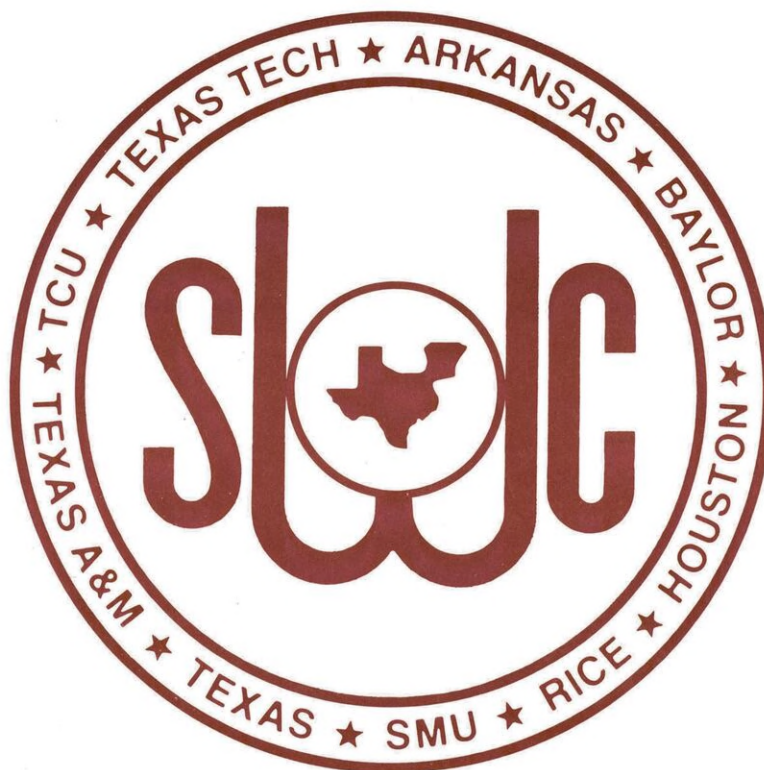


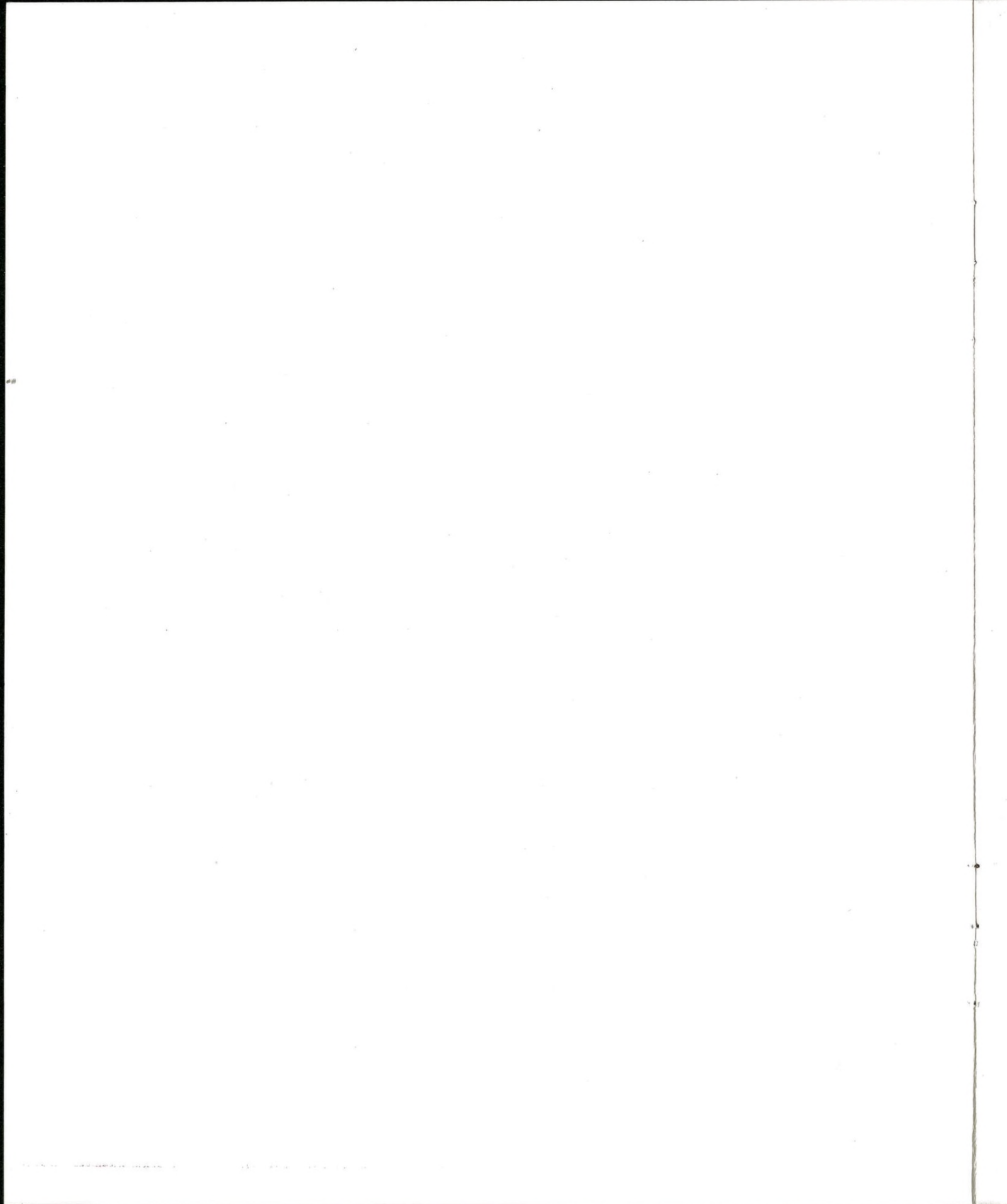

PREVIEWING THE MEN'S RACE

The 69th annual men's Southwest Conference cross country championships promise to be as exciting as ever with two teams ranked in the NCAA top 20 and two others receiving enough respect to receive votes in the poll.

The NCAA top 20 poll on October 18 finds pre-meet favorite Arkansas in a very familiar position - - among the nation's elite in men's cross country. The Razorbacks are ranked No. 2 in the nation and are defending Southwest Conference and NCAA cross country champions. Coach John McDonnell's Hogs received one first-place vote in the poll and accumulated 323 points, just 16 behind top-ranked Wisconsin. The Longhorns of the University of Texas are ranked No. 8 in the nation with 204 points. Not making the top 20 but also receiving points in the poll were SWC meet host Houston and Rice.

No team has dominated the post-1950 SWC Championships the way that the Arkansas Razorbacks have. The Hogs will be looking for their 15th straight SWC title. Texas in 1973 was the last team other than Arkansas to capture the SWC's men's cross country title. Texas did own a longer streak during the 1930s and 1940s, as the Longhorns claimed the SWC men's title 17 straight times from 1931 through 1947, sharing the title with Texas A&M in 1933.

Arkansas is 4-0 in 1988 and owns an 18-meet winning streak dating back to the 1985 NCAA Championships in Milwaukee, Wis., when the Hogs finished second. Arkansas has not lost a regular-season cross country meet since a season-opening setback to Oklahoma State in 1984. That is also the Hog's only regular-season loss since 1976.

The Razorbacks return four of their top five finishers in last year's SWC Championships. Those five runners all finished in the top 11 in the race. Junior Ruben Reina and senior Chris Zinn have led the Hogs this season and are looking to do so again in the 1988 SWC Championships. Richard Cooper and Alex Hallock add experience and depth to the squad, who could very well place all five runners in top finishes.

"We're not as good as we were last year," said Arkansas head coach John McDonnell. "You can't lose a (Joe) Falcon, (Matt) Taylor and (Doug) Consiglio and expect to be good. Chris Zinn and Reuben Reina are much improved over last year and Richard Cooper is running good. But, Texas also is a much improved team from last year.

"Last year Rice ran a great meet to finish second. But, this year I really don't see anybody but Texas and us for the team title."

The team most likely to challenge the Hogs for the title is Texas. The Longhorns feature two runners who have consistently placed high all season long. Texas' Harry Green is the defending SWC individual champion. He and teammate Jeff Cannada have alternated victories all season long and appear to have the inside track for individual honors.

"It's going to be tough," said McDonnell. "Texas ran really well at Iowa State (site of the 1988 NCAA Championships). It was a very tough field and they finished fifth with 188 points. The winners only had 86, so Texas was very close. They will be tough to beat."

Houston and Rice are the two squads that could battle the Hogs and Horns for a high finish. Houston has a host of senior leadership and experience. The Cougars are led by Pat Picciano, who has had a strong fall and could contend for high individual honors. Jim Thorpe, Jeff Davis, Matt Fontaine and Monico Rivas have also ran well this season and could lead the Coogs to a high team finish.

"Our squad is running well as a team," said Houston head coach Howie Ryan. "Pat Picciano is running very strong. And so are our second through fifth guys. I hope that we can compete strong with Texas and Arkansas and maybe pull off an upset. We will have to have a great team race, though."

Rice is led by seniors Sean Wade and Lance Benedict. Wade led the Owls throughout much of the fall season, while Benedict ran well in the Texas A&M Invitational on October 20. If the Owls can get good production from their next three runners, they could surprise a few people.

SMU, with Tim Gargiulo as an individual favorite, Baylor, Texas A&M, TCU and Texas Tech all have good chances of high individual finishes. Any runner could break-up the lead pack and make the team title a very interesting race.

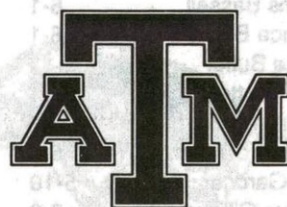

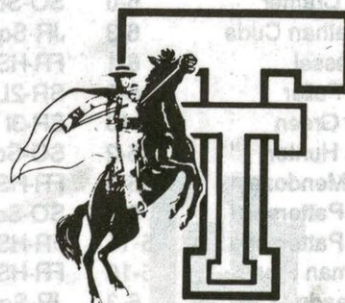

PREVIEWING THE WOMEN'S RACE

The seventh annual Southwest Conference women's cross country championships could prove to be "Showdown II" between two teams that will most certainly be among the nation's leaders in the NCAA Championships.

The University of Arkansas and the University of Texas have met one other time this season, at the Stanford Invitational in Palo Alto, California. The Lady Hogs turned in one of their best performances of the year as they upset the Lady Longhorns by one point, 67-68. Aisling Ryan ran a 5,000-meter time of 17:25.2 to take second-place ahead of third-place Eileen Ellig of Texas, who posted a 17:32.9.

The Lady Longhorns are considered by many to be the top team in the SWC, as they are ranked sixth in the October 18 NCAA top 20 poll. However, Arkansas, who is ranked 20th in the poll, has obviously proven that they can compete with the Longhorns.

Texas is the three-time defending SWC champion. The Lady Longhorns shared the title with Houston in 1985 and won the championship outright in 1986 and 1987. Since the first SWC women's championship meet in 1982, only two schools have claimed the championship -- Houston (1982-83-84, co-1985) and Texas.

The Longhorns lost three of their top five runners from a year ago. Junior Eileen Ellig has led the squad this fall and appears ready to take over for the departed 1987 champion Trina Leopold. Seniors Tracy Laughlin and Sheila Quigley could finish strong to break up the Arkansas runners and help the Lady Longhorns post a high team score.

"I think this will be a critical race for us this season," said Texas head coach Terry Crawford. "We consider Arkansas to be the favorite. They are coming back with a veteran team. We have a young team, one that really hasn't jelled yet.

"It is critical in seeing the team jell at the conference meet and the District IV meet and in qualifying for nationals. We will need to run our very best to beat Arkansas, better than we have all year."

Arkansas head coach Bev Rouse's 20th-ranked Lady Razorbacks have been hampered by illness the last couple of weeks. Sophomore Aisling Ryan, who placed third last year, has been sidelined the last two weeks with a bacterial infection and her status for the SWC meet is questionable. Also, seniors Sally Ramsdale and Jackie Mota have also been slowed by flu-like illness.

"I would say that Texas is the favorite," said Rouse. "We just need to get healthy. If we're at full strength I think we can give Texas a run for it. But, it's questionable whether we'll be at full speed.

"If we can put our whole team together, we can contend. But, we've only had all seven healthy for one meet this season (Stanford, where Arkansas finished first, beating Texas by one point)."

Much like the men's race, the teams that have an outside shot at upsetting the top two teams are Rice and Houston. Each has quality number one runners. It just depends on how strong the number two through five runners can finish.

Houston's Carmen Maldonado has led the team all season long. She has finished at the top of each race this season for the Cougars. Maldonado and junior Nanette Garcia appear able to lead the Cougars to one of their most successful SWC meets in the last few years. The Greenwell twins, Donyale and Rochelle, who qualified for the NCAA Championships last season, and Angela Stearns should round out the next three scoring spots on the squad.

"Carmen has ran well for us all year," said head Houston coach Diane Howell. "She has been consistent and focused and I expect her to continue to perform well.

"Nanette Garcia has been sick and has had a few nagging injuries, but by the conference meet I feel like she can compete with the leaders. Our next three runners all have to run well for us to have even an outside chance of upsetting Arkansas or Texas."

Rice's senior Kirsten Aure and sophomore Julie Jiskra have been the top performers for the Lady Owls this season. Aure was second on the Owl's squad last season in the SWC meet as she finished sixth behind Pam Klassen's fourth-place finish. Senior Michelle Barz finished 14th in last year's meet and Jiskra finished 20th for the Lady Owls.

Any number of teams could break out of the pack and challenge for high individual finishes. Texas A&M, Baylor, SMU, TCU and Texas Tech all possess good runners who could break out from the pack and make a difference in the final team totals.
