SHELL RESCUES EIGHT FROM SINKING PLEASURE  
CRUISER IN TEXAS GULF

Shell wayside facilities for years have been welcomed havens for many a weary traveler.

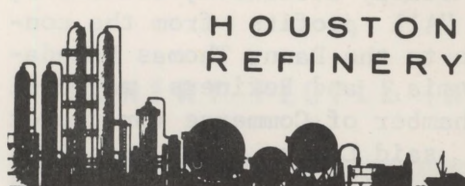
But for Texas Liquor Control Board Administrator Coke Stevenson, Jr., and seven other persons aboard the sinking pleasure cruiser Creole Sue, probably no refuge was as welcomed as Buccaneer Field's Platform A off the Galveston Coast.

Stevenson, the 53-year-old son of the former Texas Governor, and his seven companions were rescued recently by Shell employees working on the offshore platform when the boat--a 56-foot cabin cruiser--began taking on water and listing sharply.

Cause of the incident has not been determined. Shell personnel reported all eight persons aboard were hauled safely off the sinking boat, which was later towed away several hundred feet from the platform by a contract vessel before it sank in 70 feet of water.

No injuries were reported. However, R. O. Smith, the executive secretary of the Wholesale Beer Distributors of Texas, who reportedly suffers from a heart condition, was given oxygen and flown to Galveston aboard a helicopter. The others were sent to shore aboard the contract crewboat.

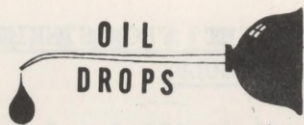

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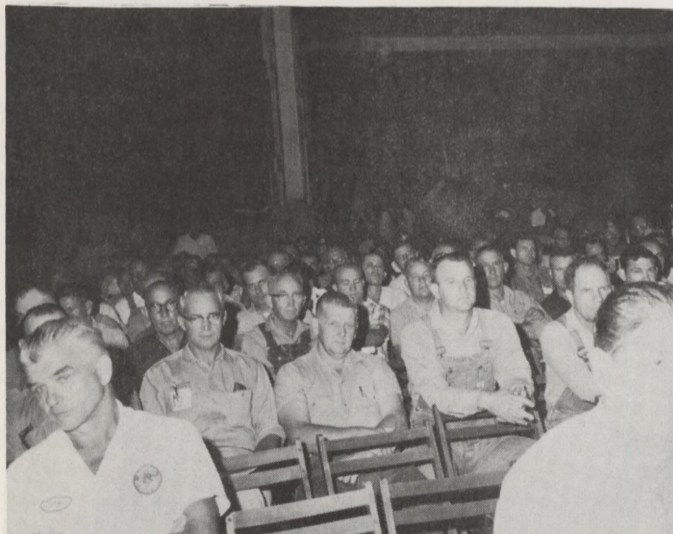
