People like these, whom you will probably never meet, are the ones who really say "Thanks for a job well done".



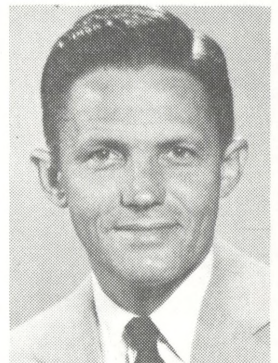

U. S. REFINERY MANAGERS IN CANADA

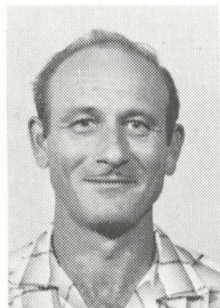

L. F. KING ELECTED TO BOARD OF COATING SOCIETY

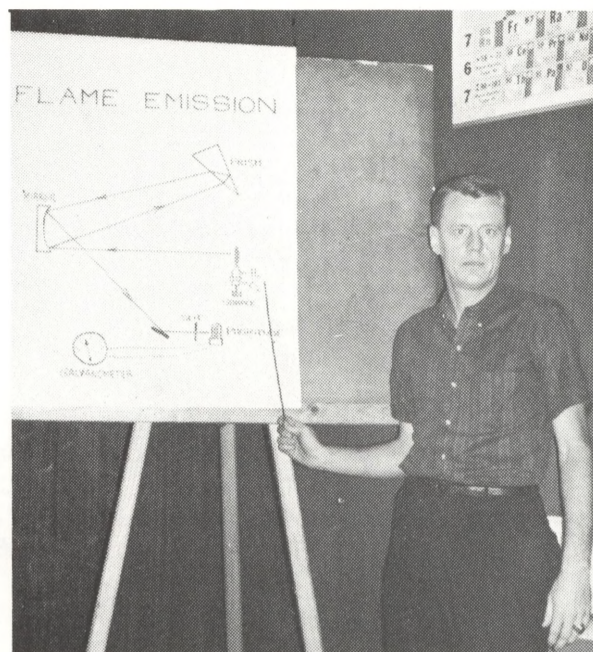

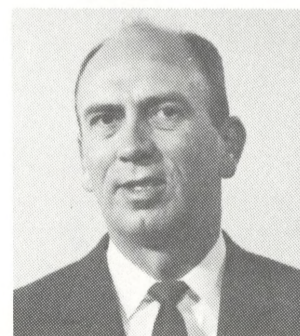

By operating through various relay stations, she can contact any Shell location in the country. It is not unusual for her to receive cables from Amsterdam, Holland, through our relay station in New York. "It's a very reliable instrument ordinarily", she said, "but Hurricane Carla knocked it out of service for a whole week". While it takes constant alertness, hard work (1,500 to 2,000 messages per month) and the speed of a skilled typist to operate the machine, she likes the work very much. One "fringe" she mentioned is that she is always the first to know the latest weather and the new Equity Fund and Shell Stock Fund quotations.
