Regents adopt new fund proposals

The UH System Board of Regents took the offensive Monday in the statewide battle for educational funds.

At its monthly meeting, the Regents issued three resolutions dealing with funding:

- The endorsement of "the creation of a dedicated fund to provide equitable

enhancement of higher education institutions in Texas which are outside of the Permanent University Fund."

The Permanent University Fund is an educational endowment based on oil revenues that was established in the 19th century. PUF money is used only for the University of Texas and Texas A&M University.

The Regents pledged their support of any efforts to achieve the goal of creating

the new fund during the 68th Texas Legislature in 1983, and called on all elected officials, alumni and "friends of the University of Houston" to join with the board in "support of equity in Texas higher education."

- The endorsement of "efforts to resolve the existing dilemma of capital funding at seventeen institutions of higher education in Texas."

To achieve that goal, the Regents

declared their support of any proposals to repeal the state ad valorem property tax and eliminate any restrictions on general revenue appropriations for capital construction at UH and 16 other state institutions.

- A call to Gov. William Clements and the Texas legislature to approve funding for the construction of new buildings for the colleges of Business Administration and Architecture.

The resolution also encouraged the governor and legislature to provide funding for UH System administration office facilities.

The Regents also approved several fee increases that will be effective in fiscal year 1983 and will affect UH students:

- Raising of the fee for late registration from \$10 to \$12.

- Nearly doubling the returned check charge from \$7 to \$12.

- Doubling the full-day orientation charge from \$10 to \$20.

- Raising nine-month room and board charges in the residence halls — the minimum from \$2,140 to \$2,430 and the maximum from \$2,460 to 2,840. The "room only" charge for Cougar Place dorms was increased from \$1,710 to 1,935.

The Regents approved these increases in Child Care Center fees:

- Weekly charges for infants — three months to 18 months — from \$63 to \$73. Hourly charges will go from \$2.05 to \$2.45.

- The rate for toddlers — 19 months to 30 months — will increase from \$57 to \$60. The hourly rate will go up to \$2 from \$1.80.

- The weekly rate for children aged 19 months to 30 months from \$50 to \$53. The hourly rate will increase to \$1.75 from \$1.70.

- The registration and supply fees will remain the same.

In other Board business, John E. Kolb was elected chairman. Kolb replaces Mack H. Hannah, Jr.

Karen Whitney attended her first meeting as student representative to the Board of Regents.

Plans developed for Greek on-campus housing

Part of the university's redevelopment plan, which was first announced last semester, is ten acres which have been set aside by the UH System Board of Regents for fraternity and sorority housing.

Plans are far from being finalized, but "Fraternity and Sorority Row," as it has been referred to by one university staffperson, will be part of an estimated 20-acre community development project along Cullen Boulevard between Elgin and Interstate 45.

The fraternity and sorority complex will be located where the King Apartments now stand and extend behind the Wendy's and Burger King restaurants.

Development of the project is expected to span the next five years. The long-term goal, university officials have reported,

is to encourage students to live on campus.

"We're trying to create a community atmosphere here," Regent Joel Cummings said. Cummings is chairman of the Committee on Funding Construction.

Cummings said the university wants to attract more students and faculty, secure the area by providing campus police patrols in an area not previously patrolled, and create what he termed a "living and shopping environment."

Funding for construction of the sorority and fraternity houses, which is expected to run up to half a million dollars for each 17-20 bed residence, will be the responsibility of the individual Greek chapters, Assistant Vice Chancellor Connie Wallace said. Wallace serves as the liaison between the university and the Greek organizations.

Those groups which decide to

live in the complex will be offered a long-term property lease by the university, she said.

Merrill Shields, legal counsel to the regents, said the university is "exploring all avenues of leasing possibilities to make the proposal as attractive as possible."

Shields admitted to a question of whether the university property, which qualifies as state land, could be leased below market value or below a "reasonable rate of return."

Response from most of the 14 sororities and 12 fraternities on campus has been positive, Wallace said. "Naturally, they're worried about financing," she said.

"There are a number who say they can't afford it now, but (say) that they will work on it. Four, possibly five organizations, have said they are just not interested," Wallace reported.

Of four fraternity and sorority organizations which participated in an informal survey by The

Daily Cougar, three either owned or have nearly purchased their own house. The fourth group did not own or lease a house.

Memberships in the fraternities and sororities ranged from 15-65 members, with an average of eight residents living in each house.

Wallace said she thought the nature of the central campus, which is predominantly oriented toward commuter students, is responsible for the present low ratio of Greek house residents.

"There has been a resurgence across the country the past five or six years in sorority and fraternity membership," Wallace said. "It's just not felt as strongly here because of the nature of our campus."

Wallace said, "I think this (resurgence) could be a signal to the Greeks with reference to their programming," but admitted that "they are going to have to make some changes to attract new membership."

Wallace speculated that funding help for the new houses would probably come from the chapters' national and alumni organizations, through funding raising and through conventional bank and savings and loan financing.

Shields said the university has been working since September to acquire land along Cullen Boulevard. Shields said a large percentage of the acreage, which encompasses several fast food restaurants, the King Apartment complex and individual residences, has been purchased.

The resolution issued by the regents gives the Greek organizations until March 1, 1983, to prepare a formal description of site location, design and schedule for construction.

Until university officials decide formally how the land will be used, the newly-acquired property will be leased back to its former owners.

Just a few more reflections on why we're important and you're not.

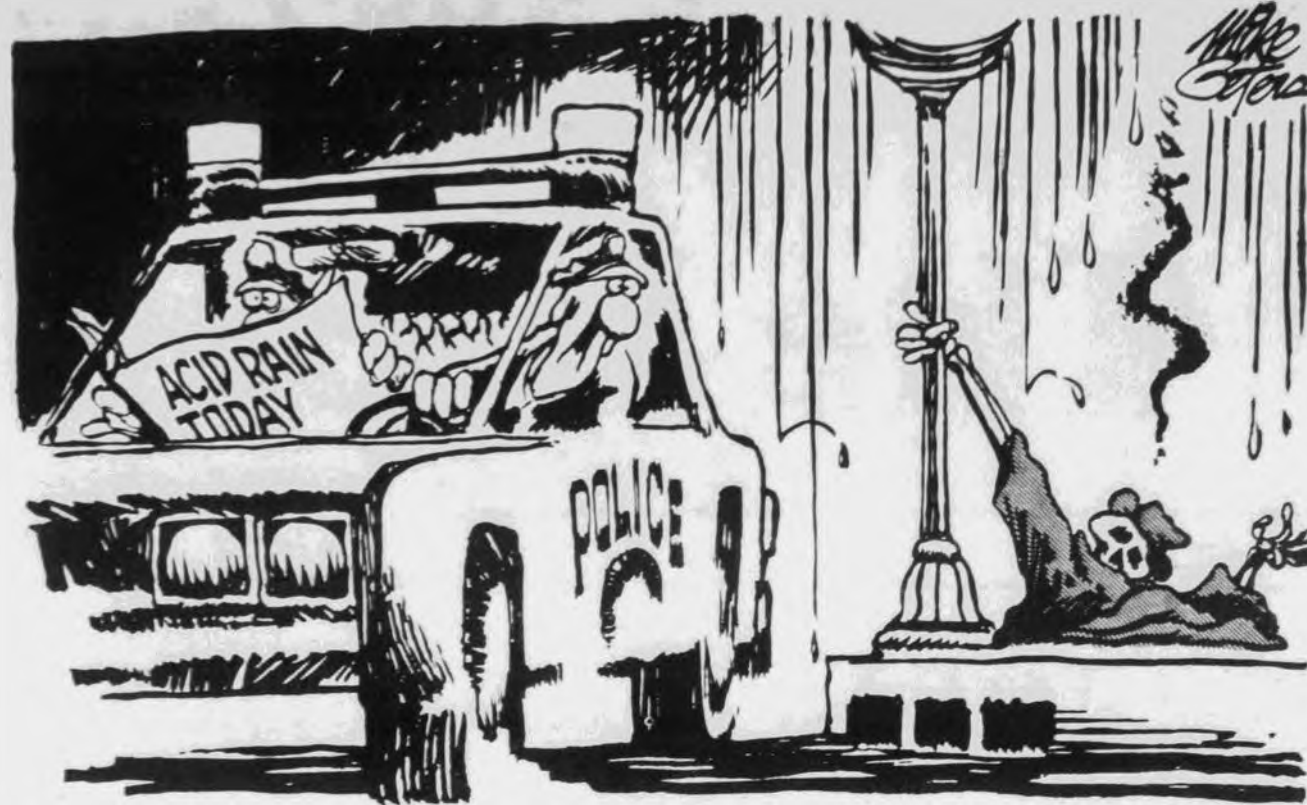
- We read The Village Voice.

Some final advice on your finals

The following suggestions are designed to help you to do your best on final exams. Of course, the best preparation is to develop and implement good study habits throughout the semester. If your study skills have not been in tip-top shape this semester, consider these suggestions to ready yourself for finals!

Get ready . . .

- Organize all notes — If your notes do not have a consistent structure and are hard to follow, make a comprehensive outline; highlight key information with a marker or by underlining. If you have several technical words-phrases or formulas to remember, make a list with accompanying definitions for easy review.

- Ask preparatory questions — Give serious thought to how well you know your course material. Do you grasp key concepts and fundamental information? Are you familiar with the entire course content? If questions about subject material need to be answered, talk with your professor as soon as possible and, if necessary, arrange an office appointment. Also, ask about a review period during the last class, where general and specific content for the final can be discussed.

- Arrange a review rap session — Talk to other students in class about a small study group (2-4 people). A study group can help to increase familiarity with course material simply by talking about it.

- Prepare a study schedule — Design a daily study schedule that allows plenty of time to review all course notes and reading material. Set aside time needed for meals, work, sleeping, and some recreation. Incorporate sufficient breaks into your schedule to avoid becoming very tired from studying for lengthy periods of time. Above all, stick to your schedule and do not succumb to excuses for not studying.

- Set up a quiet study area — A remote room at home, where you can study when off campus, is ideal. One that is away from distractions, such as the television and phone, is best. Also, keep the library in mind as a regular study place.

Set . . .

- Read and reread — all materials to insure understanding and good recall. With math and science problems, drill yourself on practice exercises.

- Be an active reader — As you study, get involved with the material. Ask questions, challenge the author's point of view. For example, "Do I agree with this statement?" or "Is this conclusion supported by the data?" An active interest in the subject can facilitate good understanding and recall.

- Recite — Discuss the material aloud while studying, and put it in your own words. Check your notes and the textbook to make sure that your understanding of the material is accurate.

- Review — Go over key information during final preparation for your exam. A general review of this information the day or evening before the exam should sharpen your memory.

Go . . .

- Get a good night's rest before your exams — Staying up late into the night studying can leave you feeling fatigued the day of the exam. Also, drinking excessive amounts of coffee and/or taking drugs, such as No-Doz, can lead to tension and jitters and

interfere with your exam performance.

- Stick to Your regular diet — Don't eat substantially more or less food before an exam than you eat ordinarily at that time of day. An unusually large meal may bring on sluggishness or fatigue, while an exceptionally small meal may leave you feeling hungry or ill-at-ease.

- Don't discuss material immediately before your exams — Discussion at that time can lead to confusion or increase your anxiety about material you may have overlooked.

- Relax — Take a few slow, deep breaths before actually starting the exam. Think positively about your performance.

- Read instructions thoroughly before starting — Ask questions for clarity, if necessary.

- Read through the exam before starting — If you have questions, raise them.

- Develop a strategy — Note the material that you are more familiar with and tackle these items first. Also, note the items that carry maximum credit as opposed to those that contain minimum credit. Approach the heavily weighted material first.

- Budget your time — Be careful not to spend disproportionate amounts of time on any one item. Wear a watch to monitor yourself.

After your exams are said and done, seriously consider improving your study skills if they are not up to par. If study skills are the problem and/or insufficient interest-motivation toward school work, talk with a counselor at the Counseling and Testing Service, second floor of the Student Life Building, 749-1731. We'd like to help.

Drexler gets nod as UH Athlete of 1981-82

Many University of Houston athletes have risen above the pack to display exceptional athletic ability, determination and sportsmanship. In an effort to recognize the accomplishments of these students, and this being the final edition of the 1982 spring semester, The Daily Cougar sports staff has selected a Most Valuable Player and Newcomer of the Year from each sport.

We begin, though, with the 1981-82 UH Athlete of the Year — sophomore Clyde Drexler.

A 6-foot-6 sophomore has no business playing forward on a Southwest Conference basketball team, much less being named the University of Houston Daily Cougar's Athlete of the Year. Not until Clyde Drexler, that is.

A midsize against his forward-peers, who tend to be three to four inches taller, Drexler led the Houston Cougars through a season that placed UH as one of the four best teams in the country. Only one game, a 68-63 loss to North Carolina, separated the Cougs from the championship game of collegiate basketball. His scoring slam-dunks and leadership that's hard to find in a second-year player inspired his teammates throughout the season.

Though he is short of height, he piled up some pretty lofty statistics. His most impressive numbers are his team-leading 334 rebounds for a 10.5 per game average. Those figures were good enough to place him second in the conference in rebounding, behind Texas' LaSalle Thompson.

Drexler moved into 15th on the all-time UH rebounding list and fifth on the all-time rebounding

average list.

He was just as effective putting balls in the bucket as he was under the boards. His 485 points, for a 15.2 per game average, were the second-highest on the team, following Rob Williams' 633. His field goal percentage of 56.9 was the second-best of the starters, as were his 362 field goals made.

His deft defensive play also raised many eyebrows in 1981-82. He led the Cougs in steals with 97, 47 ahead of runner-up Michael Young. Drexler also placed second on the team with 36 blocked shots, behind only 7-foot Akeem Olatunji's 72. Drexler often drew defensive assignments against the sharpest shooters in the conference.

In the 78-74 victory over Baylor on Feb. 20, all-SWC forward Terry Teagle was ripping the Cougs for 20 first-half points while the Bears took a 44-43 lead.

During halftime, Drexler volunteered to guard Teagle in the second half and Head Coach Guy Lewis granted him the wish. Drexler proceeded to hold the red-hot Baylor forward to 10 points the rest of the way, giving UH a must-needed road victory.

His best game of the year may have been against Biscayne, when he scored 30 points and pulled down 16 rebounds, though in the Christmas Kettle Classic championship game against then fifth-ranked Iowa, he nabbed a season-high 19 rebounds while contributing 16 points.

Unlike most players who have reached the status Drexler has attained, he has expressed his sincere wishes to stay in college basketball his remaining two years. He can only get better, which has to concern his SWC opponents.

They can't complain, however.

At least he's not getting any taller.

MVP: The Mad Dog Defense. The 1981 Houston defensive unit was a stingy lot. Led by such notable performances from linebackers Weedy Harris and Grady Turner, right end Leo Truss, nose guard Craig McCallion, cornerbacks Butch LaCroix and Reggie Vonner, and free safety Calvin Eason, the 7-4-1 Cougars would have been hard-pressed to finish the year with their sixth straight winning season.

UH's defense allowed just 11 total touchdowns — five rushing and six passing — for a new school low. The Mad Dogs yielded an average of only 235.6 yards per game and 3.7 yards per play in 1981 — the lowest totals UH has given up since tying for the SWC title in 1976.

LaCroix ended the season ranked third in the nation in interceptions with seven in 10 games — the third-highest total in UH history for a single season. He also led UH in pass deflections with 80.

Eason had five interceptions in 11 games, and Vonner, who totaled three, returned a pick off 40 yards for a touchdown against Miami-Florida.

Harris topped UH in tackles with a 120 total, 80 unassisted against Miami-Florida. Team captain Turner was runner-up with 87 tackles. Truss and McCallion both had five quarterback sacks and eight tackles thrown for a loss. Truss recovered four fumbles.

Newcomer: Lionel Wilson. The season would have been a total loss had Wilson been unable to take the quarterback reins from an injured Audrey McMillian and play with the savvy of a veteran.

Playing in nine games, the sophomore from Houston set UH season records for most yards in total offense (1,881), most yards rushing for a quarterback (656) and most total plays (361). He completed 85 of 170 passes for 1,225 yards, the most yardage earned by a UH quarterback since Danny Davis threw for 1,348 yards in 1976.

Wilson, who averaged 205.2 yards a game in total offense, had 140 rushing yards and 110 passing yards against Utah State and 125 rushing yards and 159 passing yards against SMU — the first UH back to total more than 100 yards in passing and rushing in the same game since Gary Mullins did it once in 1968. Head Coach Bill Yeoman knows he has in Wilson, a talent who should help

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Floyd does 100 meters in stadium-record time

Reports of Houston Cougar sprinter Stanley Floyd's disappearance, to paraphrase Mark Twain, were greatly exaggerated.

Floyd, whose leg aches, muscle aches and backaches kept the world's best 100-meter speedster in 1980 out of the running during most of the 1982 outdoor season, showed up at Robertson Stadium Sunday for the Houston Invitational to dispel his recent image as one of the UH athletic department's prima donnas.

He did so with three extraordinary performances. He flashed his first 100 meters since last August in 10.19 seconds, shattering Harvey Glance's two-year-old stadium record of 10.22 with the fourth-fastest time in the world to date. He made qualifying for the NCAA Championships look easy.

The 20-year-old native of Albany, Ga. warmed up for the 100 by anchoring the UH 400 relay team. Floyd shot ahead of Rice's Vince Courville to give the Coogs a winning time of 39.03 and another stadium mark. It was the sixth victory in seven races for the squad of Charles Young, Mark McNeil, Anthony Ketchum and Floyd.

Floyd completed his Sunday hat trick and delighted the crowd when a surprise move by Assistant Coach Clyde Duncan had him take Stefan Baker's second-leg spot on the Coog 1,600-meter relay team. Floyd, running his first 400 meters in two years, joined Robert Poole, Young and Ketchum to scorch the track in 3:06.74.

Though the time qualified the team for the June nationals in Provo, Utah, Duncan said Floyd has seen the last of the 1,600-meter relay for this year.

"It is important for every sprinter I coach to run a leg on the mile relay, basically for strength," Duncan said. "It will be Stanley's first and last time for us. It should help his 100-meter time. His prediction is to run faster than 10.07 seconds this year. It would be tough for him to run the 100, 200 and sprint relay at the nationals. In fact, he may only run the 100 and sprint relay."

Ketchum, a freshman seeking to one day break the 400-meter world record (43.86), easily won his specialty in 45.96 — a bit off the third-place 45.75 he set at last week's Mt. SAC meet, but Duncan didn't mind.

"I'm excited about his performance," he said. "I think we're going to be shocked at what he'll be able to do once his hamstring (strained earlier this season) comes around."

Baker showed no ill effects of a knee injury, which limited the junior during the indoor and outdoor seasons. His 13.96 for third in the 110-meter high hurdles was just what he needed to qualify, while sophomore Terri Rowan added her name to the Lady Coog list of qualifiers with a 2:10.00 for fourth in the 800-meter race.

Senior Mike Collins and sophomore Rick Meyer, though capturing their respective events, weren't as fortunate in their bids for the NCAA meet. Collins, needing a javelin throw of 245 feet to make the trip, was able to hurl 236-2. Meyer, who'll compete in the NCAA discus event but aiming for a 60-foot serve in the shot put, fell short with an outdoor personal best of 57-0¼.

Freshman Marshall Broadway

surpassed his previous best effort in the high jump when he soared into first place with a 7-3 mark.

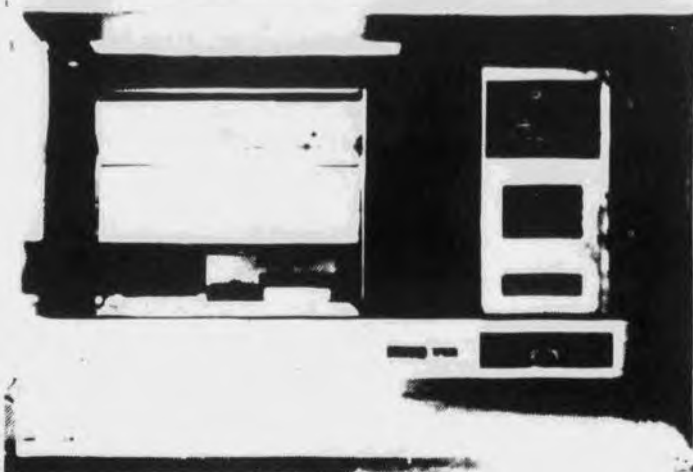
The UH women's track team, which will visit Austin May 7-8 for its Southwest Conference Championships, featured two first-place showings. Junior Kirschen Hagenlocher paced to a 4:30.85 in the 1,500 meters and the UH women's 400 relay team of Pat Lavallias, Carol Lewis, Darlene Jefferson and Jackie Washington nosed out Prairie View A&M, 45.00 to 45.03.

Washington enjoyed her fastest 200 time this spring, 23.86, but had to settle for second place, as did Rachel Clary, who cracked the minute mark in the 400-meter hurdles for the first time this season with a 59.70.

Houston plays host to the men's SWC Championships at Robertson Stadium May 14-15. Preliminaries will begin May 14 at 6:00 p.m., along with finals in the long jump, shot put, javelin and the 10,000-meter run. The remaining finals, beginning with the pole vault, will start May 15 at 5:15 p.m.

Men's Basketball

MVP: Dave Brewer. The 7-foot sophomore from Lago, Virginia, averaged 21.1 points per game this year, while making an impact on the squad in blocked shots with 11 and three on SWC record for blocked shots in one game when he stopped away eight shots against TCU. He grabbed 179 rebounds and averaged 12.2 rebounds per game, third best on the Cougar.

Women's Basketball

MVP: Beth Bortner. The 5-foot-10 sophomore guard from Fremont scored every game this year, totaling 17 assists and a

near-shut 14 steals. She set a Southwest Conference record with 11 steals in one game against Baylor in this year's SWC tournament. Her 27 points in the game against Texas Tech was second on the team in junior year. Vicky Fuchs, who had 46 points for a 33.3 average.

Newcomer: Ty Nichols. Nichols appeared in 21 games and finished the season with 22 points in an 8.6 per game average. Fifth highest on the team. The 4-foot freshman was from Knoxville, Tenn. had 101 free throws against Texas A&M when she scored 24 points.

Baseball

MVP: Wesley Gregerson. The senior left fielder finished the season with a .314 batting average and a team-leading .364 in

conference play. Gregerson, a business management major from Baytown, also led the UH single-season record with 16 doubles, moving him to second on the UH all-time list with 24. He is second on the team in RBI with 39.

Newcomer: Corky Swindell. Swindell led the team with a .329 batting average and had two game-winning RBIs. The second baseman from Sharpstown had one six-game hitting streak, three five-game hitting streaks and two streaks of four. He also boasted a .573 fielding average.

Golf

MVP: John Staughter. A sophomore from Abilene, Staughter is currently holding a 71.4 per-round average, the third best on the team. His proudest

moment came when he captured the 1982 All-American junior-collegiate individual title.

Newcomer: Billy Ray Brown. Brown owns the team's best per-round average (73.2). In the eight tournaments he completed in, Brown placed in the top ten six times.

Men's Track

MVP: Anthony Ketchum. Ketchum, 19, didn't miss a beat after coming to UH from Needville High School, where he capped his prep career by blazing the 400 meters in 45.50 seconds for his fourth straight 400-meter title in the state championships. He was the lone freshman to win a 1982 NCAA Indoor Championship title, defeating his 440-yard field with a 47.47 clocking.

Ketchum has already qualified for the national outdoor meet's 400-meter event (45.75, a school record) and has helped the UH 400 relay squad to a record time of 38.9 seconds. Fast times are certainly on the freshman's side.

Newcomer: Brian Stanton. The junior transfer has rewritten the school high jump standards with consistent marks of 7 feet, 4 inches, which was quickly exceeded with a 7-4 1/2 one month later. He grabbed the SWC indoor crown and placed second at the TAC indoor meet with 7-4 1/2 clearing. He has added much-needed depth in the Cougar field events.

Women's Track

MVP: Danni Olson. The 5-foot-4 Olson has shown with the javelin what a little work and the proper technique can do. She shattered her 1981 school best of 174-8 with a 184-3 toss in March 6, then followed that up two weeks later

with a 195-4, qualifying for the NCAA Championships. The 20-year-old Austin native, who has also qualified for the discus event (166-9), is currently ranked No. 7 in the nation.

Newcomer: Carol Lewis & Jackie Washington. With the addition of freshmen Lewis and Washington, the UH women's team has become a threat on the nation scene. Lewis broke the two-year-old UH women's long jump record, bounding 22-0 1/2 March 27. She topped first place at the Mt. SAC Relays with a wind-aided 22-0 3/4. Sister of world-class long jumper and sprinter Carl Lewis, Carol has demonstrated her own unique skills in the 100 hurdles (11.5, a UH record), the high jump (5-8) and as second leg of the Coug 400 relay squad.

Washington, ranked ninth nationally for the 100 meters in 1981, is well on her way to becoming the fastest woman sprinter in UH history. She has won five of six 100 races (her best time is 11.34) and two of three 200-meter dashes (25.79 wind-aided and 25.86). As first leg of the UH 400 relay team, the Houston native has paced her squad to a school best of 44.79 seconds.

Men's Swimming

MVP: Siang Ang. The 19-year-old Singapore native etched his name into the history books when he became only the 12th man ever to crack the 20-second mark in the 50-yard freestyle. He bettered his NCAA preliminary time of 19.97 two weeks later when he swum to a 19.86 to win his first national title at the U.S. Short Course

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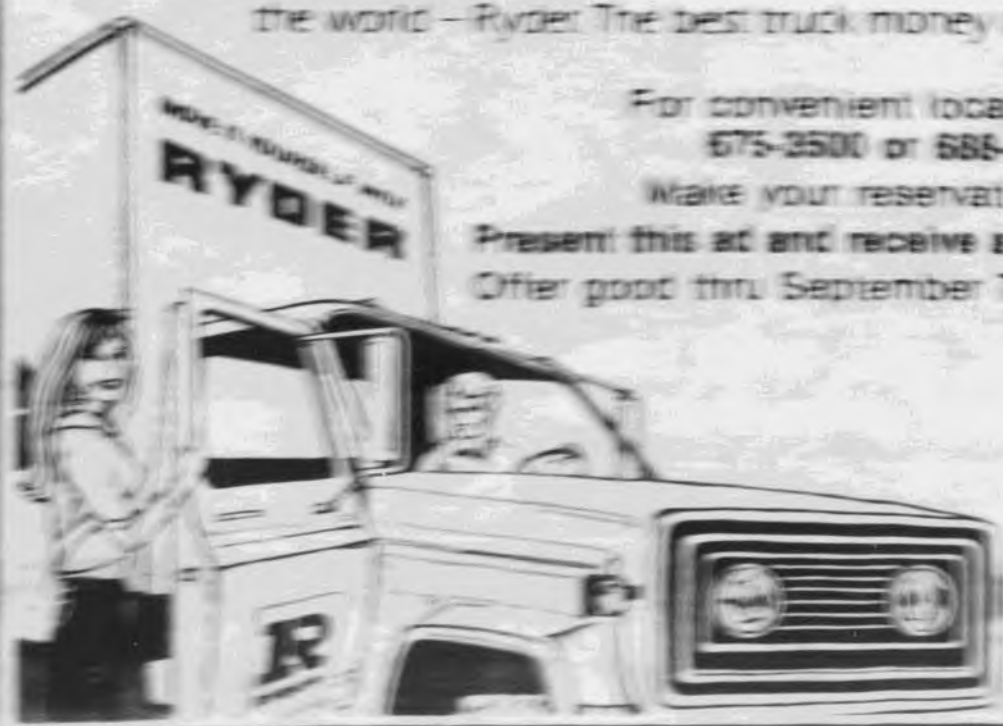

Championships. He also is the first male swimmer in UH history to earn a national crown.

Newcomer: Kevin Evans. Evans showed his potential by finishing as one of the top 10 divers at the SWC Championships and qualifying for the NCAA. Before coming to Houston from Johannesburg, the freshman was the open South African national champion for the one- and three-meter dives in 1980-81.

Women's Swimming

MVP & Newcomer: Beverley Rose. The Scotland native paced to a 56.44 for second place of the 100-yard backstroke event at the U.S. Championships, after capturing third and a UH record at the NCAA meet with a 56.19. Rose, 17, also set a school mark in the 200 backstroke (2:06.83), and she had steady times throughout the 1981-82 season.

Men's Tennis

MVP & Newcomer: Steve Couch. In a dismal rebuilding year, the freshman from Clear Lake led all netters with a 13-8 record. Couch, who was ranked 13th in the United States in 1980, is well on his way to being one of the top collegiate players in the country.

Women's Tennis

MVP: Margaret Redfearn and Joy Tacon. Redfearn combined a fall record of 22-4 and 15-3 in the spring for a team-high 37-7 record overall. Tacon, a sophomore, improved on her fall finish of 13-8, compiling a 15-3 spring record for a 28-11 total overall.

Newcomer: Margaret Redfearn.

Women's Volleyball

MVP & Newcomer: Linda Williams. A transfer to UH from Wharton Junior College, Williams received praise for her leadership qualities and her amazing leaps and powerful hits which defied her 5-foot-4 height.

Andre Ervin, 6-0, 180-pounds, from Hamilton High School in Brooklyn joins guards Alvin Franklin from La Marque High School and Derek Giles from Lee Junior College as 1982 Cougar signees.

Ervin, who has a 42-inch vertical leap, averaged 36.5 points, 12 rebounds and six assists in leading Hamilton to a 22-5 record and the city tournament's semifinals. Ervin led Hamilton to the city championship in 1980-81, when the team was 28-2.

Teacher helps disabled have fun

Lisa, confined to a wheelchair, is learning to do something she may have never dreamed possible, and that is to bowl.

Alief adapted physical education teacher Pat Rebsch has made this fun activity possible for Lisa by teaching her how to use special equipment that allows the disabled to participate in normal, everyday sports.

Pat is the coordinator of the Adapted PE department in the Alief Independent School District. She teaches physical education and recreation to disabled children age eight to 21 at six different schools in the district. She is one of several traveling adapted PE teachers in Alief.

Some of the students she works with have physical handicaps caused by cerebral palsy or muscular dystrophy. Others may be mentally retarded, blind, deaf or emotionally disturbed.

In adapted PE, Pat first analyzes the child's gross motor skills. Then she designs a program to fit that child's abilities and disabilities. "You find their strengths and you build on them. You find their weaknesses and try to improve them," Pat said.

Pat's work often includes adapting a game to fit a child's abilities or disabilities or teaching a child how to use special equipment to play the game such as a ball ramp for bowling. She also creates new games for the children to play.

"If the child can only throw the ball backward, we adapt the game to fit their strengths. If they can only throw the ball a tiny way, you make their targets right around them in the area that they can throw," Pat said. One child, nine-year-old Jay who spends his day in a wheelchair and has very little strength due to a congenital heart condition, plays the bean bag toss with his target, a large hula hoop, just two feet away.

If Pat can not change the game to fit the child, there may

be special equipment available that will allow the child to participate in the game.

Twelve-year-old Lisa, a victim of cerebral palsy, doesn't let her handicap get in the way of her bowling. Lisa uses a special ball ramp that is designed to be used with a wheelchair. One morning Lisa demonstrated her adeptness at using the adapted equipment. Lisa lacks the strength to lift the ball so Pat set it on the ramp for her. After carefully lining up the ramp with the pins, she sent the ball crashing into the ten pins, knocking over nine on the first shot. On her second attempt, Lisa sent the ball careening into the tenth pin. "A spare!" she exclaimed.

Lisa has learned how to score a game in bowling and can take the ball ramp with her to a regular bowling alley where she can play against anyone.

Pat also has to teach some of the children how to use their strengths to play different games. Twelve-year-old Miriam at Killough Middle School has cerebral palsy and has no use of her hands. She does have movement in her feet and has become quite adept at using them in place of her hands. For a leisure time activity, Pat has taught Miriam how to play cards with her feet.

Aside from fun time activities, Pat also teaches her students some very practical physical activities. For example, Gretchen, who has spina bifida and must travel around Killough Middle School in a wheelchair, has been learning to move from her wheelchair to her carseat and to her bathtub. At 12, Gretchen is looking forward to going to college and Pat "wants to make her as independent as possible."

Pat's day begins early with her first student at 7:30 a.m. She has a continuous stream of students and activities from then until 5 p.m. when she leaves for home.

Pat's day is varied and long. Three days a week she begins working with students at Petrosky Elementary School. Some she works with on a one-to-one basis. Others she teaches in small groups of about eight.

Later on, Pat drives to New Elsie High School where she and fellow adapted PE teacher Lisa Goulis teach a large group of mentally retarded teenagers. Together they teach them dance, gymnastics and weight lifting, among other things.

The rest of Pat's day is spent at Killough Middle School where she again teaches some children one on one and others in small groups. By 3:30 she is finished teaching but then must begin the mounds of paperwork that comes with the job before going home at 5.

Other goals of adapted PE include finding leisure-time recreational skills her students will enjoy for the rest of their lives as well as to improve their physical condition in any way possible. For example, "You may want to improve their walking or running patterns," Pat said.

Another goal of the adapted PE program is simply to build self-esteem and independence in the child.

In fact this is one of the reasons Pat enjoys teaching her special kids. When she sees them trying a task with "everything they've got in them and then they master that task," Pat said, and the student feels really good about it and achieves some self esteem from it "it's beautiful."

Pat finds her job is "very challenging" and never boring because she is "constantly thinking and creating new activities and adapting old games."

Pat studied physical education at the University of Texas but at the time the school did not have an adapted PE program. While still in school, Pat worked with children with cerebral palsy in a clinic. At that point, Pat said she realized she liked working with handicapped children and decided to take special education courses.

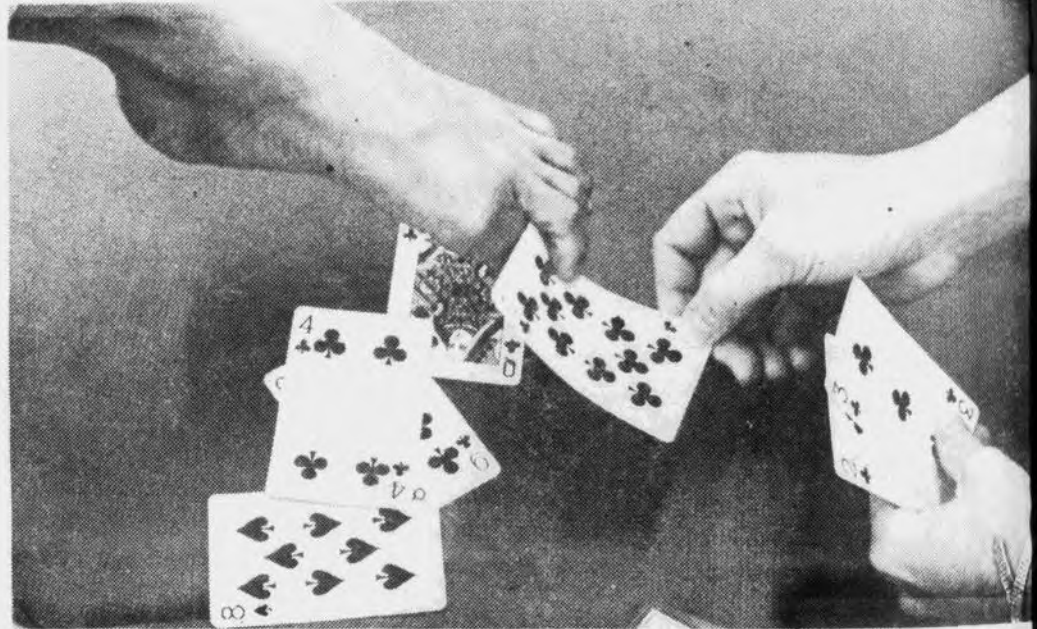
Pat said books, literature and professionals in the field are helpful in getting new ideas of working with her students. However, she can only use these as background information to pull from when developing a specific program for a particular child, since every child is different.

(Top) Rolling on a huge inflated ball is great fun for 12-year-old Miriam. Miriam, a student at Killough Middle School, has cerebral palsy and has a hard time relaxing her arms and legs. Teacher Pat says the ball helps Miriam to relax and straighten her arms and legs through the natural gravitational pull while she is on the ball.

(Bottom left) Pat helps Miriam onto the uneven parallel bars where she has learned to do many "stunts." Miriam loves to do these stunts and will demonstrate her skill at performing on them to anyone who will watch.

(Bottom middle) Adapted PE is also concerned with teaching recreational activities. Pat has taught Miriam to play cards with her feet since Miriam's hands are completely unusable.

(Bottom right) Sometimes PE time includes more physical therapy than fun. Pat works with nine-year-old Jay, from Petrosky Elementary School, to strengthen his head and abdominal muscles. Jay, who suffers from Downs Syndrome, has a heart defect and scoliosis as well. At this time, he lacks the strength to push his own wheelchair but Pat is working on that as well.



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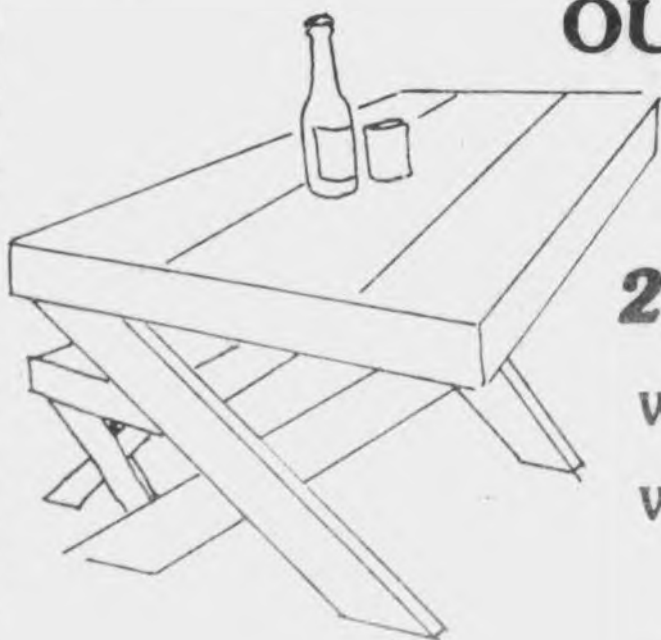

When you receive the Priority Registration packet in the mail this Summer, you then will use this slip to fill out your section request form. Returning the section request form before the August deadline for Priority Registration will automatically place you in a preferred position for class selection above those students who did not participate in Priority Advising.

STEPS TO FOLLOW

- STEP 1:** Make an appointment to see your advisor. Some departments will have open time periods for advising. See the Advisor Locations listed below.
- STEP 2:** Obtain a Fall Semester Course Roster. This roster is printed on the following pages as a special insert. This is **not** a final Class Schedule. Because of this early printing, the actual class times may change between now and July. Use this Course Roster to determine your course options with your advisor. You will receive an up-to-date Class Schedule by mail in your Priority Registration packet.
- STEP 3:** Fill out your Student Program Advising Slip with your advisor. The advisor will approve the courses only, not the specific sections of courses with several sections. Therefore, do not select actual sections, instructors, and times now. Wait to do this until you receive the final Class Schedule in July. The advisor will give you a copy of the Program Advising Slip listing your approved courses or options. The signed advisor's copy will be the record that you have participated in priority Advising; your name will then be entered in the computer data base for priority class section assignment.
- STEP 4:** Keep your copy of the Student Program Advising Slip in a safe place until you receive the Priority Registration packet in July.
- STEP 5:** Fill out and return your section request before the August 2 deadline. Use your Student Program Advising Slip containing the approved courses

or options. Select your class sections from the Fall '82 Class Schedule you receive in the mail.

STEP 6: Pay your tuition and fees at Hofheinz Pavilion during the Fee Payment Period, August 23-27, 1982. Your specific time will be listed in the Fall Class Schedule you receive in the mail. Classes for the Fall Semester start on **August 30**.

If you participate in Priority Registration by mail in July, the University will better be able to satisfy your requests for class section assignments. All students going through Priority Advising will be assigned class sections first. Next, other students registering in Priority Registration will be assigned class sections as a group. The last group to be assigned will be all students who register in Regular Registration, August 17-18, 1982.

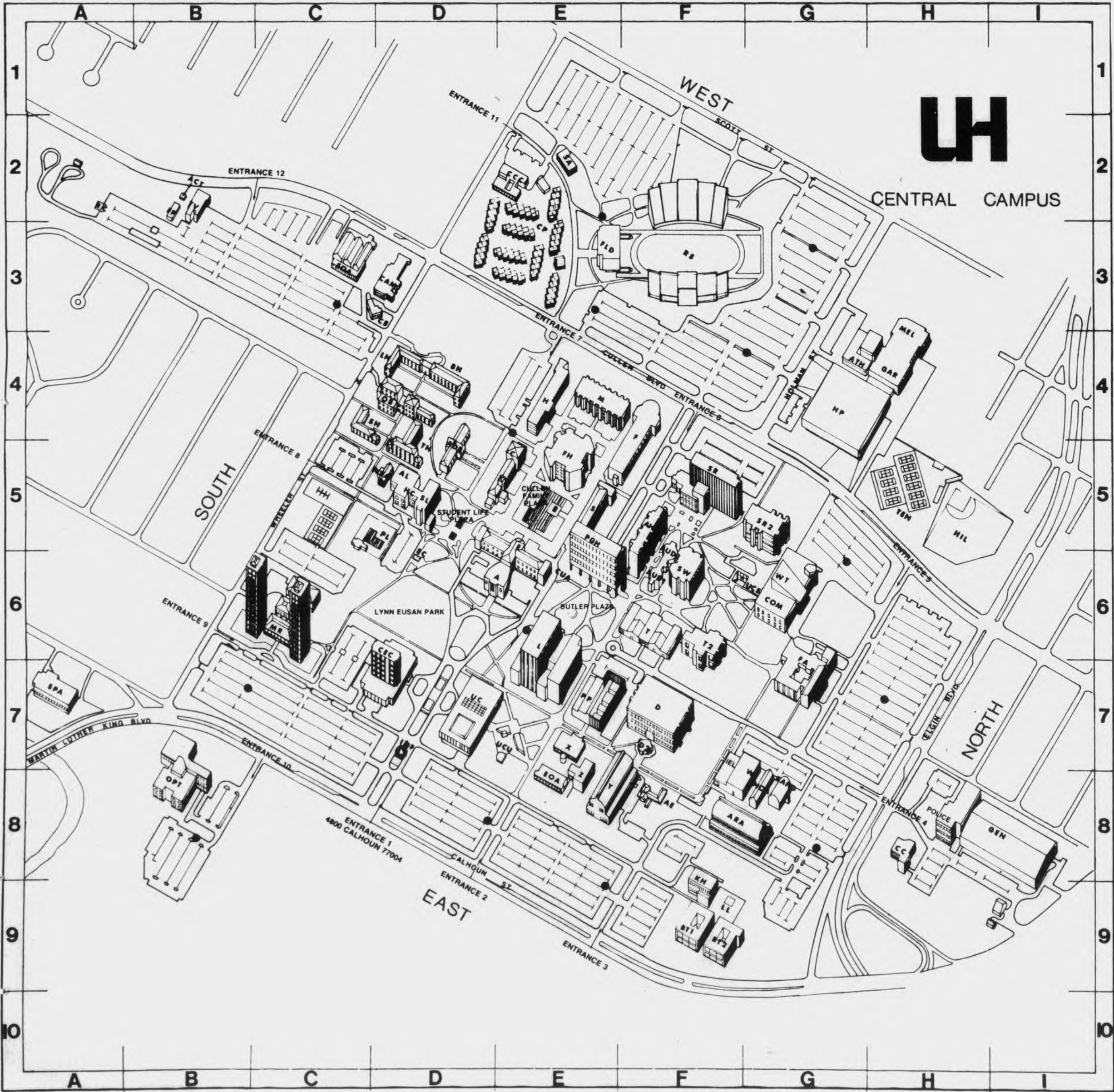

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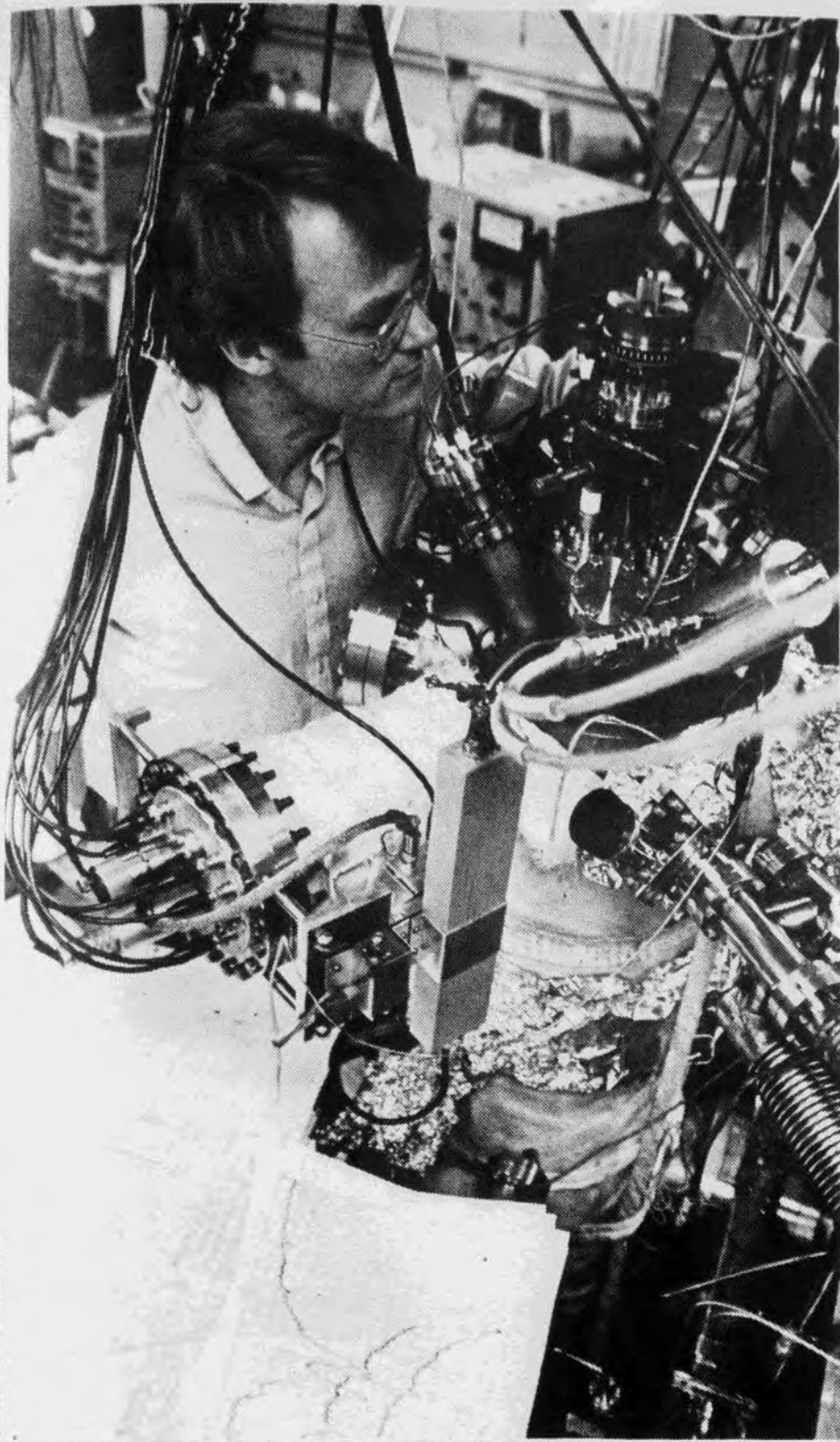

Professor looks for rusty solution

Homeowners and industry spend millions of dollars each year to prevent and eliminate rust. Two University of Houston scientists studying atomic interactions on metallic surfaces offer a glimmer of hope in the battle against rust and improved prospects for highly specialized metals.

Dr. Alex Ignatiev, associate professor of physics, slowed the rusting process (oxidation) and Dr. J. Wayne Rabalais, distinguished university professor of chemistry, strengthened metal surfaces during laboratory tests.

Countless reactions occur every minute that may alter the chemical and physical properties of metal surfaces. By exposing various metals to x-rays, ion beams, electron beams and ultraviolet light, the researchers are getting a picture of the metal's atomic structure.

"We want to know how to coin certain physical and chemical properties of a surface to achieve a desired goal," Rabalais said.

"It is very important to control chemical and physical properties of surfaces. It would control a lot of problems worldwide," Rabalais says.

Rust starts when oxygen molecules in the air dissociate (split into two oxygen atoms) and chemically attach to a metal surface.

Ignatiev has discovered that photons, particles of light, may trigger the desorption, or release, of oxygen from a chromium surface such as a solar collector, slowing oxidation, increasing efficiency, and extending the unit's lifetime.

"I want to find out how the

oxidation process occurs on the atomic level. Do oxygen atoms 'seep' into the metal's surface or are oxygen and iron atoms somehow switching places at the surface?" Ignatiev said.

By bombarding a metal surface with certain active ions, Rabalais has found that a protective film of a new compound (a metal oxide, carbide or nitride) covers the metal.

Aircraft rely on lightweight materials, usually aluminum and titanium, but these metals are soft and have low melting points. A nitride film over either metal

raises the melting point and hardens the metal yet retains the metal's light weight, Rabalais explained.

"The exciting part of this work is that we can retain the properties of the bulk metal and gain the properties of the surface film," Rabalais said.

The entire field of metallurgy and material science, traditionally oriented to macroscopic problems such as how much stress a steel I-beam can bear, will be revolutionized, Ignatiev concluded.

UC board accepting more space requests

The University Center Policy Board Space Allocation Committee is accepting more applications for office space in the UC.

The committee has made preliminary recommendations, Mark Rector, new UCPB chairman, said. He added that some space available in the UC has not been applied for.

Rector encouraged recognized student organizations to apply for space.

To be considered for space, Rector said organizations must submit applications to the activities center desk before May 12.

The committee's final recommendations will be made at a public hearings May 14.

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Experts unsure about job market

What's the job market look like for this year's college graduates? Even the experts aren't sure.

What makes the question difficult to answer is the lack of a pattern, according to findings in the most recent salary survey report just released by the College Placement Council.

Some employers are postponing hiring decisions while they wait to see when economic recovery will begin. Others in industries less affected by the economic slump are conducting business as usual. Still others are cutting back on recruiting trips and reassessing their staffing needs, partly because of internal cost controls and partly because most of their needs were filled much earlier in the year than is customary as students, apprehensive about job opportunities, eagerly grabbed the earliest offers they received.

One thing is evident. According to the latest CPC report, fewer offers are being made nationally. Since the report is based on job offers, it is impossible to determine from the data whether there are fewer jobs available or whether fewer offers are being made for the same number of

jobs.

For example, in a highly competitive year an employer may have to make many offers to get one acceptance for an available position. As the job market tightens, an employer may have to make only one or two offers to fill a position.

Some industries — automotive, metals, and construction, in particular — are feeling the crunch more than others. But even the oil industry, which had greatly expanded hiring in recent years, is slowing its recruiting activity.

Still, it appears that there will be employment opportunities for the best students and most aggressive job-seekers. Engineering graduates may not have as many offers to choose from, but few should find themselves without a job. In disciplines less in demand, students will have to work harder and smarter to find jobs.

While the number of job offers in the salary survey report may be down, starting salary averages have not suffered. Students majoring in petroleum engineering drew the top offers at the

bachelor's level — \$30,432 annually, a 14.2 percent increase. Second-ranked chemical engineering, at \$27,168, experienced an 11.5 percent gain. Since the July 1981 report, increases in dollar averages for the 12 bachelor's-level engineering disciplines ranged from 5 percent to over 14 percent.

The three business disciplines reported increases of 8 percent to just over 9 percent in offers since July. The higher average offer in this group, \$18,444 per year, went to accounting majors.

Computer science dominated the science category in number of offers, but the annual average of \$22,572 for this discipline took second place. The other physical and earth sciences category was the leader among the sciences with an average of \$23,940, and 8.1 percent jump since the July report.

The humanities and social sciences group traditionally has had limited number of offers in this early report, since many graduates receive job offers later in the academic year or following graduation.

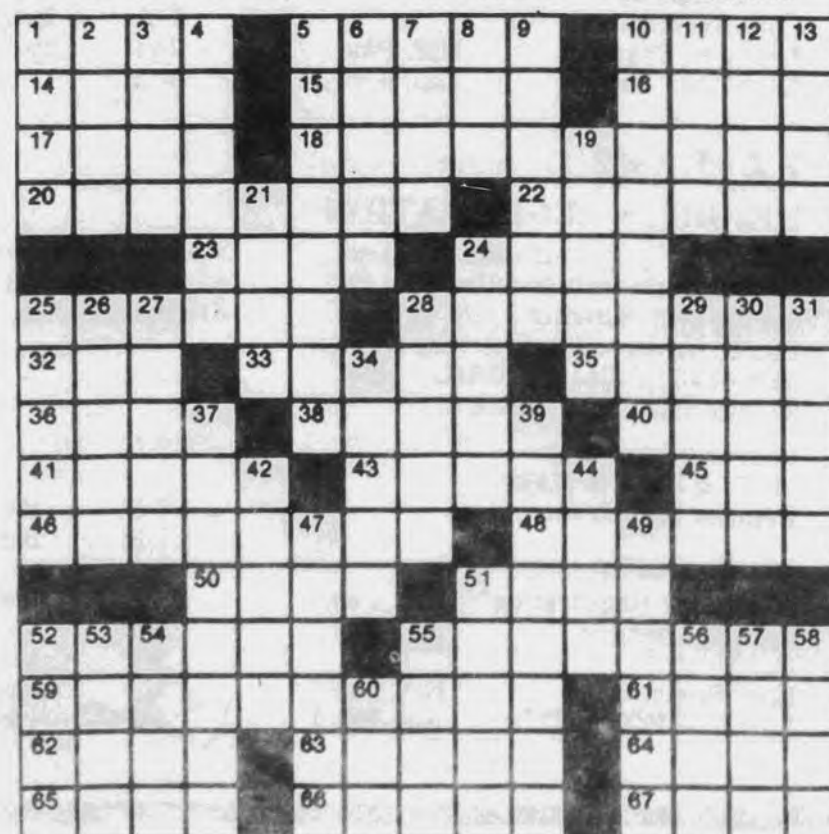
