BORDER OLYMPICS — Casa Blanca Country Club, Laredo, Texas, 36 holes. This was UH's first Championship and it was a big one. North Texas State and Oklahoma State were the big powers in Collegiate Golf. UH trailed North Texas by 21 shots and Oklahoma State by 14 after the first 18 holes. UH picked up 14 shots on Oklahoma State the first nine and was only 9 shots back of North Texas State with 9 holes to go. Tommy Cruse, Rex Baxter, Wally Bradley and Pete Hessemer all shot par or better and they won by 2 shots over North Texas. They shot a total of 577 (a new record). Rex Baxter 69-72—141; Pete Hessemer 75-70—145; Wally Bradley 76-71—147; Tommy Cruse 72-72—144.

FT. WORTH RECREATIONAL — Fort Worth, Texas, 18 holes. Rex Baxter, 70; Tommy Cruse, 70; Pete Hessemer, 70; and Wally Bradley, 73 — 283.

WEST TEXAS RELAYS — Odessa Country Club, Odessa, Texas, 36 holes. Rex Baxter, 150; Wally Bradley, 154; Pete Hessemer, 158; and Richard Parvino, 159. Total 621. Tournament was played in a dust storm and in freezing temperatures.

ALL AMERICA — Pine Forest Country Club Houston, 72 holes. **Team Medal Play Champions** — Bradley, 284; Cruse, 290; Parvino, 292; Hessemer, 298. Team Total, 1164.

Team Match Play — (Bradley, Cruse, Hessemer and Parvino). All four of our players birdied the last hole and three of North Texas team birdied it. 7 of the 8 players made putts over 10 feet for birdies. The match ended in a tie and UH won on Medal Play.


Two Ball Champions — (Bradley and Parvino). They shot 205 (54 holes). Rex Baxter was playing in the Masters during this tournament. He was 19 years old and the youngest golfer ever to play in the tournament.

MISSOURI VALLEY CONFERENCE — Indian Hills C. C., Tulsa, Okla. 54 holes. Rex Baxter, 207 (9 under par); Wharton, 226; Hiskey, 228; Parvino, 228; Jimmy Russell, 239. Tournament played in 30 to 40 miles an hour wind. Probably the greatest golf Rex ever played. He finished 19 shots ahead of the field. Many said this would have been good enough to have won the National Open.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS — Scarlet Golf Course at Ohio State University, 36 holes. Rex Baxter, 73-67—140; Jim Hiskey, 76-77—153; Frank Wharton, 77-76—153; Richard Parvino 76-79—155. Team total 601. Rex's 67 broke the course record. He shot 35-32—67 (five under par). He knocked in a putt of 45 feet from 4 feet off the green for a birdie 3 for us to win by one shot over Purdue and North Texas State. Needless to mention, this was our all time thrill and the realization of some dreams coming true.

















RICHARD CRAWFORD

Co-Medalist in NCAA 1959 (Still shares the record). Runner-up in Medal Play in NCAA in 1960. Won 1958 All America. Placed 9th in NCAA Medal Play in 1958. Won Missouri Valley Conference 1959 and 1960. Won Border Olympics in 1960. Won Tucker in fall of 1957. Runner-up in 1959 All America. 4th in 1960 All America. Teamed with David Boies to win the All America Low Two Ball Championship 1958. Runner-up in Trans-Miss in 1960. Selected on NCAA Golf Coaches All America Team for 1959 and 1960. Runner-up in 1959 Border Olympics. Tied for 2nd in 1959 Pikes Peak and was runner-up in 1960. Runner-up in Lake Charles Intercollegiate 1959 and 1960. Won Lake Charles Open in 1960. Didn't make a double bogie his junior year . . . 1959. Certainly one of the most consistent golfers if not the most consistent player to ever play college golf. Member of three All America Championship Teams 1958-1960. 













