Student Council

The Student Council of the University is the Senior Legislative body, having legislative, judicial and executive powers in matters pertaining to student activities. It is composed of thirteen members; five Student Association members and seven class officers. The president, vice president, and secretary of the Student Association serve in the same capacity in the Council.

This year the Council has undertaken the control of the conduct at all school dances; is sponsoring, in cooperation with the faculty, the weekly "song fest" in the day school; and has carried on an extensive war stamp and bond sale on the campus. It has passed a bill which will bring about a closer cooperation between the council and assembly. Throughout the year it has urged an intramural sports program and has passed a bill urging its establishment. The council has originated a bill proposing a minimum blanket tax for all University of Houston students.

The Student Assembly, the baby legislative body of the University of Houston, held its first official meeting of the year on October 2, 1941. The assembly has grown fabulously during its short existence and has enjoyed a most successful year through the cooperation of its officers and members, and through its close harmony with the Student Council and the Administration.

The pet scheme and promotion of the assembly this year was the first school-wide intramural athletic program. It is hoped that this will prove to be the first step toward a permanent department of physical education. Albert Brower, the Cougar representative, introduced the resolution which instituted the program.

Members of the Assembly attended and took part in the state-wide Student Government Convention held in San Antonio on March 20, 21. Sherwood Crane, assembly vice-chairman, brought home the coveted title of President of the Texas Student Government Association. He is the first University of Houston representative to win this office.

The finale to a successful year was the Senior Luncheon held on the Rice Roof in May.



United States Navy at The University of Houston



The first U. S. Naval Reserve Vocational School was opened at the University of Houston on October 28, 1941, soon after the completion of the Industrial Building. About 100 reserves were enrolled in a four-months course of training to prepare them for maintenance service for the U. S. Navy.

The men in this first school were originally from either New Orleans or Houston and were chosen by examination from trainees at the Corpus Christi Naval Base.

A new Industrial Shop Building, erected on the campus in 1941, provides facilities for instruction in such studies as drafting, machine shop, electricity, welding, Diesel and gasoline motors, and sheet metal.

James R. D. Eddy, head of the State Department for Vocational defense training, is co-sponsor with the University of Houston of the program.

The first class was graduated February 27, and a new group of Naval trainees began a second four-months course in training on March 2.

Lt. (j. g.) Sabathier is officer in charge of this school for the Navy. Petty Officers F. T. Harrowing, chief pharmacist's mate, and G. S. Beale, chief boatswain's mate are also located at the University. Others in the Navy Office at the University are R. W. Daray, Sk1c; A. F. Lemoine, Y3c, and B. S. Shaw, Em1c. A. J. Roussel, Sk3c, was recently transferred to the Navy office here.

Aviation Section



The Civilian Pilot Training Program is about three years old, and in such a short time it has become one of the greatest forces for the advancement of aviation in America. The C. A. A. had the answer to mass production of American Pilots long before the War-Lords of Europe went on their respective rampages. It was the far-sighted vision of a hand full of men that has given this country seventy thousand trained pilots, twenty-five thousand of which have entered our armed forces.

Colleges took to the Civilian Pilot Training Program with enthusiasm from its beginning. Students, like their parents, found comfort in the unparalleled safety record of the course.

The University of Houston has participated in the C. P. T. P. since its inauguration in 1939. In the first primary course, Cliff Hyde, Flying Service and Air Activities, Inc., were the contractors. The University offered a primary course in the summer of 1940, while the flying schools offered the secondary course. Later the University offered both the primary and secondary courses with these same three flying schools handling the flight instruction.

Much of the success of the program at the University can be attributed to the fact that the flight contractors were already well established concerns with excellent equipment and a personnel of thoroughly trained instructors.

The University of Houston and the flying schools, Air Activities, Cliff Hyde Flying Service and Aviation Enterprises, Inc., are proud of the boys that they have trained and are proud to know that they can train men for Uncle Sam.



Primary Training

Student pilots receive instruction in both ground and flight work, which are necessary before obtaining a Private Pilot Certificate upon completion of a flight and written test.

Eight hours of dual instruction is required before the student solos. During the dual flying the students are taught use of controls, inspection of aircraft, taxi-ing, co-ordination, take-offs, landings, straight and level flight, gliding and climbing turns, shallow and pylon eights, and stalls and spins.






Primary Training

The ground work in primary consists of meteorology, navigation, Civil Air Regulations, some aerodynamics and engine work. The element of safety is stressed both in air and on the ground. There have been no accidents due to aircraft failure in any of the courses.

After soloing, the student takes up such advanced maneuvers as spot landings, pattern landings, power turns and pylon eights. When, on mastering this and making a cross-country flight, the student is ready for a flight check.



