

The children of two employees of the Houston Refinery are among the fifty 1972 scholarship winners recently announced by the Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated.

They are Robert J. Londrigan, son of R. J. Londrigan, and Donald F. Loveless, son of W. D. Loveless.

The scholarships are sponsored by the Shell Companies Foundation in its program for children of Shell employees, pensioners, or deceased employees. Now in its fourth year, the program has provided 200 such scholarships. The 1972 winners were selected by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation from approximately 700 candidates on the basis of their performance on tests administered in 1971 and on their leadership and citizenship attributes.

Each scholarship provides a renewable award of from \$500 to \$1,500 a year covering up to four years of full-time undergraduate study. The National Merit Scholarship Cor-



Parents of other league members are also active in promoting the organization and many of the ladies help run the concession stand. Proceeds are used to cover cost of operating the league and the field.
