## UH considering Gulfgate bus service

A direct bus service from the Gulfgate-Park Place area to UH is now being considered by the UH Transportation Office, said Julie Norris, assistant vice chancellor.

"We were told at the end of the summer that the Houston Metropolitan Transit Authority would not encourage or allow a private service that would compete with MTA in the Gulfgate area," Norris said. The Transportation Office is trying to find out if this is just policy of the MTA or if this is an actual legal mandate, she said.

"Our bus service would not be in conflict with MTA's that goes downtown," Norris said.

If there are no legal problems with MTA, then the Transportation Office will begin advertising the new service to discover how many students are actually interested.

"There has been a lot of demand for a service out of the Gulfgate-Park Place area," Norris said, "and if the service is implemented we will ask that the student call in and leave their name so that we can get a definite number of people that will be riding the bus."

Norris said that an estimated 50 to 80 people would be riding the bus from Gulfgate-Park Place area if UH had the service now.

However, the Cougar Car-Go running from Baybrook and Alameda Malls does not seem to

have the same amount of interested students as the Gulfgate-Park Place run may have.

Norris said that there are 33 permanent daily riders on the Car-Go Baybrook and Alameda. "Most of the riders are staff, about four riders are faculty and four or five riders are students," she said.

To spark interest in students, the Car-Go has added a one-day service and a three-day service. These two options began Monday and will be operated through the end of October.

"We will decide if the new programs will be extended into November based on what response we get from students," Norris said. "We're trying to get people to see if they like to ride the bus."

Norris said the reason people are not riding the Car-Go is because, "It is difficult to get people out of their cars. They think they will need (cars) during the day." She also said that the people who are riding the bus will not go back to their cars.

If membership does not increase, though, the Car-Go may not last into November.

"We would have to tell people to go back to their cars," Norris said. "But we might be able to get the 33 people to join a carpool — at least we would have accomplished that," she said.

To keep Car-Go and make it self-sufficient, the membership needs to increase by approximately 50 to 55 riders. A 100-person membership would require switching to buses again,

Norris said.

To find out what could cause an increase in Car-Go membership, the Transportation Office will distribute a questionnaire to students sometime in November.

"The questionnaire will be made up of questions from the Transportation Office and from the MTA," Norris said. The response of the questionnaire will determine long-range planning for the spring, she said.

## Dorm cafeteria survey gives food poor grades

A survey of dorm residents shows many are displeased with the service and the food in the Moody Towers Cafeteria.

The surprising aspect of the survey is the degree of the students displeasure.

Of the 306 people who rated the quality of the entrees, only one person called it excellent, and only 24 called it good. The other 281 rated the food either fair or poor, with most calling it poor.

The results were basically identical when it came to rating the taste of the entrees, with even more responses in the fair or poor category.

The survey was conducted by the Texas Public Interest Group (TexPIRG) on Oct. 8, 9 and 10. Questionnaires were distributed in the Moody Towers cafeteria.

Since that time, the management in the cafeteria has changed, according to Bobby Brownstein, manager of the residence halls. He is out of town and was unavailable for further comment.

The questionnaire asked residents to rate the overall menu in the cafeteria. Again, only one person called the quality and taste excellent. The majority of students rated the menu poor in terms of quality and taste.

Most of the students who answered the survey said they would like to get off the board plan.

The results were even more overwhelming when residents were asked if they would like to see a shorter board plan offered in addition to the current mandatory 20 meals per week plan. Almost 260 said they would like to see the shorter plan as an option.

The residence halls administration has told TexPIRG a shorter board plan would not be much cheaper than the current one. Board rates are established with the assumption that students will miss a number of meals a week.

Over half the people responding to the questionnaire rated the attitude of the servers and employees as poor. Complaints about rudeness were also common in the area of the survey reserved for comments.

One person said she had found a used band-aid in the potato salad. Another described how he had once seen a bug suspended in jello.

The most common complaint was about hair in food, with about one-quarter of the surveys mentioning hair.

TexPIRG members Helen Lynch and Pat Rinaldi said they plan to take the results of the survey to Brownstein.

## Blood donations do not bring sweat, tears

Members of the UH community are having a rare opportunity presented to them this week. They can save a life.

The Institute of Hemotherapy is on the UH campus all this week to promote the annual blood drive. And according to the corporate recruiter for the institute, unless the public comes through, Houston could face a major blood crisis.

This summer's gasoline crisis caused heavy depletions in the blood banks in Houston. Institute officials say regular donors, the lifeline of blood centers, were unable to report during the summer to make donations.

Many people have misconceptions about donating blood. The process takes less than 30 minutes, causes only mild discomfort, and does not prevent a donor from resuming a regular schedule.

Monday, one campus organization donated 128 pints, a little more than one-fifth of the daily requirements of the city. Those donations could serve as many as 1,280 people due to modern technology that separates blood into many components that serve different purposes.

Some professors here have taken steps to promote the blood drive. Drs. Peter Jurtschuk and Henry Shanfield are giving bonus points on tests to students who donate.

But the only real motivation that counts is personal motivation. Not everyone has been unfortunate enough to have a family member involved in a life-and-death situation requiring immediate transfusions of blood. Those who have done so live in the fear that perhaps one day the doctor might have to say there is no more blood.

The only requirements for donating are general good health and a willingness to give. Hopefully, the UC will overflow with those kinds of people this week.

## TEX★PIRG

A staff member of the Public Utility Commission of Texas has proposed an innovative change in Houston Lighting and Power Company's rates which will benefit users of solar energy.

Jeanne Schillaci, an economist for the utility commission, has recommended that users of solar energy receive reduced rates in order to encourage the usage of that benevolent energy form. Public opinion polls indicate that over 90 percent of the public favors increased reliance upon solar power. Ms. Schillaci's proposals were contained in testimony delivered in HL&P's rate increase last week.

The economist indicated the immediate impact will be small, between \$3 and \$7 per month for each of the 500 solar energy users in HL&P's service area. The issue she has raised is a relatively minor part of the rate hearing. But Ms. Schillaci's idea, if accepted by the Commission, would set a major precedent.

She said, at the hearing, "one conclusion which the staff has reached is that the current ratemaking policy, in which the utility's revenue and rate designs are based upon historic, average costs, constitutes an institutional barrier to the use of solar energy."

Increased electrical consumption causes the power company to build new, and very expensive power plants, and to

purchase contracts for fuel at higher prices. This results in higher rates. However, if more homeowners utilized solar power units, then the increased power company purchases would be curtailed, allowing reduced rate increases.

When ratepayers dole out their electric bill payments, they are paying not only for the new costs but for both old power plants and old fuel contracts as well. Thus, the person considering the purchase of new solar equipment who

calculates the way in which it will lower the electric bill gets an inaccurate comparison.

Ms. Schillaci's proposal is to provide a "credit" on the solar user's electric bill which will give them a more accurate comparison of the benefits all rate payers derive from the increased usage of solar power.

A determination on all aspects of the HL&P rate increase request—including the PUC staff's suggestion of a solar power credit—will be made this month.

### Faculty survey issued

## Input sought on pay raises

UH faculty will be asked this week to give their opinion on criteria for merit salary increments.

Dr. Martha Piper, of the Faculty Affairs Committee of the Faculty Senate, said Monday more than 1,200 surveys will be sent this week to faculty members. She said that all faculty members will have received a questionnaire by the end of the week.

The data from the poll will be analyzed at campuswide, college and departmental levels. The information from the 83-question survey will be available to all faculty members and sent to Provost George Magner, who will present the data to the Dean's Council for consideration of future merit increment proposals.

Piper said the data will be used to develop general guidelines for merit salary increments at UH. "The survey will help us see if there are enough generalities to form overall campus guidelines," Piper said. The information also will be useful to colleges to find out if a set of criteria for merit

salary increments can be developed in each college, she added.

The questionnaire asks what criteria should be used in judging teaching, scholarship and service. The poll also asks what importance each of these areas should have.

Among other questions asked is whether faculty members should have the opportunity to contract their objectives with their department chairs and deans at the beginning of the academic year and be evaluated on the basis of reaching those goals at the end of the year. They also will be asked if they should have a minimum salary increment and additional adjustments for those who merit it, an issue which was strongly debated in the last meeting of the Faculty Senate.

Faculty members also will be asked if there should be uniform student evaluations within colleges or across campus, and if a central pool of money should be held at the campus level to insure that highly productive faculty members receive additional merit increments.

Faculty members will be

requested to send back the answered questionnaires by Nov. 5. Piper said the results of the survey should be compiled by Thanksgiving.

Sen. Osmond Ghazzaly, civil engineering, said he was skeptical that the results of the survey will have any effects on the administration. "My experience is that I think that what they (administration) tell the world and what they do are two different things," Ghazzaly said.

He added that a similar survey taken three years ago by the Faculty Senate produced little results. In the last survey most of the faculty question indicated they thought the quality of teaching was considered below scholarship as criteria for merit salary increments.

Piper said the new survey will produce better results because there is more faculty interest in merit salary increments, and because Magner and the others of the administration have indicated interest in the results of the poll.

"The survey will receive very careful review by the administration on our campus," Magner said.

## Students receive credits for courses through UH examination program

Credit by examination enable students to receive credit for subjects without having to take the course.

Yvonne Williams, test program advisor for UH, calls credit by examination, "a reward for the nontraditional student."

"No matter where you learned it, whether it be in the service or on the job, we can give you a test for it and credit if you fulfill the required score," she said.

UH accepts credit by examination for courses in accounting, American history, art history, biology, chemistry, English, French, German, Spanish, mathematics, physics, political science, psychology and quantitative management science.

"We also give out the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) exams," said Williams,

"However, UH doesn't accept all of the CLEP exams. We offer the CLEP exams to anyone, but it is advisable for the student to check out which colleges accept which exams."

Williams went on to explain the test scores were also different for different colleges. "What UH accepts as a score for credit, Texas A&M might not and vice-versa," she said.

UH offers the CLEP test once a month. They are 90 minutes objective tests and results are processed in six weeks. The cost is \$20 per test and "you can take up to five in one day," Williams said.

If a student fails the test, it is advisable for them to wait approximately six months before they take another one, Williams said.

The political science exam is

available any time during any day, Williams said. Cost for the exam is \$18. All of the other Advanced Placement (tests accepted by UH) tests are scheduled and costs range from \$20 to \$27.

"The Advanced Placement tests take place two or three times a month. We plan to have a schedule out by November announcing the exact dates," Williams said.

There are study guides available for each test. "These include sample questions from prior tests," Williams said. "These do give an overall view of the test and you can order them from the CLEP Board."

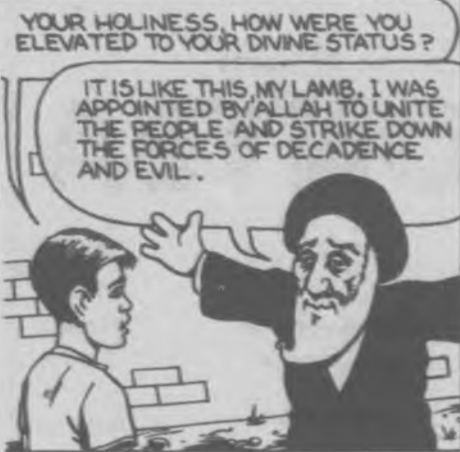

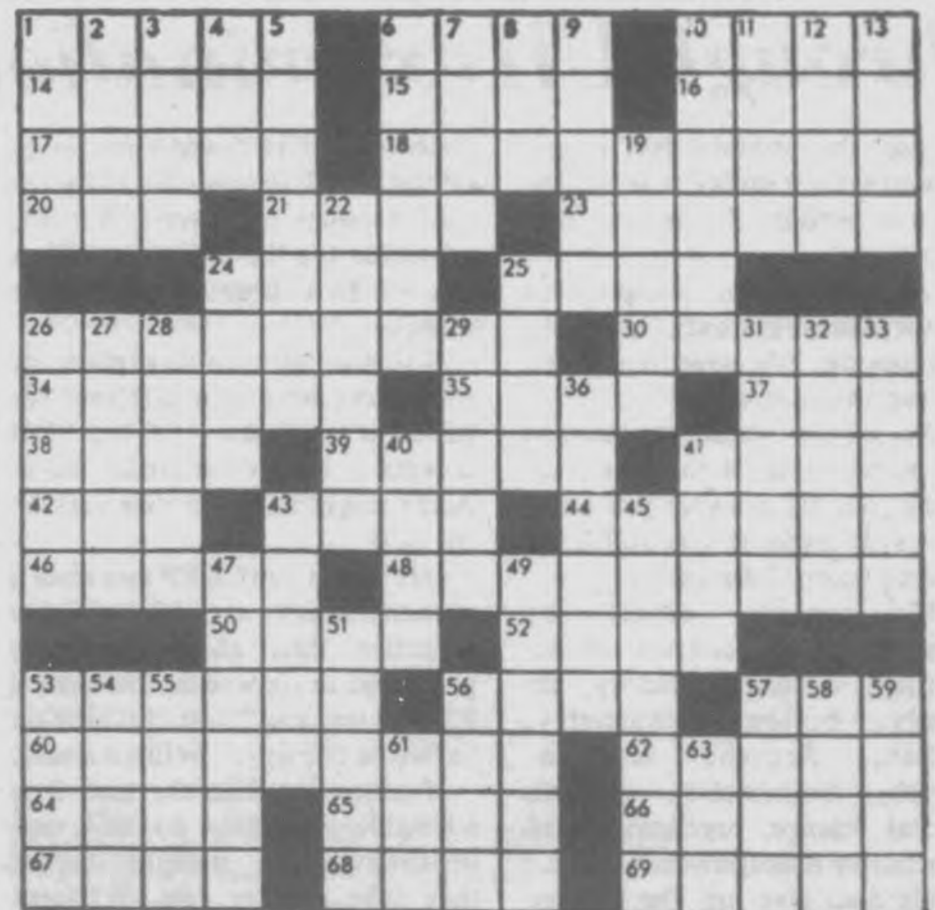

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## Lewis high on new recruits

Coach Guy Lewis' Cougar basketball team's roster won't be in the least bit familiar come Nov. 30 when they open their season against the Arizona Wildcats.

"We've really been looking forward to this year, we feel like we have new faces and a lot of improvement from our returning players," Lewis said. "We had very enthusiastic drills, and it's a good group to work with."

Some of Lewis' new recruits are making the veteran coach smile from ear to ear.

"Every one of our new guys will contribute this year," Lewis said. "Robert Williams and Walker Russell both are outstanding guards. Larry Rodgers is going to be a fine forward.

Brown, I like his looks, and he will play both forward and center. Larry Micheaux will be a very fine center here. And, I like the looks of David Bunce, he gets up and down the floor real well. They'll all contribute.

"It's going to be hard to pick a starting team, I seriously doubt we'll have a starting team in December that will be steady. It will change from game to game," Lewis said.

"The center spot is still our biggest question mark," Lewis said. "I'm not saying it's a weakness, but a question mark. One of these guys must step forward and take charge of the rebounding in one of these games. I like what I've seen so far. I've

The Coogs will continue workouts for three hours every day in Hofheinz Pavillion throughout the month.

## Tuten leads golfers to Braswell win

## SMU defeats UH soccer 2-0

The UH Soccer team lost its first game Saturday, a 2-0 decision to fourth-ranked SMU. The loss dropped the Cougar's record to 2-1-1 and was the first loss in six home games.

A lax Houston defense cost the Cougars two goals as SMU scored twice in the first 10 minutes of play. The shocked Cougars settled down quickly and returned to their game plan. SMU had several good chances in the first half but failed to put the ball in the net.

In the second half, SMU fell into a defensive shell and Houston began to dominate play. Led by Juan Rendon, Houston's fine midfielder, the Cougars controlled play much of the second half. However, UH could not penetrate the tough SMU defense.

UH travels to Austin this

weekend to play the University of Texas. The next home game is Nov. 3 against TCU.

## Blackwell released

(AP)—The Dallas Cowboys placed second-year running back Alois Blackwell on no recall waivers Monday to make room for defensive end John Dutton, recently obtained from Baltimore in a trade.

Blackwell, a second-year back from the University of Houston, had not carried the ball this year.

In his rookie season, the 5-foot-10, 195-pound Blackwell carried the ball 9 times for 37 yards.

Dallas Coach Tom Landry said, "He's a pretty good back. Somebody will get him."

## Counselor's Corner

### Tests help set priorities

The frequently heard refrain, "Testing, testing, one, two, three" heard at the beginning of a public performance is largely acknowledged to be necessary for the success of the program and the enjoyment of all the participants, but at the same time the small exercise in testing is seen to be an irritant and an intrusion. Just as there is a need for testing in the concert hall, in life there is frequently a need for testing to ensure the quality of the performance in a wide range of activities.

While the metaphor could be continued at length, let it for the moment serve as the overture and thus the introduction to a brief discussion of testing. Certainly much of the business of living is testing - measuring, assessing, evaluating, comparing, questioning. For each of us the frequently heard, privately and at times publicly, asked question is "How am I doing? How am I doing as a student, date-mate, spouse, athlete, jogger, son, daughter, mother, father, lover, citizen, budgeter, decorator, skateboarder, dancer, as a person?" The need to know is a part of being human.

The question can be totally unanswerable without a criterion or a norm. In other words the question of "How am I doing?" is first answered by defining the

yardsticks or the measures to be used in making the assessment. For example, "How am I doing compared to my friends?" or "How am I doing compared to some guide for living that is important to me?"

The questions of personal success, meaning, and accomplishment in life will be addressed in forthcoming articles. Here I only hope to help make some better sense of the kinds of testing we are all too familiar with in colleges: Mid-terms, Finals, Proficiency, Placement, Credit, and Admission exams and tests. While all of these are stressful and at times distressing, intrusive and at times burdensome, challenging and at times devastating, imposing and at times demanding, they do afford each of us an opportunity for at least very partial answers to the question "How am I doing?" For instance, "How am I doing compared with others in this Chemistry class?" or "How am I doing in these areas (verbal and quantitative) compared to others seeking admission to a graduate program?" Whatever the test, it will only speak to very small and narrowly defined parts of a total person. To "fail" a test in Chemistry does NOT mean one has "failed" in living-even though it sometimes feels that way.

There is also a need for others to know how each of us is doing. The teacher needs to know if I am gaining mastery of the subject.

The Admissions officer needs to know if I am doing well enough in certain ways to predict that I might master some proposed endeavor.

The test results, then, are invaluable as a tool both for the person and for others. The findings provide partial answers to questions and aid in the process of setting priorities and establishing directions.

Both the person and other consumers of test data have a responsibility to use the findings appropriately. Both also have a common and defined frame of reference for partial answers regarding progress and accomplishment.

In the context of the metaphor offered earlier, tests then serve to help orchestrate the business of living, and as the sound systems in our auditoria are helpful despite their imperfections, testing also helps. As a final note drawn from the metaphor, when there are problems in the sound systems there are engineers who can help; so also when there are problems in the testing processes, there are professionals who will seek to help.

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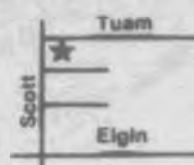

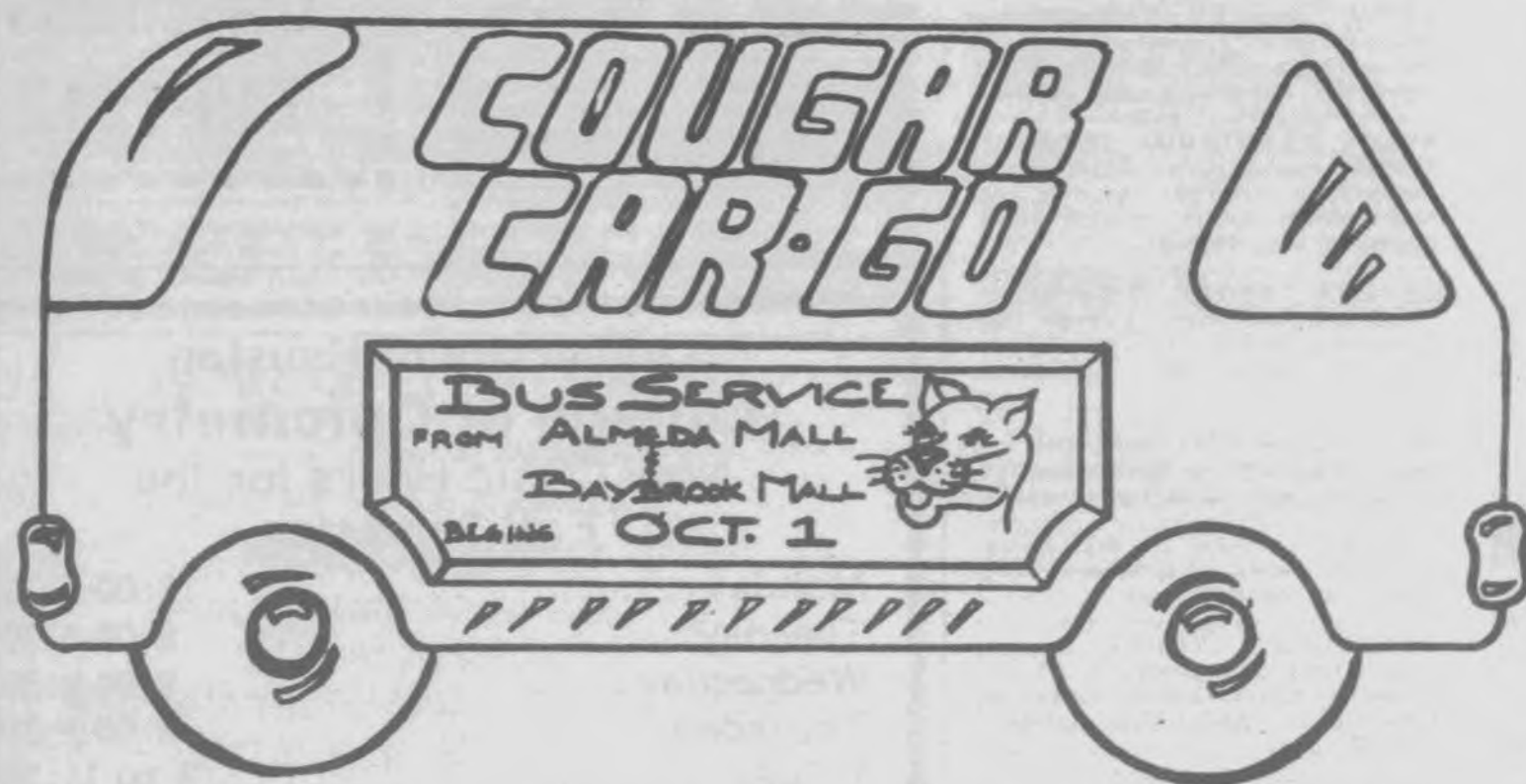

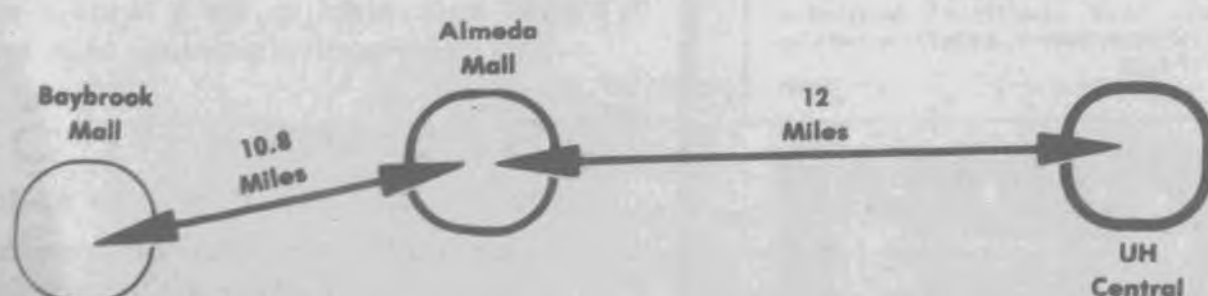
