## SCORA kicks off membership drive

SCORA has kicked off its 1981 membership drive, having mailed membership applications—along with ballots to fill vacancies on the SCORA Board of Directors—to all employees and retirees.

Although there's no deadline for returning membership blanks to SCORA, there is a March 31 deadline for employees to get the \$12 per family membership fee paid by payroll deduction. The fee, which is up from last year's \$10 amount (due to inflation), covers membership for a year.

Ballots, which will result in electing four new directors and four alternates, must be returned by March 9.

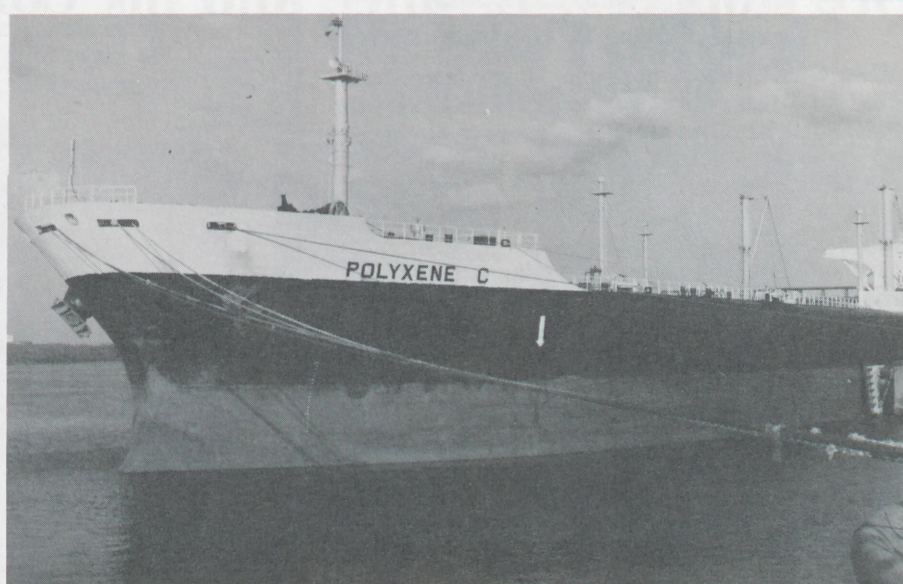

## Polyxene C is largest to dock here

The 855-foot-long Polyxene C, which measures 133 feet at the beam, recently became the largest tanker to ever dock at the Complex last month. Registered in Liberia, the ship delivered 259,000 barrels of crude from Abu Dhabi. But the record for the largest single shipload of crude delivered to the DPMC still belongs to the Singapore-registered Euro Pride, which offloaded over 580,000 barrels of Algerian crude here last fall.

on or before Friday to avoid being squeezed out by a large number of earlier ads.

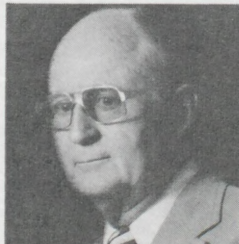
The following are some of the other rules for submitting ads for free publication in the Shellegram.

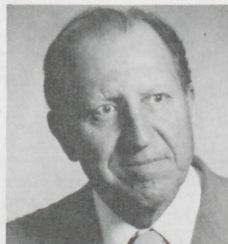

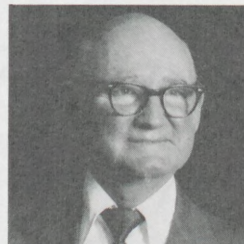

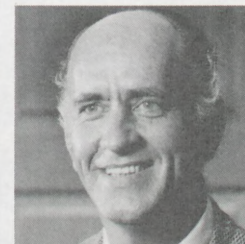

### Fire stoppers: Livanec and his Complex safety prize

When Allen Livanec, mechanic, Maintenance North, picked up a fire extinguisher as his safety prize for DPMC North's million safe hours last year, he thought he'd never get a chance to use it.

But he was glad he had it last week—when a grease fire ignited in the kitchen of his Deer Park home. "It really came in handy," he recalled.

Livanec explained, "The whole thing started when I came home from work and found out my daughter's cat, "Smokey," had been run over. Considering the cat's name, it all seems ironic now.

"Anyway, my daughter and I went out in the backyard to bury the cat. During this time, my wife, Dolores, was cooking dinner on the stove—boiling eggs on one burner and cooking French fries on the other. But she wanted to join us. So, she turned the burner for the eggs off—thinking she was turning off the French fries—and came out to join me in my digging ceremonies.

"I'd just laid the cat in the hole when Dolores looked up and saw flames shooting out of the vent in the roof. She yelled out that the house was on fire. I ran into the house real quick and saw that the whole top of the range was on fire. So, I grabbed my Shell fire extinguisher and put it out.

"The fire burned up the range and the cabinets above it and caused a lot of smoke damage. But the extinguisher proved itself and kept the damage from being worse. I'm going to get another one if I have to buy it myself. But I hope we can hit another million first. I know what my safety prize is going to be."

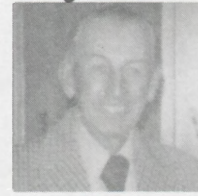
