Minutes of the April 4, 2005 Meeting

Bayland Community Center

Attendance: 46

1. **Learning Corner:** David Poteet presented information on the warblers seen in Texas, with focus on habitat of each species: where they nest and where they feed.
2. **Bird sightings:** Swallow-tailed Kite; Chimney Swifts; Painted Bunting; Sora; Yellow Rail; American Bittern; Swainson's Hawk taking an American Coot; flock of 300 Long-billed Curlews; kettle of 32 Anhinga; Blue-winged, Hooded, Black-throated Green, Kentucky, Tennessee, Worm-eating Warblers; Ovenbird; Northern Parula; Louisiana Waterthrush; White-Eyed, Red-eyed, and Yellow-throated Vireos; possible Eskimo Curlew
3. No reports were offered for Membership or the Library.
4. **Newsletter** submissions are due April 10. Al Shultz reminded members that there will be no *Spoonbill* in June or July. Materials for the August issue should be submitted by July 10.
5. For **Environmental Issues**, Mary Dodson announced that the granting of conservation easements for tax incentives is being reassessed. See www.refuge.net for more information.
6. The **Outdoor Nature Club** "Birding Program" was presented to the Westbury Civic Club and AARP.
7. **Migration Celebration** at San Bernard NWR is April 9 & 10.
8. **Field Trips:** Bill Saulmon announced that Mike Austin will lead the April 16 trip to Quintana and Brazoria. Meet at Oyster Creek at 6:30am. There are still openings for the Ft Hood quarterly trip April 23 & 24. Target birds are the Golden-cheeked Warbler and Black-capped Vireo.
9. **2003-2005 Officer Appreciation** tokens were presented by outgoing Chair Kathy Farr.
10. Skip Almony reported that **FeatherFest** exceeded the planners' expectations with 300+ registrants. OG provided 50-60 % of field trip liaisons. Patches, tee shirts, and tote bags are still available.
11. As Chair of the **Nominations Committee**, Skip Almony presented the slate of officers for 2005 - 2007. Committee members were Margaret Simmons and Bill Saulmon. The nominees were Michael Williams, Chair; Bernice Hotman, Vice-Chair; Shirley and Raymond Mondshine, Secretary; and Jim Winn, Treasurer. Skip Almony asked for nominations from the floor. The motion was made and seconded that the slate be accepted by acclamation. Motion carried.
12. **Dr Jane Packard** was introduced by Michael Williams. She presented a program "*Courting Birds and Bird-Watchers in the Big Thicket*". Dr Packard is Associate Professor of Ethology at TAMU. She studies bird behavior. Each species has unique appearance and methods for mating purposes. With video clips, Dr Packard showed some of the dances and displays, postures and plumages birds use in courting. In the second part of her program, Dr Packard discussed her involvement in community-based conservation in The Big Thicket. By participating in breeding bird surveys and transect studies, it is hoped that residents will see value in maintaining buffer zones around each of the nine habitat types in the preserve.

FIELD TRIPS

Our last field trip of this season will be on **May 21, 2005** to **Brazos Bend State Park**. It's been a few years since the OG visited nearby Brazos Bend State Park, so it's time to get reacquainted with this great birding spot. We will be targeting species that breed here, such as Purple Gallinule, Least Bittern, Prothonotary Warbler, Northern Parula, Yellow-throated Vireo, Hooded Warbler, Indigo and Painted Buntings and Acadian Flycatcher, among others. David Heinecke, who is the Senior Park Naturalist, and Bill Godley, the OG's own Brazos Bend "native," will lead this field trip. Meet them at 7:30 a.m. at the 40 Acre Lake restrooms. To get there from Houston, take U.S. 59 South to Crabb River Road (FM 2759) and turn south. Continue on this road (which becomes FM 762) to Brazos Bend State Park; look for the brown park sign on your left.

We had a joint field trip with the Houston Audubon Society on March 12, led by noted bird photographer and author Kevin Karlson. We chartered a bus for this trip and had to limit attendance to 45 people. Winnie Burkett, Don Richardson and Bill Saulmon helped out as assistant guides for the trip. Although the bus got stuck for a while at Bolivar Flats, it gave Kevin more time to demonstrate his new shorebird identification method, which is the basis for his new book coming out next year. We then went to the North Jetty where Kevin pointed out the differences between the Eastern & Western subspecies of Willets. We then went to High Island where everyone enjoyed the activity at the Smith Oaks rookery, but migrants were hard to find. The weather was nice but windy. On the bus trip home we reviewed the day's checklist -- we had 100 bird species for the trip.

Eighteen folks attended our regular monthly field trip on March 19 to the Texas City area. We met at a beach park by the levee and saw a flock of Bonaparte's Gulls. The highlight of the trip was a visit to a very obliging Burrowing Owl at a nearby housing development. We returned to the Dike and located a flock of Eared Grebes in breeding plumage along with all the expected species. After lunch in a pleasant park we had a guided tour of the Nature Conservancy Prairie Preserve by Manager Brandon Crawford. Brandon explained the habitat management practices employed to preserve the Attwater's Prairie Chicken. We had about 79 bird species for the day.

Adam Wood will be replacing me as our new field trip coordinator. Please let Adam know of any birding sites you would like to visit in the future. I'm sure that Adam would also appreciate folks volunteering to lead field trips next season.

See you on a future field trip.

Exotic Records

Do you watch immigrant birds? Several species in the Houston area are not native to North America but have established local breeding populations. There are Monk Parakeets in Sharpstown and Clear Lake, Red-vented Bulbuls in the Heights, Nutmeg Mannikins and Orange Bishops by the West Beltway. If you've seen some of these or other notable local exotics, tell *The Spoonbill*. If there's interest, we'll cover them in a future issue.

In general, exotics are not "listable" (under ABA rules) if they escaped from captivity or were brought by humans. But beyond that, what defines an established population? House Sparrows, European Starlings and Rock Pigeons were once newcomers, but are now beyond any doubt as successful breeders (too successful, arguably). Cattle Egrets and Eurasian Collared-Doves are almost ubiquitous now on the Upper Texas Coast, yet they are not native to this continent. At one time – not all that long ago – these species would have been considered rarities, whether accidental or introduced.

If we are interested in birds as more than items on a list, we should note the exotics. Many seem to be well on their way to wider establishment. For better or worse, bird distributions change through time, and their populations rise and fall. There will be much debate about these changes: the extent to which they can be called good or bad in broader ecological terms, the role of humans in causing them. Meanwhile, the birds are going about their business. Let's learn something about them.

Forty Years Ago

OLIVE-BACKED WARBLER HIGHLIGHTS GEORGE WEST TRIP

Clayton Gilman, demonstrating all the attributes of a true leader, spotted an Olive-backed Warbler at the Frio River lunch site, Tilden, Texas on Sunday, March 28th, to climax the George West Ornithology Group Field Trip. This misplaced resident of the lower Rio Grande Valley "upriver to Rio Grande City" was observed for approximately 2 hours and all party members were able to clearly distinguish the olive saddle spot, black facial markings and absence of white eye ring. The field trip party of 26 left their headquarters at the Buenas Noches Motel, George West, Texas. ...The first stop at the Houdmann Ranch provided a variety of habitats and the following noteworthy birds were seen: (1) in plowed fields and on fences - Clay-colored Sparrow, Lark Bunting, Vermilion Flycatcher and Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, (2) on the lake and in the marsh - American Bittern, Cinnamon Teal, Blue-winged Teal, Gadwall, Shoveler, Snipe, King Rail, Sora, (3) in trees and hedgerows - Black-headed Oriole, Cactus Wren, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Curve-billed Thrasher, Sage Thrasher and Black-crested Titmouse. A stop at Pauraque Creek proved a dry run for both water and Pauraques but Golden-fronted Woodpeckers, Ladder-backed Woodpeckers, Black-and-white Warblers and the Townsend's Warblers were found in this area. En route to the lunch site at Carone Ranch Lark Sparrows, Scaled Quail, several Harris' Hawks, a Caracara and a Roadrunner were spotted. Exploration of ranch roads resulted in sunburned faces and many additions to the list including the Pyrrhuloxia, House Finch, Chipping Sparrow, Black-throated Sparrow, Grasshopper Sparrow and Blue-gray Gnatcatchers in distracting numbers. The 23 mile trip back to George West was enlivened by a Cassin's Sparrow who obligingly sang his sweet song on demand, a Great Horned Owl who regarded the party with disdain, and a Verdin, up Pauraque Creek. The sundown count was 86 species.
