My Dear Mrs. Green:

Your letter of December sixth awaited my return
and receives my earliest attention.

I deeply regret to report that, owing to my being
so foolish as to develop the measles in Washington and get
myself incarcerated in the contagious ward of Garfield Hospital
there, before I had attended to all of my business, I did not
complete the negotiations for an organizer for San Antonio.
I hope to have this matter in hand and the organizer in San
Antonio by January fifth, and trust the association there will
have patience with me for this delay, which I am sure I regret
quite as much as you can.

Regarding the list of contributors in San Antonio,
I shall forward that to you under separate cover within a few
days when I take up the matter with and turn over the pledges
to our Treasurer here. In the mean time, if you would in-
struct Mrs. Hart to forward such checks as she has in hand,
it would prevent our Treasurer here from sending out notices
to the pledges asking for those that were due on December first
and not in hand; as for instance, the Public Utilities pledge
of \$200.00 which was due on December first, and others.

What became of the San Antonio delegation to Wash-
ington? My last word from Miss Fenwick was that she and Mrs.
Hart and one other were coming, but they failed to materialize
and I was so worried all the time I was sick for fear they were
in that big wreck on the Southern route. I do hope that was
not the case.

The work for the Social Hygiene as mentioned in your
letter is splendid, especially that of following the cases thru
Court and investigating the whole operation of the police. It
is all splendid and is bound to have a good effect on San An-
tonio. With kindest regards and best wishes for you and your
