Some of the families had campers others had tents and the boys had their own tents and sleeping gear along with hundreds of personal items, cooking equipment, awnings for tables and canoeing gear. WHAT TO DO IF OIL, GAS GIVE OUT?
'WHY, WE'D SWITCH TO ELECTRICITY

Some people don't seem to understand the importance of oil and gas, according to Texas Railroad Commission chairman Byron Tunnell.

Tunnell, speaking to a civic club at Longview, Texas, related that a woman at a party told him she didn't worry about running out of oil and gas simply because "we'd switch to electricity."

"She didn't know, of course, that 97 per cent of all electric power generated in Texas comes from burning natural gas, or that more than four-fifths of the nation's electricity is from the fossil fuels--coal, oil, and gas," Tunnell told the group.
