Teens apparently think gay people are a threat

PRINCETON, N.J. — What do America's "straight" youths think about gay people and their employment? They generally think the same as their parents, reports the Gallup Poll in a "youth survey."

Teenagers, says the Gallup people, would much rather see a gay person behind a sales counter than behind a pulpit and are less bothered by seeing homosexuals in the armed forces than by seeing them as doctors.

Sixty-three percent of the 1115 teenagers polled said it was alright with them if gay people were employed as sales clerks, 55% gave approval to armed forces service, 48% for teaching college students, 42% for teaching high school students, and 37% for teach elementary school kids.

Only 39% thought it was OK for homosexuals to serve as preachers and ministers and just 38% thought it was OK for gay people to be doctors.

Generally, girls had a slightly more tolerant view toward gay

people than boys did. And the students with the higher academic standing had the more tolerant view. (The most prejudiced students were the ones with the lower grades.)

Quoting some examples, the Gallup Poll said they were told by a sixteen-year-old girl from Elizabethtown, Ky, "I just don't see what difference a person's sexual life has to do with their job competency. Of course, if they paraded their homosexuality — you know, made a big deal of it publicly — I'd just as soon not have them teaching little kids."

An eighteen-year-old boy from Portales, N.M., obviously under the impression that gay people are out to recruit children, says, "They just give me the creeps. I guess it's all right for them to be in sales, but keep them out of anything that involves teaching and/or preaching, for that matter. Those kinds of jobs give them too much of an opportunity to try to teach kids their way of life." ●

Columnist Ann Landers position unchanged on homosexuality

NEW YORK — National advice columnist Ann Landers views on homosexuality remain unchanged, despite new findings by sex researchers Masters and Johnson, she reported in her syndicated column of June 4.

"My position is unchanged and I shall repeat it: I believe homosexuality is a dysfunction — a deviation from the normal. In my opinion, given a choice (this means the person is not in a penal institution or otherwise isolated), the 'normal' person

will select as the object of his sexual expression a member of the opposite sex," she wrote.

"Those who prefer as sexual partners members of their OWN sex have a psychological problem," she added.

"Many homosexuals, however, are well-adjusted, productive members of society. They are rarely molesters of children and should not be denied employment on the basis of their sexual preference," Landers wrote. ●

GPC prez complains at City Council

HOUSTON — Gay Political Caucus president Steve Shiflett addressed City Council June 6 to protest the fact that no known gay people had been appointed to the Police Advisory Committee for Continued Improvement.

The committee was created the week before to foster better communications between the police department and the community. The groups named to put a representative on the committee did not include any gay groups.

Councilman Frank Mann made unfriendly remarks during Shiflett's speech. The Houston Post reported Mann as saying, "I believe if some of these homosexuals and queers would leave some of these young people alone and quit trying to brainwash them maybe they could stay clear of the police."

Mann urged Shiflett and the other gay representatives to "tend to your own business behind closed doors," saying, "I just want to let you know that as far as human rights are concerned there is also moral responsibilities."

Mann stated, sarcastically, that since some people contend that ten to 25 percent of the population is homosexual then four of the committee's 21 members also could be. Therefore, said Mann, there is no need to have a representative from a gay group.

Mayor McConn responded to this and said he doubted whether any of his six unannounced appointees to the committee would be homosexuals "as far as I know."

(Paul H. Gebhard, director of the Institute for Sex Research in Bloomington, Ind., estimated earlier this year that at any one given time, approximately four percent of the male U.S. population is predominantly homosexual and approximately 1.5% of the female population is. This works out to be an average of 2.75% of the overall population. Using this percentage, there is only a 58% chance that one of the 21 committee members is gay.)

Houston police chief Harry Caldwell said June 1 the he blocked participation by some "advocacy and political" groups in the 21-member advisory committee.

However, officials of the Houston Council on Human Relations, which helped set up the committee, cast doubt that Caldwell actually exercised a veto over membership in the committee.

Caldwell said they were seeking groups that could present ideas from a broad section of the community and organizations concerned with "community service."

Howard Wolf, president of the Houston Council on Human

Relations, told the Houston Chronicle that they were looking for organizations that "have a sincere interest in the welfare of this community."

Wolf said he did not know why gay groups were not included among the fifteen organizations. Wolf said he didn't recall that specific question being raised during the formation of the group.

Shiflett responded to that with, "I think this committee is a complete whitewash of the problem."

Shiflett told the City Council June 6 that "the Gay Political Caucus is shocked" that not one gay community organization representative is on the committee.

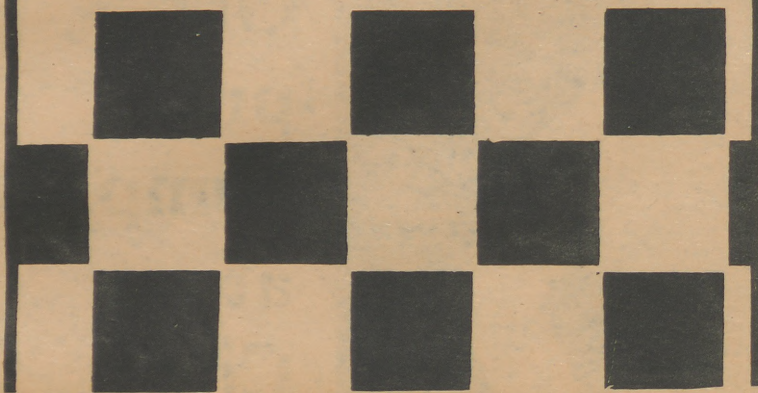
"It is our second glance at this situation that has brought about the possibility that maybe this committee is simply another apologetic group that will end up a fraud and a community whitewash. After all, it has no funding with which to do anything yet," Shiflett told the council members.

"It has been also suggested that only because the U.S. Civil Rights Commission is in town was this committee created. The very fact that we were not among the fifteen organizations is why we have to go to the U.S. Civil Rights Commission," Shiflett stated. ●

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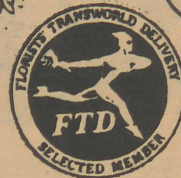
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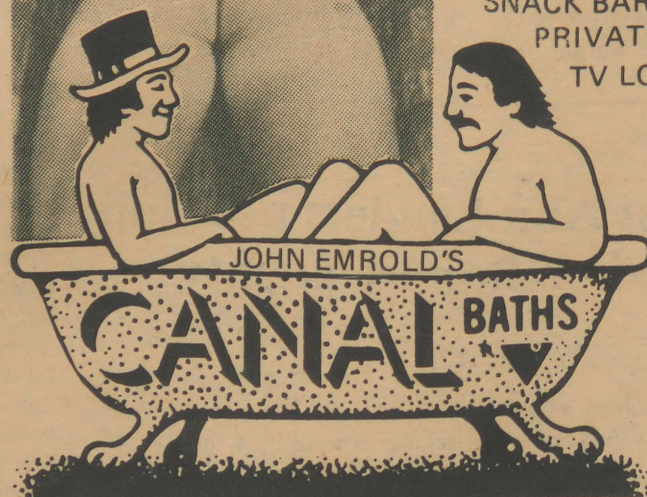
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Here's latest data on the "gay planet"

WASHINGTON — Science magazine has just published the latest findings from Voyager I on the gay planet.

(What? A gay planet? Where did that come from?, you ask.)

Well, actually, the planet's not gay, and, technically, it's not a planet, but it's the closest we've got.

Ganymede is the largest of Jupiter's twelve-or-so natural satellites, or moons. And all of Jupiter's moons were named for Jupiter's (Zeus') lovers in Greek mythology.

There's Callisto, Amalthea, Io, etc., all females. And then

there's Ganymede, who was supposedly a young, virile Greek warrior, and the male lover of Zeus. So there.

Now, how do we get off with calling Ganymede a planet when it's just a moon of Jupiter? Because Ganymede is relatively large — larger than the planets of Mercury or Pluto. So it's just that it happens to be in orbit around another planet instead of around the sun.

Science magazine reports that Ganymede appears to be made up of a mixture of rock and ice with abundant small and medium sized shallow craters.

Much of Ganymede's brownish surface is marked with closely spaced, shallow grooves.

A striking fact about Ganymede, reports the magazine, is that there is an absence of large basins or mountains, indicating the icy surface cannot support massive structures.

Voyager II is now flying past Jupiter and should be yielding additional information. ●

Report says it may be hormones that determine sexuality

BOSTON — The common idea that environment, not hormones, shapes adults' sexual preferences is being disputed by a study that shows teenagers' glandular secretions play an important role in establishing their personal identity as men or women.

"Our data shows that environmental or sociocultural factors are not solely responsible for the formation of a male gender identity," the researchers wrote. "Androgens make a strong and definite contribution." Male sex hormones are called androgens.

The study, conducted by researchers at Cornell Medical College, was published in the New England Journal of Medicine.

The report, published May 31, could have an important impact on the debate about whether glands or upbringing shape a person's sexual preference.

The scientists studied nineteen male pseudohermaphrodites, people who have the male hormone testosterone but be-

cause of a prenatal deficiency are born with female sex organs. All nineteen live in the Dominican Republic.

All were raised as girls but after puberty, their sex organs became more masculine, and eighteen of them began to think of themselves as men.

"A male gender identity gradually evolved over several years as the subject passed through stages of no longer feeling like girls, to feeling like men and, finally, to the conscious awareness that they were indeed men," the researchers wrote.

Dr. Julianne Imperato-McGinley, one of the researchers, added, however, that environment probably has an important influence on adult sexual preferences.

Sex researchers Masters and Johnson, in their recently-released study on homosexuality, stated that sexual preferences were determined by environment, saying that people are not born homosexual or heterosexual; they acquire one or the other. ●

Civil Rights' public hearing postponed

HOUSTON — The U.S. Civil Rights' long-expected "public" hearing into alleged questionable practices of the Houston Police Dept. has been delayed — again.

However, a hearing scheduled June 12 was still to be conducted. This is a documentation hearing, said Gail Gerebenics, the commission's assistant general counsel.

Gay Political Caucus president Steve Shiflett was supposed to appear at the June 12 hearing. He said he would submit "no less than one hundred cases, all of which include verbal abuse of gays, with many involving physical abuse that resulted in hospitalization, bruises, broken bones or stitches."

The abbreviated hearings

were expected to include Shiflett's testimony and documents.

Gerebenics is leader of a commission team which has been in Houston gathering information for weeks. She said the commission will receive

documents from not only Shiflett, but other groups, including the police department itself.

The new "full-scale, public" hearing will be rescheduled for another date, at least a month later, she said. ●

High school "prom" held at gay bar for seventeen-year-old

BOSTON — Paul Guilbert finally got to go to a prom, and he got his choice of dates, even through the prom was held a month late at a Boston gay bar and not at

his high school in Rhode Island.

But the seventeen-year-old gay youth did get to take his date, 22-year-old Eddie Miskovich, to a prom after all.

Boston's Gay Committee for Gay Youth feted Guilbert and Miskovich at a "Gay Prom" in the downtown Boston bar.

At the "prom," attended by about 100 young men, Guilbert drew cheers when he said, "I really wanted to go to my high school prom because gays have every right to go with whoever they want as every other student has."

But Guilbert had to abandon his fight to take Miskovich, a Brown University student, because he is a minor and his parents objected. The objection was accepted by the school

board as its final word in the matter.

However, Guilbert promised, "I plan to do the same thing next year. If they refuse me, I will be eighteen and this time I'll take it all the way in the courts."

Bar proprietor Gary Dotterman, who charged \$5 per couple admission to the celebration, decorated the bar to conform to his idea of a prom. Blue and orange streamers festooned the X-rated murals on the walls.

"This is the prom I never had," said a 28-year-old draftsman. "On prom night in high school I sat at home."

His companion, a 27-year-old construction worker, added, "At my prom I tried. I took a girl, did the whole bit. It was the most miserable time of my life." ●

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Penn. House condemns pro-gay Governor

HARRISBURG, Pa. - The Pennsylvania House voted 180-14 May 31 to condemn Gov. Dick Thornburgh for designating a statewide Gay Pride Week June 24-30.

Rep. Clarence Dietz, who

introduced the resolution, sponsored a similar resolution in 1976 castigating former Gov. Milton Shapp for issuing a similar proclamation.

The proclamation encouraged people to break state law, the lawmakers claimed.

The harshly-worded resolution said that deviate sexual intercourse "has always been a serious crime" in Pennsylvania and is punishable by imprisonment and a fine. The resolution said Thornburgh's proclamation honored "sexual deviates." ●

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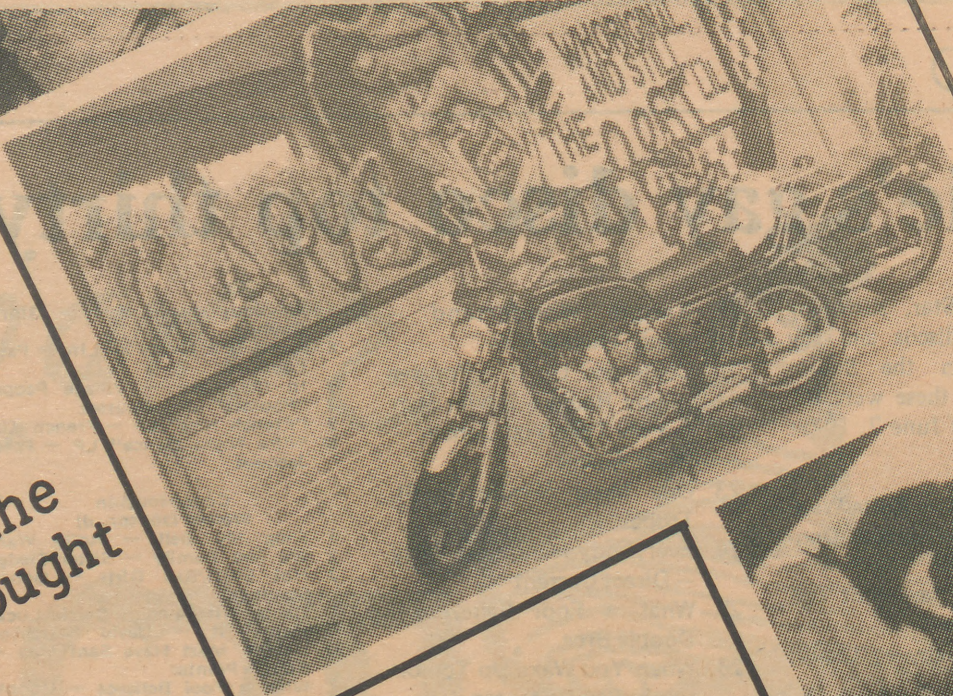
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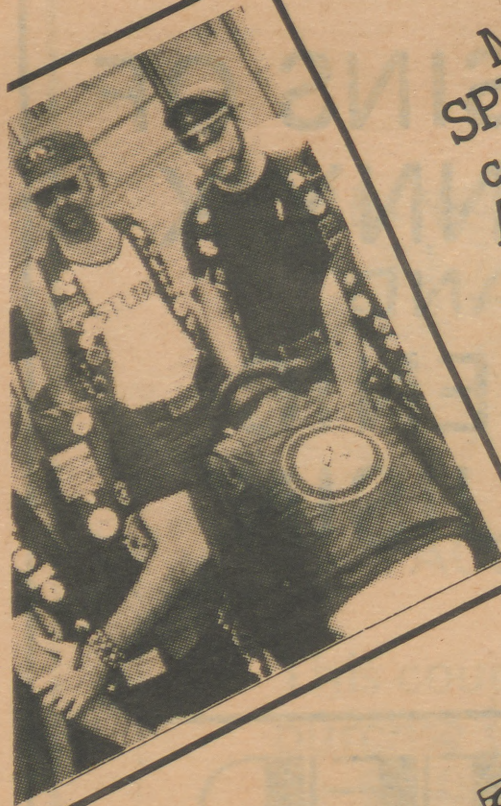

Pro-gay U.S. Rep. Leland to host "Open House" Sunday

HOUSTON — Sunday, June 10, 2:00 to 6:00 p.m., U.S. Rep. Mickey Leland will host his first "Open House, Bazaar and Street Festival," at his community office, 4101 San Jacinto.

Leland, a Democrat representing portions of Houston, including Montrose, was recently called "one of the most committed members in the House of Representatives to gay civil

rights" by Steve Endean, the executive director of the Gay Rights National Lobby.

The Gay Rights National Lobby has secured almost fifty cosponsors on the federal gay civil rights bill, H.R. 2074, including Congressman Leland. However, Endean explained that many members cosponsor to indicate support but just don't have time to actively

work on the bill.

"If all of our cosponsors were as committed to working to advance the bill, we would be far ahead of our current pace."

Endean's comments came following a meeting between the two to explore plans to advance the legislation. "Congressperson Leland indicated not only a willingness, but an eagerness to work to advance lesbian

and gay civil rights at the national level. He will work for the bill by talking with

other members of the Black Congressional Caucus, by

talking with other first-term members, by assisting gay

rights advocates in gaining support from minority orga-

nizations such as the NAACP and the Leadership

Conference on Civil Rights, and by continuing to work with the GRNL in a wide variety of ways."

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Councilman Mann calling names again

Houston City Councilman Frank Mann did it again. He broadcast his homophobia and ignorance for all of Houston to hear: "I believe if some of these homosexuals and queers would leave some of these young people alone and quit trying to brainwash them maybe they could stay clear of the police."

Mr. Mann: I, for one, have never molested or attempted to "brainwash" any young person. I have no desire to. But, nevertheless, I have been abused by Houston police officers.

Explain my case, if you will.

Thanks for your support

The response from the gay community in Houston to my report last week of being abused by police has been overwhelming.

"Hey, man. Thanks for speaking up. They did the same thing to me . . ." was the statement I heard time and time again during the past seven days.

Here's the status of my case. My appearance in court on charges of public intoxication and assaulting a police officer has been postponed, by the request of my attorney, until June 18.

This is only the trial for *me*. At a later date, once this is out of the way, I intend to see these officers in court again. Next time it is they — and the Houston Police Dept. — who will be on trial.

There is one sure way to end this rampant case of "I'll-show-you-I'm-more-macho-than-you-are" afflicting many Houston police officers: If everyone — everyone — who is subjected to police abuse were to press their cases to the fullest. Do not be satisfied just to get out of the false charges they made against you. Prosecute *them!*

There are a lot of good people in Houston who realize, like we do, that the Houston Police Dept. has a problem.

I want to put a guilt complex on you now. Many people are subjected to police abuse, they get mad for awhile, then they tend to forget it. This is why the problem continues. Don't forget it.

Perhaps if someone several months back, or several years back, had fought their cases properly, I wouldn't have been assaulted by Houston police officers. This is why I'm going to make sure I exhaust all channels in pursuing my case. This is why you should too, should you be, or have been, subjected to police abuse — even if it's just a little name-calling! (This is something policemen do very often — fag, nigger, spic.)

Houston policemen are public servants. They are being paid, and paid well, to PROTECT you against real criminals. Not to harrass you because they don't understand your sexuality . . . or race . . . or handicap.

Do not put up with anything less than total respect from every police officer. If you don't get it, do something about it. Do not just keep silent.

Let's get the macho sickies off the Houston police force.

History of the March on Washington

HOUSTON — While Oct. 14 is somewhere in the distant beyond, Gay Pride Week is important enough to consider now. On that date lesbians, gay men and our supporters will gather in Washington to declare our freedom and celebrate it.

I will try here to sort out the history of the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights for those interested.

San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Milk called for a national march on Washington in his Gay Pride Week address, read at Houston Town Meeting I and simultaneously delivered at a massive rally at San Francisco City Hall.

Harvey Milk designated July 4, 1979, as the date. An early planning conference in Minneapolis fell apart over disagreements on the July 4 date. Harvey Milk was assassinated soon after the conference, creating more confusion.

The Philadelphia Conference met Feb. 23-25, 1979, to begin march plans. Like all previous conferences in the gay movement, the delegates were representatives from gay organizations mainly from East and West coast cities. More men were there than women, more urban representatives than rural, and few minority representatives.

The Philadelphia conference called for a national march, set the date and established a set of march demands. The conference

also called for a "steering committee" meeting that would meet to advance march plans. This steering committee is to be more representative of the minorities within the gay minority: lesbians and "third world" gay people.

The steering committee will meet at the University of Houston July 6, 7 and 8, 1979, and will be composed of four delegates (two men, two women) from each of 47 regions in the U.S. Each delegation must reflect the ethnic compositions of their home region. Observers are welcome and help is needed to transport and house the delegates while they are here. Most of the people here for the conference will come from areas where little or no gay rights effort has been started and they will be attending their first conference.

National Gay Task Force, Gay Rights National Lobby, Metropolitan Community Church and Episcopal Integrity have all taken positions of non-support of the March. But NGTF and GRNL are now in the process of reconsideration and the national sentiment toward the march is growing more enthusiastic as a result of Dan White's verdict and other gay related national media coverage.

The Coordinating Committee has not only been successful

gathering march support but has worked hard to insure the success of the steering committee meeting in Houston.

The logistics of transportation and housing have required a separate and, at times, difficult effort. But the logistics planned to be announced at Houston have evolved into an impressive system. A toll-free WATS telephone number has been secured to handle all reservations across the nation. Previous national marches (anti-war, civil rights and poverty) have relied on local organizations to advance transportation.

We will have one national system with computers to handle not only commercial transportation but car pooling and hitchhiker connections.

Anyone who wants to go to Washington no matter what their economic realities will be able to call the 1-800 toll-free line and arrange their transportation. The toll-free number and computer will be ready for operation on July 7. Gay owned and gay supportive travel agencies are making every possible effort to discount fares and expenses to keep the costs down.

We will have the capacity to move the largest mass of people to any one place in history. Only the U.S. military has a similar mobilization system.

Gay rights militancy only breeds fear

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Over the past several years, there has been widespread public tolerance of the homosexual community. The gay culture is acknowledged, rather than ignored.

The price that the homosexual community must pay, for this public acknowledgment, is social responsibility. Homosexuality will never be accepted. However, if first-class citizenship is to be achieved, then we must act accordingly. It is our social responsibility to do so.

With any movement concerning minority rights, there is a conservative backlash. Fear is the common denominator and the catalyst. Jacksonville is a conservative community, and this conservative backlash is to be expected. Feeling this backlash, we must attempt to understand that the rapidity of change is accompanied by misunderstandings and over-reactions. Every apparent backward step is followed by a leap forward in education, knowledge, and public awareness.

Militancy only breeds fear. This fear would only feed the fire of misunderstanding. It is the fuel that the homophobic requires, and can only lead to mistrust and possible violence. It

is the social responsibility of every human being to present himself in a positive manner, if he is to expect social acceptance. The homosexual is not exempt from this category.

However unfair the opposition may seem, understanding rather than confrontation, is the answer.

We at The Junction are a minority of one. We are limited as to what we can do to affect positive social change. Our day-to-day relationships with the people that we encounter is the

most effective means at our disposal. In reality, it is the only means at our disposal.

The positive manner by which we project ourselves toward others, and how that projection is perceived, determines what we are . . . both to ourselves and others. If this projection is a socially responsible one, then positive changes in public opinion will occur.

Love surrounds fear and destroys it.

LA mayor signs ordinance

LOS ANGELES — Mayor Tom Bradley signed an ordinance June 1 prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex or sexual preference for employment, housing or business practices.

He made no comments during

the signing. The ordinance provides for civil damages from \$200 to \$400 for discriminating against homosexuals.

The only exemptions are for religious institutions and for bona fide occupational requirements. o

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"The Innocent," intimate

THE INNOCENT, rated R. Released by Analysis Film Releasing Corporation. Produced by Giovanni Bertolucci. Directed by Luchino Visconti. Screenplay by Suso Cecchi D'Amico, Enrico Medioli and Luchino Visconti, from the novel by Gabriele D'Annunzio. Starring Giancarlo Giannini, Laura Antonelli and Jennifer O'Neill.

The Innocent has the distinction of being the final chapter in the career of one of Italy's great filmmakers. Luchino Visconti died in 1976, before he was able to complete the post-production work on the film.

By no means does *The Innocent* — which stars Giancarlo

Giannini and Laura Antonelli — serve as a summation of Visconti's life. It is, however, in its grand passion, sumptuous decor and measured pacing, a characteristic work, and one that brings into focus for the last time the contradictions that marked and elevated Visconti's films.

Based on an 1892 novel by Gabriele D'Annunzio, the story is set in the upper class Italy of the turn of the century.

Tullio (Giannini) is an aristocrat who devotes his life of leisure to the deadly serious, intellectualized pursuit of passion. His love for his beautiful

wife Guiliana (Antonelli) has disintegrated over time into comfortable domesticity, and his main activity is balancing his responsibility to her against his devotion to a mistress (Jennifer O'Neill).

Tullio's ordered existence begins to come apart when he finds himself smitten with a renewed passion for his wife after learning she's had an affair with a famous novelist.

The novelist dies, but not before Guiliana has become pregnant by him. She refuses to submit to an abortion, and Tullio's passions become twisted into an intense jealousy directed against the innocent, unborn

child.

The mystery, as far as Tullio and Guiliana are concerned, is how lives ruled by reason in true turn-of-the-century style are so easily destroyed by passion.

It's the irreconcilable tension between heart and mind, the devastating tug-of-war between the sweet submission to feelings and the enlightened adherence to principle that fascinates Visconti. These themes are mounted here, as in other Visconti films, in a grand operatic manner.

The ornate, detailed design of *The Innocent* is crucial to its meaning, for one becomes involved with the characters' di-

lemma by being seduced by the sensuality of their world. That their devotion to sensuality proves to be the characters' undoing challenges a viewer, who finds himself drawn by the same beauty. There is an operatic sense of tragedy to this that comes as no surprise, for Visconti was equally renowned in his native Italy as a director of opera and as a filmmaker.

Despite this film's heightened emotionalism, Giancarlo Giannini gives a more restrained performance than he has in any of Lina Wertmuller's films. Laura Antonelli is most famous for sex appeal, which plays an important part here, but not at the expense of the genuine feelings she conveys.

Jennifer O'Neill is less memorable, but it is largely because her part in the drama is that of a catalyst rather than a central player.

Though *The Innocent* is built out of grandiose passion, it is really an intimate film, about the struggle of two very mortal characters. As a mature work of art, it grows and expands upon reflection, and it is thus a fitting finish to a distinguished career. (SETH CAGIN) ●

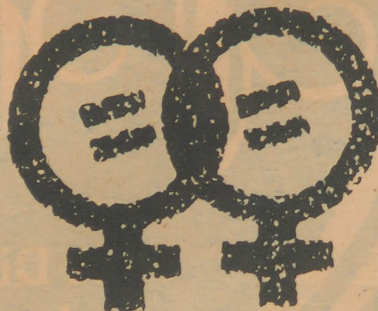
