UNITED FUND TOTAL REACHES \$27,405; 'WAY OVER TOP

The counting continues...and as of today our total contributions in the 1964 United Fund drive had reached \$27,405. This is over 15% above our goal, and a tribute to every employee who joined in the giant task.

Meanwhile, employees at the Chemical Plant topped their goal this year, with contributions standing at \$12,117.88 as of today, \$817.88 more than their goal of \$11,300.

Reviewing the drive this year, Co-Chairmen J. E. Garrison and R. L. Lucas expressed the feeling of every member of the UF committee, with a hearty "Thanks for a job well done".

ETHYL ALCOHOL EXPANSION AT HOUSTON PLANT

Shell Chemical Company will add a new production unit to boost the annual capacity of ethyl alcohol at its Houston Plant by 15 million gallons. Construction will begin soon, and completion is scheduled in the summer of 1964.

The Refinery is already adding shipping tankage at the docks to service this expansion.

The original unit at Houston was placed in production in 1948. Both will use Shell's process for the direct hydration of ethylene. Ethyl alcohol has many uses and large volumes are required by pharmaceutical and related industries. In recent years, Shell Chemical has supplied the cosmetics and toiletries industries with grades consistently having a mild, neutral odor.

Ethyl alcohol shipments are made from denaturing plants and bonded terminals at Houston; Sewaren, N.J.; Argo, Illinois; and Culver City, Calif.
