#### THE STATE MEETINGS

Open to the public, the State Meetings have been organized by widely representative Coordinating Committees selected by the National Commission from hundreds of openly solicited nominations.

The State Meetings have been successfully bringing together a cross section of Americans: homemakers, students, nurses, artists, secretaries, rural women, household workers, teachers, civic leaders, union members, businesswomen, and church workers. Scores of thousands of these people have never been to a women's meeting before.

Why have they been coming to the State Meetings?

- To talk about their lives, their liberties, their abilities to pursue happiness on a basis of full equality with American men;
- To recognize the contributions of women to our Nation's development;
- To measure the progress of women;
- To define those barriers and practices which still prevent women's full and equal participation in all aspects of national life;
- To elect official delegates to the National Women's Conference in Houston based on State and Territorial populations.

#### THE AGENDA

Each State Meeting considers a core agenda of women's issues and related subjects of concern to them. Recommendations voted by State Meetings will shape the agenda of the National Women's Conference.

#### THE ISSUES

Whatever concerns women is an issue in the State Meetings... and at the National Women's Conference: Arts, Child Care, Credit, Education, Employment, Equal Rights Amendment, Female Offenders, Health, Homemakers' Legal Status, International Interdependence, the Image of Women in the Media, Older Women, Rape, Strategies for Change, Teenage Pregnancy, Women in Elective and Appointive Office... It's your turn—what concerns you concerns us all.

## THE NATIONAL WOMEN'S CONFERENCE

In November, nearly 2,000 elected delegates from all the States and Territories will meet in Houston to represent you at the National Women's Conference.

Their meetings will reflect the views, ideas, and opinions of the women who elected them.

While only elected delegates may vote, you too can play a part. You can come to Houston to attend workshops, enjoy special events, and lend support to your delegates.

At home, you can be in touch with the Conference through your local newspapers, through radio and television.

You can help your local, State, and National legislators to understand and support the activities and recommendations of the National Conference.

This historic meeting, working with the ideas and suggestions that grow out of the State Meetings, will make recommendations to the President of the United States and to the Congress for the elimination of barriers that still prevent women's full participation in all areas and aspects of American life.

By law, this Conference must do more than talk. It must make recommendations for action to the Congress and the President.
