DATA GROUP GETS UNIVAC 9300 UNIT FOR CHEMICAL, REFINERY JOBS

A new Univac 9300 computer was installed this week at the Commercial Systems Department housed at Shell Chemical Plant which does data processing jobs for both the Refinery and Chemical Plant.

The new computer will replace the Univac 1005 in doing oil movements jobs, financial and inventory reports and other jobs handled by the group. The machine, which consists of a computer and its slave units including two tape drives, has the capacity to read 600 cards per minute, print out 600 lines a minute and can store 12,000 bits of information in its memory.

A large crane was pressed into service Tuesday to lift the heavy sections of the unit to its new home on the second floor of the Administration Building at the Chemical Plant.


Before the machine goes into operation next week, about 70 programs formerly used on the 1005 will have to be rewritten into the type of computer language used by the 9300.

The computer will be tied into the Prudential Building's Shell Data Service Center by voice grade or regular telephone line and by a lease line. Through the voice line, two or more computers can communicate with each other through a telephone switchboard. The line can also be used for voice communication. Only computers can send and receive information on a lease line.

The Commercial Systems group consists of Lewis Crouch, Supervisor; Jack Miller, C. M. Brower, V. E. Burnett, Mike Wozniak, and Jack Richardson, Operators; and G. R. Bedingfield, Head Operator.

DEER PARK SCHOOLS FINISH YEAR WITH PLANS FOR GROWTH, EXPANSION

Another school year has just ended for the Deer Park School District, and W. D. Antone, School Board President, feels that the District has performed well and matched the expectations of students, teachers and parents.

Antone, Operations Foreman in the Refinery Lab, is proud of the advances the schools have made and is very pleased with the way the Deer Park Elementary School's team teaching has worked out.

This school, which opened last fall, was among the first to institute a team teaching program which had been proved and tested in other schools. Known as the "One Room Schoolhouse," this school has one large room where all of the students are taught different subjects in small groups according to their ability. The teachers plan teaching schedules and activities together and can discuss learning problems which a particular student might have.


For special events, several classes are put together and one group has even produced a film of their own.

Antone says the students seem happier in this school because they learn at their own pace and because all the students are treated as individuals. No stigma is put upon the slower learner.

The Deer Park Elementary School has six levels beginning with kindergarten. The sixth level students will move to the Junior High School where principal Leon Wolters, a Shell son, is setting up a new program to meet the needs of the students from the team teaching school.

Wolters, the son of C. M. Wolters, Instrument Man 1, Eng. Fld., was educated in the Deer Park School District and has now transferred from another district to teach here.

All of the schools in the district are very modern with the latest in teaching equipment. The Junior High School even has an indoor swimming pool. A special equipment space at the elementary school enables

the children to get special aids, books and audio-visual equipment themselves with the help of a color coded system.

In the planning stages are two elementary schools, one junior high and a high school which will be built by the district in the near future with a \$12 million bond issue.





Love attended Texas A&M before joining Shell as a Junior Draftsman in 1936. He became Senior Draftsman in 1953.


