Debbie Bradley, secretary, Olefins: "I guess I'm thankful for my family's health. I'm also glad my son, Eric, is doing well in first grade."

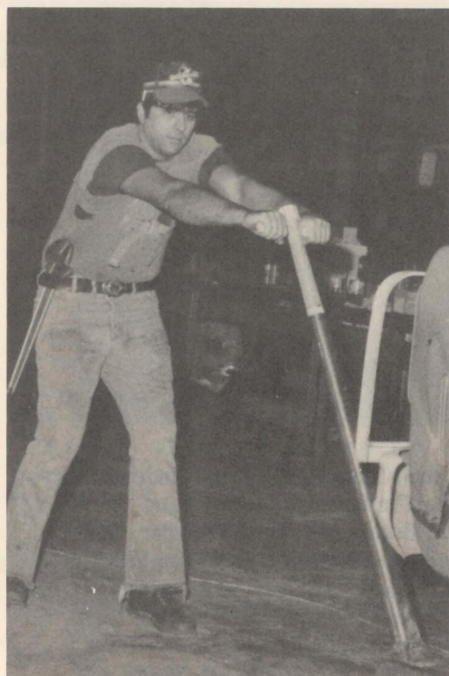

Safety training program presented at Astro Village

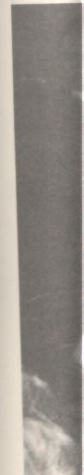
The DPMC held its second industrial health and safety training program Nov. 10-14 at Astro Village for members of the two Health and Safety Committees and other employees.

Open house slated at Docks

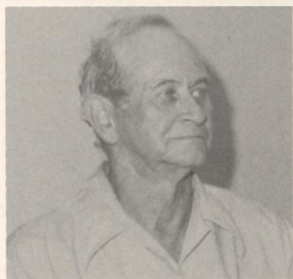
