

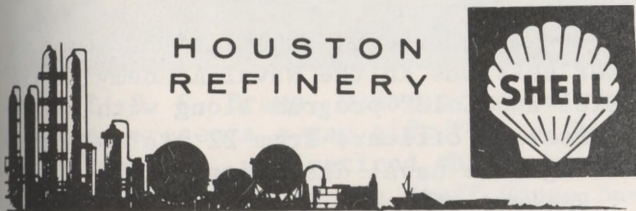


TEN-AND-OVER PARTY PLANS BEING COMPLETED FOR OCTOBER 21 GET-TOGETHER

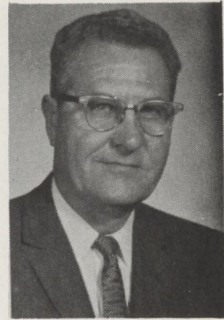

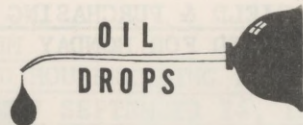

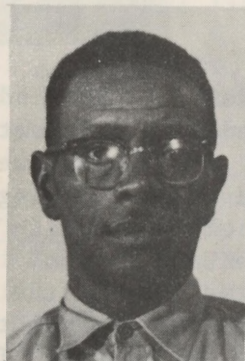
He married a Houston girl and has two daughters, a son and two grandsons.

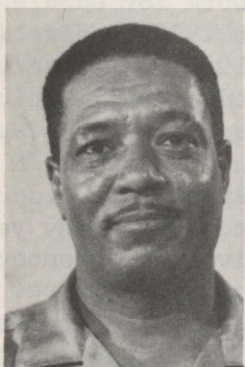

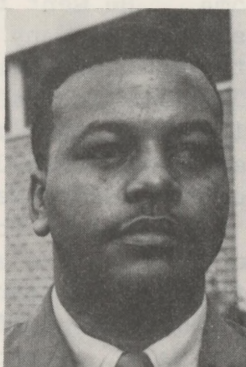

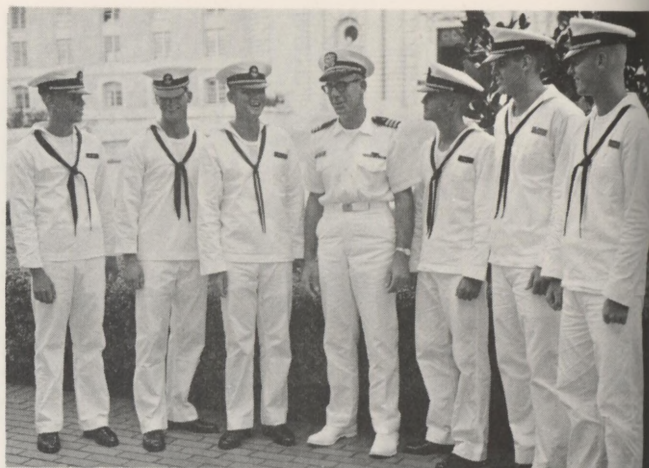

RESEARCH'S BUCHANAN ATTENDS COURSE AT UNITED STATES NAVAL ACADEMY

WOMEN DRIVERS

Women drivers are better automobile insurance risks than men drivers, says the Insurance Information Institute.

Does this mean that women are better drivers than men? No. Nobody knows which sex is more competent behind the wheel, the Institute declares.

In one recent year, 80 men drivers were involved in fatal accidents for every billion miles driven by men, as against 38 women drivers involved for every billion miles driven by women. Therefore, according to those figures, a woman driver is much less likely to be involved in a fatal accident than a male driver. That's one reason the females are better insurance risks.

But the National Safety Council points out that men do a much greater proportion of driving in rural areas and at night, the place and time when accidents are more likely to occur...News Leader, Richmond, Va.

LIQUID HYDROCARBON AND GAS RESERVES
HIGHEST IN HISTORY

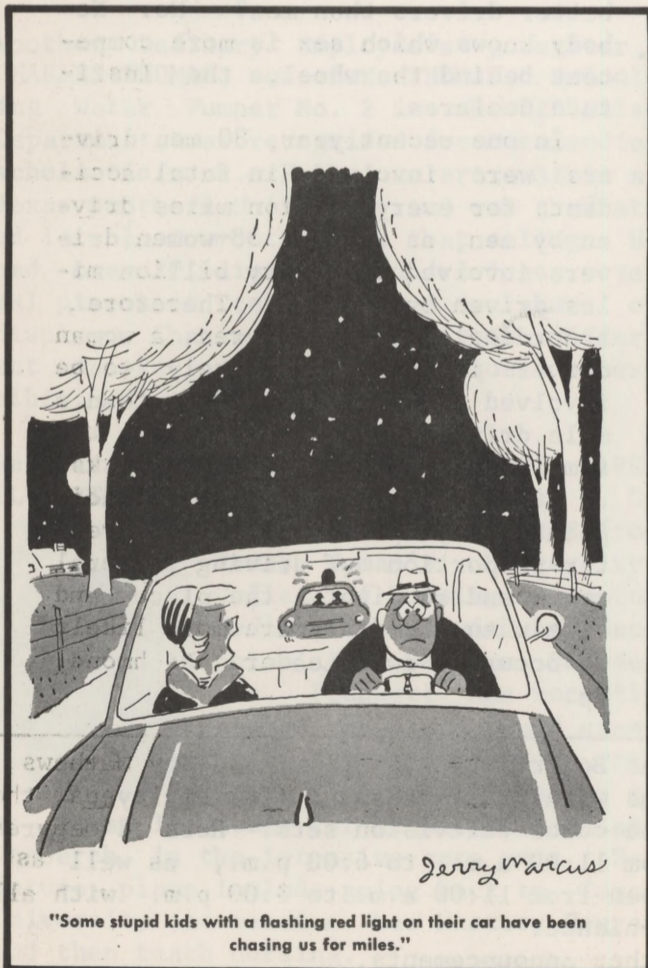
The nation's proved recoverable reserves of liquid hydrocarbons and natural gas at the end of 1966 rose to the highest amounts in history, according to reports issued by the reserves committees of the American Petroleum Institute and the American Gas Association.

Proved recoverable reserves of liquid hydrocarbons were estimated at 39.8 billion barrels--an increase over 1965 of 405 million, or about one per cent. Natural gas reserves advanced to 289.3 trillion cubic feet, 2.86 trillion cubic feet higher than in 1965, also an increase of one per cent.

Estimated proved reserves of crude oil as of December 31, 1966, were 31.5 billion barrels--a gain of 100 million over the previous year. Proved reserves of natural gas liquids accounted for the other 8.3 billion barrels--an increase of 305 million over 1965.

Additions to the proved reserves supply of natural gas totaled 20.22 trillion cubic feet. A record 17.49 trillion cubic feet of natural gas was taken out of the ground in production (more than one trillion feet greater than in any previous year) and a net injection of 135 billion cubic feet was added into underground storage.

Proved reserves are those which experience indicates can be removed from known reservoirs under existing economic and operating conditions. They do not include oil or gas in unproved portions of partly developed fields, or in favorable, but as yet untested, strata.
