Senate passes trillion dollar debt limit

Washington (AP) — The Senate passed and sent to President Reagan Tuesday a bill boosting the national debt limit past \$1 trillion for the first time. The bill will permit the government to borrow the money it needs to pay bills in the the fiscal year beginning Thursday.

The measure was passed by a vote of 64-34 after Republican leaders fought off a series of amendments that would have sent it back to the Democrat-dominated House. The House had approved the bill earlier, but GOP leaders feared it might balk at endorsing it again.

It is the fifth increase in the debt limit since 1978, when the limit was \$798 billion and the actual debt at the end of the fiscal year was \$772.69 billion.

The new ceiling of \$1.079 trillion, already approved by the House, would amount to \$4,694.20 for every American man, woman, and child. At \$1 per second, it would take 31,688 years just to count a trillion or \$1,000,000,000,000.

The debt limit reached a billion for the first time during World War I and stood at \$293 billion 20 years ago.

"We must pass the debt ceiling or we can't honor all the Social Security checks that went into the mail yesterday and today," Finance Chairman Bob Dole, R-Kan., told fellow senators.

"The next stopping point, I guess, is a quadrillion, that is a thousand trillion," said Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., who staged an all-night talkathon to protest pushing the debt limit over the trillion-dollar mark.

Proxmire, of Wisconsin, flailed at the measure Monday night and early Tuesday for 16 hours and 12 minutes, then gave up his talkfest

at 10:27 a.m. EDT.

Proxmire said he was hopeful he would "wake up senators and others in the Congress."

The Senate rejected 63-33 an amendment by Proxmire to set the debt limit at \$995 billion, an increase of \$10 billion over the current figure. The \$1.079 trillion figure is sought by Reagan and has passed the House.

Also turned down, 67-31, was an amendment by Sen. Thomas Egleton, D-Mo., to reverse tax breaks already given oil companies and use the money to bolster the

sagging Social Security trust fund.

By a vote of 84-15, the Senate tabled, and thus killed, amendments by Sen. William Armstrong, R-Colo., that would have allowed President Reagan to withhold appropriated funds, subject to a congressional veto within either 30 or 45 days.

Senate then rejected, by a much closer 56-43 vote, an amendment by Sen. J. James Exon, D-Neb., that would have reduced the third year of a congressionally approved tax cut if interest rates turned out higher than the administration has predicted.

Screening of 'Birth of a Nation' proves abortive

Despite the pleas of the five pickets from the International Committee Against Racism to, "Join our picket, stop racist 'Filth of a Nation'", the 7:30 showing of "Birth of a Nation" went on as scheduled.

Shouting through an electronic megaphone to a nearly deserted UC, InCAR member Joan Beckerman urged those who were "against racism, do not go to the movie and join us."

The showing attracted a crowd of 161 in the Houston room.

Todd Fine, chairman of the Program Council Film Committee that presented the movie said, "It's a classic movie. It has a right to be shown." According to PC President Steve Scholl, "From the very beginning, the PC Executive Council would not pass the movie screening without a panel discussion afterwards. We began talking about this way back in June."

Why show a movie that was so certain to raise controversy? Scholl explained, "In view of all the talk that apathy is rampant at UH, we are just trying to do things to arouse people. It's in the hopes of stirring a little controversy, but not just for the sake of controversy. There were no racist motives behind the showing of the film. None at all."

The panel discussion following the screening attracted 59 people. Serving as experts were: Daily Cougar Montage Editor Dan Perez, Sociology Professor, Dr. William Simon, English Instructor Max Martinez, and Channel 2 correspondent Dan Molina.

Perez offered a summary of the life and accomplishments of the film's director, D.W. Griffith, citing the many cinematic innovations and achievements in "Birth of a Nation."

Simon expressed his sociological viewpoint and said the movie, "Bares no resemblance to black reconstruction as it actually happened. It began a pattern of representing blacks in American cinema, expressing the subliminal racism that pervades the American consciousness."

Martinez, responding to Perez's assessment of the film as an artistic achievement said, "Art expresses truth, beauty, and celebrates all the best that man is capable of. This film depicts him at his worst." Perez responded by saying that he was, "Appalled by the film's racist overtones."

Molina, who recently reported on the Klu Klux Klan, related that the Klan, "Often shows this film and uses it as an emotional expression of their views. A great deal of the symbols in the film are characteristic of the people I dealt with in the Klan."

A general discussion with the audience followed. When many accused the movie of possibly inciting viewers to racism Simon interjected with, "Don't confuse the symptom with the cause. The film, I guarantee you, would not produce even four more KKK's. Media 'reflects' more than it 'creates'. We should start facing the racism inherent in all of us."

Man held in connection with viola theft

A \$13,000 viola stolen from the School of Music last Friday was recovered by UH police Tuesday with the assistance of Daily Cougar Photo Editor James Leifeste.

Officers J.L. Warner, G.L. Newell, T.J. Welch and G.A. Albright were notified of the theft of the 200-year-old instrument last Friday by Dr. Robert Jobe, associate director of the school of music.

Friday evening, shortly after the theft, police questioned witnesses who saw a suspect walk off with the viola. Witnesses were shown mug shots from police files and identified Ellery Washington, 21, as the man they saw leaving with the case.

Police also questioned local pawn shop owners about the viola, Albright said.

Monday night Leifeste notified police that a suspicious man was in the Houstonian camera room.

Police showed Leifeste a few mug shots, including Washington's, and Leifeste identified Washington as the man he had seen.

Tuesday afternoon Washington was again seen, this time in The Daily Cougar office. Leifeste recognized the man and asked Photographer Doug Dodson to call the police. Leifeste detained the suspect in the office.

Dodson reported the police arrived at the scene in 1 ± minutes.

When arresting officers Warner and Albright arrived at the Cougar newsroom, they smiled and said, "Mr. Washington, we've been looking for you for quite awhile."

Washington is a suspect in other burglaries and has a number of outstanding warrants for his arrest, Albright said.

After an hour of interrogation, Washington led officers to a pawn shop at 502 Main where the viola was found, Albright said.

Washington's mode of operation, according to Albright, has been to act as if he belongs where

he doesn't, and his presence has not been questioned.

Assistant Police Chief John Miller commended his men on their diligence in closing the case. He also congratulated the Cougar staff on its cooperation with the

The U.S. Senate rang up another purchase last night when it passed a bill raising the limit for the national debt to \$1.079 trillion. That's right, a trillion dollars. Czech deserves curriculum

To the Editor:

The University of Houston announced its million dollar expansion last week with a media blitz on television and the newspapers. Their slogan on their public service announcements is "meeting the needs of an urban community". With all of this money and goodwill one would think that the Spanish and other language departments would announce to the Czech instructor that Czech language and cultural classes would be cut arbitrarily. But no... Mr. Soucek (Czech lecturer) had to find out by students calling him and asking him why Czech wasn't offered in the class schedule. All the proper paperwork was submitted at the end of the spring semester and all deadlines were met.

Then there is the case of the \$25,000 gift offered to the University of Houston for scholarships in the study of the Czech language. A woman that was interested in Czech studies and also interested in a tax break, offered the 25 grand.

Again Mr. Soucek did all of the paperwork to make it happen. The Spanish and other language departments deliberately stalled the procedure for so long, our benefactor gave the money to another university out of sheer frustration. Texas-Czechs have contributed a lot and ask for so little in return.

Just offer the classes in the class schedule and if enough students show up there will be a class. And

I don't think that the Texas-Czech community is trying to create a bloated Czech bureaucracy with a multibillion budget. I feel that the University of Houston should maintain a high level of academic standards by offering Czech language and Czech culture classes. Both language and culture courses are necessary to preserve and record our history as Texas Czechs. 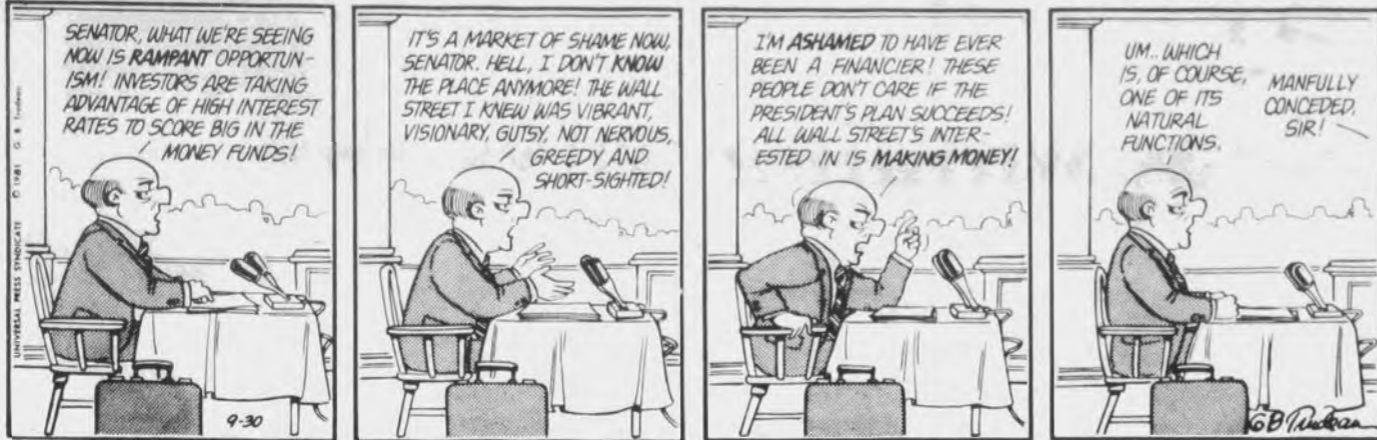

Prison reforms delay asked by White

Austin (AP) — Attorney General Mark White said Tuesday he has asked U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice to stay major portions of his order requiring changes in Texas prisons because Texas can't meet the deadlines.

White said he mailed the motion on Monday.

Parts of the order already have been stayed by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which plans to hear Texas' appeal of Justice's ruling Dec. 18.

White asked Justice to stay these additional portions of his order:

- A requirement that by Nov. 1 each prisoner housed in a dormitory be given at least 40 square

feet of living space, with the amount to be expanded to 60 square feet a year later. White has asked that the requirement be dropped to 30 square feet.

- A requirement that inmates in solitary confinement receive at least 60 square feet of living space by Aug. 1, 1981.

- Justice's ruling that the guard-inmate ratio be reduced to one guard per 10 prisoners by Nov. 1, one-to-eight by May 1, 1982, and one-to-six by Nov. 1, 1982.

- A prohibition against using inmates as "turnkeys" who lock and unlock doors.

Justice's order that only minimum security prisoners be

assigned to dormitories rather than cellblocks. White said the order would result in 95 percent of the inmates being confined to cells, while the Texas Department of Corrections "cannot possibly house 95 percent of the prison population" in cellblocks.

White said if Justice denies his latest request, he again will ask the 5th Circuit to stay the judge's order.

The lecture is part of the history department speaker series and is

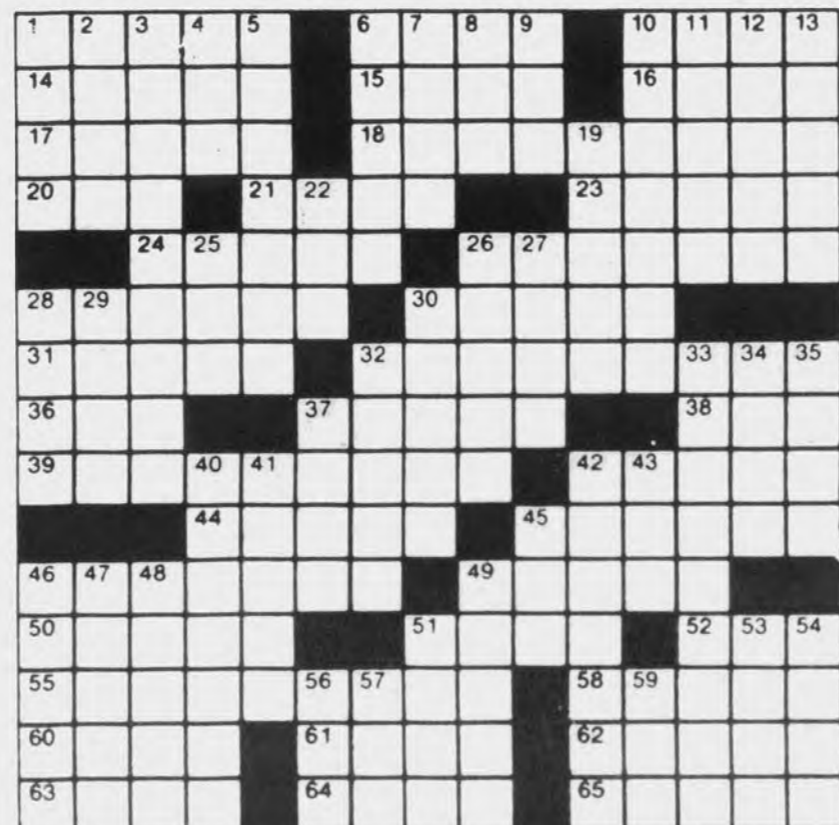
cosponsored by the University Honors Program.

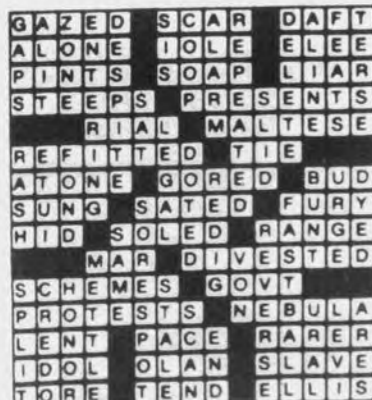
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

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Williams' teams follow winning ways

Some good things never change, and it seems inevitable that the winning tradition of UH golf teams will continue on. It has done so for more than 30 years under Head Coach Dave Williams and this season's team looks to be no exception.

The 1981 Cougars, equipped with less experience than ever before (there are no seniors on the squad), overcame the odds and

won the Southwest Conference Fall Golf Championships at Columbia Lakes Country Club in West Columbia Sept. 14-15, edging arch-rival Texas by three strokes and third place TCU by 13.

The defending champion Cougars have now won or shared the fall title an unprecedented nine times out of 10 tournaments played and Williams is expecting more victories this season.

The starting six golfers who competed at West Columbia won the tournament with their

remarkable consistency. Junior Mark Fuller teamed with sophomore David Tantis to place third as a pair. Junior Billy Tuten and sophomore Don Burwell tied the pair of sophomore John Slaughter and junior Mike Neece for fourth place on the list.

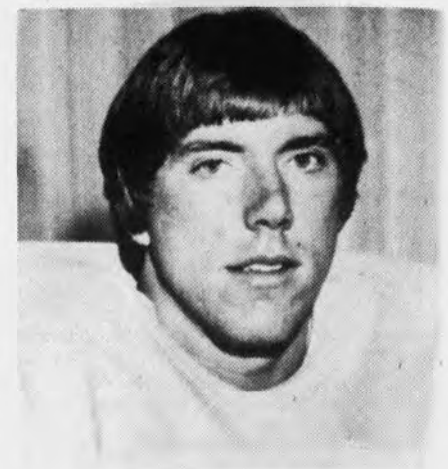
Slaughter, Burwell and Fuller were the top returnees from the 1980-81 team.

Fuller was the best surprise of last year.

"I had no idea that Mark would emerge out of the pack and help us as much as he did last season," Williams said.

The Cougars will be in Shreveport, La. for the annual Morton Braswell Invitational on Oct. 4-5. After only one day off, the team moves to Baton Rouge, La. for the LSU Invitational Oct. 7-9.

Williams is still deciding on future tournaments that the Cougars will take part in this fall. He is usually flooded with requests. It adds to the prestige of a tournament if the Cougars are one of the entries, and the 1981 UH golf squad is set on keeping it that way.

Oilers trade Carpenter

(AP) — The Houston Oilers have traded starting fullback Rob Carpenter to the New York Giants for undisclosed draft choices and other "future considerations," an Oilers spokesman said Tuesday.

Carpenter has started in each of the four games this season, gaining 74 yards on 18 rushing attempts and 80 yards on 13 receptions. He scored his only touchdown of the season on a 33-yard reception against the Los Angeles Rams.

Carpenter saw expanded running duties this year when the Oilers abandoned the I-formation in favor of the pro set. But Houston's offense was ineffective in two straight losing efforts and Coach Ed Biles said the Oilers will return to more I-formation plays, with the emphasis on tailback Earl Campbell.

"We still plan to run a diversified offense with various sets, but the I-formation will play a larger role now with Tim Wilson as the up back than in the first four ball games," Biles said.

Carpenter, a five-year Oiler veteran, was a third-round draft choice in 1977.



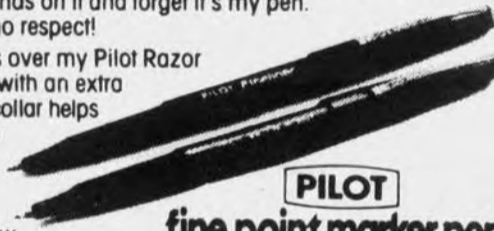
