we tried to square dance on skates. And I've been dancing ever since," he said.

"I think square dancing is a family recreation. Our two sons, who are now in college, danced when they were in high school and our teenaged daughter dances. Our 3-year-old is still a little young, but I suspect she will be dancing in a few years," he said.

He was instrumental in starting a square at Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri, when he was in the Army and even did some exhibitions on roller skates.

Carl feels very strongly about the benefits of square dancing and has been very active in taking square dancing to different groups.

Just this summer through the Houston Square Dance Council, in which he has held several offices, he has participated in organizing a Teen Jamboree, a project he has supported for four years.

Dancing for Handicapped

"They say you have to listen to square dance, but I know a little old lady who is deaf who can really dance, and I know a blind girl who has learned to dance," he said. "Now we're starting to take square dancing to people in wheelchairs and we are starting a wheelchair club in Houston."

"You can forget your business problems and your family problems by square dancing because it demands your full concentration," he emphasized.


Square dancing led to calling and Carl has been calling professionally for eight years at most dances in the area on his long change, vacations, and anytime he is not at the Refinery.

Requirements for Callers


What kind of training do you need to be a caller? "Hardheadedness and perseverance," he answered quickly. "No really, you have to like people, have a good voice, and good diction and work hard. For every dance I call, I call one at home, practicing and getting new material."

Carl, who spends at least two nights a week calling or dancing has also held offices in the Houston Area Callers Association. He works with the Council and the Association on festivals and national conventions.

Currently, Carl and his wife, Mae, are helping Dip & Dive, a dance club at Eastminster Presbyterian Church, form classes for beginners. "Any interested couples may call me at CR 2-0945 and I'll sign them up for the class which begins on September 18," he said.



WATER SKIERS UNDER 12 YEARS OLD SHOULD WEAR VEST-TYPE JACKETS

Water skiers who are 12 years of age or younger must wear U.S. Coast Guard vest-type life preservers to be in compliance with the law, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

The law states that water skiers are occupants of the boats which are pulling them. Therefore, skiers are subject to the provisions of the Texas Water Safety Act.

This means ski belts are out for the young skiers. It also means that while the older skiers may wear the belts, there must be a Coast Guard approved life-saving device on board the boat for them.
