SPECIAL APOLLO VIII SOUVENIR ENVELOPE
BEING PREPARED FOR STAMP COLLECTORS

C. F. Stebbins, Dispatching, is one of the Refinery's stamp collecting enthusiasts. He reports that the special souvenir envelope from the Apollo VIII flight will be issued, and felt that possibly other Refinery stamp collectors would be interested in the issue.

NASA - Manned Spacecraft Center Stamp Club has announced plans for publishing a souvenir envelope to coincide with the issuance of the Apollo VIII commemorative postage stamp on May 5, 1969. The envelope will carry a printed inscription noting the dates of the Anders-Lovell-Borman flight and the first manned lunar orbit on Christmas Eve, together with a four-color facsimile of the Apollo VIII insignia.

The stamp, which depicts the now-famous photograph of the Earth as seen from the Moon, will be affixed to the envelope and canceled at special first-day ceremonies to be held in Houston. Collectors desiring to acquire these cacheted first-day covers should write to Manned Spacecraft Center Stamp Club, Post Office Box 58328, Houston, Texas 77058, enclosing 35¢ for each souvenir cover (or \$1.00 for 3) together with a self-addressed 9½-inch return envelope carrying sufficient return postage (6¢ for each 3 covers ordered).

Further information on special service for collectors' or dealers' requirements will be furnished on request, provided a stamped, self-addressed envelope accompanies the inquiry.
