Myrna Loy the movie actress who is suddenly all lit up with a burning desire to reform the world has announced her acceptance of the chairmanship of the Film Committee of the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization which, in the parlance of modern alphabet government, is known as UNESCO.

In this capacity, it will be her responsibility to work with motion picture producers, writers and others in putting out "tolerance" films portraying United Nations ideals, aims and purposes in such a manner as to make this organization's work "understandable to ordinary people."

"Our work is part of the UNESCO mass communications program of educating and informing world opinion about the basic rights of man" Miss Loy beamed brightly to newsmen last week.

In this interview which was given out in Italy where other American film luminaries have recently made headlines, Miss Loy spoke ecstatically of the part she and others of her guild will play in "educating" and "enlightening" the people of the United States and the world about the "cultural" activities of the United Nations.

Miss Loy, of course, hails from Hollywood where Communists and fellow travelers are so thick that the State of California had to set up its own Committee on un-American Activities in order to keep track of subversives in the movie colony.

NIMBLE DANCING FEET ENABLE HIM TO GRACEFULLY SIDESTEP "CIVIL RIGHTS" AND OTHER POLITICAL NIGHTMARES

Approximately two thousand adherents of the left-wing branch of the Democratic Party converged on the capital city of Austin on May 27th to pay homage to vice president of the United States, Alben Barkley, and to consume, among other things, an almost equal number of barbecued chickens purchased for the occasion by the party's state financial chairman who, incidentally, is one of Austin's largest poultry and egg dealers.

The event was largely a duplicate on a smaller scale of the "Jefferson-Jackson" dinner given by Fair Dealers in Washington sometime ago, with the notable exception that Lena Horne was not included among the entertainers at the Austin powwow.

Enthusiasm of the gathering was only slightly dampened by the disconcerting gesture of Jack Porter of Houston who served the vice president a big nice, ripe, red raspberry in the form of a letter presented him on arrival urging him to discuss frankly with Texans the position of his party on FEPC legislation, the Tidelands and repeal of the Taft-Hartley law, and by the rumbling threats of a group of Houston Negroes who, through a typical Fair Deal boner, were invited to the dinner and then instructed not to come.

The vice president, as was to be expected, neatly sidestepped Civil Rights, Tidelands, Taft-Hartley law and most all other issues calculated to stir up opposition in Texas and confined his discussions largely to attacks on Republicans and to the financial condition of the banks throughout the country.

No reference was made to the current investigation of the Amerasia case, of alleged Communists on the payroll of the Federal government, of the thousands of homosexuals said to infest the various departments, of the charges of betrayal of China by Communist sympathizers connected with the State Department or any of the other burning issues which are claimed to be keeping administration officials awake nights trying to figure out a way off the hot seat.

Noticeable among the crowds in hotel lobbies in Austin preceding the dinner were many older politicians of the State who, in 1928, made the hustings ring with their plea for the election of Herbert Hoover over the democratic nominee, Al Smith, but whose minds had evidently blacked out on that particular incident in their political careers as they sounded off about the treachery of graceless Democrats who refuse to support party nominees.

Conspicuous at the gathering also were many perspiring stout ladies milling around and working hard to keep up the illusion that their sex is living up to the tradition of "purifying politics" but succeeding only in leaving the impression, somehow, that what they really wanted most was to get home and take off their girdles.

Those attending the dinner might be roughly divided into several classifications:

The first group was composed of Federal employes who naturally might be expected to regard a twenty-five dollar charge for six bits worth of bull-neck barbecue or tough chicken as a small price to pay for the privilege of feeding at the public trough for seventeen years.

Perhaps the second in number was the large delegation of political lawyers from all sections of the State who have profited financially at one time or another through their share of the legal business which has accrued to the faithful as a result of the increasing amount of red tape enmeshing the citizens' business under New Deal and Fair Deal administration of the affairs of government.

The third group might be said to take in elected office holders, including members of the legislature, who for some reason not clear to the lay mind, seem to consider it as a responsibility of their office and a token of their popularity to be seen at all political gatherings, no matter how far removed from their district or sphere of action.

In fourth place should be listed those earnest radicals with a gleam in their eye and a burning zeal for social reform and who find the Fair Deal set-up a perfect instrument for conducting noble experiments with taxpayers serving as human guinea pigs.

The fifth and last group comprised the rank and file party members who were born Democrats and who are honestly unaware that current national leaders have yanked the rug out from under them so far as the original principles of the party and faith of the fathers is concerned and who may be expected to continue to go along just for the ride.

Another group so small in number as to constitute no special class

TEXANS SHOULD SHOW GRATITUDE TO CLARK

It is rumored that the Honorable Tom Clark who, during the manpower shortage several years ago, was named as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, may come to Texas during his summer vacation and visit in Dallas where he was widely known, before he became nationally prominent, as a trial lawyer in the lower courts of Dallas County.

While in the State, we suggest that the people of Texas should honor him with a series of large-scale entertainments which could be participated in by his wide circle of admirers throughout the State who were highly pleased at his selection as a member of the nation's highest tribunal and who recognize that this appointment by the president was made strictly on a basis of merit.

We suggest that the committee to arrange for his entertainment be composed of a group of oil men who will probably want to pay tribute to his recent efforts in behalf of protection and conservation of one of the State's largest and most profitable industries.

Assisting them should be several hundred teachers who may want to personally express their gratitude to the eminent jurist for his interest in the welfare of the school children of Texas as typified by his concern in the adequate financing of the public school system of the State.

A feature of the entertainment should be a boat ride in the Gulf of Mexico as we feel sure a palatial yacht will be contributed for the occasion by a group of East Texas oil operators whose friendship for the Justice dates back many years.

On this trip an inspection should be made of the tidelands, prized possession of Justice Clark's native State since the days of the Texas Republic.

Following this, he should be taken to Austin to address the law class of the University of Texas on the Rights of States, emphasizing their authority to govern their own internal affairs as set out in the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution, a subject which we understand is very dear to the heart of this illustrious son of Texas.

Tickets to the affair should be sold for one hundred dollars each and the proceeds divided equally into two parts, one half to be donated to the National Democratic Campaign Committee and the other half to a fund to be used in prosecuting violators of the State's oil proration laws.

Some years ago Harry Hopkins, the Rasputin at the New Deal Court, made the assertion that the American people "are just too damn dumb to understand." "Progressive" Republicans And "Liberal" Democrats

Republican senator Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin whose rather broad charges have at least resulted indirectly in stirring up activity which finally brought the notorious Amerasia case back to light after it had been secretly interred five years ago, was severely criticized by seven other members of the Senate recently who are also listed in the roster as Republicans.

The Wisconsin senator was charged by his colleagues with exploiting "fear, bigotry, ignorance and intolerance" and a demand that such tactics be halted was made.

The statement labeled as a "declaration of conscience" by the woman member who read it caused no particular reaction, one way or the other, and was not unexpected as some one of the group had apparently tipped off left-wing newspaper columnists in advance who had publicly intimated it would be forthcoming.

Also those joining in the criticism are regarded as "Progressives," and bear about the same relation to the Republican party as Fair Dealers or "Liberals" do to the Democratic party.

The "declaration" is reported to have met with the approval of Senator Millard Tydings, chairman of the sub-committee investigating Communists on the payroll of the government, and who has such apparent distaste for the job that he practically has to be pushed along with a prod pole every step of the way, like a steer at a stockpen loading dock.

We have always maintained that if an honest and full investigation could ever be had of the administration of the affairs of government under the New Deal and Fair Deal, the resulting disclosures of corruption on a mammoth scale would stagger the wildest imagination and we still think so.

If Senator McCarthy, or any one else, helps to bring such an investigation nearer to fulfillment, we insist they are rendering a public service of inestimable value to the people.

The trouble, however, with any sort of investigation along this line so long as the Fair Dealers are still in possession of the records is that the gesture is more or less futile because the Whitewash Squad of the Administration stands by with their pail and brush ready to cover up the filth as fast as it is raked out of the Augean stables.

W. L. Clayton who recently resigned from the firm of Anderson Clayton Cotton Company of Houston to devote all his time to his activities in behalf of the Atlantic Union, in addressing a meeting of that organization in Washington a few days ago made this astounding statement:

FEARLESS TEXAN SPEAKS UP ABOUT THE BETRAYAL OF CHINA

The following letter was written by Fred T. Spangler of Route 8, San Antonio, to the senior senator from Texas.

We do not know Mr. Spangler but we are reproducing his letter not only because it gives, in our opinion, a clear picture of the betrayal of China, but because it is the frank and fearless type of communication which any American citizen should feel free to address to his representatives in the Congress.

Mr. Spangler assures us, in explanation, that he supports his family of five on a modest salary which demonstrates, he says, that he is not a capitalist, or a feudal baron; which makes no difference whatever to us.

Being a genuine American and never having gotten lost in the labyrinthian maze of Communistic theories which have enmeshed so many citizens in their deadly coils, we like capitalists and the more "capital" they have, the better we like them.

We don't even have any particular aversion to "feudal barons" whatever that means. All our antagonism and vitriolic resentment is directed against enemies of this country, both at home and abroad.

But to get back to Mr. Spangler's letter: Dear Senator Connally:

"Thank you very much for your letter of May 4th in answer to my having urged that our naval units in the South Pacific render as much assistance as possible to help the defeated remnants of the Chinese Nationalists in their "Dunkirk" on Hainan.

"In your reply you stated: 'Acknowledgment is made of your letter of the twenty-fifth instant, with respects to the situation in China. You may be sure that all aspects of this matter are having the considered attention of the proper officials of government.' In a handwritten paragraph you stated—Hainan has already surrendered—the Nationalists would not fight though they had two to one men."

"I have noted your comments, and am of course disappointed. I am disappointed and angered over the consistent policy of a certain faction of our Government officials, well assisted by a left wing press, to convey to the American people: (1) That Mao-Tze Tung and his faction were only "agrarian reformers," "agrarian democrats," etc. (2) that Chiang Kai Shek is a scoundrel, a "feudal warlord," a "corrupt and grafting official," etc.

The results are now plain for all to see. Our defense perimeter in the Pacific has been broken. We have made no effort to stem the Red Flood over Asia—and I speak of China—where this terrible betrayal of the American people has occurred. We have turned over to Russia a vast storehouse of approximately 500 million Chinese, who can be used against us. We have opened all the warm water ports along the Chinese coastline for use of submarines operating out of Port Arthur and the other Russian controlled ports. We have brought Russian operated airfields and equipment up to the front door of Formosa, Japan and the Philippines. We have tolerated outrages perpetrated on American officials in China, which would have been inconceivable twenty years ago. Have we taken a positive stand on the slapping of an American consul in Shanghai last summer? Have we delivered an ultimatum in the Angus Ward case? Have we done anything except to forget the two marines captured at Tsingtao eighteen months ago, and just released by these same Communists? We have made no effort to protect the life savings and investments of American business men in China. We have turned our back on the traditional open-door policy followed by this country for so many years. We have lost face not only in China, but with all Asiatic peoples.

"May I, sir, have the temerity to set a pattern for some future events? Within a few months Formosa will fall. Then shortly thereafter the Communist guerilla bands in South Korea will strike in conjunction with the Russian dominated North Korean army. Korea will fall like a ripe plum in to the Russian basket. The next step will be a revolution in the Philippines by the Hukbalahaps (more "agrarian democrats")—and the Philippine Government will be-

come Red. Japan will then be untenable. Our defense perimeter will then move eastward to a line running roughly through the Aleutians southward through the Hawaiian Islands. And one of the many losses to the American people will be the setting at naught of the magnificent fight by Gen. MacArthur, not only against the State Department's political commissars (yes, Sir, I do know about John Stewart Service and his efforts to complicate and nullify MacArthur's occupation policy in Japan—I was there,) but against the Russian General Kuzma Derevyankó, the Kremlin representative in Japan.

"Even now we could strike back in Asia by utilizing the Chinese Nationalists manpower under close U. S. Supervision. We could demand from Chiang suitable collateral such as a 99-year lease on Shanghai in return for further aid. By operating through the Nationalists, we could adopt the same tactics presently pursued by the Kremlin.

"I note your postscript concerning the failure of the Nationalists to fight on Hainan although having a numerical superiority of "2 to 1." I believe, Sir, that Intelligence sources indicate a rather different picture on Hainan. Do you know that the "Chinese" Communist armies were led by Russian officers? I remember also a situation during the summer of 1949, when the Nationalists armies seemingly disintegrated and handed over their American-made equipment to the Communists. And in this connection I also know about the rather shocking career of Ephram Zenov Liebberman, alias "Michael Lee," and his part in the Chinese debacle while he served in the Far Eastern division of the Commerce Department and caused the withholding of enormous supplies of critically needed materials which never reached the Nationalists.

"You see, Senator Connally, I am not just another letter writer with a vague notion about China. I lived for many years in China and speak the northern dialect very well. I have traveled throughout that country over a period of years. I have learned to know the common man—the coolies—and to have fairly definite ideas about his thinking. And it is not democracy he wants, but a full stomach, peace and sons. He is incapable of grasping the difference between one political philosophy and another.

"And Sir, I also know how much of this tragedy has come about in China. I knew Edgar Snow in China, and his subsequent faithful following in the anti-Chiang line on things Chinese. His position as associate editor of a great American magazine gave his writings prestige, and his years of residence in Asia gave them authenticity. Others who helped in the character-assassination of Chiang and the Nationalists are Owen Lattimore, Nym Wales, Henry Wallace, Louise Strong, Alger Hiss, Lauchlin Currie, Frederick V. Field, Agnes Smedley and many others of the same stripe, too numerous to mention. Right Wing writers have found it difficult to get anything published. Many editors of local papers scattered across the length and breadth of this country have faithfully parroted the Left Wing lies about the Far East. The anti-Defamation League has many editor members.

"George Sokolsky is another real expert on China, who has never been consulted in the formulation of State Department policy regarding China, and whose writings are factual and truthful.

"During the past years I have sent you many letters and telegrams of protest against policies in the process of formulation in Washington. I have protested against the DP Bill as written, and in general I am strongly opposed to special legislation for minorities or by minorities. I am also opposed, and have viewed with alarm the slowly ebbing away of the sovereignty of the American people to a strong Federal Government. Deficit spending and an ever increasing bureaucracy, to say nothing of the theft of the Democratic Party and its principles by the Fabian Planners of this country, have made me fear for the future of my children—in fact, the

future of the children of all our people. The American heritage of free enterprise, the rugged philosophy that security is something which a man created by the sweat of his brow, now seems something of the past. The helplessness of the man in uniform to protest without severe reprisals, and the blackmailing clauses in Federal Housing contracts to achieve the mongrelization of the white race, are sickening schemes which we will emphatically protest at the polls this Fall and again in 1952.

"With the help of God, an aroused and awakened middle class in this country will yet save America."

Most level-headed Americans seem to regard the members of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights as nothing more than a harmless flock of gabbling geese squawking off their excess energy in a loud crescendo of clamor and noise.

But we are not so sure that this analysis is correct.

Young Baylor Students To Fight Communism

The valuable work that is being done by young Bob Slimp of Baylor University of Waco who is organizing "shock troops" on various college campuses to arouse the people against Socialism, is not surprising in view of Baylor's record for fighting Communism inside its own walls.

This policy was instituted by Pat M. Neff, former president of the school who took decisive action years ago when Reds were first beginning to infiltrate schools and colleges, in Texas and elsewhere in the United States.

President Neff carefully went about getting accurate information on the names and activities of a bunch of young radicals who were undertaking to get recruits to their cause lined up.

When he had made a complete investigation, he quietly called all students into an assembly room, read the names of those who were back of the agitation, gave them twenty-four hours to leave the school and then dismissed the gathering. They left, Period.

TEXAS WOMAN CALLS THE SHOTS, AND HOW

Every now and then we have occasion to feel extremely proud of some member of our sex whose reaction to two-timing Washington politicians who try to play both ends against the middle indicates that she knows what the score is and which side has the ball.

We had this feeling in the highest measure on receipt of the following copy of a letter addressed by Magdalene Charlton of Tomball, Texas, to the senior senator from Texas:

"I read in this morning's Houston paper that you stated that you are 'shocked—dazed' by the Supreme Court Decision regarding the Texas Tidelands. May I ask why?"

"Mr. Truman stated in his platform that he would take the Tidelands. That issue and the promise to break down the segregation laws were given prominent play-up in the 1948 Democratic Platform and you supported it.

"For that reason, I fail to see why you should feel any surprise at the results.

If he had been genuinely concerned in writing this theory into law, he would not have waited nearly sixty years to say anything about it.

When he was a soldier in World War I, he never made any mention of his interest in racial equality.

When he was an unsuccessful haberdasher in Missouri, he failed to bring up the subject, so far as any one knows.

When he was a county judge for the Pendergast machine in his native State, it is not reported that he concerned himself in such matters.

When Pendergast sent him to the Senate, no one heard him chirp about equality of the races.

When he was vice-president, he was strangely silent on the subject.

It was only after he became president and decided that he liked the job and wanted to keep it that he suddenly developed a bleeding heart for the cause of political and social equality for Negroes of the South, and, incidentally, for the Negro vote of Harlem and other heavily colored sections of the country.

Wallgren Marches On

Mon Wallgren lost his race for re-election as Governor of Washington in 1948. Ever since his lame-duckship, his friend, Harry S. Truman, has been looking out for him.

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BUREAU OF INTERNAL REVENUE AND CORRUPT PRACTICES

The most disgraceful and depraved example of the abuse of official power yet recorded, in our opinion, can be charged up against the Bureau of Internal Revenue which held that contributions to the Democratic Campaign Committee in which \$250,000 was raised to hold a party in Chicago for Harry Truman were "donations to charity" and, therefore, deductible for tax purposes.

When the court declared that Texas had no title to its tidelands regardless of any pledge the United States might have made to forward annexation, when it held that other sovereign states had no ownership of their own soil, the court remembered the ballots of 1932-36-40-44-48 and was convinced that they would not change.

The law is what the court says it is and the court today is caught in a frenzy of New Deal thinking that pays only lip service to the constitution. The court rules as it thinks the people will vote.

It is the Roosevelt-Truman court that decided the tidelands issue, but neither Truman nor his predecessor would approve a bill to restore the tidelands to their rightful ownership.

No Supreme Court ahead of the present one (in the sense of its general 1938-50 make-up) has held on segregation as this court held on the issue Monday.

What one court has undone for another, still another court can upset for this one.

You still have a chance in 1950 and in 1952. You may not have many more.

Fair Dealers Are Now "Black and Tan" Party

It is reported that the president plans a trip to Texas in October on his way to the West Coast in the interest of the Fair Deal program.

It is said that the recent election of a Republican from Texas has caused him to revise his original schedule and decide to visit the State.

It is also claimed that he is afraid his action in connection with the government taking over property legally belonging to the State of Texas might affect election results in this State in 1952.

What Do You Want to Bet, Mr. Goldberg?

It was announced in CIO headquarters in Washington recently that all Negro-white segregation in the South or elsewhere would be banned on properties owned or leased by the Union.

The order would apply to offices, drinking fountains, washrooms, meeting places and other facilities, it was stated.

The General Counsel in issuing the directive challenged any State or local statute or ordinance which would require the CIO to practice segregation.

The name of the General Counsel who thus set himself above the law in the South and apparently thinks he will get by with it is Arthur J. Goldberg.

At the fifty-third annual convention of the American National Livestock Association held in Miami, Fla., earlier this year, a resolution was adopted warning the people of the rapid approach of the Socialized State and alerting them to the danger to our form of government. The resolution follows:

"There impends today a threat to our country and the freedom of its citizens which so menacingly overshadows the future that we, American cattlemen of all shades of political belief, feel it our duty to speak out in unmistakable terms.

"This threat lies in the fact that our country—without conscious choice on the part of its people—is rapidly and unmistakably drifting toward the consummation of a false concept—the socialized state.

"Tokens of this danger are everywhere and undeniable. The growing power and expansion of wasteful government; the colossal public debt; the heavy burden of taxation; the malicious attempt to substitute an artificial economy for the natural economy which alone can function in freedom; the gradual assumption by the State of financial responsibility for every hazard incident to life—hazards which should be personally met and borne by every human being who has the instinctive will to survive and the inherent impulse to be free; the arraignment of economic and social groups, one against the other, and numerous other conditions and proposals similarly inspired and equally false.

"Government produces nothing and has no means by which to support these false and destructive theories except by exacting from its citizens the fruits of their labors.

"The course the government is now taking, unless it is promptly reversed, must inevitably lead to national bankruptcy. In a vain effort to prolong a specious sense of security, more similar expedients will be applied until we become mere numbers in a completely socialized state.

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That we, the members of the American National Live Stock Association in convention assembled at Miami, Florida, January 5, 1950, reaffirm our solemn conviction that the future health, strength and prosperity of our country depends on the reestablishment and maintenance of free and competitive enterprise and hereby pledge ourselves as individuals and as an association to diligently and actively work towards this objective and toward the defeat of the falacious philosophies that are beguiling our country into socialism."

The next time you see a racial propaganda picture, take down the name of the author, find out who he is and what his affiliations are. For instance "The Home of the Brave" was written by a man who addressed a mass meeting in St. Nicholas Arena in New York October 27, 1949, in behalf of the eleven Communists indicted for treason against this country. You may decide there is something besides "tolerance" and "brotherhood of man" behind the flood of racial pictures being fed to the American public, if you go fully into the background of those who write and produce them.

There are thousands of people in this country more dangerous than Hiss, Robeson and others whose Communist views are well known to the public, yet how many know their names? What university they teach in, what youth groups they head, what motion pictures they direct and produce, what theological school they are connected with, what books they write?

LEADER OF "FIGHTERS FOR FREEDOM" OUTLINES OBJECTIVES OF GROUP

A. G. Heinsohn, Jr., chairman of the Knoxville, Tennessee, division of **Fighters For Freedom**, recently replied to attacks on that splendid organization with a defense that would convince any one except "Fighters For Communism" of the lofty and worthwhile motives of a group composed of responsible citizens in all parts of the nation dedicated to a return of sound principles of government.

Mr. Heinsohn's remarks follow:

"We are glad to reply once more to attacks on **Fighters For Freedom** and in this way bring out into the open the basic conflict facing all Americans today.

"On the one side are those who believe that more prosperity can be had for less effort and our lives made easier if we allow the Government in Washington to plan and direct them for us. On the other side, are those who retain their trust in God and their desire to get along on their own efforts instead of depending upon controls and hand-outs from Washington.

"The issue will be determined by the way Congress votes on new controls. Most members of Congress, regardless of party, will vote as they think the majority of voters in their home district want them to vote. It is the purpose of **Fighters For Freedom** to inform the great bulk of citizens of the dangers that lie ahead and to urge the citizens to act. **Fighters For Freedom** is strictly non-profit, non-partisan.

"To be specific, **Fighters For Freedom** believe the prospect of national bankruptcy is a dangerous thing. This was very truthfully pointed out by Franklin D. Roosevelt when he said, "Any government, like any family, can for a year spend a little more than it earns. But you and I know that a continuance of that habit means the poorhouse." At the present time our national debt is some \$260 billion which amounts to \$1750 for each man, woman and child in America. Those in charge of our Government are increasing this debt every day because they continue to spend more than they take in. If every private home in all the towns and cities of America were sold, the total would be \$30 billion or enough to last these Washington spenders only eight months. If every farmer in America sold his farm, his equipment and his livestock, the total would be \$25 billion, or less than seven months supply at the rate they are spending our money.

"Those who attack us believe that we should not criticize the bureaucrats who have brought us such prosperity and freedom." Our critics are entitled to their opinion. It is our opinion that prosperity does not come from bureaucrats. Prosperity only comes from what we citizens ourselves produce. As for freedom, we have always understood that it was won for us by our ancestors when they rebelled against too much government and too many officeholders from England.

"But, by far the greatest danger is the threatened loss of liberty and individual initiative. A money value cannot be put on these precious possessions. If those in charge of our Government succeed in forcing through Congress, authority to tinker with, or control, wages and prices, commodity allocations, consumer credit and bank reserves, agriculture (Brannan Plan), medicine, and employment, then there will be little liberty or initiative left in America.

Florida Hopes To Bring About Two-Party State

Citizens of Florida before too long may duplicate the feat accomplished in Texas when a Republican, Ben Guill, of Pampa, was elected to Congress, according to William C. Cramer of St. Petersburg.

In a recent address to Florida Young Republicans Mr. Cramer pointed out the penalty which a one-party State must pay and the general decadence which has resulted from the Democrats having a vested right in the presidency.

Asserting that it is from the local level that strength is gained nationally, he called attention to the need for two-party government in all States in order to stem the tide of corruption now flooding the national capital.

Houston Doctor Warns Socialized Medicine Creeping Up On Us

Dr. John K. Glen of Houston, addressing the Group Action Council of the State Medical Association in that city recently, warned that Socialized Medicine has already advanced farther than the average person realizes.

"The question is not whether we want Socialized Medicine, but how far into it, the nation has already gone," Dr. Glen stated.

"Bills subsidizing hospitals and medical scholarships have passed the House and Senate and other bills are now being considered.

"Socialized Medicine is being pushed by people expert at passing laws and there's not much we can do except write our congressmen—or make some political changes."

The Federal government derived almost a billion dollars more in revenue during a six-year period when the individual income maximum tax rate was 25% than it received during a similar period of time under a maximum rate of 79%. The total revenue from individual incomes under a maximum rate of 25% from 1927 to 1932, inclusive, was \$5,297,891,340.90. The total revenue from individual incomes under a maximum rate of from 69% to 79%, from 1933 to 1938, inclusive, was \$4,351,664,316.91, making a total of \$946,227,023.99 more revenue under the lower rate than the higher.

Three years have passed since Congress submitted a Constitutional amendment to the State for ratification which would limit the president to only two terms in the White House. Thirty-six States must ratify such amendment to make it a part of the Constitution but so far only some twenty-three or four have done so. Will it require another tragedy such as thirteen years of the same president in the White House to make the legislatures act?

DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES OF THE SOUTHERN CONSERVATIVE

The following principles on which the Southern Conservative is founded will appear in each issue of the paper hereafter:

Those of us who are responsible for initiating the Southern Conservative plead guilty to the charge of being hopelessly old-fashioned as we love our own country with a blind and passionate devotion, above all others on earth.

We find ourselves without the slightest desire to change our form of government to conform to foreign ideologies or to attempt to re-shape it in the Soviet mold.

We are convinced that those who founded this Republic framed the greatest instrument for the government of men ever devised by human mind.

We wish to deny, before it is made, the charge that we are subsidized by any special interests or that our undertaking is just another scheme dreamed up to attract the support of big business.

In our discussions of State and National issues, we shall show no more partiality to the Tycoons of Industry than we shall to the Czars of Labor.

In fact, we seem to remember that some of the biggest business men in the nation teamed up with labor union racketeers in playing ball with the New Deal when that economic atrocity was riding the crest and have continued to string along with its more vicious counterpart currently administering the government in Washington.

The courage, integrity and patriotism which must be commanded if the Republic is to survive will not be found exclusively among representatives of big business or leaders of labor unions.

It must be drawn from that vast group of average Americans who ask nothing of government except that it secure them in their inalienable right to work, to save and to keep a reasonable share of the fruits of their toil.

We are against the domination of government either by big business or big labor and we maintain that favoritism to either group on the part of a State or National administration is un-American, immoral and a flagrant abuse of power.

As to political affiliations, we acknowledge allegiance to neither of the two major parties.

As presently constituted, both are so shot through with radicalism as to render them incapable of resolving the serious problems confronting the Republic.

We acknowledge our indebtedness to the courageous and patriotic Coalition Block of sound-thinking Democrats and Republicans in both Houses of Congress which has prevented Communistic influences from complete domination of our Federal government.

We are opposed to the reckless squandering of the taxpayers' money by incompetent, irresponsible and improvident public officials and we contend that taxes should be levied for purposes of revenue only and not to punish the rich, reward the poor or redistribute the wealth.

We are firmly committed to the principle of States Rights and we hold that the people of an ypart of the United States are entitled to maintain their own social customs and traditions without interference from politicians seeking oves to perpetuate themselves in power.

We are unequivocally in favor of Free Enterprise as opposed to government ownership of business and insist on the responsibility of every American to seek to improve his social and economic condition through initiative, energy and thrift rather than leaning on the arm of government for support.

We concede to every man the right to work and the opportunity of profitable employment regardless of whether he does, or does not, belong to a labor union.

On the other hand, we claim for the employer the irrevocable right to hire and fire his employees without instructions from any government agency or intimidation by Federal Police.

We feel that at this crucial time in history, it is imperative that newspapers and other groups seeking to influence public opinion should exert every effort within their power to help preserve our republican form of government, our Free Enterprise system and American way of life. We shall exert all our energies to that end.

These are the sentiments of the SOUTHERN CONSERVATIVE and although ours may be only one small voice crying in the wilderness, we will fight for fundamental American principles, as we understand them, without apology to any man or set of men.

Late yesterday I drove with some friends through the beautiful countryside up to Polecat Prairie where I was scheduled to speak last night at the dedication ceremonies of Community Cooperative Cottage, a federally-financed project which was opened earlier this year for the reformation and rehabilitation of delinquent grandmothers.

Following my talk, I was conducted over the buildings and grounds by my good friend, Professor Phineas Flapdoodle, former teacher of sociology at Harvard, who is doing a wonderful job as Executive Director of the Cottage.

I marveled at how well these guests of the government have been able to adapt themselves to their surroundings and it is my feeling that when they have completed the ten-year course which has been planned for them by experts in senile psychology, they will be able to resume the place in society which they occupied before they were led astray by poverty, insecurity and social maladjustment.

On our way home we stopped at another government-operated project known as the Social Service Clinic for Human Welfare where it was my privilege to review the excellent work being done by a group conducting special classes of instruction for emotionally underprivileged and frustrated spinsters.

This planned program of study was set up for the purpose of training mature unmarried women for social service positions with the Federal government.

The maiden ladies enrolling in these classes are found to be particularly adapted to this type of work since they have had no practical experience and no preconceived ideas on the subject and thus can approach their tasks with an open mind.

After finishing this free course of instruction which prepares them for useful service, they are taken to Washington and placed on the government payroll, and from there they are sent out over the country as experts in child guidance, counsellors in marriage relations and authorities on pre-natal care of unwed mothers.

Tomorrow night I have been invited to attend a dinner to be given by the Amalgamated Countries Commission on Mortal Privileges when Senator Blowhard, former Associate Justice Canby Hadd and I will be honored with awards for our services in coordinating the activities of the Malayan Coconut Knockers Union with those of the Associated Stump Pullers Confederation of Saudi Arabia into one compact unit to function as the Committee on Leisure for Laborers.

On arriving home, I found a delegation waiting for me from the Stopper Removers Division of the International Bottle Washers Union who presented me with a medal for distinguished service in the cause of universal peace.

There Is No Fool Like An Educated Fool

James Bryant Conant is the president of Harvard University.

Harvard University is the institution which turned out such stellar figures as Alger Hiss, Franklin D. Roosevelt and hundreds of other politicians of the New Deal and Fair Deal mold.

Last week a report was released in Washington from a sub-committee of the Educational Policies Commission, a body set up by the National Educational Association to issue statements of policy for American education.

The report was signed by President Conant as chairman of the sub-committee and urged the expenditure of public funds for aiding needy high school students in gaining higher education, and especially all "gifted youth" or the top ten per cent in intellectual ability.

The educator in urging this course gave voice to this classic declaration: "The American ideal of a casteless society is endangered by social and educational practices which tend to recruit leaders in business and the professions from so-called upper class families. This system restricts the vocational opportunities of youth from the lower economic classes without regard to individual ability. To the extent that we permit one's opportunities for education and life work to be determined by the social standing or financial means of his parents, we shall move in the direction of a stratified or closed society."

We wonder what he means by a "casteless society" and think that perhaps he is confusing this country with Russia which is the only one so far as we know which boasts this ideal, or even speaks in such terms.

And too, does he mean to imply that if parents have what he considers the misfortune to be wealthy and belong to the upper social class, that they should be prevented from educating their children as potential "leaders in business and the professions" on the theory that only the poor are possessed of character and brains?

Also, we would like to know what is wrong with the system we already have and which has been employed by some of the greatest men in history whereby the "gifted youth" of poor parents gets his education by working his way through college washing dishes, waiting on table or shoveling coal?

Any way, if the eminent head of Harvard who finds it in his heart and mind to advocate such un-American policies is speaking for all educational institutions in this country, we think the best interests of the nation would be served and the cause of good citizenship advanced if all students would forget about higher education and settle for a high school diploma.

ence of Americanism would put this kind of iron in the spines of the people again to the extent that they would rise up, rid the country of gangster politics and clean out the National capital.
