Suspect sought in Montrose murder



Houston police are seeking help in identifying and locating a suspect in the murder of a Montrose resident on Friday, June 16. The suspect, who has used the first name Kenneth, is described as a 20-year-old white male, approximately 6 feet 1, and weighing about 150 pounds, with blonde, curly hair and blue eyes. Police said he also has a pale complexion and an "anemic" look and may have a cut on his left arm. They believe his mother lives in the Humble area.

The body of Eugene LaFoy, 48, was discovered about 3:00 p.m. at his home in the 1200 block of Taft. The suspect is rumored to have lived with LaFoy for several days prior to the stabbing death and may also be a suspect in other Montrose area murders.

Anyone with information about the identity or whereabouts of the suspect is asked to phone HPD Homicide division at 247-5418.

Asner Answer To Democracy

Activist actor Ed Asner praised the Chinese students in their struggle for freedom but said Americans may need a refresher course in democracy. Asner was in Boston last Saturday to give the commencement address at Northeastern University's graduation services in Boston, praising the "courage and sacrifice" of the Chinese demonstrators. But Asner criticized America's sagging "moral infrastructure" and questioned why citizens of the United States, with so much more experience at democracy, seem to be becoming "more fractured and factious with each passing day."

Asner's daughter, Liza, was among the 4,000-member graduating class at Northeastern. He and actress Liv Ullmann were among five honorary degree recipients.

NAMES, Colt 45s dominate the Pride Awards

NAMES Project—Houston and the Colt 45s were undisputedly the walkway winners at Saturday's Pride Awards ceremony, sponsored by Metropolitan Community Church and Montrose Activity Center. The NAMES Project received awards in two of the six major categories. Most Outstanding Event and Expanding Pride and Understanding Beyond Our Community, at the banquet, held Saturday night, June 17 at the city Multi-Service center on West Gay. The Colts, who staffed a cash bar during the event, garnered two honorable mention plaques in addition to winning the main award in the AIDS Service category.

The award for Community Service Organization went to the Montrose Clinic, while the clinic's former executive director, the late Tom Audette, was honored as Outstanding Individual. Audette's award was accepted by

his lover, Garrison Smith.

The Outstanding Business award was presented to the Brass River Bottom.

Honorable Mentions in each of the award categories were as fol-

lows: Outstanding Event, the 1988 Gay/Lesbian Pride Parade; Expanding Pride and Understanding, the Colt 45s; AIDS Service Organization, the People With AIDS Coalition—Houston;

Community Service Organization, the Colt 45s; Business, LOBO; and Individual, Marion Coleman.

The awards were designed to honor individuals, organizations and businesses in Houston for exceptional service, commitment and leadership in the Houston gay and lesbian community, according to the event's sponsors, who intend to make it an annual Gay and Lesbian Pride Week tradition. The award recipients were selected by means of a community ballot.

Keynote speaker for the ceremony was the Rev. Tony Perry, founder of the Metropolitan Community Church, who speaks on the evolution of the gay rights movement and gay pride over the past 20 years.

A few picketers from two organizations, Houston Gay Atheists and AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power, demonstrated outside the Multi-Service Center's parking entrance during the ceremony. The picketers protested the fact that some of the admission proceeds would go to a religious organization, MCCR.

Gays under Glasnost: Still a long ways to go

As twilight dines to darkness and the tourists and families return home, the park in front of the Bolshoi Theater fills with love and nervous laughter. Couples retreat. Young men in designer jeans, business men, several officers in full military uniform are out on the prowl. The men appear proud, slightly cautious as they begin another evening of cruising in the heart of Moscow.

Michael works in the theater, Alexander as a clothes designer. Both are in their mid-thirties and Alexander is divorced. Together the two friends painted a grim picture of gay life in the nation's capital.

"The Helsinki used to be the main meeting ground, but in recent years the 'hooligans' have gotten the upper hand. The younger crowd is looking more hang out in small groups. One will lure an older gentleman off to a park or side street, rough him up and rob him. The police show little concern as it helps create an atmosphere that discourages gays from congregating here. Now we mostly stay at home."

Up until recently, homosexuality—considered a product of the decadent West—officially did not exist in the Soviet Union. It was simply another one of the many national taboos topics. Like many other subjects for discussion, homosexuality and sex were, and still are, on the Soviet verboten list, especially in mixed company. Sex education is rudimentary at best in schools and virtually nothing credible in writing existed on the subject. Recently a well-known sociologist, Igor Kon's book "Introduction to Sexology" was released for public reading after a decade of censorship. In 1985, Kon was also the first author to promote realistic discussion about AIDS.

As in many countries of the world, the threat of AIDS has forced the acknowledgment of the existence of homosexuals, and, as about homosexuality, the average Soviet is in the dark about AIDS. Up until now, many Soviets patiently denied that they existed in their country. Presumably the numbers of AIDS cases in the USSR is still small, but a ticking time bomb; condoms are virtually unavailable and those that are, are unreliable, information of AIDS and safe sex dissemination is minimal, and the use of IV drugs is a much larger problem than acknowledged.

Up until the fall of 1988, such low numbers as 60 to 70 cases of AIDS were quoted, and the authorities were quick to add that it was mostly all foreign students—black Africans. The information channels are slowly opening up. In Nov. 1988, the Moscow press ran an article about the first acknowledged AIDS death; a female prostitute. A more accurate, but still questionable number of 420 cases of AIDS



were reported. In the USSR nothing equivalent to the American concept of gay community exists—gay underground perhaps best describes the situation. The gay subculture is riddled with KGB informers who use their information for purposes of blackmail and inducing other homosexuals to inform on friends and contacts. Suspicion is rife, fear underlies every potential trust. There are virtually no bars or nightclubs. Parks and squares are frequented by gays in the larger cities, but, if the homosexuals know about the spot, so do the KGB. Hotels are generally off-limits to Soviet citizens, and privacy at home is unlikely. Meetings and contacts are largely made through gatherings at private apartments—salons—established cliques of trusted friends. Like all friendships in the Soviet Union, because so few people can be trusted until proven otherwise, friendships are usually intense, possessive affairs, likely to be smothering to the average American—even more so in the gay community where there is much more at stake: job, reputation, possible imprisonment.

A large percentage of gay people are or were married and have children of their own. Marriage is the most viable way out. Even if a divorce follows shortly thereafter, a wedding ring provides the necessary facade to function in the society at large and is also a way of obtaining an apartment away from one's parents. (Single young men are low on the housing priority list.) The spouse may know the partner's proclivities or might even be gay him/herself.

Michael's apartment off Corky Street is an unusually large place; five rooms but only two of which were furnished. Five families just got relocated to new apartments in the suburbs. Photos cut from a French film magazine adorned the walls. Bridget Bardot, Yves Montand, Simone Signoret, Aluminus came with western beer and soda pop labels lined the window sill.

Michael said, "My dream fantasy is to follow in the footsteps of several of my friends who have managed

to marry a foreign woman and move away. New Yorkers and Parisians," he laughed, "are on top of the preference list."

Alexander lamented, "Even Negroes in your country are treated better than we are here. At least they have a chance to work their way up. Here we have nothing."

Russia's pre-revolutionary upper and noble class was rife with homosexual activity. Ivan Terrible, though married numerous times, was attracted to young men performing sacred dances in women's clothes. The highly sexed Peter the Great was known to take soldiers as bed companions, and had an intimate relationship with Alexander Meshkov, who rose in the ranks from baker's boy to court prince. Memoirs of Princess Dashkova, a noblewoman who helped Catherine the Great overthrow her husband, Peter III, hint at a relationship between the two famous women. Though not gay him/herself, Alexander Faskin knew and approved of his close friends gay relationships. The celebrated composer, Peter Tchaikovsky, was gay, as was Gogol, though he spent his whole life denying it until his confession at age 43. Anna Yevdymova, the first Russian woman to be awarded L.L.D. and her lover, Maria Pionovova, edited one of the first literary journals of the 1850's, "The Northern Herald."

In 1900, the relatively enlightened anti-gay law, written by Nikolai Miney, explored the suppression of female sexuality in a male-dominated world, with a sympathetic view towards lesbianism. Mikhail Kuzmin's and Nikolai Klugev's sensuously gay writings, honored and appreciated in pre-revolutionary times, helped them gain reputations among the other brilliant poets of their time. By the mid-1920's their works were banned.

The advances for human rights in the brief liberal period after the Revolution were obliterated during the reign of Stalin. In the winter of 1934 in the larger cities of Moscow, Odessa, Leningrad and Kharkov, numerous well-known actors, musicians, and artists were accused of being involved in homosexual activities and

arrested. Many were imprisoned and sent to exile in Siberia. Among them was Yuri Yarkun, a writer and artist and Kuzmin's lover.

Shortly afterwards, Stalin's implementation of article 104 of the Criminal Code punished homosexuals from three to eight years. The law only applied to men, and lesbianism was technically legal. The Stalin purges killed 1000 identifiable homosexuals. During the Khrushchev years article 104 was replaced with article 121 which eliminated the minimum sentence.

Soviet citizens still suffer the horrors, deprivations and suffering of incarceration simply for the fact of their sexual orientation. Oleg, a bespectacled, slight man with a new growth of beard covering his jaw, has been incarcerated a number of times. The longest prison term had been for 11/2 years in 1985. During Andrei's sentence he experienced many forms of physical and mental abuse. He described how he was strangled with a towel, repeatedly brought to the point of blacking out, deprived of sleep for three weeks, forced into a cold concrete cell without windows or blankets. "In prison, gays are treated the worst. They are humiliated in different, cruel ways. They may not eat at the table, or use utensils. I have seen them not allowed to sit on a bed, but on the floor mats."

Currently there is serious discussion in the USSR of rescinding the anti-gay law. Even if homosexuality becomes legal, public attitudes—particularly in the backlash of fear from AIDS—will be slow in changing.

Alexander said, "for so long, homosexuality was never discussed. In this country, it's always been permissible to have same sex contact in public and private. It's entirely common to see two soldiers in uniform walking down a street with arms linked, or a group of girls holding hands. Men give each other hugs and kisses on the cheek, pat behinds, hold onto each other, sleep in the same bed or tent together. In a way, people's ignorance made it safe for us. But now everyone knows and talks we have become a problem. And with AIDS people are even

more afraid of us."

The advancement of human rights for gays is unlikely to receive support from within the Soviet dissident community. An American lesbian spoke two years ago at a meeting of dissidents and suggested that freedom to choose one's sexuality be included in the agenda as a basic human right. Many of the dissidents expressed outrage at her assertion. "It was the most controversial topic of the whole meeting. Some of the dissidents hold strong religious beliefs and objected to homosexual rights on moral grounds saying things like 'How can gays be okay if they don't procreate?' A scientist got up and talked about how gays and lesbians had different hormones than normal people. And these are among the more enlightened, tolerant people in the country!"

A Soviet psychiatrist from Moscow, (who wished to have his name remain undisclosed) explained that homosexuality is viewed as perversion, an illness to be cured. Archaisms for dissuading homosexuals away from their proclivity, such as forcing men to watch heterosexual porn movies, are still in use.

One gay American related the following account: "I met a couple of gay men in Moscow. We returned to their apartment and talked for several hours. They were friendly, enthusiastic about meeting me. When I asked if we might arrange a meeting the following day with some of their friends and some of mine, they became hesitant. They explained that to have Americans, and gay ones at that, coming into their house would be too dangerous. The next day I called them back a number of times but no answer. They had given me a bogus number because they were afraid."

Vera, a young Soviet woman with homosexual leanings, spoke in faltering English to convey her strong convictions. "I believe all people should have the right to be and express who they are without fear. But so many Soviet gays have no ideals or dreams. Many seem to be into drinking and drugs, perhaps to escape. For Americans, being gay is not only sex but also something philosophical. Soviet gays they aren't ready, or able, to struggle for their rights."

Appearing in the monolithic, regimented facade Soviet culture presents to the outside world, new cracks are appearing. Beneath the unofficial social network of gays tenaciously existing in secret. In the face of overwhelming obstacles, gay men stubbornly survive in a world of their own and hope for the day that the enlightenment of Glasnost will shine on them too and lessen their fear. Michael said, "I hope that the law really is going to be changed. It will be the beginning of something new for us, but I'll believe it when I see it."

Klansman to speak at Aryan convention

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (UPI)—The white supremacist Aryan Nations Church said June 16 its annual "Aryan National Congress" will be held July 14-16 and will include speeches by Ku Klux Klan leaders.

The Aryan Nations drew wide criticism from Northwest government and civil rights leaders for hosting a convention for young violence-prone skinheads in April, and protesters far outnumbered the neo-Nazis.

But Aryan leader Richard Butler vowed to keep holding such gatherings and disputes suggestions his group is unwelcome in the area and should leave.

Klan leaders Louis Beam of Texas, Stanley Matthews of Alabama, Tom Robb of Arkansas and John Ross Taylor of Canada will speak at the July convention, the church in rural Kootenai County said.

We assume there will be federal and Anti-Criticism League agents in attendance, and Kootenai County Sheriff's officials posting as news reporters, so conduct yourself accordingly; the church says in invitations to the event.

NGLTF releases hate crimes data, 'alarming widespread' trend

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) issued its annual "wake-up call" to the nation June 7, announcing the release of its Anti-Gay Violence, Victimization & Defamation in 1988 report.

"Today's report is our annual wake-up call to the American people, to public officials, to the media, to teachers and to clergy," stated Kevin Berrill, NGLTF Anti-Violence Project director. "It is our reminder to the nation that the price of anti-gay bigotry is paid in human lives lost and in innumerable suffering for the victims, their loved ones and our entire community."

A record total of 7848 incidents of anti-gay violence and harassment were reported in 1988, an increase of 840 reports—or 9 percent—over the previous year's numbers.

The 1988 study also includes an unprecedented look at violence and harassment directed at gay-community-based Metropolitan Community Churches and gay and lesbian campus groups.

The marked increase, Berrill says, may or may not be an indication of a rise in anti-gay violence nationwide. But either way, he notes, the numbers are only the tip of the proverbial iceberg.

"This report does not claim to

measure the full extent of anti-gay violence and victimization that occurred last year," he stated. "Without question, the vast majority of anti-gay episodes in 1988 were not counted. ... We regard this report as a 'snapshot' of the problem, a picture which is not complete yet is vivid enough to dismay and outrage any person of conscience."

To help counter the national problem, activists are now looking toward the possible passage of the Hate Crimes Statistics Act, a federal measure which would mandate the Justice Department to collect statistics on crimes motivated by bias based on race, religion, ethnicity or sexual orientation.

Cedrick Hendricks, a spokesperson for Rep. John Conyers (D-Detroit, Mich.), the bill's lead House sponsor, opened that Wednesday press conference.

"When I introduced the new legislation in 1987," stated Conyers in a statement read by Hendricks, "I was soon to find it the target of hostility by Members who did not wish to see a provision of anti-gay hate crimes included."

Last year the bill survived two attempts to delete the bill's "sexual orientation" provisions to pass by an overwhelming majority in the House. The bill

died in the Senate, however, due to a last minute tactic from Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.).

At present, the House bill is expected to see committee action in late June. The Senate version of the bill, sponsored by Sen. Paul Simon (D-Ill.), is now being held up by lobbyists who are delaying a vote on the bill until they have enough votes to defeat an expected Helms amendment to the bill.

The non-binding "sense of the Senate" amendment would put the Senate on record as being against ever passing a bill banning anti-gay discrimination; mandate the enforcement of state sodomy laws; ban pro-gay public school curricula; and declare the "homosexual movement" a threat to the "American family."

Also at the press conference in the Dirksen Senate Office Building was Claudia Roesner, whose lover Rebecca Wright was killed in a 1988 attack on the Appalachian Trail.

"Before May 15, 1988 I believed that we, as lesbians, could be hurt or harassed," she said. "With words, most likely, maybe with some force if things got out of hand. ... I did not consider brutal murder born of hatred and ignorance. Nobody should have to worry about brutal murder. I didn't. I lived my life,

chase my love respectfully and honorably as I believe all people should.

"Brutal attempted murder happened to me. And I killed Rebecca. It happened because we were identified as lesbians."

To help counter the hate that helps fuel such attacks, Berrill called on the gay and lesbian community to "put on notice" those entertainers, religious leaders, public officials and others whose public statements allegedly contribute to what he called an "alarming widespread" epidemic of hate.

Berrill cited an incident in which a Connecticut disc-jockey named "Sebastian" stated that gay men spread AIDS and deserved to be castrated, after which a gay man with AIDS was savagely attacked by three teenagers who shouted that "Sebastian says queers spread AIDS and don't deserve to live."

"There is a connection between irresponsible public statements and violence," asserted Berrill. "When they call us 'tyks' and 'faggot' and 'queer' in the media we will hold them accountable. There is no minority that is more smeared and demeaned than the lesbian and gay community. And I believe that in a large part it facilitates anti-gay violence."

"It dehumanizes us; it trivializes our experience; and it has to stop!"

Clements signs AIDS funding law

AUSTIN (UPI)—Gov. Bill Clements worked late last Sunday to beat a midnight deadline for vetoing or signing into law the 1317 pieces of legislation passed by lawmakers in the regular session that ended in May.

Although anything unsigned by midnight would automatically become law, any vetoes had to be done Sunday.

The governor signed into law more than a 1000 measures June 14, 15 and 16, including an \$18 million omnibus AIDS bill to expand treatment programs for those suffering the virus and to set up more education and prevention programs.

Gay Games III: One year and counting

August 4, 1990, may seem like a far way off, but for those intending to participate in the Celebration '90 Gay Games III and Cultural Festival, registration for sporting events begins in July 1989, and the Vancouver organizers are currently soliciting artists, performers and writers for the cultural aspects of the festivities.

Like every lesbian and gay organization I know, the Gay Games III is trying to put on a Cadillac show with the ever-present Volkswagen budget," said media coordinator Barry McBill. Despite the inherent budgetary limitations, Vancouver's Celebration '90 promises to be even bigger and more spectacular than the two previous games. A projected 6000 athletes, 4 to 5000 athletes, and 20,000 spectators are expected to arrive in Victoria, Columbia for the 8 day extravaganza.

Among some of the changes in store for G0III is the addition of a number of new sports to the last Gay Games's 17. The following sports have been added: water polo, equestrian, race walking, golf, martial arts, squash, badminton, touch football, and croquet. Curling and Ice Hockey will be presented as exhibition sports.

There will be no regional eliminations or qualifying trials. All preliminary and final competitions are part of the Games themselves. There is equal access to all events for men and women, and the physically challenged. Special medals of honor will be given to those who overcome special obstacles to participate in the Games.

The other major change is the emphasis on artistic and cultural aspects of the celebration. Many people reacted against this move, feeling that gays have always been involved and known in the arts and that the Gay Games was a chance to come together around sports, a field that traditionally many gays have felt excluded from. Nevertheless, the Celebration '90 organizers have long been committed to giving Gay Games III a major cultural emphasis.

Among some of the exciting cultural events already in the planning stages: a 1000 member international gay and lesbian chorus, a "Chef's of the World" cooking event, a book fair, an international arts and crafts fair, photo and art exhibitions, video and audio, sports dancers and doggers, a 450 member band, theater productions, writer's workshops, "women's" entertainment, and some big name stars.

In one unusual plan, Jeffrey Pike from Boston, is organizing an evolving "Dance Tine across America." They will start with a short "seed dance" in Boston that grows and develops as it is performed from city to city, crossing the continent to Vancouver. Dancers will join the troupe along the way and a final performance will be staged in Vancouver.

A major goal for the organizers is to attract participants from outside North America. As a result of sports co-chair Mark Mees's outreach last summer, 500 athletes are expected from Europe, and Australia and New Zealand are sending 250. News of the games is being spread through South America, parts of

Asia, Israel, and even the Soviet Union. Mary Brooke, the only full time staff person at the Gay Games office said, "I think the local government has responded very positively towards the Games. They are far-sighted enough to see the vast possibilities of the event with everyone working towards the common good. The Games will bring in a lot of revenue which will benefit everyone."

Honorary Director John N. Turner, member of Parliament and former Prime Minister of Canada wrote, "I have long been aware of the contribution of the gay and lesbian population to our city's growth and vitality in all sectors. As a former athletic competitor, I subscribe to the social principles on which this international sporting event has been built: the spirit of openness and honesty, the democratization of athletic endeavor in amateur sports, and the concept of inclusion as opposed to elitism and exclusivity. I wish to endorse the organizers of Celebration '90 in their efforts to enhance our city's well deserved reputation for cosmopolitan hospitality."

The sporting venues include the city parks, recreation centers, public and private school gyms, university and college facilities, with as much concentration in the downtown and West End of Vancouver as possible.

The participants will be housed in a variety of ways. Many of the gay residents will be housing guest (billeting) arrangements have been made to the University of BC dormitories, in block bookings of hotels, and camping facilities.

The 100,000 local gays and lesbians are gearing up for the upcoming event and thousands will be volunteering in a variety of ways. While the local government and Chambers of Commerce have been supportive of the Games, the planners have hit several homophobic snags. Last year University of British Columbia (UBC) President, Dr. Strangway, initially denied use of UBC facilities for the G0III saying that he thought it an improper use of campus facilities and implied that gays were abnormal. Due to massive public outcry, he rescinded

and many of the G0III sports are slated to be held in venues on the UBC campus. Some of the more vociferous local Christian fundamentalists are raising trouble over what they call "the sodomite invasion" and that HIV positive people are coming to their city to infect the heterosexuals. They are threatening to sue the city, though they have no legal grounds for litigation.

As of now, Mary Brooke is the only paid staff person. Grant applications have been filed with the government for short term staffing; 2 staff people for 6 months, and an additional summer student grant request for 5 students for 3 months. "I look at the Gay Games III as this growing oak tree, and as of now, I'm the acorn, the official nut at the bottom," Mary laughed. "It's a lot of work, but worth it."

Mary was particularly proud to announce that a special assistance fund for those with financial difficulties in getting to the games has been set up, helping to make participation more universal. Also, the physically challenged need not be deterred from joining in as a special committee will be coordinating transportation, housing, and sign language interpreters.

In keeping with the Gay Games policy of inclusiveness, the organizers intend to do whatever they can to encourage and receive all and everyone interested in coming to Vancouver for the celebration.

—Sports Registration:
Early registration will open on July 1, 1989 with a firm deadline of May 31, 1990. Team roster changes will be allowed until July 15, 1990. A preliminary event schedule will be issued in June 1990 following the close of registration. Until Jan. 1990, all early registrations will qualify for discounted fees.

In sports where facility limitations make it impossible to accept all entries, registrants will be accommodated in the order they are received. The sports offered for registration are: Basketball, Basketball, Billiards, Bowling, Croquet, Curling (rehabilitation), Cycling, Diving, Equestrian, Golf, Ice Hockey (rehabilitation), Marathon, Martial

Arts, Physique, Powerlifting, Race Walking, Raquetball, Soccer Softball (fast and slow), Squash, Swimming, Tennis, Touch Football, Track and Field, Triathlon, Water Polo, and Wrestling.

—Theater:

AIDS survey to proceed in Dallas County

DALLAS (UPI)—An advisory panel voted Wednesday to proceed with the Dallas County phase of a proposed nationwide study to determine the prevalence of the AIDS virus, despite opposition from some gay leaders.

The panel voted overwhelmingly to approve procedures for conducting the anonymous survey, to be carried out in 3400 randomly selected homes in Dallas County beginning in August.

The line "no" vote came from William Waybourn, president of the Dallas Gay Alliance, one of seven organizations identified with the gay and lesbian community on the panel.

"We will ask our members in the community who are contacted about this survey to not only say 'no' but 'hell no,'" Waybourn said after the vote.

He told reporters the alliance al-

so may pay for advertisements urging the public not to participate.

Other members of the advisory panel indicated the group's opposition was expected and only made more apparent the diversity of opinion that has existed in the Dallas gay community for years.

Despite pledges of anonymity, interviewers would be able to recontact some people who declined to participate to be sure they were fully informed when that decision was made.

The Centers for Disease Control approved \$5 million over two years for the two-phase feasibility study. The purpose is to learn how common the human immunodeficiency virus HIV that triggers AIDS is in the general population.

The first part was the feasibility survey was carried out in the Pittsburgh, Pa., area last year. Waybourn also objected to the survey in Dallas has been the

recontacting of participants who decline to take part in the voluntary effort.

Research Triangle Institute, a North Carolina non-profit corporation hired to conduct the study, predicted 80 percent cooperation, but officials conceded they have encountered unprecedented mistrust in Dallas regarding participation.

Dr. Donald Zimmerman of RTI assured the advisory panel Wednesday that every possible effort had been taken to protect the identities of those individuals who participate.

"There will not be any lists of addresses used by Research Triangle Institute field staff at any time in the main survey or the non-respondent follow-up survey," Zimmerman said.

Individuals in the main study who decide not to take part will be given the survey's only record of their address by the interviewer during the home visit and will not

be recontacted.

The addresses of other non-participants will be covered by an anonymity shield and opened only if their survey form is selected to be included in a follow-up survey to determine why they did not take part in the main study and encourage them to reconsider, he said.

Al Calkin of the Lesbian-Gay Political Caucus said his initial concerns had been resolved about protecting the anonymity of people from high risk groups, such as gay men and intravenous drug users, who are asked to take part.

"There is overwhelming support on this panel among the gay members to proceed with this study with the changes that have been proposed," Calkin said.

Warren Buckingham of the AIDS/ABMS Network said he believed information from the survey will be valuable in helping community agencies do better long-range planning.

Belgian gay editors acquitted of promoting prostitution

The editors of *Tela Quels*, one of Belgium's two main gay/lesbian newspapers, were found not guilty June 1 of promoting prostitution and debauchery through the newspaper's classified ads.

The case had dragged on for more than a year as prosecutors filed additional charges—one against co-editor Pierre Bocquet for allegedly offering himself as a prostitute in the classifieds and another against a radio program during which the *Tela Quels* newspaper ads are read.

Both the newspaper and the radio show are produced by Antenne Rose, a multifaceted gay organization serving the

French-speaking area of Belgium.

"We have good news! We've been acquitted" co-editor Luc LeGrand said June 1 in a phone call from Brussels. "And in the justification of the acquittal, the judge said there can't be any discrimination against gays."

LeGrand and Bocquet had maintained throughout the past year that the charges were unfounded and that the *Tela Quels* personals are nothing more than messages from gays and lesbians hoping to meet each other.

LeGrand told reporters last Spring that the legal action against the paper reflected the personal prejudices of the new Catholic

Secretary of State who, LeGrand said, was distressed that Antenne Rose had earlier received recognition from Belgium's Labor party.

Belgium's other main gay newspaper, *Homokrant*, which publishes in Flemish, and several mainstream publications that print personal ads have not been harassed by authorities.

The resolution of the case against *Tela Quels* leaves Turkey's *Yesil Baris* as the only newspaper currently known to be under legal attack for printing gay/lesbian material.

A publication of the Turkish Radical Green Party, *Yesil Baris* one year ago be-

came the first newspaper in Turkish history to report on the gay liberation movement. After the paper's third issue, editor Abdul Kadir Demir Ozu and party leader Ibrahim Eren were charged by authorities with spreading homosexual information. Some issues of the monthly paper have since been confiscated while other issues were published clandestinely. Ozu and Eren's trial is set for November.

Among the published material that has upset the Turkish authorities were ancient Greek gay poems and drawings, and an article suggesting that the founder of the 20th century Turkish Republic, Kemal Ataturk, was gay.

Police say three slayings may be linked

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Homicide detectives are investigating the possibility that a killer is stalking gay men in the wake of three killings in areas where many of the city's gays and lesbians live. The area is called Center City and is an 11-block area in the city's downtown section.

"It has not been determined that they are homosexuals," a police spokesperson said. "The newspapers are saying that. We won't be unless we find that it is relevant and

we need to alert the gay community."

Mark Segal, publisher of the Philadelphia Gay News, said many people in the city's gay community are concerned about the killings because there has been much recent anti-gay resentment in the city.

Homicide Lt. James Herwood, who said police have no suspects in the three deaths, said the killings have many similarities. All three were single men who lived in Center City apartments, which were ransacked after the homicides. The vic-

tims were severely beaten and stabbed.

Herwood said police believe the victims know their attacker and are investigating the possibility that one person may be responsible for the three killings.

The latest body discovered was that of David Johnson, 55. Police said they found the body at 6:30 p.m. Monday after neighbors complained of a strange odor coming from the man's apartment.

Johnson, who had been dead for several days, was found beaten and stabbed on his kitchen floor, police

said. The body of Tracy Griffin, 24, was discovered June 10 lying on his living room floor after maintenance men complained about the odor coming from his apartment. Griffin was bound, stabbed, strangled and beaten, authorities said.

Alex Munchweiler, 59, was found June 6 by a maintenance man who used a pass key to enter the apartment. Munchweiler was beaten and repeatedly stabbed in the chest with a pair of scissors, police said.

Segal noted that earlier this month a resolution was passed in

City Council recognizing Lesbian and Gay Pride Month, but not before violent vocal attacks on homosexuals by two councilmen. The resolution, killed the year before, passed on a 9-8 vote.

"I think there's a lot of concern simply because of the mood of the city right now," the publisher said. The Philadelphia Lesbian and Gay Task Force released a report last year showing that 73 percent of the gay men and 42 percent of the lesbian women have experienced criminal violence on the basis of their sexual orientation.

Copies of Lowe's controversial sex tape to be sold

NEW YORK (UPI)—Smut king Al Goldstein said June 7 he plans to sell segments of the videotape purportedly showing actor Rob Lowe in steamy sex scenes with a 16-year-old Georgia girl.

Goldstein, who publishes Screw magazine, said he will sell videos of his hour-long Manhattan cable show, Midnight Blue, which earlier this month aired a short segment of the pornographic tape that has embroiled the actor in controversy.

Bootleg copies of the tape have been circulating in the night club scene, particularly in the gay community where they are reportedly selling for about \$2,000. Goldstein said his video will sell for less than \$30.

The videos have been available since last summer when it was filmed with 16-year-old Lena Jan Parsons having sex with another woman in an Atlanta hotel room.

The mother of the girl, Lena Arlene Wilson, recently filed suit, accusing Lowe of using his celebrity status to entice her underage

daughter into making the pornographic video.

The actor's attorneys have asked the federal court to throw out the suit, charging Wilson tried to extort half a million dollars from Lowe before filing the complaint.

Lowe, 25, is also believed under investigation by Atlanta area authorities for the possible criminal offense of sexual exploitation of a minor, which carries a 30-year prison sentence upon conviction.

Goldstein said he bought a copy of the tape for \$15,000 from a man

who responded to an ad he took out in an underground Atlanta newspaper offering to buy the video.

"I got a call from somebody who said he was a federal law enforcement agent. I really didn't ask him too much about it, but it was 'Federal. Expressed to us,'" Goldstein said, refusing to identify the person who sold him the tape.

He said the 37-minute video is of "terrible" quality and that only the best eight minutes were shown on "Midnight Blue."

"It's explicit sex. He's a real Don Juan," said Goldstein, adding that he believed Lowe was the person starring in the pornographic video. "He has a future in porn."

Asked why he decided to air the controversial tape, the Goldstein replied, "It's a current affair. We consider our show a nude 60 Minutes."

"Every journalist goes as far as his publisher will let him. Mine is the sex beat. I want my audience to see as much as they can. My own curiosity was piqued and so was everyone else's," he said.

Episcopal Church opens gay ministry

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI)—The Episcopal Church opened Tuesday what is believed to be its first ministry for gay people, aimed at giving the church a presence among gay men and lesbians and their presence in the church.

The Oasis, headquartered at All Saints Church in Hoboken, will minister to homosexual Episcopalians but will also actively seek to bring other gay people into the church, its organizers said.

While churches in areas with large gay populations have formed some of the same functions, The Oasis is believed to be the first official Episcopal ministry in the nation specifically for gay men and lesbians, organizers said.

The Rev. Robert Williams, a gay priest who heads the ministry, said The Oasis will give new

meaning to traditional. "The Episcopal Church welcomes you" signs in front of churches around the country.

"In many places, it would be more honest if they'd add a disclaimer. Gays and lesbians need not apply," Williams said.

Bishop John Spang, leader of the Episcopal diocese of Newark and long an advocate of church outreach to homosexuals, was scheduled to preside at a service Tuesday night to mark The Oasis's opening.

The Rev. Ellen Barrett, ordained in 1977 as the church's first acknowledged lesbian priest, was to be the guest preacher.

The ministry was inspired by a call by the General Convention of the governing body of the Episcopal Church, for an open attitude towards homosexuals, said the Rev. Leslie Smith, a spokesman for the diocese.

"[It also has roots in the attempt of this diocese to look seriously at sexuality]," he said. "It's no accident it occurred in this diocese. This is the type of ministry we've been looking at very carefully."

The response has been favorable, Williams said, although All Saints received one abusive anonymous letter after plans for The Oasis were made public.

Hoboken, in an urban area with many homosexual residents, is also a few minutes away from one of the country's largest gay communities in Manhattan's Greenwich Village. Williams and the diocese hope the ministry will become a resource for the entire gay community.

He said the Episcopal Church has not adopted any formal marriage-like blessing for committed homosexual couples, although Spang has advocated a study of the issue.

CAIRSON CITY, Nev. (UPI)—The American Civil Liberties Union asked Gov. Robert Miller Thursday to stay the execution of a former male prostitute convicted of killing two gay men in Las Vegas. He was scheduled to die early Friday.

The ACLU asked Miller to delay the execution of Sean Patrick Flanagan, 28, for up to 60 days so it could file a petition for clemency in behalf of the condemned man, who has requested any appeals in his behalf.

Miller did not make an immediate ruling. Flanagan, a former Marine from Michigan, was scheduled to die Friday at 4:30 a.m. Houston time by lethal injection, the second execu-

tion this week at the Nevada State Prison.

He also would be the 10th person executed in the United States this year and the 114th person put to death since the Supreme Court restored the death penalty in 1976.

ACLU lawyer Thomas Perkins said the death penalty in his case was not appropriate. "The kid gave up his rights to an attorney, pleaded guilty and asked for the death penalty," Perkins said.

Perkins requested a hearing before the state Board of Pardons for clemency based on the religious convictions of Flanagan, his remorse and his years without major convictions.

Flanagan confessed to strangling pianist

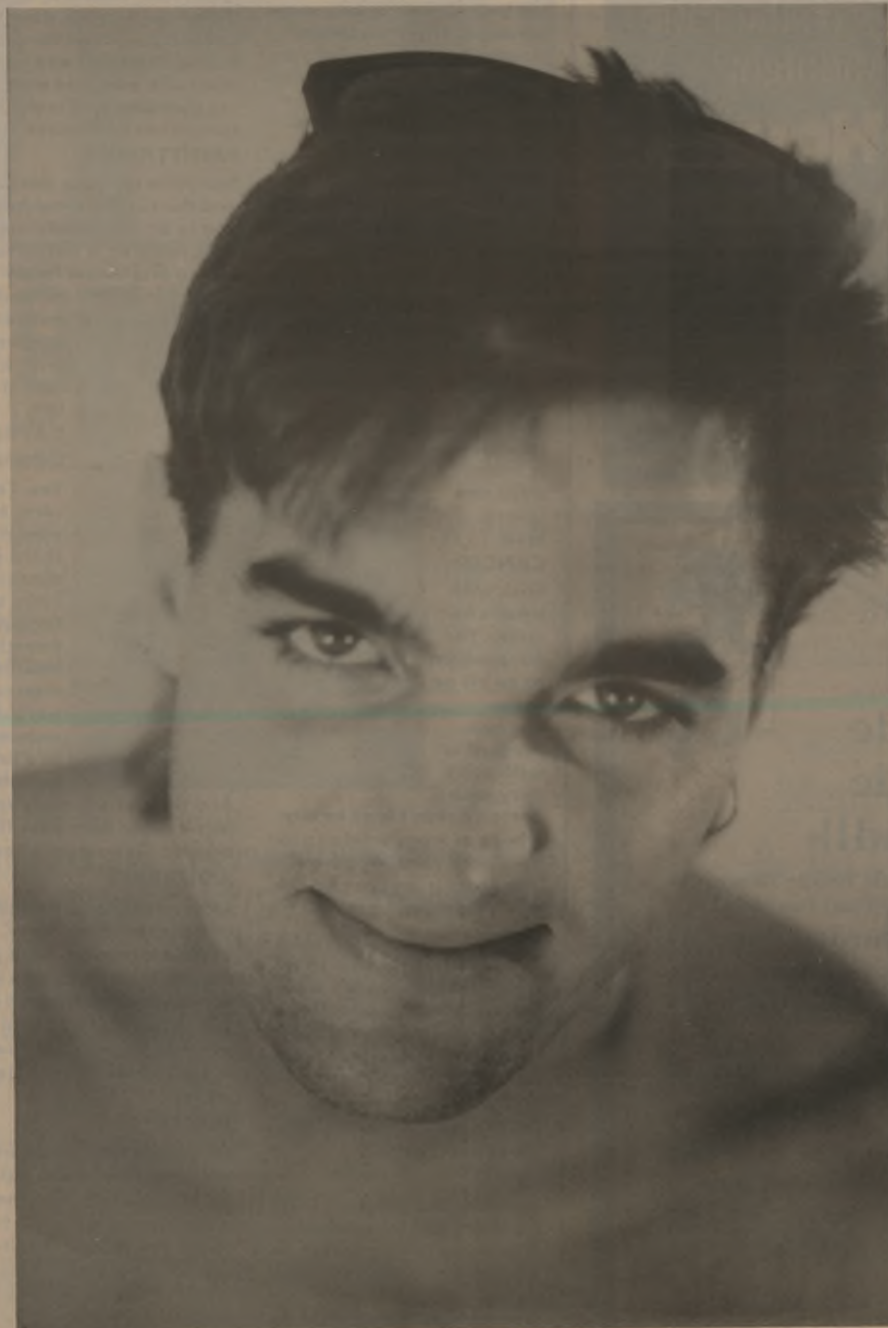

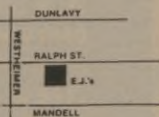



Under New Management

Homophobia permeates AIDS policy, activist reports

MONTREAL—Anti-gay and lesbian prejudice has permeated virtually every level of the development of U.S. public health policy on AIDS, from research to educational to federal appropriations, reported a Human Rights Campaign Fund political strategist who attended the recent international AIDS conference here.

In a presentation to the Fifth International Conference on AIDS, Eric Rosenthal, HRCF political director, disclosed the effect of homophobia on the government's responses to the epidemic.

Speaking to approximately 300 people at the conference, Rosenthal first noted that in all but one state, Wisconsin, it is legal to discriminate against lesbians and gays. He then listed examples of how homophobia has influenced AIDS policy, particularly in the areas of education and prevention.

Seventy percent of AIDS cases continue to be found among gay and bisexual men," Rosenthal said. "Therefore, gay and bisexual men should be

a major target for AIDS prevention activities. But the federal government, unable even to adopt anti-gay violence legislation, is at a loss when it comes to teaching gay men to have safer sex.

Rosenthal noted that the federal government pays a majority of the costs for AIDS research and prevention programs, yet Congress often places conditions on how the money may be used.

For example, in 1988, Senator Jesse Helms successfully introduced anti-gay legislation that attempted to block federal AIDS funding of programs on safer sex between men. The Helms amendment stated no federal funds would be used to "provide AIDS education, information, or prevention materials that promote or encourage homosexuality."

"The message from the federal government was clear, Rosenthal said: certain lives are expendable if the alternative is funding preven-

tion materials aimed at gay men.

Opposition to such homophobic legislation has increased, however, not only from gay and lesbian groups but from mainstream organizations as well, Rosenthal said. Efforts by public health organizations to correct and prevent homophobic legislation have turned Congress around in some instances, he noted.

For example, when the Helms amendment was introduced in 1989 appropriations legislation, Senators such as John Glenn and Edward Kennedy, acting on information from public health authorities, successfully challenged the homophobic amendment, which was defeated in a floor vote.

In summing up his presentation, Rosenthal urged the medical and scientific communities to prevent anti-gay prejudice from affecting public policy decisions.

The "Living and Loving with AIDS" issue (summer 1988) received an award of merit for best in-depth coverage of a current issue among magazines with fewer than 10,000 subscribers. In the category of General Excellence, Open Hands was one of two magazines in its circulation range to receive honorable mention. The ACP's award of merit is considered a coveted honor in religious journalism.

Open Hands, completing its fourth year of publication, is published quarterly by Affirmation: United Methodists for Lesbian/Gay Concerns. The Associated Church Press is an association of over 175 religious newspapers and magazines in the United States and Canada.

ACLU files AIDS discrimination suit

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill. (UPI)—The American Civil Liberties Union of Illinois filed suit against the city of Belleville Tuesday on behalf of a man who wants to open a home for AIDS victims.

Last month the Belleville City Council voted to deny issuing Charles Baxter a permit to open Our Place, a home for AIDS victims with nowhere else to go.

The discrimination suit is being brought under the 14th Amendment and the Federal Fair Housing Act.

ACLU spokeswoman Gwen Os-

borne said it is believed to be the first suit in the country brought under the federal housing act on behalf of AIDS-infected individuals.

"People with AIDS have to live somewhere," Osborne said. "Just by denying a permit for a group home doesn't alleviate what it is you may fear."

Belleville Mayor Richard Brauer said the City Council denied the permit without any discussion about AIDS.

He said the Zoning Board of Appeals warned the group home

would "alter the essential character of the area," which includes the headquarters for a hospice operation, an office building and a junior high school.

The area is zoned for commercial development, Brauer said, not housing.

Charles Baxter, 44, said he made the decision to open Our Place after years of caring for elderly and terminally ill patients.

He sold his home in Highland, Ill., and moved into a 22-room building in Belleville, with the hopes of making it a loving home environment for up to seven

AIDS victims.

"I sold my home, I sold my pickup truck, I sold my car, I sold my antiques," Baxter said. "I sold everything I owned to put money into this project. I'm to the point where I need help."

Baxter said he worked as a hospital administrator until last summer, but decided to go back into private practice so he could be in close contact with patients.

"The first AIDS patient I had, I was scared to death," Baxter said. "It's a lot different learning something from a book and walking into an AIDS patient's room."

Study reveals inconsistent AIDS discrimination policies

An important new study by National Gay Rights Advocates (NGRA) shows that the vast majority of state civil rights enforcement agencies prohibit AIDS-related discrimination. The agencies enforce the ban through laws that forbid discrimination on the basis of physical handicap.

Results also indicate, however, that numerous gaps in these laws leave many people with AIDS and other handicaps without legal protection. For example, several states allow employment discrimination in the private sector or discrimination in housing or public accommodations. Other states offer no protection to persons with "communicable diseases" or "perceived" (but not actual) handicaps.

The study reveals a broad consensus that handicap discrimination laws forbid AIDS-related discrimination. Thus, agencies in 40 of 51 states surveyed prohibit discrimination against people with AIDS, 35 forbid discrimination against people with ARC, and 33-

ban discrimination against persons with asymptomatic HIV infection. Only one state, Tennessee, indicated that such discrimination would be permissible. Of particular value to the gay community, agencies in a majority of states (28 of 51) indicated that state handicap law protects uninfected person who are subject to discrimination because others perceive them to be at risk for AIDS.

According to attorney Benjamin Schatz, Director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project, the study demonstrates the need for the Americans with Disabilities Act. The Act, if pass by Congress would broadly prohibit handicap-based discrimination. Explained Schatz: "The AIDS virus knows no state boundaries. It will continue to flourish everywhere as long as the fear and dishonesty produced by discrimination are allowed to continue unchecked in any region. The guarantees of basic justice

should not depend upon state of residence—particularly when the course of a national epidemic hangs in the balance."

NGRA Executive Director Jean O'Leary commented, "Medical experts agree that AIDS-related discrimination increases the spread of AIDS by forcing people away from education and medical attention. New laws must be passed and existing laws must be strengthened to ensure that all Americans are protected against handicap-based discrimination."

—Stonewall stamp

The United States Postal Service will become the first federal agency to officially acknowledge lesbian and gay pride week when it observes the 20th anniversary of the Stonewall uprising by offering a special lesbian/gay stamp cancellation on June 25. The uprising, a riot by patrons of a gay bar in

Greenwich Village, signaled the birth of the modern gay liberation movement.

The special cancellation, which was requested by the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, will be available at "Stonewall Station," a mobile postal unit to be located in New York's Sheridan Square all day Sunday, June 25, the day of New York City's Lesbian and Gay Pride Parade.

The cancellation features a logo designed by prominent New York artist Keith Haring. It will be affixed to first-class stamped mail dropped at the mobile unit on June 25 or sent in advance to Postmaster Room 1037, Morgan general Mail Facility, New York, NY 10199-9991 with a request to use the special Stonewall commemoration.

Founded in 1985, GLAAD discourages stereotypes and misinformation about lesbians and gay men by sponsoring visibility projects and organizing grass-roots response to anti-gay bigotry, particularly in the media.

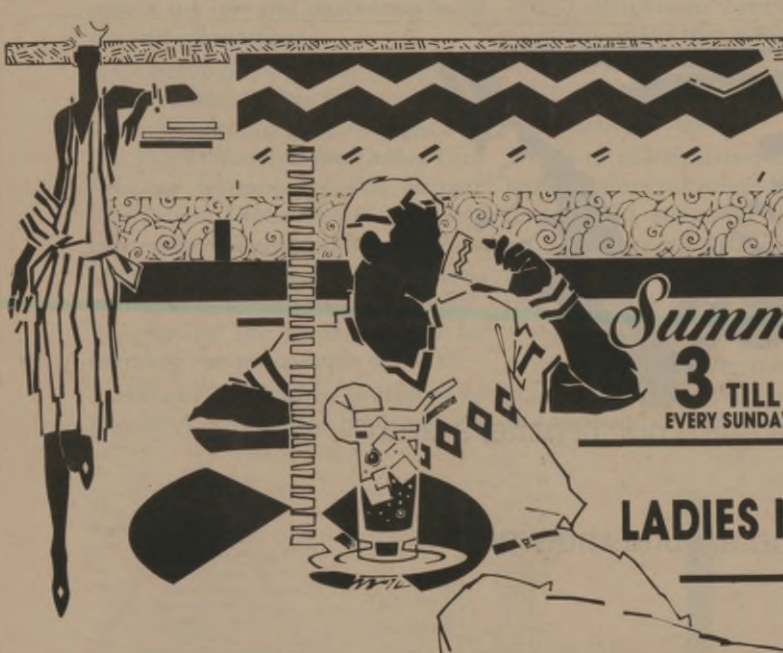

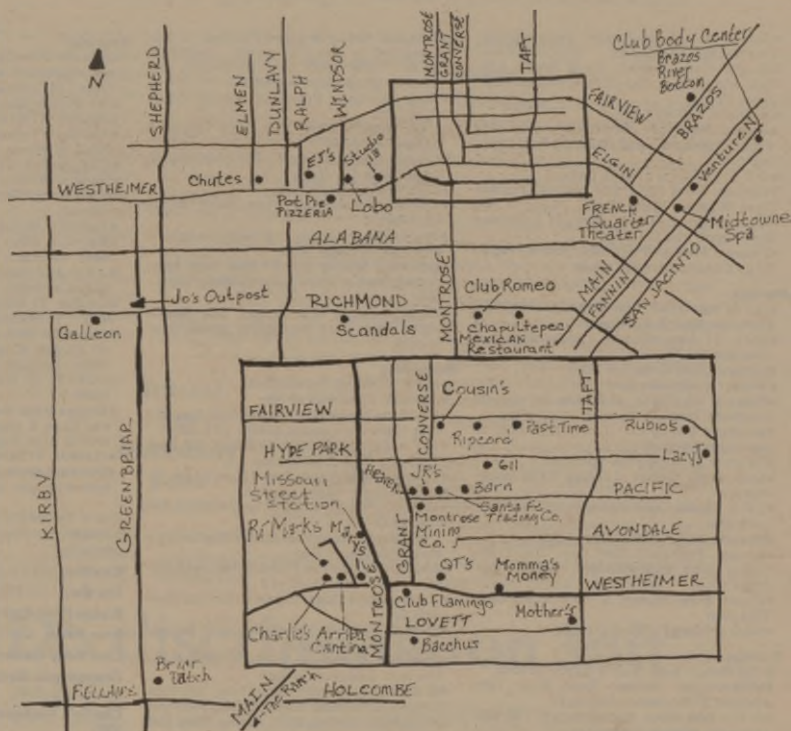

Twenty years since Stonewall, and how times have changed. But how far we have yet to go—just to achieve “equal” rights.

Our biggest obstacle is the same confronted by every minority in the past and present in seeking justice: The general public’s perception of us. A new book, “After the Ball: How America Will Conquer Its Fear and Hatred of Homosexuals in the 90s” by Marshall Kirk and Hunter Madsen, explores the opinions of the great middle America where we are still perceived in all the old stereotypes.

Closer to home, in our old stomping grounds, Dallas County is trying to survey for the prevalence of the AIDS virus and the Dallas Gay Alliance is opposing this survey. The Dallas Times Herald (formerly owned by the current Houston Post owner) editorialized that the gay community should support the survey having the most to gain by learning the prevalence of AIDS.

William Waybourn, president of the DGA, responded this week on

the op-ed page of the Times Herald. Pointing out that the gay community knows all too well how prevalent the disease is, Waybourn also noted the unfortunate truth everywhere that the straight news media have never understood, let alone acknowledged, the efforts of the gay community in dealing with this epidemic.

We deal with AIDS everyday and, as Waybourn points out, the government wants to study it (this was Reagan’s legacy in dealing with AIDS). Waybourn concluded that “unfortunately, they need our credibility to pull off this survey and it’s not for sale—not after having paid for it with our lives.”

One of the Houston Chronicle’s letter writers the other day couldn’t understand spending any money on persons with AIDS, concluding “they” knew the risks and should pay the piper.

Putting aside the basic inhumanity of this letter writer, it also underscores the continuing ignorance of the general straight public about

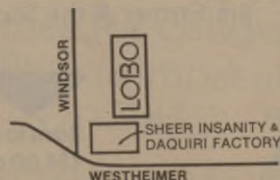
AIDS. Those who are getting sick and dying were, most likely, exposed years ago before anyone knew of the disease, let along the risk.

Twenty years ago we began to tell America that we are here and are truly everywhere. Now we must achieve some understanding as to whom and what we are. We must educate the media. We must educate middle America. Perhaps first we must educate our own families.

It is not enough to leave this to each individual gay man or lesbian. It is not enough to leave it to our various gay political groups. We need a well-organized, well-conceived national effort to challenge the stereotypes and to establish positive gay/lesbian images—a battle plan if you will.

So on this notable anniversary let us plan for the next great battle so that when Stonewall marks its quarter-century we can say that we have engaged the enemy and they are ours. And it is our fervent hope that at that time we shall all be here to celebrate.
