

Vermont secretly repeals anti-gay law

MONTPELIER, Vt. — Another American state has repealed its "sodomy" law, making it the 24th such state to do so, although two of the states, Idaho and Arkansas, later reinstated

their anti-gay laws.

Vermont repealed its law prohibiting fellatio April 23, 1977 and the repeals became effective July 1, 1977. It was done with no fanfare and thus the



national gay rights community was unaware until just a few weeks ago, when it was stumbled upon by Dr. Frank Kameny, a Washington, D.C. gay activist.

According to the Nation-

al Gay Task Force, 38% of the U.S. population now lives in areas where antigay laws ("sodomy" laws used mostly against gay persons) have been repealed.

Caped Wonder stuns theater-goers

SUPERMAN, rated PG. Released by Warner Bros. Executive producer Ilya Salkind. Produced by Pierre Spengler. Directed by Richard Donner, Screenplay by Mario Puzo, David Newman, Leslie Newman and Robert Benton. Based on the character by Jerry Seigel and Joe Shuster. Music by John Williams. The most fun to be had in a movie theater since "Star Wars," this is a great piece of pop art. The film treats its legendary hero with the utmost respect and intelligence, plunging audiences back to an age of

"Superman" offers the most fun to be had in a movie theater since "Star Wars."

Rooted in that great popular American art form — the comic book — "Superman," like "Star Wars," galvanizes comic book mythology with spectacular special effects and an epic scale. "Superman" had an idealism — a quality of spirit — that is All-American, and for that reason is joyous. This film is a terrific piece of pop art.

The filmmakers' masterstroke was to leave the myth intact, even though the story has been updated. This Superman is unblinkingly good and unimaginably strong.

There must have been a temptation to poke a little fun at the man of steel, to reveal him for a myth by camping it up. Any such temptation has been resisted. "Superman" treats its legendary hero with the utmost respect and intelligence, plunging audiences back to an age of innocence.

If you want to spend a little time believing in truth, justice and the American way, this is the film for you.

This film takes us from Superman's origins on the dying planet of Krypton up through his first encounter with a master criminal on Earth. Superman's childhood in his adopted home of Ma and Pa Kent in Smallville, U.S.A., is chronicled, as is the education bequeathed him from afar by his Kryptonite father, Lorel

Superman, using the name Clark Kent, takes a job on the "Metropolis Daily Planet," where he can be on hand to perform acts of good. At the "Planet" he meets his great love, Lois

Lane, who indulges the bumbling Clark Kent and adores Superman, never realizing that the two are the same person.

On hand are another couple of characters who will be familiar to Superman fans. They are Perry White (Jackie Cooper), the salty editor of the "Planet," and Jimmy Olsen (Marc McClure), cub photographer.

These legendary figures have been cast impeccably. Even the prankster Marlon Brando, who plays Jor-el, resists turning his character into a joke, establishing an authoritative tone that carries through to the rest of the movie.

Smaller parts like that of Superman's mother, Lara (Susannah York), and the Kents (Glenn Ford and Phyllis Thaxter), are enacted with panache by versatile actors. The role of archvillain Lex Luthor is handled admirably by Gene Hackman, who is ably assisted by sidekicks Valerie Perrine and Ned Beatty.

But the real casting coup was the discovery of Christopher Reeve for the role of Superman, and of Margot Kidder, who plays Lois Lane.

Reeve's transformation from Clark Kent to Superman and back again is astounding. He captures perfectly the essence of the Superman myth. The bumbling but well-intentioned Clark Kent is a figure with whom anyone can identify.

Clark Kent is a guy who always misses the elevator and never fails to turn up speechless when met face to face with his heartthrob, Lois Lane. Reeve's halting, stodgy manner as Kent is authentic and winsome; he bumbles with the best of us. But let this guy slip into a pair of blue tights and he's a god. Reeve's demeanor changes. He becomes relaxed, his expression opens up, his voice booms with self-confidence.

The invincible, incorruptible Superman is a figure anyone might fantasize being. Reeve is so convincing that it's easy to believe that Lois Lane, intimate with both characters, would never catch on that they're the same person.

Of course, Margot Kidder's interpretation of Lois



Lane is crucial, for she is Superman's chosen spokesperson. Her reactions to Superman become the reactions of Metropolis' biggest newspaper. Lois Lane is the girl next door, the wacky, enthusiastic journalist who can't spell, and she mirrors an audience's feelings about both Clark Kent and Superman.

Margot Kidder, an actress whose time has come, has every nuance under control. Whether she's sharply rebuking Clark Kent or gazing starry-eyed at Superman, we're with her.

All of us have to put up with the Clark Kent within us and within our associates; all of us will have to settle for dreaming about Superman.

Richard Donner, who previously directed "The Omen," keeps thing moving at an energetic clip. He is especially good with action sequences, and, overall, with the naive tone.

Several early sequences lag, notably the one in which Superman is educated by Jor-el.

The special effects, which include a full-scale California earthquake, not to mention Superman's flying, are convincingly spectacular. Veteran cinematographer Geoffrey Unsworth, who died recently, brilliantly rendered the film in a bold comic book style; and Kohn Williams, who com-

posed the scores for "Star Wars" and "Close Encounters of the Third Kind," has come up with another winner

Superman, for all his power, can't really return us to simpler times, if indeed, they ever existed. But "Superman," with the magic and power of the movies, can transport us for a little while.

This fantasy may not tell us much about the real world, but fantasy can tell us a great deal about our best instincts.

A culture with the capacity for dreaming up a myth as glorious as Superman has something to cheer.

'Sticky Fingers' is week's best bet

STICKY FINGERS by Sticky Fingers on Prelude, #12164.

Looks like one of New York's finest disco labels is on the move with what promises to be another biggie. "Sticky Fingers" kicks off with an uptempo tune, "Wastin' My Time." This song begins with good instrumentation and strong, exciting vocals, aided by a cute sax and a stinging guitar. It even has a little whistle noise.

"Takin' a Chance on You" is more of an R&B cut (that's rhythm and blues, folks). The music here is a bit similar to Crown Heights Affair's.

Side two continues the

sound of up-tempo with "Night Time," possibly the best track on the LP. The other cut on this side is also a soul-flavored, foot-tapper, sing-a-long.

Looks like another top seller for Prelude.

OUTLINE by Gino Succio on PRF-Warner, #3309.

Gino is one of the most respected musicians on the Montreal scene and here he shows why, having written, arranged and produced everything in this, his debut album.

The sound on this album is, pardon my adjectives, highly professional, remarkable and incredible, especially the side one, cut one selection, "Dancer."

Also on the first side is the hit, "The Visitors," formerly available as a limited twelve-inch Canadian import. "Visitors" incorporates a lot of the familiar synthesized sound.

Side two starts off with "Dance to Dance," a mostly soulful, slow-paced song with plenty of brass and genuine percussion in the break

Overall, this artist's first LP try should prove a winner, from a label used to winners.



New Orleans . . . it gives you a natural high

New Orleans is undoubtedly the most exciting city to visit anywhere in America. I have been hooked on this city since my first Mardi Gras — nearly twenty years ago — and still get a natural high as soon as the airport limo enters the French Quarter.

Pronounced "New-Orl-Yuns" by the natives, this great port near the mouth of the mighty Mississippi River has a strong French, Spanish and Cajun inheritance.

Magical street names like Bourbon, Rampart, Canal, Esplanade, Bienville, Royal, Toulouse, Conti, Picayne and Burgundy (Burr-GUN-Dee) conjure up romantic Old World fantasies. Except for the Superdome, modern skyscrapers and that fact that "A Streetcar Named Desire" is now a bus, New Orleans in many years has changed less than other major cities.

The square mile or so that comprises the historic French Quarter (known as the Vieux Carre, pronounced Vou Ka-Ray) is more continental than any other part of the U.S. and remains much as it was two hundred years ago! Although a lot can be said for other districts and nearby parishes, most visitors, whether gay or straight, converge on the Quarter to spend their time and money.

Mardi Gras (this year Mardi Gras climaxes, if you'll pardon the expression, Feb. 27) is the wildest celebration imaginable. It's a week of parades, floats, costume balls, parties, promiscuous sex and total abandonment. But every weekend can be a minor Mardi Gras. The bars are

open 24 hours and Bourbon Street is blocked off at nightfall to auto traffic, creating a wall-to-wall promenade of turned-on revelers.

The Quarter is the only place in America where you can buy a drink at one bar, pour it in a paper cup and walk on to the next. An auto is almost a liability for it is much easier to walk, take a taxi or hire a horse-drawn carriage. Furthermore, cruising goes on day and night on most every block or street corner, but inevitably all roads lead to Lafitte's in Exile. . . .

Lafitte's at 901 Bourbon succeeded the infamous Dixie's and has since become a legend in its own time. At this medium-sized, two-storied cruise bar you can eventually see everyone you have ever know or anyone you would want to meet, so the legend goes.

(Don't confuse Lafitte's, the gay bar, with Lafitte's Blacksmith Shop, a straight bar half a block away, or with Lafitte's Guest House, a gay guest house, two blocks away.)

A close competitor to Lafitte's is the Bourbon Pub, 801 Bourbon.

New Orleans is noted for its jazz but has never really been big on discos. The best is the Parade, upstairs at the Bourbon Pub. An alternate choice to the Parade is Le Bistro, the only other gay disco in town. It is conveniently located across the street. The Parade traditionally gets the better crowd but Le Bistro is open 24 hours. The Parade closes at sunrise.

Somewhat less frantic are the Rampart Street bars. Brady's and the Grog are favorite lesbian haunts while I prefer Travis's I and II, which are both located in the 800 block. Travis's II (known as T.T.'s) gets a lot of the S&M crowd and has a "fun" back room.

Tiger's (formally Kitty's) at 740 Burgundy also gets some macho leather numbers and the new Stake Out, above Fat Sam's, hopes to corral some of the same types.

The Galley House at 542 Chartres has a more mature crowd and is often popular afternoons.

The Post Office Lounge has closed, which should leave Fat Sam's and Le Lido as the premiere show bars.

Hopefully by now the the Last Call at 940 St. Louis will be open, featuring pool tables and pinball machines. The old Society crowd and is often popular afternoons.

The Golden Lantern at 1239 Royal is an old favorite, where anything goes from bikers to pikers.

Jewel's Tavern at 1207 Decatur is a sleazy (and I say that in a most complimentary tone) cruise bar with "hot" bartenders and humpy customers.

Popular baths include the Club Bath Chain's Club

New Orleans at 515 Toulouse, Canal Baths at Rampart and St. Ann, and Camp Baths at 512 Gravier. New and promising are the Club Gemini at 1129 Decatur and the Country Club complex at 634 Louisa.

Most promising of the new gay restaurants is Flamingo's (a short five minutes by cab out of the Quarter) at 1625 St. Charles.

Other gay-oriented restaurants with mixed crowds are the Apple Barrel, Fatted Calf, Maxey's, Ichabod's and Tortilla Flats. For the well-heeled, New Orleans offers a marvelous selection of "straight" dinner houses, among my favorites being Antoine's, Arnaud's, Beques, Brennan's, Broussard's, Commander's Palace, Corinne Dunbars, Galatoire's, Le Ruth, Louis XVI, Masson's, Moran's, Turci's, Versailles and Vieux Carre. A great place to take that special someone you met the night before for morning coffee and doughnuts is the French Market at Decatur and St. Ann.

For convenience and comfort I usually stay at the Downtowner or Vieux Carre motels, which are straight but pro-gay. Among the recommended guest houses are Ursulines at 708 Ursulines, Lafitte at 1101 Bourbon, Bourgoyne at 839 Bourbon and Cross's at 717 Ursuline.

Over the years I have met many lasting friends "way down yonder in New Orleans." I hope that you too will find the same good times, romance and adventure that I will always associate with "the city that care forgot."



Bussey Experience on Atlantic, #19216.

The "Disco Extravaganza" medley (which first came to our attention on a twelve-inch disco disc) is featured here. This cut has a female chorus singing, very emphatically ... very intimately, "Listen to the drums, gonna make you come to your maximum."

However, this jazzy-attimes LP doesn't do much for me. But then again, Gary's Gang didn't either at first but now I go to sleep with that one.

JUST BLUE by Space on Casablanca, #7131.

Space's second effort on this well-known disco label is as good as their first release, "Deliverance."

There are two perfect disco cuts here: the title cut, "Just Blue"; and "My Love Is Music."

I'm puzzled as to why Casablanca doesn't give credit to the main vocalist, Madeline Bell, a very talented woman. She also did the vocals on "Prison" and "Deliverance" from their first LP.

The rest of the album contains heavy, synthesized music, which is excellent for in-home play.

One bad note on this album: the cover. Something more could have been done with it, I think.

The twelve-inch disco scene.

Atlantic Records has bombarded us with over a dozen new releases and more are on the way, I'm told. Favorites are "Shoot Me" by Tasha Thomas (already a monster smash); "I Was Made for Dancing' by none other than Leif Garrett, but it's a bit rock-flavored; "Superman" by Herbie Mann, which I reviewed here last week; "He's the Greatest Dancer" by Sister Sledge, a very chic-sounding record destined to crossover pop; "Disco Extravaganza" by G.B. Experience; "I Want Your Love" by Chic, on a limited pink vinyl version but the song is also available on their album; "Fire Up (More and More)" by the ADC Band, a soul, R&B disco tune; and finally, there's the S&M disco single of the year, "Workin' and Slavin" by Midnight Rhythm.

For all you Parliament freaks, Casablanca has released a nine-minute version of "Aqua Boogie" on a twelve incher.

Boney M's "Dancing in the Streets" is available on

Sire Records as a limited twelve incher. It's probably one of the year's best R&B dance records.

RCA has a cute twelve incher called "There but for the Grace of God" from the group, Machine.

And last, but not least, TK has released "Nanu Nanu (I Wanna Funky with You)" by Daddy Dewdrop, a funky (of course) hit with irresistible, bouncy vocals.

Disco bits and pieces.

The Salsoul Orchestra is busy promoting the release of their new album, due any day. . . . Rumor has it that Buddah Records has picked up the rights to the giant Canadian import, "La Bamba," by Antonia Rodriguez on Epic/Canada. . . . Where is all that hot Butterfly product promised by this past Christmas? ... Donna Summer and the Village People are out on a picture disc ("Best of Live and More" and "Macho Man"). Suggested retail price is \$15 but they are suitable for framing, and since the quality of the pressing is not quite as good as the black vinyl versions, framing them would be a good idea. ... Shirley Bassey's new album offers a semidisco remake of her classic hit, "This Is My Life." ... Buddah still has some Melba Moore material that they will let us hear soon.





Book Review

'Brief Encyclopedia' is saying nothing new



BRIEF ENCYCLOPEDIA OF HOMOSEXUALITY by Stephen Wright, 144 pp., \$5.95. Stephen Wright Press, Box 134, F.D.R. Station, New York, NY 10022.

This one-man production volume (written, proofed and printed by Stephen Wright) touches upon a great deal of material in its 27 essay chapters relating to homosexuality and the gay lifestyle.

The very diversity, however, is the book's chief weakness since some areas the author goes into needs more than he does, or can, give. It isn't a bad book; it's only that author Wright attempted too much in too short a space.

What he has written has been said, and written, before and often in greater detail and more lucidly. Nevertheless, the 144-page book, complete with bibliography, might well be a good BEGINNING primer for someone unfamiliar with the area which he tries to delineate ... and an addition to one's library.

There are some items noticable by their absence, especially since the information was present in some of the works listed in his selected bibliography. These include: the trauma of coming out, and its various stages; the naturalness of "unnatural" sex, as indicated by homosexuality being commonplace among the brute animals; the need for a national program on sexuality generally and ho-

mosexuality specifically; and perhaps a section on what gay men and lesbians can do to further their cause in the fields of the judiciary, legislation and at the voting booths.

The writing style is good and easily read. Lesbianism, as usual, is given short shift, and nothing whatsoever is said about the similarities of, and needed interaction between, the women's movement and gay liberation.

A single chapter on Rotterdam, Holland, was unnecessary unless the author could give information on other interesting overseas cities and countries. This space could have been used to better advantage in sparser chapters.

As a gay activist writer, I question Stephen Wright's priorities in the selection of his material which, at times, seems almost random—to the point of being haphazard.

Although I detected undertones of gay male chauvinism in the book, I feel that certainly it was unintentional and done through ignorance, steming from conditioning rather than

Author Wright would have done well to limit his fields and to have spent more time developing those chapters where it was obvious his interests lay, rather than spinning his wheels in an overall mishmash on homosexuality.


