

Thompson takes new job

Bettencourt named complex manager

superintendent for most of the 1970's.

Thompson moves into a new position in the Manufacturing and Technical group as manager of Manufacturing Management Systems. He will provide leadership for improving productivity in manufacturing site management.

A primary focus will be fitting computer systems to the needs of the manufacturing organization. Particular emphasis will be placed on further developing informational systems.

A second key area will be improving organization and work force effectiveness in manufacturing locations.

"Since it is a new position, the expectations are not completely defined," Thompson said. "I am going to have to further define the job as I work in it.

"It is hard to leave Deer Park," he added. "I certainly enjoyed working here as superintendent and complex manager."

Bettencourt arrived as complex manager at Deer Park with experience in a similar work environment at Norco. "Although each location has distinctive sets of challenges, we must continue to improve our effectiveness in all Shell locations in order to survive in an extremely competitive environment," Bettencourt said.

"I look forward to working with employees here to meet Deer Park's current challenges," he added.

A Galveston native, Bettencourt joined Shell after graduating from Texas A&M. He started as an engineer in Deer Park in 1949 and served in various engineering and managerial assignments until 1960 when he transferred to Head Office Engineering.

In 1962 he moved to Woodbury Plant as operations manager, moving to Head Office Engineering as projects manager in 1964. In 1966 he became manager of Engineering Construction.

In 1969 Bettencourt came back to Deer Park as superintendent. He served on special assignment in Head Office from 1973-74, before returning to Deer Park as

superintendent. He has been complex manager at Norco since September of 1979.

Will study pre-med at Southwestern

Davison wins Shell Foundation award

Robert Douglas "Doug" Davison, an outstanding scholar, accomplished musician and leading citizen, represents DPMC as winner of a 1985 Shell Companies College Scholarship.

Davison, a graduating senior from Pasadena High School, is the son of Gerry and M. E. "Dave" Davison. Mr. Davison is a recent retiree from DPMC's Industrial Hygiene department.

Davison plans to use his four-year Shell scholarship to attend Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, where he will study Pre-medicine.

He graduated with a 4.022 grade point average, above a perfect 4.0 due to premium points awarded for honors courses. He twice received the principal's Academic Excellence award for perfect grades.

Davison was a two-year member of the National Honor Society, as well as a two-year member of Mu Alpha Theta National Mathematics Honor Society.

Active in the high school band, Davison served as Lieutenant Colonel of the band and as Drum Sergeant, top officer of the percussions section.

As a freshman he was named to the high school symphonic orchestra and was named to the Texas University Interscholastic League District Band as a sophomore and junior. He won first division Solo and Ensemble - Percussion four consecutive years.

Davison was a three-year member of his school's student council and member of the student body executive committee. He was also a member of the Key Club, Health Occupational Students of America and French Club.

In October, 1984, Davison was selected Junior Rotarian. He also was a finalist to Boys State as a junior and a member of Who's Who Among American High School Students in 1985.

Outside of school activities, he is president of the Sunset United Methodist Church Youth Fellowship, a position he has held for three years. He is a member of the Pasadena Area Concerned Citizens Youth Council and has been a Special Olympics Coach in Pasadena.

Additionally, Davison worked as a student at Pasadena Bayshore Medical Center, observing and assisting with medical procedure in the hospital's 16 departments, and has worked for Pasadena orthodontist, Dr. Broussard.


Children take 'Time Out for Safety'

Out for Safety."

Judges will select 12 posters as winners to ornament 12 monthly pages in the calendar. Creators of winning posters receive \$100 U.S. savings bonds. Additionally, eight posters will receive honorable mention with those young artists awarded \$50 savings bonds.

There will be four age categories: 6 and under, 7 to 10, 11 to 13, and 14 to 17. Number of awards per group will be determined by number of entries in each age category.

The "Time Out for Safety" theme revolves around Zebenneezer, a zebra, the mascot for this year's contest.

"In football, when play gets too rough, the referees, or 'zebras' as they are affectionately nicknamed, call time out," said Lois Guthrie, Safety, contest coordinator. "A time out should be called *before* the job or playtime activity gets too rough in order to study how to avoid a penalty, or injury."

Children are encouraged to depict daily or seasonal activities illustrating how to take time out to think about what could happen -- the penalty -- and how to avoid it by ensuring safety.

A child can enter more than one poster, however, each child is eligible to win just one prize. Entries should be submitted on

standard-sized poster board (22 inches by 28 inches) cut in half (11 inches by 28 inches or 22 inches by 14 inches).
