LUCAS DEATH SHOCKS REFINERY

Refinery employees were shocked this morning to learn of the sudden death of R. L. (Deac) Lucas, long-time Manager of the Refinery's Treasury Department. Death came at mid-morning of an apparent heart attack, shortly after he had been admitted to a Houston hospital.

A veteran of over 38 years' service with Shell, Mr. Lucas had served as Manager of the Treasury Department here for almost 20 years.

Widely known throughout the community and active in church and civic activities, Mr. Lucas only last month helped guide the 1964 Refinery United Fund drive to a successful conclusion as its Co-Chairman.

Mr. Lucas was born in Kay County, Oklahoma, July 2, 1905. He joined Shell as a Timekeeper at Arkansas City, Kansas, in April 1925. During his long Shell career he held various positions at Arkansas City, St. Louis, Mo., Wood River Refinery, and Head Office, before coming to Houston in December 1943.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Dorothy Lucas, one daughter, and one son. To the family, condolences are extended by its many Shell friends.

Funeral services will be held at the Settegast-Kopf Funeral Home, 3320 Kirby, Houston. JA-6-2411.

GOLF FILMS AVAILABLE

Films of international golf matches shown on television in the 1962 and 1963 series of "Shell's Wonderful World of Golf" are now being offered on a free loan basis to golf clubs, service clubs and similar groups. The programs feature matches between top American and foreign golfers on famous world courses.

Each of the 16 mm sound films is one hour long, and all but one are in color.

Play is covered with commentary by Gene Sarazen, winner of every major golf title, and George Rogers, professional announcer and golfer. This commentary describes the players' distinctive styles, the characteristics of the course, the reasons for the players' decisions to use certain clubs, and appraisals of techniques.

Additional narration gives background information on the history and geography of the area around the course, and explains the course layout and topography. At the end of each film, the players give tips on techniques, showing in slow motion their approaches to various shots.
