PROVIDENT FUND NEWS

As previously announced, in view of the stock subscription offering, no Shell stock was purchased during February. Equities Fund Unit Value on February 5, 1968, was \$1.891 and on February 20, 1968, was \$1.855.

SHELL STOCK FUND FIDUCIARY
TO SUBSCRIBE TO STOCK OFFER

On February 15, Shell Oil Company announced its intention to offer additional shares of its common stock to shareholders during early March through issuance of subscription rights. On March 1, the offering commenced with the announcement that the Company was offering to the holders of its common stock of record March 1, 1968, the right to subscribe at \$50 per share for 6,123,985 additional shares of common stock at the rate of one new share for each ten shares held. On March 1, the Shell Stock Fund held 1,524,767 shares of Shell Oil Common Stock.

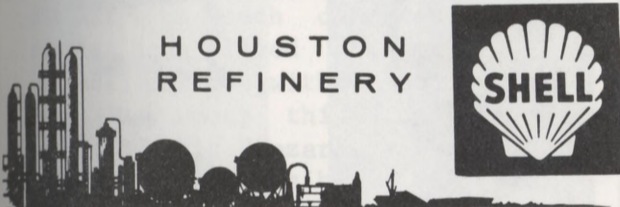
Subsequent to the first announcement, the fiduciary of the fund, Manufacturers Hanover Trust Company, advised the fund that it intended to subscribe for additional shares to the extent of cash available, which would include the Company's

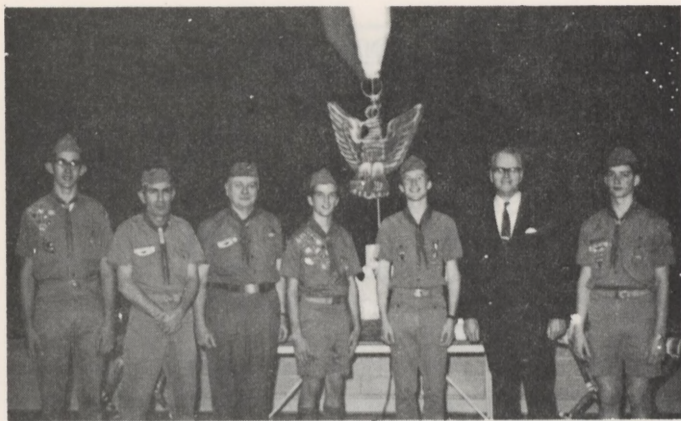
E. P. CASHAT NAMED FOREMAN

contributions made in February and March, the cash dividend to be received in March and proceeds from sale of a portion of the rights.

Following receipt of rights by the fund, the fiduciary sold at market price about 47 percent of the rights and has advised the fund that it will be able to utilize the balance of the rights to subscribe for 81,522 shares of common stock at the offering price.

Regulations of the Shell Stock Fund provide for Company contributions only. Therefore, members cannot contribute additional funds or individually exercise or dispose of subscription rights attributable to their interest in the fund. Thus, no action is required by individual members as regards the current subscription offering.

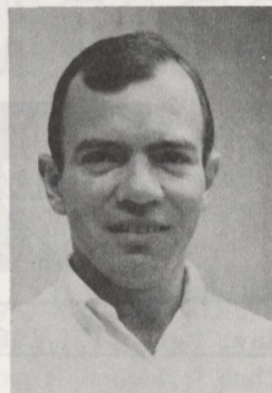
Proceeds from rights sold will be credited to each account, and subscribed shares will be allocated according to cash available in each account. Proceeds from the sale of all rights of members who are not currently directing Company contributions to the fund will be credited to their thrift fund accounts.



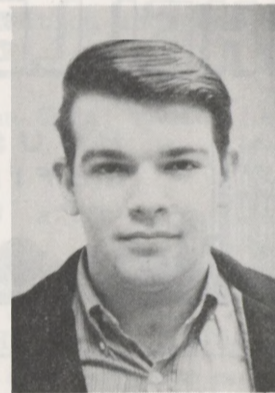

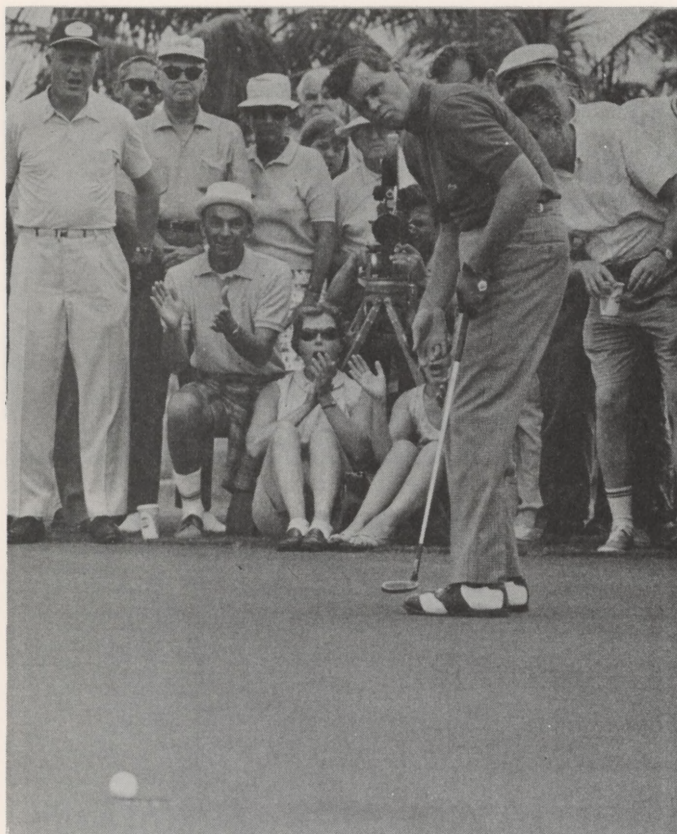

SAFETY---WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

Sir Thomas More, the writer of the classic, "Utopia", while imagining the perfection that characterized his island dream, surely envisioned a happy people who enjoyed this blissful state to the utmost because they had created an atmosphere where accidents and injuries were unknown. One quickly rejects this idea as fictional and fantastic. But it can be real. There are records which verify the possibility of such climates where people have lived and worked for extended periods without bodily injury. How does this come about? Who plans this "Hazardless Utopia"? Just who is responsible? One finds the answer in the idea that is not new, and in the theme that has not changed -- Safety is an individual responsibility and a cooperative effort. Cooperation and mutual aid, which were probably born of the concept of being one's "brother's keeper", are recommended, and this is good. But safety must begin with number one -- me and you-- the individual. What may one do to promote safety? What is one's responsibility? (A) First, one may ask am I emotionally, mentally, and physically prepared for the work before me? (B) Second, do I understand what I am supposed to do and do I have all the facts? (C) Third, am I following the established safety procedures? Utopia! The story is unreal. But safety and freedom from pain and injuries are as real as the responsible individual will make it.

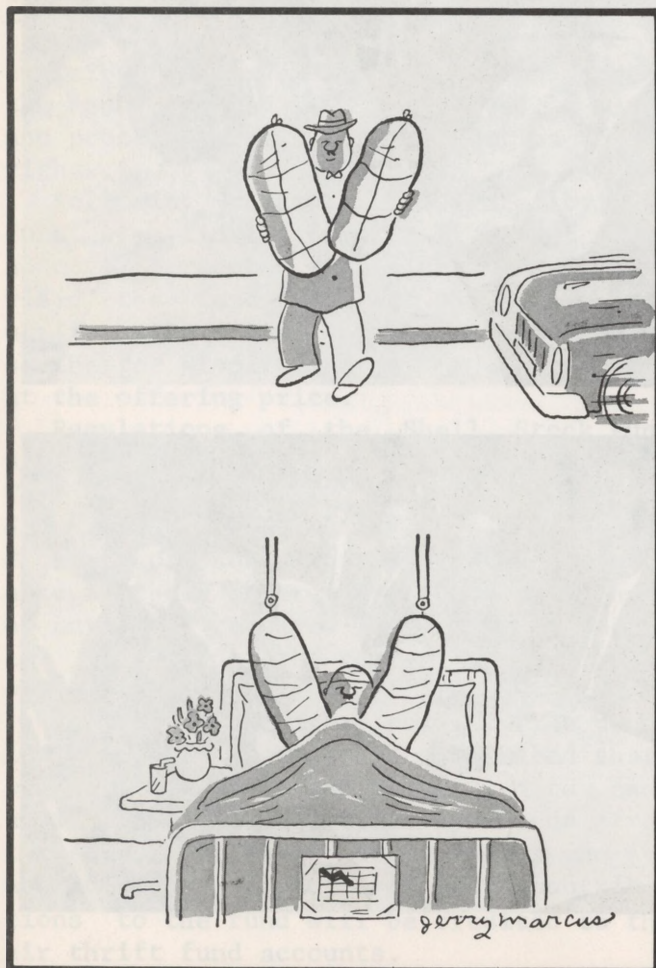

The purpose of the TAIN is to maintain the honor and character of the nursing profession; to improve community health by bettering nursing service to workers; to develop and promote standards for industrial nurses and industrial nursing services; to stimulate interest in and provide a forum for the discussion of problems in the field of industrial nursing; to stimulate industrial nurse participation in all nursing activities, Local, State, and National, and to do within the limits of the law all things necessary, proper, incidental, suitable, useful and conducive to the complete accomplishment of the foregoing purposes.
